




## Fate of Super Power In Hands of One Man

**T**HE fate of super-power for broadcasting lies in the hands of a single man, Ellis A. Yost, chief examiner for the Federal Radio Commission, upon whose report the commission will make its decision whether 50,000 watts power is to be made the maximum for general use. The present maximum is 25,000 watts, to which certain stations have been permitted to add another 25,000 watts for "experimental" purposes.

If Examiner Yost recommends favorable action on a 50,000-watt maximum and the commission accepts his suggestion, it is confidently predicted by radio leaders that the next few years will see a steady increase in permissible power, until possibly as much as 500,000 to 1,000,000 watts is used. Experiments are already being made with powers as high as 400,000 watts.

Some time ago the commission adopted a policy under which 50,000-watt stations were to be permitted on four of the cleared channels in each zone, twenty channels in all. There were, at that time, about a dozen stations licensed to use this power experimentally. A flood of applications for top power immediately was loosed upon the commission, and when hearings were held on those applications two months ago, twenty-seven stations fought for place.

Announcement of the twenty-channel policy brought down upon the heads of the

commissioners a volley of criticism, due to the fact that in some zones more stations wanted top power than could be accommodated on the limited number of channels assigned. There are forty cleared channels, and it was contended that if top power was to be allowed on one channel or twenty channels, it should be permitted on all. Accordingly, the question now before the commission is how far it shall go in permitting the use of 50,000 watts.

Radio engineers contend that 50,000 watts causes no more interference than 5000 watts, if carefully controlled, and that the progress of broadcasting depends to large extent upon the ability to use huge powers, even 1,000,000 watts not being rated as too high. The 50,000-watt stations now operating are reporting better reception of their programs throughout the areas they aim to serve, as well as a material enlargement of the service area and successful reception at very distant points.

Having brought up the question of raising the maximum power, the commission now finds itself between two fires, with the probability that retention of the twenty-channel policy will result in court appeals by applicants unsuccessful in securing high power, on the one hand, and the certainty that Congress will have something to say about the situation, probably unpleasant, on the other.

CRUTCHES and wheel chairs, long months of suffering and drab confinement will be forgotten for three glorious hours on Christmas morning when more than 3,000 crippled children and grown-up shut-ins will be guests of the Shell Oil Company and the Fox West Coast Theatres at a great Happytime Christmas Party held in the million dollar Fox Theatre in San Francisco.

On that morning Captain Dobbsie will broadcast the voyage of his Shell Ship of Joy direct from the stage of the theatre. All of the outstanding talent of the Happytime program, Walt Roesner and his marvelous orchestra of 20 instruments, the great Fox Theatre organ, will be heard as members of the crew. Crutches and wheelchairs and crippled bodies

By a queer coincidence, guests at Shell's Christmas party will have the unusual treat of seeing and hearing John McCrea, one of the Happytime's favorite tenors, and shortly thereafter see and hear his brother, Joel, who plays the juvenile lead in the picture "Lightnin'," opposite Will Rogers. Joel is rapidly making a name for himself in the motion picture world, while John is already established as a popular star among thousands of Shell Happytime fans.

The Shell Happytime Christmas party will begin at 8 a.m. and will be broadcast over entire Pacific Coast network of the National Broadcasting System.


## **What Do You Think of This Suggestion?**

## Mock Murder Trial To Be Broadcast

A REAL murder trial and a new kind of radio drama will be offered to NBC listeners the week of December 15, when "The Trial of Vivienne Ware" will be presented through NBC station KGO.

The radio public will act as jury, and three noted members of the California bench and bar will be principals in the six episodes of the play, which begins Monday night, December 15, at 9:30 o'clock, and continues successive nights of the week, through Saturday night, December 20, when the trial ends.

The court room drama will be presented from 9:30 to 10 o'clock every night in the six, except Wednesday night, when it will be released between 9 and 9:30 o'clock in order not to interrupt sustaining programs of NBC.

The broadcast has so many unique features that it is utterly unlike anything which has been done before on the air. It is the first time in the history of radio, it is believed, that such a realistic legal trial has been broadcast, with part of its cast chosen from actual life. Comparatively few persons, however curious, have time or opportunity to attend the sessions of a real court. "The Trial of Vivienne Ware" will mirror actual procedure of the Superior Court of California, so listeners will hear how such court sessions are held.

At the same time they will become an integral part of the performance. Every member of the audience is a juror in "The Trial of Vivienne Ware." The arm-chair by the fireside becomes a seat in the jury box, and each listener casts his vote to determine the "guilt" or "innocence" of Vivienne.

Aside from all the other features which make it interesting, "The Trial of Vivienne Ware" will hold radio audiences with the grip of the melodramatic tale it unfolds. It opens on the first day of the trial of the society girl who has been accused of murdering her wealthy fiance. Bernice Berwin plays the defendant in the case. The witnesses, court attendants and other figures in the trial are portrayed by a cast of National Players which includes Pearl King Tanner, Bobbe Deane, Dorothy Desmond, George Rand, Bert Horton, Richard Le Grande, Fred Thomas, Barry Hopkins, Earle Hodgins, Tom Hutchinson, Michael Rafetto and Victor Rodman.
