

The Editor's Page

ON JUNE 4 the world will learn who is the "talkin'est" announcer in the United States. At that time, the gold medal of the American Academy of Arts and Letters will be awarded. One hundred and eleven announcers have submitted their voices for the contest in hope of winning the medal, won last year by Milton Cross of the NBC. Cross was not allowed to compete this year. The medal is for "best radio diction," the qualities considered being pronunciation, articulation, tone quality, accent and cultural effect. Teachers of speech from universities and colleges are the jury. It would seem from all this that a language is no longer the "mother" tongue when spoken correctly over the radio, at least.

WALTER DAMROSCH has been preceding his musical offerings with short talks, not as much educative as inspirational. He recently questioned the wisdom of this course and intimated that he might curtail the talks. Two thousand letters poured in, requesting that he continue his pre-program chats. Swamped under the deluge, he has announced that he cannot do otherwise than continue. Another nail in the coffin of the dying god, Jazz.

THE question as to whether or not broadcasting a musical event helps or hinders the box office, has been debated in various circles, again and again, without a satisfactory answer resulting. In Philadelphia, for instance, the audiences at the symphony orchestra concerts have increased about 500

persons to each concert, it is estimated by those in charge. This is due, they say, to the fact that radio is educating people to an appreciation of fine music and that ultimately many of these listeners become enrolled in the direct audience. This would seem to answer the question in box-office terms for the doubting. * * *

TWENTY-EIGHT superintendents and commissioners of education were polled recently by Hoover's radio educational committee as to their opinion on the value of the educational radio programs being given throughout the country. Asked if they thought the programs available now were of value, 13 said "yes," two said "no," and 12 scratched their heads and reckoned that they didn't know. Asked if they thought broadcasting for schools could be made useful, 27 immediately shouted "yes," and the 29th expressed doubt. This bears out our own opinion that about half of the present educational programs, so-called, are junk. * * *

IT WILL cost something to break the radio law after the White Radio Bill passes Congress—if it does. A fine of \$100 a day during such time as a broadcast or other station violates the law, is the stiff penalty imposed for failure to comply with federal enactment. Personal violations are just as heavy. A man in St. Louis who insisted on broadcasting without a license, has just lost his station, received a fine and jail sentence, and is to be deported as an undesirable alien. Uncle Sam intends to sweep national air with a new broom.

The RADIO TATTLER

AND now we've got to do it all over again. Just as we get all the stations located on our dial, so we can find them without hunting around for an hour, the Federal Radio Commission announces that it will have to shake up the boys once more and put them on different wavelengths. That means we've got to get an eraser and night after night rub 'em out and write down new ones.

* * *

It takes from one to two years to get a receiver to the point where we can tell what is on "80" and what on "15"—you know, remember it, so we can turn to a station without getting the book out of the drawer and looking it up. It's a nuisance to look up a station when you want to tune it in. There are 100 lines on a dial and who can remember 100 stations? But after we've looked 'em up two or three times, we begin to know most of them.

We wonder if the Federal Radio Commission ever gives a thought to the trouble it causes when it shifts these stations around. What do we care about cleared channels, and heterodynes, and such things? We want to listen to radio. We want our stations where we can find 'em—once we locate 'em. Suppose the city council changed the names of streets once a year—moved Elm Street over where Tenth was, and renamed Twenty-second as Broadway. Nobody would ever get home at night.

Suppose a woman looked over her family, every twelve months, and decided that Jim would be Henry and May would hereafter be Jack, while Mary would become Papa and the old man would be Joe the iceman. Wouldn't it be a scream? Suppose we shifted around our Congressmen and Senators, so that a solid dry in 1930 became the representative of New York in 1931, or the arid South dragged down a dripping Senator from the North? What fist fights there'd be in Washington and how the plug hats would roll in the gutters!

Suppose the government decided that every year folks should move out of the

house in which they lived, and change over to one in another part of the city. The man who honed for a hut would get a mansion, and the gent with a villa would draw down a leanto on Telegraph Hill. And those that didn't like it could go jump in the bay. What a happy, peaceful, delighted community we'd have. And wouldn't we cheer for Uncle Sam?

Now this radio shakeup is even worse. The last time the official bosses shifted the stations around, we lost a lot of our favorite stations. Some of them just dropped out of sight entirely. For instance, we lost the gang up at Calgary, Canada. We used to listen to them on a one-tube peanut set, but we never hear them any more. Then KFI boomed in, but we lost him too. We hear him now, but he's behind a bush. There are a lot more.

* * *

What is going to happen with the new arrangement? And after we get the new positions all marked down, will the Commission let them alone or will this thing go on forever? It is getting so that if a man goes off on a weekend trip, when he comes home he can't find anything on his radio. He tunes for a prizefight and finds a strange station preaching a sermon. Or he sits down with his dial set for a baseball game, and in comes Angelus Temple.

* * *

The Commission ought to understand that we've got rights, as well as the government. We want our stations where we put 'em and we want 'em let alone. It makes us hot under the collar when we are watching a parade, to have some big policeman come up and push our stomachs in and yell, "stand back," in our ear, because he has the authority. It makes us just as peeved when some commission pushes our stations around and we can't find 'em.

We hope Al Smith runs again. We'll ask him to put another plank in his platform: Station Relief. If he promises to keep our radio stations where we can find them, he'll be elected sure, and in token of appreciation we'll say "rad-io," instead of "radio."

The fourth in the group is Harry Bechtel, who directs the skit, and is called upon to play a variety of roles, ranging from Tommy O'Hallahan, collegiate, to Tony the garbage man, Benny the taxi driver, and a score of other incidental voices.

Among its announcers KPO has a quintet of elongated announcers whose heights total 31 feet, ½ inch, and whose total weights tip the scales at seven pounds over half a ton. One thousand seven pounds, to be exact.

"Interesting Happenings in and Around San Francisco" is the title of the chat given at four o'clock daily by Shirley Dale over KJBS. Housewives are advised of current musicales, concerts, plays and talks, as well as sights of interest, by Miss Dale.

What a vaudeville team this pair would make, in the billing at least! Freese and Iceberg! They met for the first time recently in the studios of KOA, Denver, Ralph Freese as announcer and Iceberg as soloist with the boys' band from the High School at Laramie, Wyoming.

A recently developed improvement is the new transmission-line coupling which will enable the greater KYA transmitter to be installed at a distance from the antenna. This feature is not incorporated in any other transmitter on the Pacific Coast. This, combined with the principle of screen-grid vacuum tube transmission which has so greatly improved effectiveness of reception and which is being used for the first time in the West, will make the new transmitter an outstanding feature in Pacific Coast broadcasting.

Joyce Barthelson is stepping out these days in a new role—a radio contralto whose voice is attracting no little favorable criticism.

Known to the radio audience as the pianist and director of the Arion Trio, playing exclusively through NBC stations, Miss Barthelson has given five years to voice culture. Not even her closest friends were told of her ambition to become a singer until Joyce made her bow—incognito—through the air.

Mary Pasmore, violinist, is back in the KFRC Concert Orchestra, playing regularly, after an absence with the San Francisco Symphony.

You may think that an orchestra leader's baton is merely a short stick, and most any kind will do. However, according to Meredith Willson, KFRC concert director, the size, weight, shape and balance are all matters to be taken into serious consideration. Meredith has just received a box of batons from New York, made by hand for him by an expert baton maker of his acquaintance. For those who relish all the details, we will add that the ordinary looking little sticks cost one dollar each.

Incomplete statistics compiled by KJBS to determine the audience that tune in after midnight, shows that the greatest number of listeners for any single hour after midnight are listening from 2 to 3 a. m. Sopranos and contraltos displaying their cooking ability—and the tenors and baritones showing their ability at carrying trays of coffee from a nearby restaurant. And, of course, KTAB's manager, program director and publicity director are invited to the parties—of course!

During the casting of the KYA comic strip, College Daze, last fall, considerable difficulty was encountered in finding a man who could bring sufficient youth to the role of the wise-cracking hero, Toby Perkins. It needed a character who could wise-crack and "laugh it off," and at the same time be sentimental and calf-like when the lines de-

manded it. A member of the KYA staff, stopping at the control-board one morning, said to Charlie Concannon, control technician: "Charlie, you're good-looking enough to play a college hero in any collegiate farce." To which Charlie made reply: "Oh, yeah? Says you! Outside!" And now Charlie is playing the wise-cracking freshman of Colton University.

When Arthur Lindsay signed on first at the NBC San Francisco studios, nobody knew he was a bridegroom. Now attractive Helen Hoover has been added to the list of guest artists, and studio attaches have learned that the young soprano is Art's bride. The Lindsays formerly were staff members of KOMO Seattle, an NBC affiliated station. Lindsay took a few days off "to go fishing" and Helen to "visit her mother." They were married and came to San Francisco where Art immediately was engaged on the announcing staff.

Edna Fischer reports that she caught Harrison Holliway, KFRC manager, one Saturday afternoon, when he thought nobody was around, practicing on the drums all by himself. This recalls the early days of KFRC when Harrison, in addition to being Technical Director, Music and Publicity Director, Manager and Announcer, felt that he was neglecting things around the station and began taking piano lessons. There doesn't seem to be any limit to that boy's ambitions.

KGER, Long Beach, will begin to broadcast the Wednesday night fights from the new Wilmington Bowl with the tentative date set as June 4. The Bowl, at Wilmington, was burned down several months ago, but has been entirely rebuilt. KGER will have exclusive broadcast rights from the Bowl, according to Bill Ray, manager of KGER.

The station will continue to rebroadcast the Tuesday night fights from the Olympic Auditorium in Los Angeles. These originate through KFVB in Hollywood.







William H. Wright, KFRC

MEET Mr. William H. Wright!"
"Gladameetcha!"

"You've heard of Mr. Wright, of KFRC."

"Oh, yes. Yes, sure. To be sure. Mr. Wright. Let's see, eh—Did you say KFRC?"

"Yes, Bill Wright. Santa Claus, the Laughfinder, Captain Vacation, Professor Hamburg, and—

"You don't say! Gladameetcha! This is a pleasure! Well, well, well!"

Bill! Wright's versatility has given him a flock of pseudonyms to hide behind. In case you are fond of collecting things, here are a few more: Mr. XYZ, Uncle Bill, Madame Sounjeray, Baron Waste, Oscar P. Schultz and Louie the Wop. However, this story is an attempt to tell you something about Bill Wright and so we'll have to leave these other gentlemen until later.

Even Bill's press agent, if he had one, couldn't call Bill good looking, no matter how large his salary or small his conscience. He is agreeably homely. You probably know what we mean. He is such a good fellow, so obliging, considerate, and intelligently understanding that his homeliness takes on agreeable qualities in spite of itself. While we are concerned with Bill's face we must include the inevitable cigar that is always there. Great long black cigars come and go with alarming rapidity. If all the cigars Bill has smoked during his 36 years were placed end to end on the highway between San Francisco and New York, and lit, transcontinental automobile travel would be eliminated.

St. Luke's Hospital, San Francisco, is the first who "knew him when." Bill was born there, on a cold March day in 1894, at a very early age. At least Bill says it was a very early age, and he was there—if he can believe his parents.

His school days behind him, Bill went to work on the construction of gold dredgers, which was such hard work that even a world war seemed jolly in contrast. After twenty-eight months in the army, including eighteen months as a shavetail of infantry, he acquired the attitude that it was not necessary to

work for a living. And so, he says, he went into the advertising and publicity rackets.

A natural predilection for dramatics soon precipitated him into the show business where he found plenty of success awaiting him. He spent two years putting on local talent shows in San Francisco and the bay district for lodges and other organizations. Finally, he found himself high and dry when a dramatic company in which he was play-

ing character parts, went broke and he returned to the San Francisco newspapers. He worked on both the Examiner and the Call, and later became advertising manager for two different San Francisco concerns. In that way he succeeded in keeping the ubiquitous wolf a safe distance from the door.

It was not until about two years ago that radio engaged his attention seriously. New Cell Aids "Blind" Flying

THE latest development of the photo-electric cell, the electric eye of modern science, contributes to the safety of blind flying by reducing the hazard of making a landing through a ground fog. George Lewis, vice-president of the Arcturus Radio Tube Company, describes the device upon which his engineers are working. Lewis says:

"The combination of radio and marker beacons has contributed much to the safety of blind flying by leading the pilot directly to his terminal field. And the use of a sensitive barometric altimeter as recently demonstrated by Jimmie Doolittle at Mitchell Field brings the safe blind landing into the realm of possibility. It remains to mark accurately the boundary of the field for the pilot concentrating upon his instruments, as he must do when flying blind.

"The pilot cannot look over the side of his plane—a useless waste of time anyway—for, in a heavy ground fog, there is nothing for him to see. Science has provided a third and highly sensitive eye in the photo-electric cell which, with associated apparatus, can be depended upon to inform the flyer that he has crossed the border of the field, and may flatten out for the landing.

"A series of photo-electric cells are placed along the field boundary and the plane is equipped with a special neon light projector, throwing a wide beam downward. From an altitude of 50 feet, this light will penetrate a thick fog, and cast a line of light upon the ground at right angles to the plane and sufficiently long to cut at least one cell. The flash of light actuates a radio transmitter that sends an unmistakable signal received on the standard airplane beacon receiver, and the pilot knows that safe, smooth runway is beneath him."





Radio War Threatens With Canada

CANADA and the United States may go to war, in a radio sense, if some working arrangement cannot be established, by which Canada can secure adequate wave length channels for broadcast purposes. In plain language, Canada contends that the United States is "hogging" too much space. It intimates that corporate greed—the gulping of profits by advertising sponsors is at the bottom of it. If Canada stands on what she believes is her rights—and they may be just—broadcasting in this country may be thrown into complete chaos.

The division of wave lengths between Canada and the United States has become a crucial matter since Canada decided it was behind other nations in the world in radio affairs and started to spread out. The situation has been somewhat bitterly discussed by the Canadian parliament, fears having been expressed there that Canada's acceptance of the present division may seriously interfere with getting them back if they are actually needed.

In other words, Canada takes the position that each nation in the world has a sovereign right to the use of any and all broadcast bands—undeniably true, when viewed by the strict construction of sovereign powers. At the same time it is recognized that until radio progresses to the point where interference can be eliminated, some working arrangement must be made between neighboring countries, so that there will be no clash.

Pursuant to this attitude, which it must be admitted was both legal and just, Canada applied to the United States, on the passing of the radio act of 1927, for a division of the 96 available broadcast channels, between Canada and the United States. The thing was worked out, but not to Canada's satisfaction. At the present time Canada has the exclusive use of only five frequencies, while it shares 12 frequencies with the United States, and uses one frequency 555.6 meters, which is outside the American broadcast band.

To squeeze her 80 broadcasting stations within the small frequency allotment, Canada has two or more broadcasters to one transmitter, with separate call letters. The arrangement is not adequate for the broadcasting demands of the country. In reply

to further applications for frequencies, the United States suggested that allocations be made on the basis of the relative populations of the two countries.

"The division demanded by the United States representatives," says the Canadian Minister of Marine and Fisheries, "is not acceptable to the Canadian representatives."

The conference between the representatives of the two countries at which the additional suggested allocations were discussed adjourned without getting anywhere, owing to the refusal of the Canadians to accept this country's propositions. Canada's population is scattered more widely than in this country and it was alleged that an allocation by population would leave Canada very much in the lurch.

If Canada exercises her sovereign right to broadcast on frequencies allotted by the international conference, or in accordance with her own needs, it will raise Ned in the United States on at least 12 shared frequencies and many more not shared but of use in Canada as well as this country. Such a "war" between Canada and the United States would be disastrous to radio reception in both countries.

Canadian stations are equipped with powerful transmitters, the majority of which are so constructed that their waves die out within a short distance. This is deliberately done, to prevent interference in this country. If, however, Canada develops a peeve, and modulates her stations, as we do in this country, there will come pouring down from the north a barrage of high-powered waves that will ruin reception on many of our major wave lengths.

Just what the Canadian action will be remains in doubt. The conference, which began in friendly fashion, wound up in a somewhat tense frame of mind, and if Canada decides to stand on her rights, anything may happen.

A Page from the NBC Woman's Magazine of the Air

PRETEND you are a pussy-cat that's been sleeping in the sun," suggested Helen Chase, the Camay beauty expert, in a recent Monday morning talk during a broadcast of the NBC "Woman's Magazine of the Air."

"This is the way to wake up," Miss Chase explained as she began her instructions to Frances and her radio auditors. "Pretend you are a pussy-cat that's been sleeping in the sun. Stretch your arms overhead; stretch your toes. Lift the muscles in your back until they arch it. Stretch till you pull. Now flop all over—be as limp as a chiffon handkerchief. Stretch and relax several times.

"This would be a good time to lift up the legs and pretend that you are pedaling a bicycle. That will tighten up the hips. Then, when you are ready to get up, lie flat on your back with your arms at your sides and your feet together, and raise yourself slowly without the help of your hands, keeping your knees stiff and your feet right down on the bed. That makes the lazy abdominal muscles do real work all by themselves. When you are sitting up, don't lean on your hands. Lift your feet up and swoop them down on the floor and stand up."

Miss Chase also suggested that every part of dressing be made an exercise and that women, when cooking and cleaning about the house, make the ordinary movements become exercises.

Another Helen of the WMA—Helen Webster—recently presented a number of hints for using attractive screens to give a room dignity, character and interest.

"Screens possess a certain architectural quality which adds to their significance in a decorative plan," said Miss Webster during one of her Fuller talks. "For instance, a too long wall space may be broken by the introduction of a screen, provided its height and proportions are in harmony with the architectural lines of the room. Again, if you are afflicted with a room that has too many doors, you may be able to screen off one of the doors and create a greater sense of repose and balance. A screen may even change the lines of a room by screening off a por-

tion and lending an air of interest to what might otherwise be an obvious corner.

"A good looking screen, pulled across the large opening which so often connects modern living and dining rooms, will alleviate this awkward situation and add to the attractiveness of the scene as well. Screens may also be used as a protection against draughts, or to screen off some unsightly pieces of furniture.

In her latest Lady Pepperell talk, Miss Webster described a room for a boy of any age.

"I have found that a boy can have just as much appreciation for a good looking decorative scheme as any girl," declared Miss Webster. "A boy's room must be cozy, it must have color, but it daren't be frilly. It may have extra furniture pieces in it that a girl wouldn't care about. A set of shelves, for instance, that could be used for books and the top for all sorts of odds and ends. The table should be of fair size, so that the boy will have sprawling room. A plain bed of walnut or maple, or a metal bed finished to represent walnut or maple is best. The chest of drawers for the boy's clothes may match the bed, and the bookcase or the set of shelves may also be painted to match."

For the floor Miss Webster suggested linoleum that has the appearance of hardwood and which is easy to clean. Walls of light tan, painted or papered, a ceiling of light yellow, a bedspread of hand-blocked linen with a design in brown, rose and yellow on a natural colored background, peach colored Lady Pepperell sheets and cases, cream colored net curtains at the window with drapes of hand-blocked linen, a simple chiffonier or bureau, several chairs, including one that is wide and comfortable, and a table lamp complete the room. Let the boy choose his own pictures and place his books and things where he wants them.

And here's a hint from Ann Holden, the WMA's domestic science authority. One tablespoonful of water with two egg yolks will be the equivalent of one whole egg. The yolks and water can be used instead of eggs in making cookies, muffins and other things where the absence of the whites of the eggs will not be noticed.



Present Broadcast Plan Must Be Scrapped

THE new radio law will turn upside down the carefully worked out allocations of station and power, with which the Federal Radio Commission has struggled for past years, under the Davis equitable distribution system, it was revealed this week, as a revised draft of government regulations was made public.

The revisions are contained in the Couzens communication bill which has been practically approved by all the major Federal interests. Under the new law, the five zones now maintained for allocation purposes will be continued, but the zones will no longer be used as a basis for a division of radio facilities. Instead allocations will be by states, a wholly new and somewhat interesting phase of the situation.

One of the features of the new law is that stations, using not more than 100 watts of power, if located more than 50 miles from any city with a population of 100,000, shall not be charged against the quota of their state, nor are such stations to be included in the computation of the country's facilities which are to be divided among the states. This would permit the establishment, in some of the more sparsely settled states, of a number of small stations in addition to the "quota" facilities which would be allowed the states.

The new law provides for three major classes of stations: Class A—those of 5000 or more watts of power, operating on exclusive frequencies; Class B—stations using between 100 and 5000 watts, with two or more stations assigned to the same frequency; Class C—those of not more than 100 watts of power, which will be placed on any frequency on which they can operate without interference with each other.

There are other important items in the new law of general public interest. One provides for the withholding of license privileges from applicants adjudged guilty of violating anti-trust laws, in any Federal court, and for the withholding of license from any applicant engaged in the manufacture, sale or distribution of radio communication apparatus, unless the applicant agrees to lease or sell his apparatus to all applicants. The compensation, if it cannot be agreed upon mutually, will be determined by the Federal commission in charge.

The law also classes with an applicant, any parent, subsidiary or affiliated company with which he may be connected and making all responsible for any action which might make a licensee liable to penalty under the act. The existing prohibition upon mergers of wire and wire communication companies, which has served as a barrier to the projected amalgamation of the Radio Corporation of America and the International Telephone and Telegraph Company, is continued in force. There is nothing in the bill, however, which prevents an interchange or exchange of communication service between such organizations, thereby insuring mobile communication arrangements to meet public demand.

Radio Transmission Undergoes Changes

THIS year has developed interesting improvements in radio transmission, according to John Cope, Chief Engineer of the Pacific Broadcasting Corporation. Mr. Cope, who is supervising the installation of the Greater KYA transmitter, says: "Radio broadcasting, while developed to a very high degree from the equipment and production standpoint, nevertheless is seeing important ideas in equipment and design formulated from day to day. The Greater KYA screen-grid transmitter incorporates all important developments to date, and is the first of the latest models to be installed in the United States.

"It offers many scientific features not to be found in any other existing transmitter, and from the standpoint of effective power and quality of reproduction, will be decidedly outstanding. Engineers are watching the installation with keen interest and the public audience is promised reception that has never before been available on the Pacific Coast. One feature of inestimable value to the receiver will be that, while the average modern transmitter is accurate to within 500 cycles, the Greater KYA equipment will maintain precision of 50 cycles' variation. This will insure maximum strength with minimum interference."




