





Progress of Television Is Disappointing

HIGH officials of companies engaged in the development of television are about convinced that many years must elapse before methods are perfected which will be economically and mechanically practical for widespread use.

A decidedly pessimistic view of television's future prevails in many quarters, and the conclusion has been reached that the problem must be approached from a totally different angle if perfect pictures are to be provided within the next few years.

The chief obstacle of development is the fact that to render satisfactory transmission of pictures under present methods it is necessary to utilize frequency bands of such widths as to make impossible any general development of television service such as is now given in broadcasting, in which more than 600 stations are engaged.

Perfect television by the scanning-disc method would require a frequency band of such width as to be impossible of use. A picture so projected would be perfect in every detail, but this perfection, now, at any rate, does not seem possible in the restricted band to which pictures must conform under present conditions.

Considerable advancement in the art of picture transmission is expected to be made

within the next two or three years, and equipment may be developed which will permit picture broadcasting on a fairly satisfactory scale, but, according to some leaders in the industry, it will be necessary to abandon for a number of years all hope of making television a theatrical enterprise with pictures taken, say, in Hollywood studios, projected upon the screens of motion picture houses throughout the country.

The whole problem is that of perfecting a principle already proven. The fact that pictures can be transmitted by radio is established; the task now is to transmit perfect pictures, and to project those pictures over a frequency band sufficiently narrow to permit simultaneous operation of a number of television stations without interfering with broadcasting or other services.

The barriers which now confront television development indicate that the scanning disc will not be the ultimate media for breaking up the picture at the transmitter and re-assembling it at the receiver. A number of investigators have already attacked the problem of finding a substitute for the disc, probably in the form of a cathode ray. Reports have been heard from time to time that this has been accomplished, but, if so, the new developments apparently have not yet progressed beyond the laboratory stage.

... SILHOUETTES ...

NELL Larson—the Swede. What's more, we'll call her that to her face. Pretty fine face, too. Well, she, too, was born. Even as you and I; only at a different spot on the dial. If you had tuned in Vancouver twenty-five years ago you would have heard Nell in her first broadcast of syncopated squalls.

At the age of five mother discovered Nell putting some good old swing bass into the standard hymns on the family reed organ. Good little children didn't use to do such things. Father said no good would come of it, and he ought to have known—being a regular devil on the hot fiddle and a cor-dine hisself. Regular barn dance hall sheik, says Nell. "I'll be derved if daughter is going to be a musician," says Dad. And Dad has been properly derved. Music ran in the family from way back, anyway. Nell's great-grandfather had been official right royal organist to the right royal King of Sweden—and that's a pretty hot job for such a cold country. If Nell was steaming with hot rhythm in Vancouver, you can imagine how hot the girl got after thawing out in Southern California for a few summers. She completed her business course in Santa Ana with honors, and upon graduation got a job playing organ at the local theater. This was when her father gave up and resigned himself to the immutable laws of inheritance.

Like so many other stars of the present KHJ staff, Nell did her first radio broadcasting from the old KHJ, five years ago. And nearly every station in Los Angeles has vibrated to her syncopated onslaughts on the staff piano. After Nell plays with a piano it never is the same again. The life of a KHJ piano tuner is not good for more than three months, and insurance companies won't look at one.

Nell goes in strenuously for books, food and swimming. But her real hobby is horse-back riding. That's what comes of giving a child a hobby horse. Nell always shakes hands with the horse before every round at the riding academy. At the end of each round she waves her handkerchief to the brute, saying philosophically, "You go your way; I'll go mine."

BORN in Germany, raised in Chicago, a member of the American Army during the war, a champion swimmer, a moving picture artist—those are just a few of the things that have happened to Frederic Bittke, baritone on the KFRC staff, and heard on Old Vienna and the Golden State Blue Monday Jamboree.

His parents brought him to Chicago when he was twelve years old. In that city he was a member of the world-famous I. A. C. championship swimming team and a champion fancy diver besides.

He left Chicago to work in the movies at Culver City for the old New York Motion Picture Company. That was in 1916. But he didn't like the lazy life, lounging around for days on end playing pinochle, waiting for the director to put them to work, and he gave it up to become an athletic instructor. Then the war.

Bittke enlisted in the American Army as a member of the Radio Intelligence Section and saw service at the front. Following the Armistice he was a member of the American Army of Occupation, stationed at Luxembourg. It was there that he met the girl who became his wife. He brought her to Southern California, where their daughter, Doris, was born in 1921.

It was upon the insistence of his wife that he decided to take up singing seriously. With his family he returned to Germany to study, and while pursuing his musical studies he was a member of the staff of the American Consulate General in Berlin. He also had two other vocations while in Germany. He sold American chewing gum for Mr. Wrigley, and for two years he was a staff baritone on one of Germany's principal broadcasting stations called Frankfurt on the Main.

Since his return to California, Frederic Bittke has been very active in musical work in the bay district. He sang with the Pacific Opera Company last year, and is soloist each year with the Pacific Saengerfest. He is soloist with the Second Church of Christ Scientist. All this in addition to his regular radio work on KFRC.

WHY, I thought you were a little, fat Scotchman!" people exclaim when they first meet Samuel Gayley Mortland, better known as "Yir Frien' Scotty" to thousands of KPO listeners.

He is a Scotchman, and proud of it, too, as his warm, Scotch burr and his Scotch poems indicate, but he's not short or even plump. Six feet four inches in height, and as slim as the well-known flag-pole, Scotty proves that it's possible for a man to be both a philosopher and a humorist without looking the part. And he doesn't mind the surprise most persons show when they first crane their necks to look up into his quizzical countenance with the twinkling gray eyes. In all the years since he has been "Yir Frien' Scotty" only one radio admirer has ever thought of him as tall and thin.

He was born, not in Aberdeen or Edinburgh, but in St. Louis, Mo. But for all that, he grew up in the atmosphere of Caledonia. His father and mother were true Scots and so were most of their neighbors.


"Roll your slee's aboo yir oxters," his father would order young Scotty when he was doing household chores. That meant, "Roll your sleeves above your elbows." The Thanksgiving turkey was a "bubbly-jock" in the Mortland household, and Bobbie Burns shared honors with the family Bible. The hundreds of Scotch poems which roll off Scotty's tongue into the KPO microphone today as easily as those he writes himself, he learned at his father's knee. "The Solid Muldoon" was one of the favorite poems in the Mortland family, and Scotty can recite it today at a moment's notice.

He was just 18 when he ran away from home and started a career for himself. The elder Mortland was a riverman, and the country where Scotty grew up—Edna Ferber's "Show Boat" setting—was the kind to inspire an adventurous boy to active deeds. Scotty got as far as Colorado on that first trip. He wanted to be a railroad engineer, but the only job he could find was on a newspaper—which is rather reversing the usual order of things in journalism. When he tired of Colorado he came West and settled in Seattle, where he studied law.

SAM WINELAND, KFWB's fine musical director, has a background of both concert and microphone training, and an unusual ability to direct classical and popular programs. He started out at the tender age of ten being a child prodigy, and when he was sixteen, Luigi von Kunitz, eminent Austrian violinist and concert master, was so impressed by this talent that he took the youthful virtuoso to Vienna. He studied at the Brussel Conservatory for two years under Cesar Thomas, and had, as a fellow student, the American composer, Charles Wakefield Cadman.

After a musical career in this country he became musical director for the Jensen von Herberger Corporation in Seattle and Portland, organizing and directing concerts and planning programs. The last two years he has been on the MGM lot during the regime of the musical pictures, associated with Dr. Akst in the synchronization of film and sound, and directed the scores for such hits as "The Rogue Song," "Our Blushing Brides" and "Good News."

Sam's hobbies are hunting and fishing, he is in his element when he is bringing in a wary trout. As for music, he likes both modern and classic compositions and enjoys conducting with a zest that is really enjoyable to observe. He works hard, and his heart and soul is in the labor of the day. Anyone who has heard his excellent broadcasts can't help feeling the tremendous energy, the sympathetic understanding, and the fine qualities of Sam Wineland—a director whom KFWB is proud to claim as a member of their staff.

Scotch humor peeped out in the courtroom so often that Chester Rowell offered him a job running a Scotch column, and "Yir Frien' Scotty" was born. The column is now 16 years old, and has been conducted in various papers on the Pacific Coast. Scotty brought it to radio when he joined the forces of KPO, where he is heard nightly at 5:45 in a news broadcast. "Scotty" also conducts the program at 8 o'clock every Sunday morning when he reads the Chronicle comics to the children. He is also heard on special broadcasts which require a Scotchman.

• • • Reports from the Northwest indicate that the Nathan Abas String Quartet's chamber music hours, which are heard from KPO every Sunday night, are among the best Sunday broadcasts of the West. The personnel of the quartet argues well for continued success. Nathan Abas, violin virtuoso, of Amsterdam, Holland, is director. William Wolski, violin, is a young Russian

of exceptional ability; Flori Gough, 'cellist, is a San Franciscan, recognized as one of the most capable 'cello players in California, and Nathan Firestone, violist, comes from a family of distinguished musicians. He was formerly associated with the chamber music quartet of Louis Persinger. All are featured artists of the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra.

• • • It is generally believed that actors and actresses are the exact antithesis in real life to what they appear when acting. This is not so in the instance of "Lizzie," of "Millie and Lizzie," of CJOR, however. Lizzie is the same motherly, optimistic character that she is in the popular British Columbian feature. She is the mother of five children, the youngest of which is five years old. Russell, the third in precedence, portrays the character of "Little 'Erbie." Many of the domestic episodes are written entirely by "Lizzie," and are elaborations upon actual experiences from her own life.

• • • Paul Rickenbacker, KHJ's splendid announcer and actor, never permits his name to go out on the air if he can help it. He has appeared weekly in important roles in "Folgeria," the "Pershing War Memoirs" (Marshall Foch) and has played most of the leads in "Vignettes in Symphony." Rickenbacker lets his name leak out on the Pilgrims Hour and Jimmie Bittick's dance program from the Town House, only because the sponsors insist on it. Still, Paul has neither creditors nor former Mrs. Rickenbackers on his trail and this reluctance to accumulate well-earned publicity and credit is still waiting an acceptable explanation. Probably, Freud has the answer. These inhibitions assume terrible proportions sometimes.

• • • New energy bubbles forth from KGER as the guiding hand of H. W. Cole, new manager, begins to function. Jack Strock, Harry Moody and Mel Roach comprise the newly arranged announcing staff, each doubling at sundry other positions.

- • • Betty Marino, NBC violinist at the San Francisco studios, had her mind set on playing the harp when she was a youngster. Betty's father insisted upon her studying the violin. In order to get out of practicing, she used to stick the violin strings in water so they would break. However, when people began to speak of the beauty of her tone, she took an interest in the violin which she now plays so delightfully over the air.
- • • Bill Tucker, KFVB's concert pianist, is a firm believer in the "back to nature" idea. His pet hobby is his garden, and when he isn't busy playing some symphonic arrangement on the piano he has his nose buried in the expensive garden catalogues. His latest acquisitions are gardenia plants, and the feminine members of KFVB hope that they thrive.
- • • John Eugene Hasty, author of the new "Emperor of the World" mystery tale of the future, and other KFRC features, is a most obliging playwright. When the station's actors come to him with a sad tale about not being able to be present for the presentation of one of his plays he simply writes them out or writes someone else in. Recently for one of the Emperor of the World episodes Edna O'Keefe had an outside engagement and it was doubtful if she could be back at the studio in time. And so Jack had a substitute part all prepared for two other characters. As it happened Edna arrived just in time, though somewhat out of breath.
- • • Mahlon Merrick, conductor of the Pacific Vagabonds and other NBC orchestras whose programs are noted for their modern musical arrangements, makes most of those arrangements himself, and without the aid of a piano. He has been known to work eight hours at a stretch, without striking a key to verify his ear. "I hear the music as I write it," he explains.
- • • Ken Allen, the new replacement in the often decimated ranks of the KHJ Trio (alias the Three Cheers), was born in Eugene, Oregon, on a Friday, the 13th. Notwithstanding, Ken recently completed an engagement with Roy Fox's orchestra at the Cafe de Paris, London, where the court charge is \$5.25 and 80 per cent of the inmates are of right royal blood. The Prince of Wales and King Alphonso were regular patrons. The Prince seldom failed to request Ken to sing "Little White Lies" and "Where Can You Be."
- • • Tom Mitchell, the Rainier Ricky Man of NBC, received a concrete evidence of a radio listener's admiration the other day when a large package arrived at the San Francisco studios of the Pacific Division for him. It was a handsome pigskin traveling case for cigars.
- • • Radio announcing seems to agree with George Beuchler. Since he came to Columbia from Washington some two years ago, he has gained fifteen pounds.
- • • Alberto Terrasi, baritone, who is heard over KFRC on Sunday mornings during the Home Sweet Home concert, has sung in twenty-two operas, including leads in Rigoletto, Pagliacci, Faust and Traviata. He has appeared in opera in England, South Africa, Central and South America and France, in addition to his native country, Italy, and America.
- • • Kitty Brown has gone domestic! Kitty abandons her duties as copy writer at KGER to discuss the business of "beat the whites of two eggs until stiff," etc., with the women. This new feature is heard from 9:30 to 10 each morning and is listed as Frances and her Fads and Fancies, which includes all of the interesting little tricks of domestic life, i. e., cooking, sewing, home-making or what have you.
- • • Robert Bradford, KHJ staff baritone, earned his way through school down in Santa Ana by making doughnuts. Not only did he make a hole in one—he made a hole in every one of them.
- • • Jesse Crawford, Roy! Poet of the Organ, has twenty-one different and gaudily colored suits in his private bedroom in the Paramount Theater Building in which he spends a major portion of his time. Crawford wears a different suit for each performance in the theater and always wears a blue business suit when he steps into the CBS broadcasting studio in the same building.



Questions & Answers

By N. EARL BORCH

All questions should be put in clear, simple form, and should ask directly what is wanted. Give full name and address. Personal replies or diagram will be supplied for a fee of one dollar each.

QUESTION: Could you please tell me why I can't get the stations on the right kilocycles? My set seems to be getting better as it gets older, but I can't bring them in on the right place. I think your column is going to be a great help and success.—Frank L., Alameda, Calif., April 26.

P. S.—Why doesn't distance come in in the daytime?

ANSWER: Not knowing the make of your receiver, I cannot give the proper explanation as to how to adjust for frequency correction on your dial. However, every modern receiver can be so adjusted as to be very nearly correct. This procedure requires experience and the proper tools and I would advise that you let your radio service man do this for you.

In the upper strata of the earth's atmosphere there is a certain strata we call the "heaviside layer." In technical language we say that this strata consists of ionized air particles. These particles act as a reflecting screen to passing radio waves. The sun is directly responsible for their formation. In the daytime the heaviside layer is located several hundred miles from the earth, while at night, when the sun is not shining directly down so that no further ionization occurs, the layer is relatively close to the earth. Thus we may say that, in the daytime, the waves from the broadcast station have a greater area to cover, while at night they are confined to a limited space, this space being the distance between the heaviside layer and the surface of the earth. At any given distant point from the broadcast station, the passing radio wave will therefore contain more energy at night than is the case in the daytime.

Question: I read in the latest Broadcast Weekly of the Question Bureau for radio problems on page 18 of April 26 to May 22 Weekly. I have a model 42 Atwater Kent

radio with Utah speaker. When I connect the set to a ground of the water pipe or rod driven in the ground the reception is very poor; it comes in very weak. If I disconnect this ground and use the set without a ground the reception is much louder, and if I use the light socket aerial as a ground the reception is quite loud. At night the reception over the light socket aerial is not so loud, so I have to use the rod or pipe ground. Please explain why this is.—W. M. M., La Grande, Ore., April 25.

ANSWER: Your question is not quite clear to me because you do not mention the dimensions of your aerial. The reason for the light socket aerial being a better ground in the daytime is due to the fact that the power line itself, when no devices such as lights, motors, etc., are connected to it, the line acts as a very efficient aerial system, thus bringing into the receiver energy from broadcast stations. In the daytime a minimum of devices are connected to the line, and, therefore, the line acts as a far better aerial than is the case at night when any number of devices are connected to it.

Not knowing the make of your receiver, it is hard to explain exactly why it is that the addition of a ground to the set gives you poor reception. I would say, however, that it is entirely due to a high resistance ground. In other words, you are not making proper contact to real moist earth by means of your ground rod. Ordinarily the moist earth is found between six and eight feet in the ground. This will vary considerably with locations. The water pipe system, being buried only a few feet in the ground, is, in many cases, a very poor radio ground, and often reception is greatly improved by not using it. If you will write me a personal letter, stating details of aerial, ground construction, and also make of receiver, I may be able to help you better.

QUESTION: We have Airline Nine (Model A. E. 10), using nine tubes—five 26s, one 24, now replaced by new G-51, two 45s and one 80.

This we are using with I. C. A. Universal voltage regulator, heavy duty, feeding into I. C. A. service model filter volt.

Would we get better results by using amperite tube, and what would be the trade name or number of amperite required—W. W. G., Walla Walla, Wash., April 27.

ANSWER: Since the primary purpose of any voltage regulator is to keep the voltage supplied to the set always constant, any device which can accomplish this purpose is as efficient as any other. You may easily prove to your own satisfaction whether or not the voltage is constant by connecting a sensitive a-c voltmeter directly across the input terminals to the power transformer and then watching the needle deflection for variations. If no fluctuation occurs then the regulator is functioning properly.

The amperite regulator requires a special power transformer having an 80-volt primary. It cannot be used without such a transformer because the voltage drop across the tube itself is approximately 20 volts, and this subtracted from the line voltage would render the set inoperative. Not knowing the primary current drawn by the power transformer, I cannot give you the type amperite required for your set. If you will write to the engineering department, Radiall Company, 50 Franklin Street, New York City, they will supply you with the desired information.

QUESTION: I have been contemplating on buying a much advertised DX aerial and welcome this opportunity to ask you your opinion of it. I have at the present time a 100-foot flat-top aerial and have made quite a distance record, but thought that if I could increase my reception with one of these DX aerials I would gladly install it. Thanking you for your opinion, I am, T. A. B., Berkeley, April 22.

ANSWER: I would not advise installation of the aerial of which you write. The possibilities are that your receiver would have to be turned on to a more sensitive position in order to receive the DX stations which you now have logged with your 100-foot flat-top. This would have a tendency to bring in more outside noise on the stations to which you are listening. If you really want to improve your reception, I would advise that you raise the flat-top higher in the air. The higher the aerial, the

less will be the ground distortion effect on the passing radio waves, and the more signal pick-up you may expect. If, by so doing, your total aerial system becomes too long so that you lose selectivity, reduce the length of the flat-top rather than lower it to earth.

QUESTION: I welcomed the announcement in this last issue saying that you would conduct a Question and Answer department. I have made many inquiries from dealers, but haven't got a satisfactory reply as yet. Here is my trouble. When I turn on the lights in our house it causes our radio music to fade and when I turn on other lights it makes the music too loud. What's the trouble? Awaiting your answer, I am, Claud D., San Francisco, April 24.

ANSWER: This question is more or less answered in the previous issue of BROADCAST WEEKLY. If your aerial is of the proper dimension and you still have trouble, send in complaint to the Pacific Radio Trade Association, at 316 Bellevue Hotel, San Francisco.

Don Lee Affiliates Station KDB, Santa Barbara

THE first of several contemplated additions to his chain of Pacific Coast radio stations was consummated this week by Don Lee, Cadillac-La Salle distributor for California and head of the Don Lee Broadcasting System, through purchase of the controlling interest in station KDB, Santa Barbara, California, located in the Faulding Hotel.

The vast entertainment and educational resources of both the Columbia and Don Lee chains will be made available to Santa Barbara and contiguous communities commencing May 1, at which time necessary technical hook-ups and program arrangements will have been completed.

Because of the geographical limitations of Santa Barbara it has been difficult in the past for that city to enjoy satisfactory radio reception, either from the stations of the north or south. Because of these the Don Lee chain has rightfully taken much pride in the fact that the programs built and broadcast from KHJ and KFRC have a greater and more loyal following on the Coast than those released over the nation-wide systems.

KDB, operating on a frequency of 1500 kilocycles, is to be equipped with the latest type of Western Electric transmitting equipment.

Dwight Faulding, with whom Don Lee will be associated in this station, will continue as general manager, it was announced.

This will be of particular interest to listeners throughout the Northwest, as the noted opera star hails from Seattle, and southern listeners will also attach importance to her appearances, as Miss Gentle is well known in Hollywood and Los Angeles, where she has been making singing pictures for Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer. San Franciscans will remember her for her stellar operatic work with various nationally known opera companies.
