Advertising Brings Criticism

CHARGES that some of the broadcasting stations are putting their advertising income ahead of all considerations of the "public convenience, interest or necessity" for which they were licensed are being heard as a result of the action of certain stations on New Year's eve.

Just at midnight—the one time of the year when probably nobody cared whether clocks were right or not—when large numbers of stations were on networks broadcasting the advent of the New Year from New York, certain stations broke into the program in order to advise their audiences that "when the gong struck" it would be midnight by "courtesy" of a certain watch manufacturer.

Just how much the offending broadcasters received for this advertising announcement, which for thousands of people spoiled one of the most interesting programs of the year, is a matter of conjecture, but the effect of the incident upon the good will of both the stations and the manufacturer will be far greater in amount.

Members of the Federal Radio Commission have frequently complained regarding the advertising of certain stations and their apparent lack of consideration for the audiences they serve. The "time" broadcasts, for one thing, are greatly overdone by one or two watch manufacturers, and the form of advertising for one watch not long ago was the subject of formal complaint to government officials which resulted in drastic changes in its wording. Certain broadcast-

ers, it has been complained, give the time at such frequent intervals as to spoil their programs, often cutting off the first or last few minutes of an interesting feature to use a few seconds in giving the time and much longer to extolling the merits of the watch manufacturer whose "courtesy" is thus expressed. The criticism which is being heard regarding the New Year's eve break is the more marked because of the delicacy with which several of the best known advertising programs were handled on both Christmas and New Year's. In these programs all advertising was eliminated, and the time which is usually given to advertising was devoted to expressing the advertiser's good wishes to the public.

The American public is the most "advertising-minded" in the world. Taking it for granted that the great majority of manufacturers are honest, it responds generously to their advertising appeals. It has stood for many abuses—billboards that mar the finest scenery along the roads, for an outstanding example—but once in a while it gets "sore" about some form of advertising and makes its dissatisfaction known in no uncertain terms. Advertising slides not many years ago were shown in practically all motion picture theaters. Today they are almost unknown. The possibility that their displeasure with some of the advertising coming over the air may be voiced in an impressive manner is not necessarily as remote as some advertisers and some broadcasters appear to believe.

MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Pedro Gonzales, KFRC's Mexican comedian, learned both the dialect of the Mexican and what transpires in his soul while delivering milk to their doors in Barstow, California. Pedro, whose real name is Eugene Hawes, was a mere lad at the time. His parents owned a farm near the town and his duty was to peddle from door to door.

• • • A pretty girl who came to Gunnar Johansen, gifted young Danish pianist in Copenhagen, and asked him to teach her piano, is responsible for the artist's presence at NBC.

She was Miss Anita Klitgaard of San Francisco, and before her first lesson was over, her teacher and she both realized that love at first sight was more than the poet's dream, so far as they were concerned. They were married a few weeks later, and Johansen, eager to see his bride's land, brought her home to California for a visit. He fell in love with California just as he had already done with her, and here he is.

• • • Roger Q. Williams, ace—the pilot who accomplished the most noteworthy feat of landing his plane safely on one of the Bermuda Islands, which is only 4 miles wide and 12 miles long and is 840 miles out at sea. Mr. Williams also made a 4500-mile flight from New York to Rome by the southern course of the Atlantic. Many other outstanding feats of flying skill are accredited to Roger Q. Williams. Mr. Williams is featured over the microphone at KMTR every Saturday night at 7 o'clock in a short talk of his many and varied experiences in the air.

• • • Bill Ray, KGER manager, has announced that the station has become affiliated with the coast-wide chain of the United Broadcasting Company and will take many of its evening programs. Later in January it is planned to take even a greater number of the chain entertainment and KGER plans to reverse lines and provide several programs a week to the chain. Notably in this will be the Long Beach Municipal Band, twenty-year-old civic organization from the beach city.

• • • C. Roy Hunt, general manager of KOIN, is an "oldtimer" in the radio world. And anyone in radio over five years is an "oldtimer." Hunt took over KOIN in March, 1929, and in twenty-three months' time has built the station to the foremost rank and to the position of Northwest key station for the Columbia Broadcasting System. His vocation hobby is "features—and more features."

• • • Paul R. Heitmeyer has renounced a life of relative peace and calm as manager of *The Morning Oregonian's* radio station, KGW, at Portland, and this month will become a broadcasting magnate in his own right. After having brought KGW to a point where the bulk of its time is sold, Paul is satisfying a longing for new fields to conquer by opening a station of his own in Walla Walla, Washington, the center of the Pacific Northwest grain belt. The station is KIJ.

• • • Nearly every broadcast station boasts a duo, brother or sister act; and now comes KROW with 18-year-old twin brothers, Anthony and Lewis Grosso, accordion artists, who are featured regularly over that station. Before signing up with KROW the Grosso twins were heard over KPO, KYA, and KLX.

The boys, just graduated from high school, helped pay their way through with their playing. A few extra engagements during the summer over the Orpheum and other theater circuits enabled them to enter business college.

• • • James Mathew Lyons, law student at the San Francisco College, is now a member of KPO's happy family. James is attached to the clerical force. He is well known, athletically, around the bay cities, having played center on the St. Ignatius championship basketball team of 1927. His 6 feet 3½ feet in height played an important part in the team's victories.

KPO is now grooming him for the next radio golf tournament. He has ten years' experience in "African Marbles" and was a member of the St. Ignatius High School golf team.

• • • Not every radio performer can boast a dual personality that is an asset before the microphone. Stephen Gaylord, KOL's efficient studio director, is the possessor of a fine baritone that is heard to advantage in selections of "The Americans Come" caliber. A few steps toward the "mike," a *dimenduendo* on the accompaniment, and listeners hear a pleasing "croon" rendition of "Three Little Words" or numbers suited to that type of presentation. Not long ago, Stephen announced the program, sang several numbers, and station attachés were bewildered when they were informed that there were *not* three artists, but only Gaylord at the microphone. Such versatility must be applauded!

• • • William G. Kuser, KJBS's new announcer, was formerly a dialogue and continuity writer in Hollywood. His hobby is raising German Shepherd dogs, and claims to have some of the finest animals in the state.

• • • Chinky Poo Poo, pedigreed Chinese chow dog owned by Ken Stuart, KJR and NWBS sports announcer, made his first appearance before the microphone recently, and has been the recipient of letters since. Chinky addressed the microphone long enough to say "Hello!" in his own language. He is a brother of the Pacific Coast champion chow dog.

• • • Cliff Lockwood, KFRC tenor in the Westerner's Trio, started out to be a printer and learned the trade, but ever since he sang with the Elks Chorus in Minneapolis twelve years ago, he has earned his livelihood with his voice. He has sung over WCCO, Minneapolis; WNAX, Yangton, S. D.; and KSTP, St. Paul, and toured in vaudeville.

• • • On a tiny island in the South Seas, called Manua, three white persons, the only ones on the island, gather around a radio every day to hear programs broadcast from the San Francisco studios of NBC.

"Most of the natives of the village also come to listen to your wonderful music," one of the three, who are radio men attached to the Navy Communication Service and stationed in American Samoa, wrote in a recent letter. "We have about fifty-two stations in the United States logged, but we

listen to your programs, which come in wonderfully, and are enjoyed very much because there are only three white people on this island."

• • • Charles W. Hamp, world's highest salaried radio entertainer, is accredited with being the originator of the one-man radio program. He has achieved singular success in holding large radio audiences for thirty minutes with his unusual songs and chatter.

Hamp's career as a one-man radio troupe began at KMTR in Los Angeles. One day the scheduled talent failed to appear. Acting upon instructions of the owner of the station, Hamp "strutted his stuff." There was a generous response and from that moment Charlie Hamp was "made."

Hamp returns to the West after conducting the "Quaker Oats" hour over National Broadcasting network in New York and Chicago. He is signed to broadcast five times a week to the 8,000,000 radio listeners on the Pacific Coast. He is brought to the West by Dr. Strasska at a salary of \$150,000 a year.

• • • Charles Cartier, KFRC youthful impersonator, goes to a private school so that his hours on the air may not interfere with his studies. He pays his own way out of his radio earnings.

• • • One of the additions to the singing staff at KMTR is Harold Hodge, baritone, who is a young singing actor, and has appeared as "Silk Weston," gentlemanly villain of the comic opera "O Susanna," a Franklin Warner presentation; in Martin Flavin's New York success, "criminal Code"; and in character leads with the McGroarty players. Mr. Hodge will be heard from KMTR, in recital and as soloist with the studio orchestra.

• • • Baldwin McGaw who has distinguished himself in the "Little Theatre," who has directed the annual Mount Tamalpais play, director and leading man for the Community Play House for two years, and has otherwise been identified with the legitimate stage, is the newest addition to KPO's staff of announcers.

McGaw, besides announcing, will be in charge of the dramatic productions offered over KPO, a position where his talents will be a valuable asset for better programs.
