

## The Editor's Page

THE continuance of the Standard Symphony Hour upon a new basis is meeting with wide popular approval. In place of the alternate symphonic productions of the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra and the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra, an entirely new body of musicians has been recruited under the able baton of Mishel Piastro—many of them members of the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra. The programs which this new organization have been giving are of a lighter type than those which characterized the previous regime and seem to have a wider appeal. The musical as well as the radio world is glad to see a perpetuation of this famous hour, noted for its presentation of good music. Better still, the Standard Oil Company maintains a certain dignity about its advertising which removes all offensiveness from the sponsored program as an institution.

\* \* \*

THERE is a certain truth in the statement of Representative Reid of Illinois that whoever controls radio, in the future, will control the Nation. No other agency has the power to mould opinion as has the radio. In the heyday of its greatest power the press did not begin to swing popular emotions and ideas half as rapidly nor a tenth as effectively as can one direct speech over the radio today. Reid is battling the efforts of certain powerful agencies in this country to gain control of the entire radio field. He is quite correct in his efforts. Radio should never be controlled by any agency other than the government. By its very power to sway public opinion it must needs be the tool of the public itself, safe-

guarded and properly controlled, or it will some day be used against national interests. Radio is a dictator—good or bad according to its controlling motives. The American public should control it—at the polls, if necessary, or radio will some day control the American public. \* \* \*

NOW and then a song sweeps the country like the proverbial wildfire, carrying a melody that everybody whistles, sings and hums. The most recent is the Main Stein Song, popularized by radio, and now running around 350,000 copies. The song was written by E. A. Fenstad, bandmaster in the United States Army, in 1901, as a march. It was rewritten as a stein song by A. W. Sprague, professor of music at the University of Maine, in 1910. Few copies were sold. Then the National Broadcasting Company acquired the rights and "plugged" it over the air. It took, instantly, rolling up a small fortune for the broadcasting organization. The same song was offered to the University of Maine and they refused to buy it. This, however, was before it became nationally popular.

\* \* \*

THE University of California, wealthiest of western colleges, is not abreast of other institutions in the matter of radio. There are certain progressive elements on the faculty who would see the university do something in the radio educational field, directly from the university itself. It would seem that a copy of the radio activities of Washington State College might be mailed to some of our own state university regents with good effect.



# Radio Sleuth Tracks Mystery Waves

**W**HERE does a radio wave go when it goes?

This scientifically perplexing question is before the Bureau of Standards, the governmental agency that answers more radio questions than perhaps any agency in the United States. Just now they are concerned with the route taken by a wave after it leaves a transmitter, on its path around the world.

Radio engineers have debated long and earnestly about the road which the invisible little agencies of entertainment and electrical energy, that please millions of people, follow around the world, and where they go after their work is done. Three main highways are known to exist—the Heaviside layer, the air and the earth. But which is the most traveled?

Some engineers believe that an ionized portion of the atmosphere above the earth is the travel route and that all waves hurry to this broad highway. But this does not explain how every antenna, wire and metal conductor lures them off the path again. Do they bounce between this layer and earth, losing strength with every bounce? Some scientists think they do, and there is much to sustain their opinion.

One thing which lends color to their theory is that it is known that the ionized bed-spread varies its height from the earth from hour to hour, and this, in a measure, corresponds to the strength of signals from stations. The Bureau of Standards has undertaken an intricate system of fluctuation measurement, designed to settle, if possible, this theory.

A powerful transmitter is used which bounces signals at the layer, at various angles—plots its location, as it were. The echoes from this signal are timed and measured as to signal strength. Also, difference in time between earth and “sky” waves are plotted, this giving a rough estimate of the height of the ionized layer. In this way it is hoped to work out a definite table of distances.

The purpose in all this sky chasing of an invisible rind against which radio waves are believed to bounce, is that, once the exact height and phenomena are determined, radio stations will be built to utilize it to the fullest

extent. Such problems as fading, signal fluctuation and the like may be overcome entirely once the mysterious highway along which the waves travel is accurately plotted.

The magnitude of the work may be understood when it is known that the time difference between the original impulse sent from a station and its “echo” is figured in ten-thousandths of a second—the average margin by which a commuter catches his boat or train. Instruments of astonishing accuracy have to be used for the work.

## Radios In White House Cars

**A**UTOMOBILE radio find a devotee in Mrs. Herbert Hoover, whose personal limousine is equipped with a radio receiving set. It is frequently tuned in while the First Lady of the Land is out for a drive.

Among the “radio as you go” enthusiasts also is Lawrence Richey, one of President Hoover’s secretaries. His private car, too, has a radio set similar to the one in Mrs. Hoover’s. The sets are seldom in use while driving about the city, their owners preferring to operate them during drives to the President’s summer camp or while out in the country.

Mrs. Hoover’s radio was one of the first of its kind. It consists of a chassis with six tubes installed behind the dash and with the dial on the center of the instrument board where it can be turned by the chauffeur. Tubes are mounted so as to be protected from vibration and jars. Power is derived from the car’s storage battery, and B-battery current comes from dry cells under the floor of the car.

The antenna is concealed completely in the top of the car, while the small loud-speaker is inconspicuously placed in one corner.

Neither Mrs. Hoover nor Mr. Richey cared to let it be known that they had radios in their cars because it might be construed as partisanship in the controversy that has arisen over the alleged “nuisance” of automobile radios. The White House has no disposition to take part in the controversy, especially in view of the trade angle involved.

# Air Police Start Work Soon

**D**ETERMINED that broadcast stations and other transmitting radio equipment shall keep on their proper wave lengths, Uncle Sam is preparing to "check and double-check" every station in the United States through a new monitor station, which is being built at Grand Island, Neb. The point was chosen because it was estimated to be the radio center of the country.

Working in connection with this major station are nine "district police stations" or sub-stations in as many cities, throughout the country, with six squad cars, radio equipped, which will form the flying squadron of the government's monitor system. All will be equipped with checking devices, designed to keep track of all manner of radio waves, both legal and illegal.

The plant at Grand Island has been practically completed and the work of installing the delicate apparatus which will make the station the most unique monitor point in the world, has begun. The instruments are to be housed in an operating laboratory, to which is attached, at some distance, a power plant. All wiring is underground and shielded. The houses alone cost \$80,000.

Thirty men will be on duty all the time at the "police station," all technically trained and experts in their individual lines. The police work includes the monitoring of short and long wave and intermediate broadcast wave stations all over the world. Stations in cleared channels will be monitored directly from Nebraska. Stations not on the cleared channels will be monitored by the nine district stations scattered about the country.

The sub-stations are located in San Francisco, Los Angeles, Boston, Baltimore, Atlanta, New Orleans, Portland, Chicago and Detroit. The automobile units will work out of Baltimore, Atlanta, Galveston, San Francisco, Detroit and Chicago.

Now as to the purpose of it all: checks will be made of the 600 broadcasting units, to see that each keeps on its frequency. The slightest deviation or swing of a big station from its assigned frequency, under the system of station allocation now in effect, causes its wave to cross the wave of some other station, producing a whistle in the background. The major purpose of the government's monitoring system is to keep the stations "on wave."

In addition there is a lot of regular "police

work" to be done. Unlicensed transmissions, such as between rum runners and land stations, operated without government permission, amateur transmissions, one of the important branches of radio, and a thousand other radio activities, including aviation, the newest of the fields to be invaded by the science, all need accurate monitoring to be efficient and to keep off of each other's toes. This the monitoring unit will accomplish.

The monitor stations will be equipped with the most selective and sensitive radio apparatus it is possible to obtain.

## Sphinx to Have Own Broadcast Unit

**T**HE land of pyramid and crane, of Cleopatra's moonlight boat rides, of camel and flooding Nile, is to shimmy and shake to the rhythm of American jazz, when four broadcasting stations, now in course of construction, are finished. Egypt is becoming modern.

Radio has been almost an unknown quantity around Gizeh and the playground of the Rameses family. Now and then a traveler with a portable receiver went through, intriguing the natives with a bit of foreign music. The British and French have radio posts down there, but only for official use and not for broadcast purposes.

But into the home of historical romance came tales of foreign radio and the Egyptian government has granted certain concessions to invading companies to erect stations. As yet there is no antenna on the Great Pyramid of Cheops, nor are the camels equipped with loops. But that is coming, and soon. The four stations are to be erected along the Nile, to serve the whole country. Special programs, all under government supervision, are to be given.

A good radio receiver will bring two rugs, a package of dates, and twelve hours of haggling, in any market-place. And batteries will be sold in the sweet-meat shops where the Turkish candy draws the flies. And over the stagnant ponds of heron-ville Paul Whiteman and his orchestra will bring joy to camel drivers and water boys.

The silent Sphinx will no longer be silent. A 500-watt station will heterodyne her privacy, unless she sinks still farther into the sands of the Nile and gets a well-earned rest.

# A Page from the NBC Woman's Magazine of the Air

**T**WO to one—Helen Webster and Ann Holden in a single 20-minute period of NBC's "Woman's Magazine of the Air"—that is what is promised listeners when the new Rumford Baking Powder Feature is introduced this Saturday, June 14.

Hot breakfasts for children is one of the things in which Miss Webster believes most. In an Easier Housekeeping talk just a short time ago she expressed herself on this important matter and referred to a survey which showed that an appalling number of children started off to school or began the morning's play with cold breakfasts.

"Regardless of the time of year," said Miss Webster, "unless, of course, it is an exhausting hot day, a child should have at least one hot dish or drink for his morning meal. The system is at a low ebb on first arising. Maybe we're just sleepy 'all over'—the body engines need proper stoking to start them functioning. And some warm food is an essential."

"With the combination of a gas range and modern, improved cereals that can be cooked in a few minutes, there is no reason why these healthful foods should be absent from the morning menu, no matter if father and mother, and grandmother, too, all start off to business after breakfast."

Have you tried canning your fruits and vegetables in the oven? Miss Holden discussed this labor and time-saving method in a recent Wedgewood period and many housewives have written to tell her how successful they have been in following her suggestions. She gave a recipe for canning strawberries the oven method. Here it is:

Add one cup of sugar and two tablespoons of water to each quart of berries, which have been prepared by washing and hulling. Only the freshest strawberries should be used. Even if they show only a slight imperfection use them for a shortcake or something else that you will serve immediately.

Simmer the berries and sugar for 15 minutes, and stand overnight. Reheat the next morning, then fill the scalded jars to within an inch of the top. Adjust the scalded rubbers and partially clamp the covers. Set the heat control of your Wedgewood at 250 degrees. Place the jars of fruit in the oven, and leave them there for 50 minutes. Upon removal from the oven, seal the jars tightly and turn them upside down to cool. Keep the jars in a dark place where it is cool, but where the fruit will be in no danger of freezing.



Miss Holden cautioned her auditors to use only jars which are absolutely flawless and rubber rings which are new and unused. Jars, tops and rubbers must be scalded thoroughly in boiling water. Complete instructions are given in a Wedgewood cook book Miss Holden offers anyone who will write for it.

The woman who is both cook and breadwinner will appreciate a suggestion Miss Holden made during a Crisco period. French fried potatoes can be prepared in the morning and cooked until they are almost done. Then, just before dinner, they can be plunged into hot Crisco and they'll be crisp and ready to serve in a few minutes.

# Stations Block Changes to New Wavelengths

PLANS of the Federal Radio Commission to shift some 26 stations on April 30, in the "cleared channel" playground have been temporarily halted through appeals filed by various stations, designed to anchor them on the channels they are now using. The commission's plan will have to be set aside for several months at least, until all the appeals are heard.

Faced with a storm of objections, the commission has changed the projected date of shifting, from April 30 to July 31, and may, at that time, defer the time to a still later date. A hearing is to be held on June 17, at which time all the protestants will be given an opportunity to present evidence why they should not be changed around in the "playground" and given new allocations, alleged to be better suited to general reception.

The commission, which seems to have a rare facility for making trouble for itself, got into this mess by first providing for changes in wavelengths without consulting the stations or holding any hearings. No effort was made to find out if the changes would be satisfactory, the commission taking arbitrary action. As a result, one of the stations slapped down a temporary injunction on the commission, halting the parade.

The order transferring the 26 stations to new "residence spots" in the cleared channel, was made last month in an alleged effort to reduce interference arising from insufficient separation between stations on adjacent channels. The average separation of these stations is now 522 miles. Under the new arrangement it was planned to separate them 1117 miles. By so doing, stations could be put on the same wavelength without listeners hearing the background whistle of station heterodyne.

It is conceded at Washington that the "cleared channel" arrangement is only a means of caring for a difficult situation in a temporary manner. Radio engineers are working day and night on some method by which broadcasts can be made to "die out" after a certain number of miles, yet maintain their "punch" up to the boarderline limits of their field. When this is done, a station will have a certain working range and there will be then offered a direct solution of interference.

The list of stations printed recently in

BROADCAST WEEKLY, as among those to be moved to new wavelengths will, under the present commission order, therefore, remain on their present bands without change until the pending appeals are all heard and the commission decides what it intends to do.

## Uncle Sam to Give New Radio Programs

THE radio service of the United States Department of Agriculture, which has become one of the most important branches of that division of the government, is planning a new series of programs for next fall, designed to give people in various sections of the country a more localized service than is possible at the present time.

No change is contemplated in the network broadcasts of the department, which reaches audiences scattered over 37 states, and which is centralized in Washington, D. C. These programs are made of the widest possible interest, covering current developments in agriculture and summarizing and interpreting the various reports of the department upon myriad subjects.


But another type of program is being prepared which will augment the weather reports, market news and information broadcasts which are sent out in cooperation with various individual stations. The new plan includes arrangements with land-grant colleges and universities, under which special programs will be released in each state. The department of agriculture will provide half of the programs and the state the other half and will result, it is believed, in a better balancing of programs as well as an avoidance of duplications.

The new schedule will start shortly in advance of the fall broadcasting season, the first program being put on the air about September 1. As a result of this pool of Federal and state resources, it is believed, there will be placed before audiences in each state the latest and most useful information available, with special reference to those matters in which they are interested. Further announcements of these coming programs which will be of wide popular interest, will be made later.


