

Looking Ahead to Good Radio Year

LEADERS in the radio industry are looking forward to an active year, firmly believing that the depression of 1930 is nearly at an end and that, by early summer there will be marked indications of a revival in trade.

If the depression of the past year did nothing else, it enabled the industry to clean house, dispose of all "distress" merchandise and prepare for the invasion of new markets.

During the past year, radio manufacturers have disposed of their surplus stocks by keeping producing activities to level of demand, in contrast with 1929, when it seemed that they could not manufacture fast enough to satisfy themselves, let alone the demands of the market. While there has been some mortality among the weaker concerns during the past year, this has served only to strengthen the position of the industry as a whole, and most manufacturers who have survived are now in a healthy condition.

If business conditions improve around mid-year, as is generally expected, radio manufacturers will be situated in an excellent position with new merchandise for the remain-

der of the year. Marked improvements, but nothing revolutionary, are in sight, and the modern 1931 radio set insures the public receiving more value per dollar and also the highest type of broadcasting ever attained.

There are many new and broad markets open to the radio industry. Radio is nowhere near the saturation point. In addition to the large normal replacement market for modern radio sets and the discarding of ancient and obsolete receivers, there is a great rural market now opening for radio sales, especially since the Federal Radio Commission has granted higher power to broadcasting stations operating on clear channels.

In addition, there is a tremendous market for the equipment of offices, factories, schools, auditoriums and other places in which radio has been comparatively little used. Special broadcasting programs for these interests already have been planned for the remainder of 1931 by broadcasting interests.

The outlook for the radio industry is not at all discouraging, and with an undoubted return of better general conditions the radio industry faces the future with confidence.

MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Michael Raffetto, NBC actor, is the grandson of one of the gold-rush pioneers. His father owned the famous inn at Placerville, familiar to all who know their California.

• • • For her daily diversion, Polly Linden who gives the Book Chats on Feminine Fancies, KFRC, tramps the beach with her Boston bull-pup, Buddy. She says Buddy is one of her most enthusiastic fans; he never misses one of her book reviews. And frankly prefers his mistress' voice over the air to his master's violin, at which he howls most dismally.

• • • Don Thompson, KPO's sports announcer, who during the between seasons of sports spends his time writing continuity and announcing special feature broadcasts, is the author of KPO's series of programs known as "Impressions of American Waste Lands," which are heard every Sunday night 10 to 11 o'clock. True to human trait, Thompson is one of those where there is no compromise—he loves the desert. For the past ten years he has spent every available moment on various deserts throughout America and he knows them. And in his continuity he gives his impressions from actual experiences—real, intense, romantic and interesting. Hundreds of listeners of the broadcasts have written in their approval, complimenting KPO on the unusual and thrilling stories of the desert. Cy Trobbe's orchestra plays descriptive music interspersed throughout the reading of the continuity to add tone to the program.

• • • Billed as "The Girl with the Wistful Voice," Loyce Whiteman is a coming young radio star. Her past career is very brief—first as a member of a sister team, then soloist, and now singer and dramatic reader at KFVB. Her voice makes amorous gentlemen write in for pictures—nuff said!

• • • KHQ feels very fortunate in having as musical director so capable an artist as Fred Hartley. Fred reached KHQ from England, where he first saw the light of

day in 1897, by way of Toronto, Canada. And it was in the Canadian city that he first showed his interest in, and talent for things musical, by work in the boy choirs there. After coming to Spokane he toured the Pantages circuit with Chuck Whitehead's orchestra, and was later assistant manager of the Spokane Symphony Orchestra under the celebrated Leonardo Brill. Still later Fred organized his own group which is now playing in the Isabella Room at the Davenport Hotel.

• • • A distinctive type of thank you card has just been received by Freeman H. Talbot, manager of KOA, Denver, from the Cotton Blossom Singers, who broadcast from the NBC station a short time ago. The card, acknowledging the check paid the singers, is in the form of a receipt "for investment in humanity," and is signed by Laurence C. Jones, founder and principal of Piney Woods Country Life School of Piney Woods, Miss., which the singers were representing.

• • • Herbert Clark, conductor of the Long Beach Municipal Band, heard over the UBC network from KGER, Long Beach, every Wednesday evening, was formerly with Victor Herbert. He also has been with John Philip Sousa, having made two round-the-world trips with the famous band master and his world-renowned band. Mr. Clark is a composer of note, as well as one of the premiere cornetists of the day. His fan mail on his broadcasts and his magazine articles come from points covering a large portion of the globe.

• • • Frank Galvin of the KJBS staff has been made program director of that station. Since his entry into radio, about two years ago, Galvin's character songs and novelties have been heard over many local stations. For a year he was on the staff of KPO, which he left to organize the Seven Sauntering Sailors at KGO. He then left radio for a theatrical engagement, returning to the ether waves with Art Fadden over

KFRC as the Joy Boys. For the past several months he has been with KJBS. Galvin was formerly orchestra leader and master of ceremonies in local theaters.

• • • Another invader from Southern California is Mary V. Roeder, former continuity writer for KGER in Long Beach and a Hearst trained newspaperwoman, who is now known as "Dorothy Adams, the KROW Shopper," and broadcasts a shopping hour over KROW, Oakland, every afternoon. She noses out shopping bargains just as well as she used to nose out news for Hearst, evidently.

• • • Betty Marino, NBC violinist, is an accomplished tennis player and golfer, but you seldom find her on a court or a course. Her two favorite sports would ruin her supple fingers for the violin, so she has given them up.

• • • Anne Olander, who is heard weekly over KFRC on Tuesday on the General Paint program, is an exclusive artist for that company.

Miss Olander has been with KOL in Seattle and has done a great deal of recital work in the Northwest. In addition to having a beautiful contralto voice, she has achieved a name for herself as an artist and designer. She has only recently come to San Francisco.

• • • Charlie Glenn is known as "Grandma's Boy" over KROW, Oakland, now. He broadcasts a few of his 7000 old-fashioned songs which he has in his repertoire every other morning. And that means he's joined the vast army of "pond jumpers" that cross San Francisco Bay each day, because he lives in San Francisco.

• • • This is not an invasion of Spanish history, but the simple tale of four "Dons" who constituted a foursome for a wee bit o' golf.

Four "Dons" associated with sports, with the biggest of the "Dons" piping up "Let's Get Associated." They did—they played golf—four "Dons" of football fame. Before the game was over, all agreed they should stick to football.

The four who took a fling at "African Marbles" and afterwards declared in favor of football are Don Liebendorfer, Director of

Publicity, Stanford University; Don Thompson, sports announcer of KPO; Don Newmeyer, former member of Andy Smith's California wonder team, and Don Wilding, announcer of KPO.

According to Jerry, there are as many griefs to recording as there are in the radio business, but it's great experience.

• • • Rena Vale, author of the United Broadcasting Company playlet, "The Crystal and the Press," claims she has run the gamut of occupations from school teaching to publicizing Airways. The first real "break" that she got was winning the Paramount five-thousand-dollar "Idea" contest. This strangely resembles a movie plot, or scene from Cinderella, because it came at a time when she was making her heartiest meals on coffee and doughnuts, and was on the reception committee for an onslaught of rejection slips and angry landladies.

• • • If harmonicas were as big as violins, Johnny O'Brien, NBC harmonica player, would need an assistant to help him transport his instruments to the San Francisco studios of the Pacific Division every time he appeared on a program. He never approaches the microphone with less than seven instruments, and a pile of wrecked harmonicas with broken reeds is left when he finishes.



... SILHOUETTES ...

THE British tradesman is proud to exhibit the words: By Special Appointment to His Majesty, the King. Elbert Bellows, dramatic tenor, who recently joined the KFRC staff, informs us that he also, in a small way, has received the recognition of royalty. He appeared as tenor soloist before the Duchess and Grand Duchess of Luxembourg!

It came as a sort of an aftermath of the World War, and after serving on three sectors of the western front and in the German Army of Occupation with the light field artillery of the Fifth Division. When the Armistice was signed he became part of a show troupe which played all over France. He branched out for himself for the Luxembourg engagement.

Elbert Bellows had been interested in singing ever since he was a boy of five. In grammar and high school he kept up this interest. Then came the war and service in France. After returning from Europe he began studying in earnest and for four years was occupied with voice training in New York and Drake University, in Iowa. He did Lyceum and Chautauqua work during the season.

After returning to his home in Seattle he went on a concert tour of the western states. A chance meeting with Evan Williams, the Welsh tenor, changed the course of his life. Williams advised him to do some hard manual labor to build up his physique. Bellows returned to Washington and went into the lumber business. He followed blacksmithing for a year and a half. Then he returned to active singing—and this time it was the radio that claimed him.

He became staff tenor for a Pacific Coast network. Since then he has sung over a number of other stations in the bay district. In January, 1931, he joined the KFRC staff. He is heard both as a soloist and as lead tenor with the Buccaneers, male quartet.

The true artist is always studying. Elbert Bellows is no exception. At the present time he is studying with Rena Lazelle in San Francisco.

IF YOU'RE looking for Gwynfi Jones and don't find him in the NBC studios singing during a broadcast through KGO,

just visit the nearest "motion picture palace" and he'll be there.

Gwynfi is an inveterate movie fan. He probably hasn't missed a "four star" picture since the critics began to designate the best in that fashion, and it's safe to say he can tell you plots and characters of hundreds of others.

"It's relaxation—even with the talkies," said Gwynfi.

Jones, a tenor, has been singing through the radio since the inauguration, six years ago, of KGO. Before that, he devoted himself to concert work in the United States and abroad.

A Welshman, Jones studied first in Treherbert, South Wales, and later with several foremost British teachers. Edward Davies, tenor of the Carl Rosa Opera Company, was the last with whom the artist worked before coming to America.

Studying at the London Conservatory of Music, Jones devoted much time to piano and received a "certificate" as instrumentalist as well as a vocal artist. He is an excellent performer on the Flugel horn, an instrument seldom heard in this country and found time for several tours as Flugelist with English brass bands. His last English tour came just prior to his trip to America. That was as tenor soloist with the "Pymric Choristers."

"Good music has received great impetus because of radio," Jones says, expressing his opinion of what the new entertainment medium has done to stimulate interest in the classics. "The scores of symphony programs and operatic presentations are carrying fine music into every home and prompting appreciation of its beauty—there's a sort of 'adult education in music' class on the air most of the time. Just look at the audience mail received after every high-class concert and you'll see the attitude of folk toward the classics!"

Besides singing during many NBC programs, Jones is heard at San Francisco and trans-bay churches and occasionally in recital. His numbers mostly are semi-classics though he interprets roles in studio operas and is heard occasionally in the intriguing folk songs of his native land.

CHALIAPIN expressed amazement when he heard the rare quality of Myrtle Leonard's voice—her rich contralto tones contained for him the uncommon qualities of the singing of the Russian Gypsy—Madame Ernestine Schumann-Heink heard her and enthusiastically declared that her's was the first real contralto voice she had heard—and to Miss Leonard stated, "you are the other contralto"—which is not so strange inasmuch that since her appearances with Dobbsie over KPO, thousands of her admirers have written in to KPO and all bring out the comparison of her voice with that of the famous Schuman-Heink.

Born in Alameda, Miss Leonard was first taught piano, that instrument she abandoned, however, at the age of ten years, after having shown great promise as a pianist—she chose instead the form of musical expression which she has developed so beautifully—singing. But that is not to be wondered at—for Miss Leonard possesses a voice that is clearly of the Northern European type and which reflects her Teutonic ancestry. Her range is tremendous and her lower register proclaims her to be that rare person—a real contralto.

Discovered by the eminent Maestro, Francis Stuart of New York, who heard her during one of his summer sojourns to San Francisco—he recognized the unusual qualities and latent possibilities of her voice—and urged her to go to New York to study with him. She did so by exercising her various musical talents, by teaching and doing commercial office work—to sustain herself

during the period of study. Under his teaching she has built unerringly. At about the same time Miss Leonard attracted the attention of Antonia Sawyer, well-known concert master, and spent three years under the Sawyer aegis. Followed in quick succession concerts throughout the East, Northwest and Cuba. They're Never Too Long

I've greatly enjoyed the "Open Circuit," but until this morning have only considered it an entertaining study in psychology.

In the issue just at hand of or for week February 15-21, the letter from B. E. R., Novato, Calif., January 17, headed "A Line in Time" startled me.

Still I hardly think the fine programs will be dropped because those preferring others write the most or are the only ones heard from on the "Open Circuit."

Yet here goes. Irrespective of stations, there are a number of artists and organizations that I always mark. For instance, but not the only ones: Kreindler, Abas, Dolin, Damrosch, Abas String Quartette, National Orotorio Society, etc., etc., to say nothing of Schumann-Heink.

It is hard to tell as between KGO and KPO, but for all-round programs, think I'd have to vote for KPO, but KFRC offers very much that is fine, and these three are the great favorites of myself and wife.

I shun jazz and so does she, but we both realize there are very many who want it.

Personally I detest crooners of all types, and cannot shut off either jazz or a crooner too quickly.

I never had any use for "Best Bets," for I take each day's programs and make up my own list, even though I know I can only pick up a few myself. For example, today I have nineteen marked, but may only get half a dozen or less.

I have all my BROADCAST WEEKLIES for many years and often go back to look up something. It is a wonderful publication. When I think of the old days, am amazed at the wealth from which we may now select.

I can well recollect my amazement when, in 1915, I first listened to San Jose, and as for receivers, I'm ashamed to think what I've wasted.

Right now, within fifteen feet of where I write, is an old ten-tube r-f set which was preceded by a ten-tube superheterodyne.

I now keep for my own use a seven-tube r-f of old design, but have for my wife a six-tube a-c, one the first made in the East, but somewhat modified because of experience here.

Of course I'm old-fashioned, for I was a church organist for many years, and am as familiar with Handel's Messiah, Haydn's Creation, Mendelssohn's Elijah, as the modern movie theater organists are with the popular songs of the day, but I love Damrosch because he brings me so much that is new. Yet I still love Mozart's Twelfth Mass and the

Schubert Unfinished Symphony and the Chopin Nocturnes.

Oh, there is such a boundless wealth of glorious music of the old school, to say nothing of the incomparable Bach, that I often wonder why anyone now composes, but must admit that much that is composed today is glorious.

This is, of course, too long a letter to be printed, but I want to cast in my lot with B. E. R.

An old friend of mine, a devotee of the dial for many years, handed me the other day a list of seventy-five musicians arranged chronologically from Lulli, born in 1633, to Rachmaninoff in 1873, and it made me sad to think of Schubert dead at 31, but glad to think of Verdi, who lived to 88.
