



Commission Battles Broadcaster

MISREPRESENTATION of merchandise over the radio is as illegal as misrepresentation by the printed word, in the view of the Federal Trade Commission, and is to be stamped out with the same energy as is shown in dealing with other violations of law.

This is indicated by the recent action of the commission in the case of misrepresentations in the advertising broadcast of a paint manufacturer, in which the operator of the broadcasting station was also cited as a respondent and joined in the agreement to discontinue the objectionable practices complained of.

This was the first time in which the Federal fair-trade agency had cited an operator of a broadcasting station, although early this year radio advertising of a well known cigarette was brought under scrutiny and a stipulation signed by the manufacturer whereby certain objectionable statements were deleted. In that case, however, the broadcasting stations which had been programming the advertising were not involved.

In the case just concluded by the commission, the operator of the station, the manufacturer of the paint and the distributor of the territory covered by the broadcast signed a stipulation under which certain statements used in the program, held by the commission to be misrepresentative of the actual product, will be eliminated. The acquiescence of the respondents to discontinuance of the practices complained of

brought the case to an end, since it is not the commission's policy to take formal action in cases which can be disposed of by agreement. While the names of respondents in such cases are not made known, the facts are published by the commission for the protection of the public and the guidance of other business men.

MORE than thirty broadcasting stations have been relicensed by the Federal Radio Commission for a period of thirty days only, pending investigations of charges made against them involving violation of various regulations. The charges involve such alleged violation as failing to maintain frequency within the limit required, failure to announce call letters at specified intervals, etc.

The licenses of a number of other stations also have been placed on a 30-day basis, pending decisions by the commission on applications for renewal, on which hearings have been or may be held.

In the case of a number of stations which have appealed to the courts from decisions of the commission, licenses now carry a clause to the effect that they are issued in conformity with court requirements and are effective subject to the further order of the court, thus clearing the way for immediate change in allocation or for revocation of license if the court decision is rendered before the license period expires January 31, next.

KJBS says goodnight to the radio audience at exactly sunset each night. At this time of year sign-off occurs about 5 o'clock. However, KJBS is back on the air again at midnight with the nightly OWL program.

The new announcer at KJR and the Northwest Broadcasting System studios with the deep rich bass voice is Hal B. Wolf. He comes to KJR after experience in other Seattle radio stations. Wolf is a Seattle resident.

Ruth Gwen, of KROW, a genuine redhead, lost the proverbial temper the other night. A visiting artist with dyed locks of screaming hue made this remark: "My, Miss Gwen, we have exactly the same color hair." Ruth came back with, "Yes, we must go to the same druggist."

Ralph Hansell, the young xylophonist who leads them all in the West in popularity, has added another "first" to his record.

He is the first xylophonist in radio to play his instrument with six hammers. Although Hansell is just 22 years old, he is credited with being one of the most finished artists in the country. His sureness in playing swift and difficult numbers and his dexterity in handling four or six hammers are the marvel of his fellow musicians.

BEHIND the MIKE with DOBBSIE

AMONG the dozens of stars who sparkle brightly behind the mike with Dobbsie are the three Lindens and John Faivre, composing the Linden Quartet, which adds a musical aurora of loveliness to the Monday morning Happytime broadcast.

The Linden quartet is perhaps one of the most popular and finished musical aggregations of its kind on the air today. Each member is a master of his instrument. Each is a soloist of rare ability, and all have combined to form the ultra finished product—the Linden Quartet.

Anthony and Emily Linden, who play the flute and piano respectively, are brother and sister and come from a family of musicians. The mother was famed throughout Europe as an organist—her father a trumpeter with the late Queen Victoria's "Royal Queen's Band" of London. By them the two children were taught the rudiments

of music and at an early age began their lessons in earnest under the masters of Europe. Emily, whose hobby, by the way, is raising potatoes as big as derby hats, came to America to finish her musical education at the Beethoven Conservatory of Music at St. Louis; the American Conservatory of Music at Chicago and the Chicago Musical College. She was gold medal winner of the piano class at the latter. Upon completion of her musical education, Miss Linden embarked upon a concert tour of the United States, during which she won the praise of critics and admiration of music lovers.

Anthony, who directs the group, is well known to the music world of the West and East, gaining wide fame as flute soloist for the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra, the Chicago Grand Opera Company, Cincinnati

Symphony and Minneapolis Symphony Orchestras. Like his sister, he is an accomplished composer and lends this ability to making unusually pleasing arrangements of the musical numbers which the group plays on the Shell Happytime.

Eight years as musical director of the great La Salle and Stevens Hotels in Chicago immediately qualifies Caesar Linden as among the outstanding violinists of the country. But he has qualifications to spare,

among them the position of first violinist of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. He came West to play with the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra.

John Faivre, the 'cellist, is last and perhaps most interesting of this group of musical geniuses. Several years ago, as the result of an accident, he became totally blind. Unable to read music, unable to see his instrument, Faivre determined that even these tremendous

handicaps should not keep him from his beloved 'cello. He would sit by the hour, playing phonograph records over and over. Then he would take his 'cello and follow the piece through in accompaniment. His grim determination won, for it was not long before his ears had been trained to take the place of his eyes in coordinating what he heard with the tips of his fingers and his bow arm. Today, John Faivre has what many believe is an uncanny ability to hear a strange piece played through once, then pick up his 'cello and play a perfect accompaniment for the second chorus. A determination to win, plus a natural ability as a musician, has made him one of the outstanding 'cellists of the Coast.

Tom Wallace, KNX

TOM WALLACE did a flying tackle from athletic coach of the Long Beach (Cal.) school system into the studios of KNX, where he now announces the principal evening programs of the Hollywood broadcaster and manages to let his fine baritone voice be heard now and then in solos.

Tom is a native of Bisbee, Arizona, and received his education at the University of Arizona at Tucson.

Athletic and scholarly honors came with unusual regularity to Wallace. During his college days—and that's not so long ago, either—he was always prominent in football, baseball and basketball, being captain of the baseball team.

He was also president of the student body, a member of the dramatic and glee clubs and a member of Kappa Sigma fraternity.

After school days Tom became a football coach for the Long Beach school system, while, in a somewhat sub-rosa manner, he studied singing with John Ardizoni, one of the leading vocal coaches in Southern California.

One day he dropped in at KNX' studios to see whether any baritones were needed. They were, and Tom sang more or less regularly for three years as a guest artist of the station before the urge of radio got too strong, and when he was offered a place as announcer in September, 1929, he accepted with alacrity.

Having been, at times, a California state official in sports, Tom is deeply interested in all such activities. He has a theory that the public would like to have the intermissions between halves in football games used by radio announcers to give analyses of plays that may have been made that day or in past games, answering listeners' queries, instead of descriptive material.

Maybe we'll hear him "air" his theory in fact some time soon.
