"Johnny Smoker," shown above is the answer to a general demand for a combination set and smoking stand. The Johnny Smoker, which was recently announced by Crosley, is an attractive cabinet completely enclosed on all sides. It can be set anywhere in the room, usually beside the favorite easy chair.

Without moving from the chair, the radio can be regulated by a touch of the fingers. Stations are changed as desired and programs may be stilled during periods of in-

teresting reading. In addition to excellent radio reproduction, it provides the necessary place for ash trays, tobacco jar or reading matter.

The chassis is equipped with five tubes, three of which are screen grid, electro-power speaker and other modern developments. The front panel of the cabinet is made of genuine Crosley Repwood, and reproduces a costly, original wood carving. The sides, top and back are of genuine walnut veneer. The price is said to be very moderate for a set of this type.

The "Chopped Off Program"

RECENTLY when the Los Angeles Festival Orchestra program was "chopped off" to make way for a following program, many listeners expressed their disapproval in no uncertain terms. The stations and the sponsors were both severely criticized. And, the strange part of it all is that the sponsor of the following program bore the brunt of these criticisms.

In order to acquaint our readers with the real reasons for just such an occurrence, BROADCAST WEEKLY has asked Mr. Gilman, vice-president of the National Broadcasting Company, for a statement for publication. Herewith follows his statement:

"My attention has been called to comment from readers of BROADCAST WEEKLY in which the National Broadcasting Company and its sponsors were criticized because the broadcast was terminated before the Los Angeles Festival Orchestra program was completed, and before the artist on the program was permitted to do her number.

"The position of a network is quite different from that of an independent local station inasmuch as extensive commitments are involved which, if interfered with, throw an entire system out of harmony.

"We are much like a railroad which must adhere to the schedule of one train because it affects the schedules of all others and an entire traffic situation is affected.

"What the public and the listener do not know is that the National Broadcasting Com-

pany voluntarily donated its facilities as an aid to this worthy project and in addition thereto permitted a commercial sponsorship the revenue from which is to be returned to the musicians in the various cities of the Pacific Coast. The program was entirely out of our control and we were, therefore, dependent upon the coöperation of the Los Angeles musicians who laid out the program itself. They knew in advance that this program would have to be cut at 9 o'clock and we had requested them to place the artists and best numbers in the one-hour period, feeling that greater benefit would result to them if they did.

"It almost invariably happens that when we allow organizations or persons not familiar with the demands of radio schedules to lay out or conduct programs it results in just such confusion. The sponsor whom you criticize for holding us to the contract was in no way responsible for what happened. It was merely the mechanics of the occasion which held the program to the period set.

"We know that the BROADCAST WEEKLY desires to render the best possible service to its readers and we trust that this explanation will clarify the situation for you."

It is to be hoped that in the future those in charge of originating "outside" programs will give the radio audience more consideration and avoid just such disappointments.




A Real Problem

For a year, now, I have been buying each Friday or Saturday a copy of the BROADCAST WEEKLY from the newsstand in the Spalding Building, Portland, Ore. I find it an entertaining and useful publication.

I am curious to know on what basis the programs of the broadcast stations are chosen for publication in the BROADCAST WEEKLY, and why KGW and KOIN appear in your columns only occasionally. I notice also, during the season just passed, that you never gave credit to KOIN for receiving the CBS of the New York Philharmonic Symphony concerts each Sunday, when KOIN always broadcast them.

I think it would be a convenience to your readers, if you were to list the stations in their alphabetical order. At present there seems to be to the layman no orderly arrangement in their appearance in your publication, neither as to power of station, geographical order, alphabetically or otherwise. The arrangement that would be most convenient to me would be to put the CBS and NBC group broadcasting first, and then the stations according to alphabetical order. The ideal arrangement, however, would be to list all stations under the hours of the days in

which the broadcasting is given. I suppose, however, that this would involve a great deal of effort to arrange programs under such plan.

WHEN Hardy Gibson was 8 years old his father sent him to dramatic school to learn a few tricks about dancing, singing, and acting, so that he would be able to "entertain" at home, and make a name for himself as the "hit of the

party." That was all he wanted; he expected his son to follow his own footsteps in the diamond business. And Hardy did, for a while. He served his apprenticeship as a diamond setter, five years, and then the knowledge he had picked up at dramatic school began to bother him. Well, to make a long story short, he ran away from home with a pantomime show at the age of 15, playing what is known in Australia as a "silly kid" comic. All of this happened in Melbourne, Australia, where his father, of Scotch descent, had settled. His father brought him home and put him to work at the bench again. The second time he ran away he went to New Zealand. Again he was collared and benched. So he garnered a partner, a young chap by the name of Bovis, and they skipped out for America, landing in San Francisco. They got a week right away at the old Wigwam Theater, and were received so well that Sullivan and Considee booked them over their circuit into New York. Their act was a burlesque boxing act. In New York the pair split up, and Hardy went out as a "single," doing an intoxicated English johnny.

In the years that followed, Hardy Gibson played all the vaudeville circuits, several musical shows, and worked in the silent movies for the American Film Company and Fox. There are few vaudeville theaters in the country that haven't booked his act.

About ten years ago he met a young lady from Omaha, who was playing the same show with him in Chicago. Her name was Betty, and, with her sister, was just out of dancing school. The girls were part of a musical act. Gibson was doing a "single." But such was their attraction for each other they decided to team up, both from a matrimonial and theatrical standpoint. They have been together ever since.

Hardy Gibson is a very earnest, sincere and hard-working man, always eager to help another who is in the "business," as he calls

the theatrical world. His wife is a very sweet little woman who is a devoted mother to her two boys, Harry, age 8, and Jimmy, age 6. They have settled down to radio work in San Francisco in order to give the children the benefits of a home and proper schooling. Both boys threaten to be aviators, and keep the house littered up with home-made models. Jimmy remarks facetiously, however, that perhaps the flying game isn't so good, after all; one is apt to take too many "flops." And he knows from his experience with the show business that flops are decidedly not the best things to take. They are known to KFRC radio audiences as Doakes and Doakes.


LAIRD DOYLE is a young man with a varied past. In his twenties he has managed to collect more experiences than most people do in a lifetime.

• • • Gunnar Johansen, young Danish pianist whose Sunday night recitals are an NBC feature, has taken at least one step toward perpetual fame. A Berkeley sculptor has completed a striking head of the musician, and is preparing to cast it in bronze.

• • • Visitors to Morton Downey's CBS broadcasting studio are disappointed to find that it is impossible to hear him sing if more than three feet away, so perfect is his microphone technique.

• • • Laird Doyle, KFWB, has some peculiar scars on his arm, and when asked about them merely remarks, "That's where a gondola bit me in Venice." The truth of the matter is that he collected them when he was a member of the boxing team at Stanford University.

• • • Herbert L. Clarke and his famous Long Beach Municipal Band have returned from a successful two-week vacation and are now entertaining the Beach City audiences and listeners of KGER, from the band shell located east of the old auditorium. It is hoped that the inside concerts will be resumed in the new \$5,000,000 auditorium. The new building, which will be the home of the Long Beach Band in the future, will be formally opened the last of August, when the American Legion convention takes place in Long Beach. The regular afternoon concerts will continue to be a feature at 2:30 each afternoon during the week, except Monday.

• • • Continuity writers and feature producers on radio who talked formerly of their "artistic" inability to write more than two or three broadcasts a week, should hear of Tom Breneman, feature director of KNX, Hollywood. This enterprising young man, aside from writing and taking part in the six weekly broadcasts of his famous "Tom and Wash" characters, now writes and produces nine other fifteen-minute programs per week, one-half hour and one full-hour program, a total of seventeen programs per week, every word of which Tom writes.

• • • Bill Sanderson, KFWI announcer, has a flair for dramatics, and directs the station's dramatic players in the way they should go. Returning to his native San Francisco about a year ago, after some time spent in the theatrical and movie wilds of Hollywood, he was promptly snatched by KFWI. He is 24 years old, five feet ten inches tall, has wavy brown hair, and a healthy appearance that comes from playing golf and swimming. His full name is William Earle Clifton Sanderson, but he prefers just plain "Bill."

• • • Grace Sanderson Michie, noted playwright, society girl, and writer of many of the best radio continuities heard in the West, has joined the KPO staff of writers and artists. Miss Michie, who is the granddaughter of San Francisco's pioneer, Mayor George Sanderson, has written and produced many of the best pictures ever filmed, among them "Defending Destiny," "Pagan Passions," "The Finger of Justice," and many others written during her long engagement in Hollywood.

• • • Keith Ashton, veteran newspaper man and radio writer, has been incorporated in the production staff of KFI-KECA, Los Angeles. Ashton's experience includes two trips to the deepest jungles of South and Central America, and long service as airplane pilot with the American navy during the war. Aside from his standing in the writing game, Ashton is a lawyer and is admitted to practice in the New York bar.

• • • The Walter Beban fans would have Cecil Underwood's job—yea, his very head—for the "brutal," "outrageous" attacks he makes on their favorite playwright. They writhe in an agony of embarrassment for dear Walter and seize a pen with which to express their indignation and bitter disapproval. Next Saturday night, when the Spotlight Revue is announced, lo and behold!—that Underwood person again! Surely he will temper his comments this time. But no. There he goes! More insulting, more savage than ever. Poor Walter! If they only knew—if they only knew! Cecil is introducing Walter's skit word for word as it has been set down by the author himself.

• • • Leon Sieff, youthful violin virtuoso, appearing on KROW, has an outstanding memory repertoire of scores of operatic and classical compositions. One of the most difficult of concert numbers, Mendelssohn's "Concerto in E Minor," with a 32-page score, Leon knows by heart. He is but 19 years old.

• • • Domenico Savino, conductor of the Paramount-Publix orchestra on the Columbia network, comes naturally by his dexterity with the baton. Savino is a fencer of more than average ability. His prowess with foils came from his early education in a military school in Italy.

• • • Gordon Henderson's return to KPO will be welcomed by his many admirers of the air, as prior to going to Hollywood several years ago, Henderson's entrancing rhythm was a regular feature of KPO's broadcasts. Henderson and his orchestra are filling a vacancy left by Jesse Stafford and his Palace Hotel Dance Orchestra, who are playing an engagement at the Paramount Theater in San Francisco.

• • • Blond, young giant, Nelson Case, KFVB, is a Kappa Sigma from William and Mary College, possesses a fine baritone voice, writes excellent musical continuities, and reads lines as well as announces. Another six-footer, Lewis Teegarten, attended the Alvirne School of Dramatic Art in New York. Then came a session in Seattle as announcer, and now he is announcing, writing commercial continuities, and taking charge of transcription programs for KFVB.


• • • Some seven years ago, when radio was in its infancy on the Pacific Coast, one of the most popular entertainers at KNX, the Voice of Hollywood, was introducing and making popular the now familiar art of "crooning." June Pursell, then a red-head and now a gorgeous blonde, succeeded and has since become nationally famous both on radio and through phonograph records and the talkies. Now June is to be heard on the air from KNX with her Aristocrats of Rhythm, the same being three more charming young ladies who sing interesting and tuneful harmonic backgrounds for June's haunting melodies. Not only that, but the trio play the piano, violin, saxophone, clarinet, and other instruments.

• • • We find that even radio artists read BROADCAST WEEKLY's "Open Circuit" department. At least Rheba Crawford did. Rheba Crawford appears on KYA every morning except Sundays in a program called "The Little Things in Life." Friday morning, May 15, she called attention to a letter she had read in the "Open Circuit" in defense of jazz. The writer of this letter had listed several jazzed classics, and Miss Crawford played one of these for the benefit of her audience. Her audience responded nobly. Saturday morning her mail box was jammed with indignant protests from the lovers of classics, but not one of the other musical faction bothered to approve. Miss Crawford loves a good fight, as those who remember her as "The Angel of Broadway" will recall. She is enthused over the "classics" spunk and annoyed by the lack of interest shown by the "populars." From now on, she says, she will favor the opinions of the classic school, unless the followers of popular music mend their ways.



Questions & Answers

By N. EARL BORCH

All questions should be put in clear, simple form, and should ask directly what is wanted. Give full name and address. Personal replies or diagram will be supplied for a fee of one dollar each.

QUESTION: Please tell me just what the difference is between the pentode and multi-mu tubes. Also the advantages of these tubes over the old style.—Lloyd R., Seattle, Wash., May 10.

ANSWER: The multi-mu or variable mu tube, while having a high amplification factor is only suitable as a detector or an intermediate audio frequency amplifier where resistance coupling is used, because its undistorted output is very low. The pentode tube, also with a high amplification factor, is designed primarily as an output tube having a high amplification and high undistorted output. With the variable mu tube much greater amplification per stage than that of other tubes can therefore be had while with the pentode the amplification is so high that no intermediate audio tube is necessary.

Question: When in operation, one of the power tubes in my radio shows a blue light. When I take this tube out of the socket the set plays better than with it in. What is the reason for this, and does leaving the tube in the socket under this condition place a strain on the set? The set is not playing as well as when we first got it. What shall I do for it?

Ernest M. G., Eureka, Calif.

Answer: The power tube in which you notice the blue glow is in what we call a state of ionization. In other words, a certain amount of gas is present inside the tube. This gas, if present in great quantities, will have the tendency to practically short circuit the tube so that, as far as the receiver is concerned, render it inoperative. There is no practical way to eliminate this condition from the tube. If you want receiving conditions restored to what it formerly was, you must purchase a new power tube. I would suggest that you have all the tubes checked


at your radio dealer and replace all those not up to standard. The average life of a radio tube is approximately 1000 hours, so that, if you use your receiver an average of three hours per day, at the end of a year the tubes have been in use 1095 hours. Just because the filament or heater element lights up does not mean that it is a good tube. Only a check on an efficient tube tester can determine its condition.

QUESTION: At your earliest convenience please give me the information on the following item: A monthly radio magazine (Radex) prints a suggestion from a reader. He says that "The sensitivity of a screen-grid receiver can be increased by running a fine wire from the plate terminal on a standard 5-prong 224 tube to within a quarter inch of the cap." It seems to me that the manufacturers of my set (Radiola 80) would have thought of that.

My question is: Would running a fine wire from the plate terminal of the 224 tube to within one-fourth inch of the cap in any way cause injury to the tube or set, and if not, how would it increase the sensitivity? Thanks.—Shearon B., Jr., Woodacre, Calif., May 9.

ANSWER: By using such an arrangement as you describe in your letter, a plate-grid feedback will take place. This will have the tendency to increase the amplification per tube where this connection is used. However, this is not a desirable condition because the receiver is apt to become very unstable in operation and at certain points on the dial will have a tendency to set up heterodyne waves which may radiate away from the antenna and into nearby receivers where great interference, in the form of high pitched squeals, will be the result. I can therefore not recommend this arrangement.





Safety First

A great glass curtain, transparent but soundproof, separates Paul Whiteman, "The King of Jazz," and his orchestra from guests during broadcasts, since he moved into the Edgewater Beach Hotel, Chicago, Saturday, May 16, for an indefinite engagement.

It is the first time such an idea has been used on a dance floor.

The construction principle follows that used in the NBC Times Square Studio, New York, with a glass curtain which descends as a soundproof partition separating the orchestra from the revelers during the broadcast, but in this case the entire studio is of glass.

The dancers hear the music through a loudspeaker. This is an unique arrangement for a regular dance orchestra. Heretofore the musicians have played in the open, with dancers circulating freely around them, often in proximity to the microphone.

The contract was signed through the agency of the NBC Artists Service. Whiteman's band will broadcast late dance programs several times each week for eastern listeners, but this series will not interfere with the Tuesday program by Paul Whiteman's Paint Men, which Whiteman directs over a nation-wide NBC network.





Bobby Jones

Bobby Jones has a simple and direct system of preparing his weekly golf talks broadcast each Wednesday over an NBC network in the Listerine program. Studio attaches in Los Angeles, where the Emperor Jones is making movie shorts, and from where his golf talks are picked up, declare that the golfing king is a total stranger to the sort of temperament that some screen and microphone celebrities display.

Jones, accompanied by O. B. Keeler, his interlocutor in radio, shows up at the KFI-KECA studios promptly every Wednesday half an hour before their broadcast begins.

They take their copy and retire to a corner of the reception room. There they clip the pages to pieces of cardboard so they won't rustle before the microphone. Then they begin to rehearse.

They are thorough in twenty minutes, and then stroll out on the roof garden for a cigarette and a chat. Two minutes before their program is scheduled to begin they enter the studio, perfectly prepared.

"Bobby and Keeler have their broadcasting routine so perfected that their broadcast runs itself," says Don Wilson, their announcer. "You wouldn't know they were in the place five minutes before or one minute after their program. And when they step before the microphone everything is timed to the second, and it goes off so smoothly that listeners might think it had been rehearsed for months. No wonder he's golfing champion."

Bobby is quite happy in his relations with the Los Angeles studios of NBC, he explained recently.

"They give me just the right size cardboard for my pages and they never talk golf to me," he says contentedly.


