

State Rights to Air Claimed by Dissatisfied Broadcasters

TATE rights, which once caused a Civil War, may be invoked eventually to determine whether state governments have any control whatsoever over broadcasting.

The threat that this action may be taken has recently been heard in Washington where, however, officials decline to take it seriously in view of the fact that no way has yet been found to stop radio waves at a state line

The refusal of the Federal Radio Commission to give free rein to the ambitions of certain broadcasters is believed to be the basis for tentative efforts which have lately been made to sound out sentiment on the question of state rights with respect to radio. "Existing constitutional law," it is contended, gives a state the right both to establish any station it desires for intrastate broadcasting and to prohibit the entry of any program from outside the state.

Any fight that may be made along this line will be one of words only. Regardless of the right of a state to the air above its lands, no practical way of stopping radio waves at a particular point has yet been devised. Thus, it would be impossible both for a station to keep its programs within the confines of its own state and to keep outside programs from entering.

Those who are crying state rights apparently have not heard of Europe's efforts to maintain national rights to the air-efforts which are going on today in some countries. During the early years of broadcasting, many of the European nations sought to keep their nationals from hearing the programs of other countries, fearing that they might contain propaganda-which, as a matter of fact, was broadcast by Soviet stations in Russia. To keep such programs out, a watch was maintained on the frequency of the foreign stations and as soon as they began broadcasting, meaningless signals were emitted on the same wavelength so that nothing intelligible could be received. Even today this is being continued in certain quarters but, generally, it has been dropped as too messy for the results it accomplished.

With forty-eight states assured of their "rights" to their own air, broadcasting in the United States would soon take on a totally different complexion. In fact, there could be no broadcasting at all. As the ruin of broadcasting would be very much against the public interest, supporters of state rights who undertake litigation under "existing constitutional law" would find that law quickly defined in a way they do not now interpret it.

MICROPHONE GOSSIP

- Elbert Bellows, KFRC tenor, once sang for the Duchess and Grand Duchess of Luxembourg. It was after the Armistice had been signed, and Bellows, who had been with the Fifth Division and had seen service on three different sectors on the western front, became a member of one of the show troops organized to entertain the soldiers still in France. He was also a member of the German Army of Occupation.
- Aunt Missouri, that high-yellow, richly-humored, infinitely-wise-and-kind-and-witty person of radioland, has come to KFI, Los Angeles. To be heard Wednesday and Friday at 4:15 p. m. (PST) as an added feature of Big Brother Don's children's hour.

Aunt Missouri, away from the microphone, is Bettie Sale, newspaperwoman of national experience and name.

- • The work of Alma Morrow, poetauthor, whose continuity in verse, for the "Harp Harmonies" program heard over KPO, Friday nights, 8 to 8:30, has attracted favorable comment from the program's listeners. Hundreds of letters attesting the approval of dialers to this type of continuity have been received by KPO. Miss Morrow is the author of "Lyrics in Lavender," a book of poems just off the press, in which her originative genius and beauty of expression are both to be found. Critics predict a brilliant future for her in the literary world.
- Elinor Gail's first radio experience was with the True Story hour and the Majestic program. She, too, had her season at Roxy's, and came west only because the climate beckoned. Her silver, clear soprano is heard every Monday over KFWB on "Broadway Reflections," a musical comedy program. Incidentally, Miss Gail played the part of Hugette in the original Broadway production of "The Vagabond King."
- • An artist desiring to express the thought of variety need, but paint a picture of Ivan Ditmars, KJR and Northwest Broadcasting System artist and studio di-

rector. He plays the organ, the piano, is director of the Royal Loafers Orchestra, accompanies artists in their recitals, presents novelties in the "Bye Bye Blues" program with Chet Cathers, and he can do both classical and popular with equal facility, and he also announces.

- • Josef Sampietro, musical director of KOIN, Portland, Ore., is what one might call a "transplant" in the radio world. For years Sampietro directed large concert orchestras on the Pacific Coast, and just recently the lure of radio was heeded by this superlative showman, and thus the visible audience lost an artist to the great invisible audience of listeners.
- A new addition to the announcing and continuity staffs of the UBC is Sam Hayes, formerly with KTAB. He gave the exciting plays of two important gridiron clashes—the East-West and the St. Mary's-Oregon games—for the United Broadcasting System before he was employed by them. Mr. Hayes has the reputation of announcing more games in one season than any other announcer. His total last fall was twenty-four.
- • It all happened some days ago, yet it's still "news" to Loyal Underwood, the "man of mystery" at KNX, Hollywood. At about 5:30 on a recent morning Loyal was apprised that Mrs. Underwood had presented him with twin boys and all were doing nicely, thank you!

"They're just like their father," Underwood reported. "They'd hardly arrived when one popped the other on the nose." Studio confreres suggested "Amos and Andy," "Pete and Repeat," "Mike and Ike," "Frank and Ernest," and similar cognomens, but Underwood declined to make known his choice.

• • Raymond Marlowe, tenor, a favorite of western radio has joined forces with KPO, and his dulcet voice will be heard henceforth on many of KPO's best programs.

- • In response to many inquiries received, KJBS announces that the harmony team known as "Ray and Bob" is none other than Ray Raymond, son of Dell Raymond, pioneer radio artist, and a member of the KJBS staff, and Bob Pope, who incidentally arranges all the harmony for the popular duo.
- Marion Boyle, a KHQ staff pianist, is just as dainty a miss as you can possibly have imagined. Close-cropped, rich dark hair, smiling Irish eyes of blue, slender and full of dash and go, that's Marion. Marion's first birthday was October 26, 1909. She came to earth in Vancouver, B. C., but early realized her mistake, and since the age of three has been at home in Seattle. She has always specialized in music and is an accomplished dancer as well. Marion is one of the students to whom the Cornish School of Music in Seattle points with most pride. She began her radio appearances before the microphone of KHQ and is a great favorite with both the public and her fellow artists.
- • Fresh from triumphs in Europe and California, Agatha Turley, the Irish nightingale, has joined the artists staff of the Northwest Broadcasting System (KJR, KEX, KGA).

Miss Turley was the leading soprano in seven complete grand operas which the British Broadcasting Corporation presented over

its network last summer.

Following her return to this country from the British Isles, she accepted a contract with the National Broadcasting Company. Although a star with the National Broadcasting Company in San Francisco, Miss Turley severed her connections there to join the NWBS artists staff.

- Liborius Hauptman, musical director of the United Broadcasting Company, was a child protege at the age of twelve. At this age he acted as guest conductor of the celebrated Hayden Symphony at the request of His Royal Highness, Prince Liechtenstein of Austria. At seventeen Mr. Hauptman was the youngest professor at the Conservatory of Music at Geneva.
- Baron Keyes, creator and absolute ruler of the Aircastle Family, and confidant of President Pip, Bugler Murphy, Happy Duck and Clickety-Clack, is the composer of

a newly-published waltz song, "Valley of Broken Dreams."

The new number will receive its radio premiere soon from Ray Van Dyne's dance orchestra.

• • The Three Co-Eds, featured vocal ensemble of KFI-KECA, holds the distinction of having never changed personnel since it began to work in vaudeville and radio 'way back in 1926.

They are Marian Estelle Peck, mezzosoprano, and Meredith Gregor and Theresa Aezer, contraltos. Miss Aezer is the pianist

of the group.

Several tours in the United States and Canada and a sustained appearance in New York of three years, preceded their prolonged engagement at KFI-KECA.

- • If Irving Kennedy, NBC lyric tenor, were inclined to complacency—which he isn't—there would be ample excuse. A large percentage of the letters he receives from feminine listeners who write to tell him how much his voice thrills them contain the request that he sing "I Love You Truly." Many of these, however, Irving hastens to explain, come from old ladies, and they always get a personal reply from him.
- Earl Towner, basso and organist, is back at KFRC, the station with which he began his radio career over four years ago. At that time Earl was singing basso with the Strollers, male quartet, and making vocal and instrumental arrangements. He has returned to KFRC with the Buccaneers, also a male quartet. He is making the vocal arrangements for them. Other members of the Buccaneers are Elbert Bellows, first tenor; Ray Nelson, second tenor, and Morton Gleason, baritone.
- Mort Harris, who recently returned from the East to associate with Coffee Dan's, has brought back many new and original ideas. He has already started off with a nightly broadcast from the famous cellar—known as "Thirty Minutes at Coffee Dan's." The feature is presented by remote control over KJBS every night at 12:01, except Saturday and Sunday. In addition to this, Mort is also crooning his songs each Monday and Friday over KJBS at 2:45 p. m.





SILHOUETTES

MILY HARDY, KPO's pretty little blonde soprano didn't aim to become a radio star-it just fell into her lap, as the saying goes. It happened thus: Emily was fulfilling an engagement with the "New Moon" Company, when Dobbsie first heard her singing-he was entranced with the beauty of her voice-its flexibility - its smoothness and its range.

With an eye for better talent-he sought an introduction-and Miss Hardy became one of his regular staff artists.

"I like radio singing," states Miss Hardy, "you know it's more like fun than work, and then too, everyone at the studio is so pleasant and kind and help-ful." "And another

thing," and her dreamy green eyes seem to be looking off into space—"you know the stage takes you so far from home—but the radio with its magic of bridging distance well, it just doesn't seem like one is far from home-and every time I sing I know mother is sitting at home in Carlsbad, New Mexico, listening," and with moistened eyes she states, "it's a great comfort—yes, I like radio-prefer it to the stage."

And in that fleeting moment, when Miss Hardy bares the grief her absence from home occasions-one can visualize her on her New Mexico ranch-astride a cowponyor outdoing the cowboys in revolver shooting-she is an expert with firearms-the pride

of a mother whom she adores.

Emily is not quite sure as to when she became interested in singing-but likely as not she believes it was in early girlhood when she used to sit on the ranch porch, after the moon had risen over the New Mexico hills and listen to the inharmonious "yip-yip" of the coyotes—"that made me certain that the world was in need of better voice production," she states, with an accompanying sly wink-"and my career is the result."

Grading from high school in 1926, Miss Hardy left the range behind and journeyed to Los Angeles to compete in several musical contests-and which meant the start of her musical career. Successful in winning the Eisteddfod contest for sopranos and also for pianists, Miss Hardy was elevated into the limelight overnight. Shortly afterward she

was engaged by the Opera Guild of Los Angeles and soon blossomed out as one of the best sopranos to ever sing the role of "Gilda" in productions of "Rigoletto" staged by that company.

Aside from being a lover of outdoor sports, Miss Hardy has developed the hobby of reading medical books-the study of physiology in her high school days fascinated her to such an extent that it has remained a fascination and she reads every available book on

the subject of human anatomy.

But although she has gained unusual success, Miss Hardy is still not satisfied-she realizes that the career of a singer is one of conscientious study and effort, so she is studying with Madame Beatrice Bowman, who with the knowledge of the artist as well as the ability of the teacher, is carrying her over the rough spots and creating a polish that is making her singing individual.

EONA SOCOLOFSKY has undoubtedly one of the most brilliant soprano concert voices in the Northwest. Born in Oregon, she attended the Willamette University. She studied music in Boston, where she made her radio debut. Probably no singer has met with such immediate and spontaneous success as Miss Socolofsky.

Her hobbies tend toward the various forms of outdoor sports, particularly hiking, fishing and winter sports. She is an expert ski jumper and also an expert swimmer, holding a life-saving certificate from the American

Red Cross.

Miss Socolofsky has a very dynamic personality, vibrant with activity at all times. Her microphone appearances are perhaps the most colorful incidents around KOMO.

Her great grand-mother was Jennie Rupert, famous prima donna of the French '70's.

Her voice is that of a dramatic soprano and she enjoys operatic arias in radio work and oratories in church work. Her favorite sacred solo is "I Know That My Redeemer "Liveth," from Handel's "Messiah." She finds her favorite concert work in the selections by Wagner and counts among her favorites "Elsa's Traum" from "Lohengrin" and Senta's Ballet from "The Flying Dutchman.

ARGIT HEGEDUS, said to be one of the most talented girl students ever to have been given instruction in violin playing by the great Sevcik, is a young woman with an enviable record back of her. Yet she says, naively, that some day she hopes she can concertize again and really make a name for herself.

She comes by music naturally, although her mother and father are not musicians. Her three brothers and two sisters are all musicians of note, all now living in Europe.

After being born and reared in Hungary, where her father was a business man, Margit came to this country with her elder sister, Herma, also a violinist, and together they toured the country in vaudeville for six years, between 1921 and 1927.

After this experience on the then Keith Orpheum circuits, Margit played in theaters and picture houses in the Middle West until she came to California the latter part of

1928.

She has been with KNX for a number of months and aside from her remarkable violin solo work she directs a number of orchestras, notably the Hungarian Ensemble, so frequently heard over this station.

NSON WEEKS, whose Hotel Mark Hopkins orchestra syncopates nightly over KFRC and DLBS save a Tuesday shift to NBC for the Florsheim Company, has a rather remarkable musical biography.

He has had only one music lesson in his life . . . and prior to five years ago he couldn't read a note.

At an age when most boys are just finishing high school, Weeks was at the piano conducting his first orchestra for the Hotel Sacramento. From there he took a larger band to the Hotel Oakland. While in the navy

during the war, he organized a service orchestra that enjoyed tremendous popularity at the Dugout in Hollywood. Herb Brown of "Wedding of the Painted Dolls" and "Pagan Love Song" fame was one of the gang, and Wallace Reid joined in with his saxophone occasionally.

After the war Weeks returned to Sacramento, and then to Tahoe Tavern. His next

When she is not on the air, Bernice likes most to read. The feminine authors are her favorites but she does like mystery stories. She favors classical music and though she plays the piano, she likes best to hear the violin.

Besides personally conducting his Mark Hopkins band, Weeks has selected and trained fifteen other groups of musicians now playing at Pacific Coast Hotels, country clubs and on Matson and Lassco line steamers. But perhaps the most remarkable thing about Anson Weeks is that despite his talent, he isn't temperamental . . . and despite his success, he isn't high-brow.




