

## Synchronization to Be Permitted

**P**RACTICAL experiments in synchronization soon to be undertaken may prove to be the solution of the part-time problem of high-power broadcasting stations, which find the limitations upon their operating time required because of the overcrowded condition of the broadcasting spectrum materially increase their overhead costs.

Authority has been granted Stations WTIC, Hartford, Conn., and WBAL, Baltimore, to synchronize their transmitters with those of the National Broadcasting Company's Stations WEAJ and WJZ, respectively. The Hartford and Baltimore stations are on the same frequency of 1060 kilocycles, and have been silent on alternate days. Under the plan of synchronization which has been worked out, they will continue to use their assigned frequency as at present, but the station which now is silent will be able to remain on the air by using the same frequency, and, of course, the same program, as the New York station with which it is synchronized.

Leading radio engineers believe that synchronization is destined to exert a tremendous influence upon the future development of broadcasting. If the experiment soon to be undertaken is successful, the plan will undoubtedly be adopted by a number of other stations which now are on the air only

part of the time and will make it possible, in many areas, to furnish two programs where only one is now available.

Successful use of synchronization also is expected again to bring the controversy which long has revolved around chain broadcasting well into the foreground. Independent broadcasters who are not affiliated with any of the chains have frequently urged that all chain broadcasting be put on the same frequency so that there might be more room for non-chain stations. With as many as 100 stations sometimes connected on a single chain, they contend, a large proportion of the broadcasting frequencies are devoted to one program, resulting, in some sections of the country, in severely limiting the choice of the radio audience.

The granting of authority for synchronization is a reversal on the part of the Federal Radio Commission of the position it has held for some time, which has been antagonistic to this method of operation. The matter was brought before the commission in September by Commissioner Sykes, who proposed that broadcasting stations on opposite sides of the country be placed on the same channels for simultaneous synchronized operation. He was supported by Commissioner Robinson, but had his plan voted down by the other three members.

## Scientists Study Radio Phenomena

**H**OW high is a radio wave? How much of the original intensity of a signal reaches the receiving antenna? What makes a radio signal fade?

These are only a few of the many radio questions which are receiving the attention of government scientists at the National Bureau of Standards.

Nearly \$100,000 a year is spent by Uncle Sam in his great technical laboratory for investigation of radio problems of a scientific character. Equipped with the most modern apparatus—and able to make what they need if it is not obtainable commercially—these scientists are delving into fields which approach the mythical, so far as the average receiving set owner is concerned.

How high is a radio wave? In other words, how far above the earth is the theoretical Kennelly-Heavyside layer which is supposed to keep radio waves from evaporating into the space behind the stars and which makes it possible to receive in Australia a message sent from the United States? With the aid of oscillographs and other apparatus even less familiar to the layman, the government scientists have concluded that this layer is from 225 to 250 kilometers above the earth at 4045 kilocycles and about 290 kilometers at 8650 kilocycles. Apparently, the height to which a radio signal can rise depends upon its frequency.

How much of the original intensity of a signal reaches the receiving antenna? The answer is, not a great deal. Field intensity measurements made at frequencies from 550 to 5400 kilocycles over distances up to 3200 meters over fresh water show that 15 per cent of the signal is absorbed at 1500 kilocycles and about 50 per cent is absorbed at 5400 kilocycles. Measurements of transmissions from broadcasting and government stations at distances up to 270 kilometers show that the absorption at that distance is 99 per cent for a 760-kilocycle transmission and 90 per cent for a 338-kilocycle signal.

What makes a radio signal fade? Many things, but not magnetic storms, despite belief to the contrary. Measurements with an automatic fading recorder show that magnetic storms do not affect radio signals.

# MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • The Hammatt twins have been added to the list of KFI-KECA artists. Beverly and Lorraine are 12 years old, both very blonde, both extremely polite and decorous, and both irrepressible wits. After a long and distinguished career in vaudeville, they have turned to radio as the best medium for their sparkling singing and playing. Between programs, the twins attend school and learn to keep house, according to their mother.

• • • Micky Gillette, KFRC's solo saxophonist, began studying his instrument when eight years old. His first engagement in public was with Paul Ash, at the Granada Theatre.

• • • Kenneth Birnbaum, 13-year-old trumpeter who creates much of the "hot" music heard in the NBC Spotlight Review, is the son of Mabel Bowman, well-known San Francisco actress. She was a member of the old Alcazar Stock Company in San Francisco. When a child she played in the original company of "After Dark," old-time melodramatic "thriller" which was revived recently.

• • • Ken Stuart's voice has not been heard over Northwest Broadcasting System stations KJR, KEX and KGA recently. After suffering for months with infected tonsils, Stuart elected to have them extracted. Pacific Northwest listeners missed his Thirty Minutes of Sunshine, his Sports Review and his football broadcasts. This was attested in hundreds of letters Stuart received while in the hospital.

• • • Nelson Case, one of KFWB's announcers, has a fine baritone voice, but he has one habit that his colleagues kid him about unmercifully. He will sing with his eyes closed, and when he gets up in front of the mike closes his eyes and sings to the accompaniment of piano and two muted vio-

lins—well, Rudy Vallee ain't got nothing on him, no, sir!

• • • Wesley Snyder, formerly associated with WJAY, Cleveland, and the Columbia Broadcasting Company, has recently joined the staff of KJBS as announcer and continuity writer. He will be heard regularly on the daytime programs and is busy arranging several specialty programs incorporating original ideas, which will be broadcast over KJBS in the near future.

• • • Madeline Sivyer, talented concert violinist for KROW, has attracted the attention of Don Zalaya, concert pianist on the Orpheum Circuit, who saw her play recently during the Silhouettes of Fashion by Betty Winsome, KROW shopper at the Monday night performance. Zalaya wants to put her on a concert tour and Orpheum program managers are considering. Miss Sivyer is a talented and attractive nineteen-year-old school girl and one of KROW's most popular entertainers.

• • • Years ago Isabelle Williams was pretty well known on the professional stage as a song and dance and character actor. Now Mrs. Isabelle Wilgus, Long Beach housewife, she comes back to her audience, but with a new medium. As Happy Mammy Jinny she does a weekday program for

• • • Charles W. Hamp, widely known radio entertainer, recently became America's highest salaried radio star with his acceptance of an offer of more than \$150,000 a year made by Dr. Strasska's toothpaste of Los Angeles. Hamp's friends point out that his return to his home in Hollywood represents a striking example of "a home town boy who went to the city and made good." Hamp is heard over the Don Lee Broadcasting System.

• • • Myrtle Leonard, KPO contralto who recently returned to the West after a successful concert tour of the East, has joined the artists who entertain on the Sperry Smiles programs directed by Lee S. Roberts, famous song composer.

• • • Everett Foster, NBC baritone, is one of the many men who took part in the World War who are still wondering about their share of it. When Everett enlisted he was asked what his work in civil life had been.

"I'm a singer," he told the recruiting officer.

"Fine, I've got a place for you," the officer said, and scribbled an order. Everett saluted, and looked at the order outside. It sent him to a remount depot, where he tended horses and mules for the duration of the war.

• • • Frank Galvin, of the KJBS staff, has had a diversified career up to the present time. His first job was as bookkeeper and stenographer, from which he gravitated to the capacities of salesman. Then his natural talent for music and entertaining asserted itself, with the result that Frank became, respectively, song writer, orchestra leader and character singer. One of his best known compositions was "Hushabye," which enjoyed great popularity several years ago.

self in radio circles, taking her place very soon on the NBC roster of star entertainers. Though she made her first success in New York, yet Los Angeles has been and always will be first in her heart.

• • • The Clark Sisters, popular KFRC harmony team, spend much of their leisure time motoring. They drive their own car and usually use it when playing engagements in distant cities. To numerous queries as to whether they are really sisters or not, the answer is an emphatic yes. One look at the girls will convince the most skeptical.

• • • Through a renewal of contract the Cities Service Concert Orchestra and Cavaliers, with Jessica Dragonette, soprano soloist, will be heard for another year over an NBC-WEAF nation-wide network on Friday evenings.

The first broadcast under the new contract, which was on January 2, will be the 232nd broadcast by the ensemble. This is the beginning of their fifth year on the air.

• • • Bill Tucker, KFVB's star pianist, is a thorough believer in "the show must go on." It applies to radio as well as the stage, as KFVB found out recently. Bill burned his right hand and arm severely Friday afternoon in an explosion, but because he played an important part in a major program that evening, he reported for duty, and though the pain was intense and his hand was swathed in bandages, did his part excellently in the orchestral numbers.

• • • Edna Fischer, popular pianist of KFRC, claims to have the largest band in existence. Her proof lies in fan letters from people who write that they practice on saxophones, guitars, silver toned cornets, mouth harps, trombones, zithers and many other instruments in accompaniment to her broadcasting. Edna says her saxophone section is the largest, numbering about two hundred and eighty pieces. The harmonica sections ranks second, with the buglers a close third.

• • • Marjorie Primley, a member of the Coquettes, NBC singing trio, plays the piano accompaniments for the singing of the three. Her ability as a pianist has earned money for her since she was 13 years old, when she worked in a music store after school.







# Olive West, NBC Actress

SHE was born in San Francisco "more than sixty years ago," and now radio has called her home and tamed an old trouper's gypsy feet.

So confesses Olive West, who has brought a half century's rich and varied experience on the speaking stage to delight the ears of radio audiences of the Pacific Division of the National Broadcasting Company.

The beautiful, flexible voice they hear in NBC plays was trained in the theater of yesterday—a theater to which young actors came with humble eagerness to learn an art not to be won in a day.



OLIVE WEST

There were no easy roads to stardom when Olive West was beginning her career.

She made her first appearance in 1879, as Salome in the first Passion Play ever given in the United States. She was just 12 years old, but had studied under Emelie Melville's mother, and she still possesses the rare talent for dialect which her tutor developed in her.

As Salome, however, she had her first real "grown-up" role. The production was made at the old Grand Opera House in the city of the Golden Gate, and in the cast were such famous old-timers, most of them now passed from the stage of life, as James O'Neill, who had the role of Christ; Lewis Morrison (Pilate), J. N. Long (Joseph), King Hedley (Judas), Mary Wilkes (Virgin Mary), and Kate Denin Wilson (Herodias).

The populace of fifty years ago refused to look upon the Passion Play as art. The production met such resentment that children and their elders threw vegetables and eggs at the actors as they made their way along a narrow alley to the stage door of the theater.

Such was Olive's baptism in fire—or vegetables, rather—in the profession she had chosen. The play was closed after a week, and then re-opened, and at last it was abandoned as a hopeless task.

At 13, Olive went to New York to seek

her fortune. She worked for Belasco and Frohman, and in many stock shows and road companies of New York successes. She had engagements on Broadway, too; the last one was in "Arabesque" in 1926.

For years, beginning when she was 20, Olive lived the life of a typical "trouper." She toured the country, playing a week in large cities and one-night stands in less populated districts, and her repertoire company was equally popular with both kinds of audiences. Old-timers among theater-goers will recall her as Ophelia, as Juliet and as Rosalind.

Her scrap-book, filled with the yellowed clippings which go back more than two-score years, has flattering reviews of her "Parthenia" in "Ophigenia," and of the dual roles she had as "Julia and Helen" in "The Hunch-Back." In later years, when she began to play mother parts, she was the mother in "The Melting-Pot"—the most difficult role she ever had, she says, since she was obliged to speak in a mixture of Hebrew and Yiddish." She also played in "Friendly Enemies," in a transcontinental tour of Louis Mann's success.

Olive doesn't sit back and rest on her laurels. She is much in demand by theatrical producers in California and would have more time for radio engagements if she didn't keep so busy on the speaking stage. She finished thirty-one weeks with an Oakland, California, theater and then went into immediate rehearsal on a series of radio dramas in which she has been appearing.

The appearance of this charming old trouper of sixty-odd belies her years. Her hair is graying, but her blue eyes twinkle with youth and humor. Her voice is so youthful in its range and flexibility that she frequently plays very young roles on radio. This makes her smile.

"When I was 15, I played mature ladies," she says. "Now that I'm more than mature, I'm playing girls again—that's why I love radio work!"




