The Editor's Page

SAN FRANCISCO'S first trade show of radio crafts, will be held at the William Taylor Hotel June 30 to July 2, inclusive, coincidentally with the convention of the Western Music and Radio Trades Association. The two events are expected to knit more closely the growing alliance of the musical and radio interests of the West.

The Trade Show will mark the only scheduled showing of what is new in radio for the coming year, no exposition being planned. At this show the latest models of the radio art, the recent engineering developments and the technical and trade changes or advancements for the forthcoming season will be presented in a notable display.

The Trade Show is primarily





FLOOR PLANS SHOWING ARRANGEMENT OF BOOTHS





TRAVELING along the short trail which leads to radio's cradle, one finds a host of interesting development aside from those filed in the pigeonhole chronicled "Technical Improvements."

We are thinking especially of the changed attitude on the part of the radio audience and the sponsor whose generosity makes possible many of the finest studio performances.

Vacation time prompts our thought.

As recently as two years ago popular opinion had it that radio receiving sets might as well be placed in the attic for all the use they were given during the summer season. There is no voice raised now to support that contention. In fact the radio salesman will tell you that hundreds of portable receiving sets are being sold these days for the country home or to complete the shopping list of "items needed" for the camping trip.

So there is little, if any, change in the broadcast programs presented between June 1 and September 30, which is conceded generally as the vacation season. Just as much is spent by sponsors to insure brilliant shows in summer as in winter. Witness the "Woman's Magazine of the Air," or any of the programs which come to western listeners from the New York studios of the National Broadcasting Company. Was a time when these coast-to-coast releases were suspended for a specified period during the vacation season. No one thinks of such a thing now. Instead, new programs constantly are being given their premiers.

This week's array of talent bespeaks the interest shown in vacation WMA programs at the San Francisco studios. Gail Taylor, soprano, and Easton Kent, two of the most in demand of all NBC artists, are the Monday performers, and Tuesday will see before the microphone Betty Kelly, youthful soloist well known to NBC listeners, and Harold Dana, popular baritone. Annabelle Jones Rose, contralto, and Harold Peary, whose talent extends to acting as well as singing, are programmed for Wednesday. Thursday and Friday bring the petite Lucile Kirtley, Eldredge, the personable crooner; Peggy George Chapman, and Gwynfi Jones, Welsh tenor. Irving Kennedy and Harry Stanton are the Saturday entertainers.

Edward J. Fitzpatrick again will be in the conductor's stand to direct the Magazine Melodists in an impressive group of appropriate selections, all interpreted from special arrangements.

Helen Webster and Ann Holden probably will have more to say during the week than any of their colleagues, but opportunity will be afforded to hear Helen Chase, Camay specialist, and Jean Carroll, who offers advice regularly on care of the hair. Helen and Ann "have their say" about numerous things, and not a few helpful hints in the arts of cooking and home management may be gleaned from their informal chats.

Charles McAllister presides as master of ceremonies again this week, pending the return Monday of Bennie Walker, the genial editor.

Speaking of vacation days, one of Miss Holden's features—Wedgewood—will be devoted to the preparation of the summer tea party. Miss Webster takes cognizance of the Friday holiday in her Easier Housekeeping talk on "Fourth of July Preparations."

If the summer cottage is uppermost in madam's mind, she surely will tune to the Fuller Feature devoted to Interior Decoration and to Del Ray's twenty minutes, wherein recipes are offered for the preparation of tempting Italian dishes. What could be more appetizing when the crowd assembles on the wide veranda of the beach house, bathed in a bracing sea breeze, or at the log cabin in some sheltered mountain glen? And what could be prepared more easily by the host or hostess? Just open a can for a full meal, Ann Holden insists.

There are talks on style, and other things too numerous to mention.

And the comedy bits which lighten many of the WMA features are not to be overlooked as we review the galaxy of talented performers who will be heard all through the summer season. Magnolia, the colored character created by Georgia Simmons; Henry, her "courthouse husband," and Charley advocate the use of Oronite in a mirth-provoking skit presented every Wednesday morning. The Bon Ami Radio Matinee is another comedy skit in which Bobbe Deane's juvenile interpretation is attracting wide attention.

The RADIO TATTLER

THERE are a lot of mistakes in the radio field. Oversights, we might say. Either announcers are near-sighted, or else they just read what is handed to them. For instance, there was the Westinghouse "salute" to Chicago. Personally, we don't know any reason for saluting Chicago. There were so many first louies in the world war to be saluted, that saluting got to be a sort of drug on the market.

But the Westinghouse people felt it would be a nice thing to salute Chicago all up and down a network—and they did. They saluted the public buildings, Lake Michigan, their own factory, Michigan Boulevard, the city hall, two old ladies in front of a radio store, and the outbound express. And they never mentioned Chicago's biggest industry—the gunman!

If an eastern mayor visits San Francisco, he always calls on Mayor Rolph to inquire about the height of the city hall dome. He wouldn't think of building a city hall without asking Mayor Rolph for those famous figures. And if Mayor Rolph is elected Governor, some time, he'll be just as good a booster for the dome of the State Capitol, as he was for the dome of the city hall. And a radio announcer who puts him on the air and forgets to identify him as the one man in the state who knows how high the state dome is, might just as well resign.

It is little things like this that indicate a careless spirit in broadcasting. It gets people to blaming radio announcers for things they never do. Out at the Cliff House is an eatery over which is this sign: "Half Fried Chicken—50 cents—No Covert Charge!" We heard a man ask the proprietor if a radio announcer wrote out the sign for him. It read just like a lot of radio announcements sound over the air.

* * *

We heard a prize one the other night. Said the announcer: "We are playing the next number for Mr. John Doe, who is celebrating his tenth birthday at the home of his grandchildren in San Mateo." It struck us, that, if what the announcer said was true,

grandpa had done pretty well, for his age, all things considered. Just the other day we dialed in this one: "Miss Jane Roe appears daily from this station on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays!" Well, we'd like to see her try it!

* * *

If an undertaker buried the wrong man, or a man voted the wrong ticket, it would produce a yell. But an announcer can say anything and it is all right. "We will be on the air tomorrow with an all request program made up of numbers selected by the Purity Baking company." He can even go out of his way and say: "Well folks, the Nip and Tuck boys, song and dance artists, will now entertain you with a little saxophone number, entitled, etc.," as we heard one announce.

* * *

A man in the East got a divorce from his wife on the ground of cruelty. "She nagged me," he put in his complaint. "She charged me with being morose and said I talked like a radio announcer." The court granted the divorce, holding that the allegation savored of "extreme and unusual" cruelty on her part. But it shows how far radio announcements have a grip on the public.

* * *

A man may split an infinitiv—and get away with it. He may give the wrong standard time, and the world will forgive him. But when he tells a woman that: "The Safeway Beauty Shop has an incompetant staff of experts for your every need," she will believe him every time—and shun the shop. Some station, with a sense of humor, can popularize itself overnight by paying a dollar for every mistake in its announcements, caught by listeners, the money to go to a fund to buy a grammar for the announcer.

If the announcers want to make us laugh—all right. But we don't like to laugh in the wrong place. Before they put some of this stuff on the air, they ought to read it to the studio dog. A dog has a sense of humor. If he chuckles in the wrong place, there is probably something wrong with it. That will give the announcer time to revise it and we can keep a straight face in front of the loudspeaker.




