... SILHOUETTES ...

THOUSANDS of summer week-end motorists, who make quick exits from stifling New York by means of the Holland vehicular tunnel to New Jersey, might well offer an abundance of thanks to Dr. Howard W. Haggard. One of the

greatest of modern engineering feats, it would have been impossible without a ventilation plan eliminating the deadly carbon monoxide gases from motor exhausts. Dr. Haggard, whose talks, "Devils, Drugs and Doctors," are heard every Sunday over the Columbia Broadcasting System, was largely responsible for the successful working out of that plan.

Born in 1891 in La Porte, Indiana, Dr. Haggard was educated at Exeter and Yale. He graduated from the Sheffield Scientific School at Yale in 1914, and from medical school three years later.

During the war he was a captain in the physiological division of the Chemical Warfare Service. His particular duty was to test the physiological effects of poison gases, and most of his experiments were conducted on the baseball field at Yale.

After the War Dr. Haggard joined the faculty of his alma mater, to become a member of the staff of the Laboratory of Applied Physiology at Sheffield. At the same time he became a consulting physiologist for the United States Bureau of Mines.

His war experience with poison gases was turned to humanitarian purposes when peace came, for it is at this point that he and his associates at the laboratory worked out the ventilation standards for the Holland Tunnel. About the same time they investigated the condition of air on Fifth Avenue, New York City, suggesting, after their findings, the use of vertical exhaust pipes on buses as a means of reducing the amount of carbon monoxide.

Dr. Haggard is also the co-inventor of the H. & H. (Henderson and Haggard) inhalator for gas poisons, which is used throughout the world for reviving victims of carbon monoxide gas.

Once during a lecture on physiology Dr. Haggard mentioned to his audience that it was Ether Day—the anniversary of the discovery of ether about the middle of the last

century. The group expressed much amazement and doubt when he told them that until the first experiments with ether, only three-quarters of a century ago, patients were operated on with no anaesthetic to relieve their pain. The only preparation for a surgical operation was to tie the patient firmly to the table and let him scream.

The unexpected discovery that an intelligent group of people seemed totally ignorant of the fact that surgery had come out of its dark ages only within the past century gave him his inspiration for a popular and readable history of medicine. He wrote "Devils, Drugs and Doctors," and proof that he sensed a real popular demand lies in the fact that the book is now in its fifteenth printing.

Both the book and the program which is named for it, present in interesting and sometimes highly dramatic manner the evolution of the plane of medical knowledge throughout the centuries.

TWENTY-TWO swimming medals, a reputation as a ballet dancer, a nice tennis game, and a crooning "blues" voice are Maud Nickerson's claims to fame thus far.

Miss Nickerson, who, when not on the air at KOL, Seattle, holds down a job as traffic manager at the station, still has a lot of room left in her twenties. Radio editors and listeners alike say she has the most effective blues voice in the whole town.

Now in her third year on the ether, Maud got her first radio experience at KYA in San Francisco. KFRC fans also heard her before she went north. At Alameda High School she started her swimming career, which she left to take to the air. An accomplished ballet and tap dancer, her favorite sports, next to swimming, are baseball and basketball.



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As "Captain" of the KOL "Parade," which passes in review each week-day noon, Miss Nickerson sings special requests and new blues songs. On the Parade and on other programs she has built herself a following of enthusiastic fans during her three months in Seattle.

Television Progress Turning to Home Equipment

APPARENTLY abandoning plans to restrict television to the theater, leaders in the radio industry now appear to be concentrating their efforts on the production of home equipment and are reported to have developed a new home talking motion picture machine which is to be the forerunner of television sets for private use.

Leaders in the film industry, who have been watching television closely, fearing that it would revolutionize their industry, appear to have been given assurance that no invasion of the theater field is contemplated, since reports from the film colony have in recent weeks taken a far more optimistic tone.

Probably the most serious drawback to television so far has been the question of its use after it is perfected. Experience with broadcasting appears to have convinced leaders in the radio field that there is little profit in throwing the new art wide open, as was done with radio in the early days, so that anyone can put a set together and get free entertainment from expensive transmitting stations. The staging of television shows will be a far different and more expensive proposition than the broadcasting of sound, and offers many problems which seemed capable of solution only by confining pictures to theaters where a cash return could be assured.

Just what has changed this attitude is not apparent, but new developments in the moving picture field are being held out as having a decided influence upon radio pictures,

possibly, it is intimated, through ability to use the home projector in connection with a television receiving set.

A promise that television, when it does come, will be offered in perfected form, and not be put out in a crude state to be developed, revolutionized and further perfected, as broadcasting has been during the past ten years, given recently by David Sarnoff, chairman of the board of the RCA Victor Company, is interpreted as meaning that considerable time may elapse before general distribution is attempted.

"We are seeking to perfect television to a point where it is capable of rendering real service before offering it to the market," Sarnoff declared. "While the public was willing, and even eager, to experiment with radio in the early stages of broadcast development, it seems to us that it will desire a comparatively more advanced television receiver than the early crystal radios. There was no precedent for the taking of sound and music out of space, but the public has been educated by the motion picture industry to expect picture transmission of a high quality, and it is doubtful whether interest can be long sustained by inferior television images.

"I do not believe that television will supersede sound broadcasting by radio. It will be a correlated industry. Television promises another great industrial development, but to assure this we cannot disappoint the public and defeat the possibilities of a future great service by hasty and premature action at the present time."

You Want What You Want When You Want It

Am I taking too much upon myself to say that I represent multitudes of people who never write letters to public agencies and who do not care for radio because they cannot get what they want when they want it?

The BROADCAST WEEKLY has been a great help to me in getting what I want over the radio. Through your paper may I offer a few suggestions.

First; Mixed programs are disappointments. If one doesn't care for dance music, he does not have to listen to the Lucky Strike orchestra, but in a mixed program he has to jump up and turn off the radio whenever jazz music or blue songs start in. I no longer have any patience for the mixed program. I am made actually sick by jazz music. In your last number CRC of Santa Maria hits the point exactly. He likes to beat time.

Beating time or dancing will relieve the nervous tension made by jazz. Personally I enjoy being quiet when listening to music and rather have my mind and my emotions react to it than my body. St. Vitus dance used to be a disease.

Second; My radio has been a musical education for me, making me familiar with the names and works of hundreds of composers. A few years ago there was a Schubert celebration and every station played Schubert for weeks. There have been all Sullivan programs and Liebling plays Chopin over KFI. I would like more programs devoted to one composer.

Third; One expects popular music to rage and wane, but why is this true of classical music over the radio? I keep a record book that shows strange runs on certain compositions.

Fourth; May the day come quickly when I can turn the dial to just what I want: Station A for fine orchestral music and Grand Opera; Station B for Chamber music and violin and vocal solos; Station C for jazz and dance music and blue songs; Station D for bands, patriotic and civic affairs; Station E for popular songs and light operas and musical comedies; Station F for Drama; Station G for news, stock quotations, book review, religious programs; Station H for sports; Station I for short skits and variety programs, etc.

Fifth; Has any analysis been made of the people who send in fan mail? Is it the only way a station has of testing the popularity of its programs? From the letters I have read and heard read, it seems a mighty poor way.

Talkies, and radio say, "find out what people want and give it to them." Advertising men say, "Make people want what you have to give" and they seem to get away with it, even in making people want what the movies and the radio have to give. I hope the radio will make people want better and better music, finer drama, and oratory with a message.

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IF YOU ask Harold Peary what he does to entertain NBC audiences, he says "Yes!" For the varied activities of this singer, actor, comedian and "heavy" are so numerous that it would be hard to classify him and his work. In one average day in the San Francisco studios of the National Broadcasting Company he is likely to be heard singing a romantic song in a rich baritone, then imitating a ducky with irresistible humor, and then delivering the lines of the villain in a radio drama in an almost inhumanly sinister tone.

"I never could make up my mind which I wanted to be—an actor or a singer," he explains. "Radio solved the problem for me by letting me be both."

Harold was born in San Leandro, California, and broke into the theatrical profession while he was still in his 'teens. His first role was a Mexican villain, which may explain why he is a dialect expert and plays villains so well. He was a member of an Oakland stock company for the season following his debut, then got a contract on a vaudeville circuit as a singer. When he returned to California, still under 20, his family insisted upon his returning to school and completing his education before going on with his career. Harold consented, but the day after graduation he left on a tour of the Orpheum circuit which lasted a year and a half.

Stock experience, musical comedy engagements and review followed. San Franciscans saw him in the Henry Duffy production of "Love 'Em and Leave 'Em."

By that time Harold had become a Benedict, and wanted to settle down. Mrs. Peary was Betty Jourdiane, an Oakland girl who

was a member of the juvenile company in which Harold once made an appearance as a child. She played the ingenue rôles in Harold's own musical comedy production, "The Pepper Box Revue."

Radio gave the Pearys a chance to have their own home—boon to the actor, tired of hotel life—so Harold joined the NBC staff in 1929, and has remained a member ever since. He is Tony Spagliarini in the School Days skit in the Associated Spotlight Revue, and contributes songs to the presentation each Saturday night when it is broadcast through the NBC network.

AMONG the most popular of KHQ's family of artists must be numbered Norman H. Thue. We don't know just what the "H." stands for, but he always puts it in, so it is probably to remind him of something, "or someone."

He has been appearing on KHQ programs for about two years, although a part of that time he was still in school at Washington State College in Pullman. He finished the course last year, but to be quite truthful, he still very much looks the part. As if he might, perhaps, be one of WSC's best football men, with such broad shoulders and that six feet and one inch of smooth power. But, then, there's those dark and smouldering eyes—perhaps he was the class poet.

In addition to the radio appearances, Norman and his friend, "Dutch" Groshoff, conduct the dance orchestra known in Spokane and to all the surrounding towns as "The Collegians," and so much in demand that Norman's days are sometimes obliged to stretch way beyond the usual number of waking and working hours. However, he always comes up smiling, being one of the salt of the earth . . . the even-tempered and dependable kind.

He was born August 25, 1904, in Sedro Wooley, Wash. His education was all obtained in Washington schools, and he is married and lives in Spokane. For pastimes and preference he insists that his are for teaching, fishing, rehearsing, and eating—and whether by chance or as climax, he lists them in just that order. It would seem as if he should be finding a large amount of happiness in life, as most of these activities must be generously included in every day's routine. He confesses to only one aversion. He hates riding in airplanes, no doubt preferring his wings to be "Wings of Song," and we agree that "Wings of Song" will probably carry him far and high in the realm of radio.

MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Don E. Gilman, Vice-President in charge of the Pacific Division, National Broadcasting Company, who returned to San Francisco from New York recently, came west on the Empire Builder, the train which provides the title for the Great Northern Railway's weekly dramatic program, broadcast through the NBC network Monday nights. As the train neared Oregon, a little gray-haired lady who had worn a curious air of expectancy for almost the entire day, sat back and sighed: "I've enjoyed this whole trip," she confided to Gilman. "All my life I've planned to see the West, and now I'm here at last. But I'm just a little bit disappointed about one thing—I did so hope to see that man they called 'Old Timer' in the Empire Builder program—I kind of thought he might be on this train!"

• • • Radio artists receive many very unusual gifts and souvenirs, but Al Pearce, guiding spirit of the KFRC Happy Go Lucky Hour on the Don Lee Chain, is in receipt of one from Mrs. R. R. Harris, of Alameda, that certainly wins the cardboard microphone. It is a large notebook, with Al's picture pasted on the cover, containing a resume of everything that has transpired on the Happy Go Lucky Hour for the past year. Mrs. Harris has logged each song sung by every single artist who appeared on the program during that period. For example, Al may turn to the book and find he sang "The Bird on Nellie's Hat" once, and "There's Nothing on My Mind" seven times during the year. Norman Neilsen sang "It Happened in Monterey" eight times, and "Mighty Lak a Rose" once.

• • • The spirit of a prisoner in a Stockton, Calif., county jail is reflected in an exchange of letters to KJR. This prisoner, a "trusty," requested "Eleven More Months and Ten More Days." KJR had no such musical composition at the time, so "The Prisoner's Song" was substituted. Hearing this request, the trusty wrote: "Many thanks for the substitute. priate than 'The Prisoner's Song.' We enjoyed it immensely." A humorous poem written by the trusty was enclosed. Also the following song was requested: "It Won't Be Long Now."

• • • Ever since a well known radio advertiser started warning radio dialers to watch their "adam's apple," Adams Appling has become a popular sport. According to an announcer from KPO, Adam's Apple technique is an important factor in good announcing.

• • • After an absence of several months, Harry Wickersham is back at KJBS as an announcer and continuity writer. Wickersham, while still a young man, is an old timer in radio, having operated Station KFBD on Telegraph Hill in 1923, the first high powered radio station in San Francisco.

• • • Ann Stone, KFVB blonde young ingenue, with one of the warmest voices on the air, made her debut on the stage when she was eighteen, playing in a stock company in San Francisco. She will be heard Wednesday night in the Romancing Rack-teer drama.

• • • "Shadows," a melodious ballad written by Joseph Sieff, versatile young KROW broadcast artist, was just recently published. Another number by the young jazz artist, a foxtrot, entitled, "Please Come Back Again," will also be published shortly. Sieff, who shares honors with his 19-year-old violinist brother, Leon, in the KROW Portuguese program daily, has collaborated on the words and music of several ballad numbers, including "I Got a Misery" and "Frances Lorraine."

• • • A contract on a fifty-two weeks basis has been renewed for B. A. Rolfe and his Lucky Strike Orchestra by the sponsors of the program, the American Tobacco Company. NBC listeners who follow these Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday evening programs are assured of hearing them for another year.

• • • It's Billie Lowe now. It used to be Billie Landers, and it took nearly six months for the news to break. Billie, the popular KJR and Northwest Broadcasting System blues artist, was secretly married during the last month of last year. Shortly thereafter she became seriously ill and was absent from the NWBS studios for many months. The news leaked out that she was married and is Mrs. Edmund Lowe. Billie Lowe, if you please, she insists.

• • • The famous Hallroom Boys, noted funsters of the air, have returned to KNX, Hollywood. Favorites of radio some years ago, their singing, sly joking and other entertainment, the pair of radio stars are expected to recapture their far-flung audience in short order. Originally the boys made famous that endless song, "Down by the Omelet Sea." The song may return, but at present the Hallroom Boys will be identified by the more modern but nevertheless endless lyric, "You Gotta Be Good in Hollywood." They are on the air two nights a week—Monday and Thursday.

• • • "Uncle Jay's here and all the kids are happy as can be." That's the story from Long Beach since Johnny Mack, erstwhile "Uncle Jay," moved into KGER. Johnny came to the beach city station from KFI and brought several interesting features of his own origination. Most of Mack's time will be spent on the air as evening announcer from KGER, the remainder going to devising tricks and rhymes for "Uncle Jay," which will be on the air at 6:15 each Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

• • • When the radio hero bends over the radio heroine's hand and says "Bon jour, Mademoiselle," he will speak not only with gallantry, but correct accent, hereafter—at least when he appears in dramas presented in the San Francisco studios of the National Broadcasting Company. A French teacher will be present at all dramatic rehearsals of plays in which French words and phrases occur, from now on.

• • • Gas proving ineffective, it took ether to make Clarence C. Moore, genial announcer at KOA, Denver, to quit making stand-by announcements. It happened, not in the studio, but in the operating room at

Presbyterian Hospital in Denver, where Moore is now recuperating from a major operation. He was being given gas before the operation was to start. Each time the anaesthetist thought he was asleep he would open his eyes and in his most forceful voice announce, "This is station KOA, Denver." And it was necessary finally to give ether to the 210-pound announcer before he could be freed of that fear of missing a stand-by that lurks in every announcer's heart.

• • • Harold Newton, alias "Newton the Insulter," of the Sunshine Breakfast Club, and Tim, of the "Em and Tim" skit on KGER, has been drafted into the rank of announcer on the Long Beach station. Thus we wag a finger and say, "I told you so." You see, Newt knows now what it is to be on the receiving end of insults.

• • • The summer concerts of the Seattle Park Board Municipal Bands from Volunteer and Woodland Parks, Seattle, will be broadcast during the coming summer season over KJR and stations affiliated with the Northwest Broadcasting System, according to an announcement made by Russell A. Provine, general manager of KJR and the NWBS. The concerts will begin on Sunday, June 28th, and each Sunday Pacific Northwest listeners will hear one of the best and outstanding out-door concerts in the Northwest. Charles B. Adams, veteran bandmaster, will conduct the concerts as he has in years past. In addition to KJR, the concerts will be released by KGA, Spokane; KEX, Portland; and KPQ, Wenatchee.

• • • Al Jacobs of KJBS is one of the most versatile members on the station's staff. Besides being an announcer, Jacobs writes and directs the "Radio Cartoons," sings on two programs a week with Jerry Herst and Dell Raymond, writes program continuity and is also staff pianist. As a song writer, Jacobs has been successful with his two latest hits, "Song of the Hills" and "As Long As I Still Have You."

• • • Walter Beban, NBC's "saxophonist extraordinaire," is also a "fisherman extraordinaire," judging from the string of rainbow trout he brought back with him from a recent trip. He caught the limit—twenty-five beauties.

The Commercial "Plug" Is the Listener's "Fare"

THOUSANDS of radio fans are continually voicing bitter criticism of program sponsors. For the most part this criticism has to do with the commercial announcements punctuating the entertainment, very little of it being directed at the quality of that entertainment. Radio programs today are admittedly on a high standard. The theater of the air has attracted the best talent the country has to offer. Censorship is more strict than in most other forms of entertainment. Then what is it that inspires the fans' barrage of complaints?

A majority of those who are well informed as regards programs in general will admit that some few programs deserve to be attacked as being top-heavy with commercial "plugs." But most tirades launched by the indignant listeners are in the form of blanket indictments. These I believe to be unjustified.

Advertising is the life blood of radio today. Private capital makes possible the superb shows heard nightly by millions seeking their entertainment at the dials. Without the competition born of progressive advertising policies, attainment of present radio entertainment standards would have required many more years. Without this keen rivalry, an evening at the dials would provide all the thrills of a month-old news reel. Interrogation of the indignant fans regarding other methods of supporting programs usually brings forth a rather vague suggestion that taxation of receiving set owners would do the trick.

Support of radio entertainment by taxation would create another government bureaucracy. Politics would come to play some part in the administration of the controlling agency. Further, the radio is a source of public information, and its freedom from government control, aside from necessary censorship and technical regulation, is almost as important as freedom of the press.

Private sponsors must justify their programs through the recognition and appreciation of a satisfied audience. A government program would not be so dependent upon

the approval of the public. Selection of entertainment material would be made by a far smaller group.

Several foreign countries now using this system are years behind the United States. Programs are mediocre. To broadcast on the same scale and with comparable talent would involve a prohibitive tax levy. Some listeners will maintain that America is paying too much for radio talent. They will hold that if a readjustment was brought about, the same standard of excellence could be maintained for less money. I don't believe this.

Americans have always been willing to pay top prices for talent and genius. If radio will not pay it, then motion pictures or the theater will hold the exclusive services of the artists by maintaining a higher standard of remuneration.

The advertiser is footing the bill. His advertising announcements might be considered the fans' admission to the "show." And most of the sponsors have established a fair admission price. At the beginning, the commercial announcements were much more direct and uninteresting. They usually opened and closed the program. Today a large percentage of the sponsors have split these announcements and scattered them through the program. The fan is getting his advertising in small doses.

While many sponsors have not reduced the percentage of advertising per program, they have been obliged to improve their "shows" so that, on a comparative basis, the listener gets more entertainment for his "admission."

The technique of the commercial announcement has undergone considerable change. Many of them represent real value to the listener. Sponsors encourage frequent physical inventories in the interest of good health, offer sound advice on investments, home building, and a variety of other subjects. It is true that these contributions are a part of the advertising—but they have a value separate and distinct from that of the sponsor's product.

Radio advertisers employ very direct methods in the majority of instances. The commercial announcements are usually separate and distinct from the entertainment features. The supervision and censorship exercised by the national chains is such that only reputable enterprises and products may be advertised. There is much adroitness in radio advertising, but very little deception.

A recent stop-watch survey of four fifteen-minute programs and a one-hour network broadcast revealed some interesting figures on the proportion of advertising. Each of the four shorter programs had a considerably higher percentage of advertising than was tabulated for the longer broadcast. The artists themselves supplemented the announcer's commercial script in the short programs, while the sponsors of the longer period confined the advertising to the announcer's script. The tabulation showed:

Subject	15-Min. Per.	Hr. Br'dcast
Entertainment	74.5%	86.9%
Adv. by announcer.....	13.7%	7.8%
Adv. by artists.....	6.1%	0.0%
Theme music	3.8%	1.6%

A total of between six and seven minutes of advertising was heard on the longer broadcast and this was split up into five short installments, the longest of which was seventy-five seconds. Advertising on the shorter broadcasts totaled as much as 30.5 per cent for one program and one announcement required as much as ninety seconds.

Certainly the six minutes of scattered advertising was not an exorbitant "admission charge." Yet the audience probably included radicals who begrudged the sponsor each short announcement. They would have been obliged to pay from fifty cents to several dollars for comparable movie, theatre or concert entertainment. Those who complained would probably refuse to pay fifty cents or a dollar for a Saturday Evening Post devoid of advertising. And the radio fan is not obliged to listen—he can flip the dial as easily as he can turn the magazine page.

"But my investment in my radio obligates the sponsor to give me what I want."—this is a justification cited frequently by complaining fans. It is fallacious in several respects. The sponsor purchases time on the air from the station or chain system. He is entitled to use it as he chooses except that the returns on his investment are in direct

proportion to the degree to which his program meets with public approval. The set manufacturer, through sales, creates the station's market—gives his media circulation. Therefore, the manufacturer and broadcasting system have some obligation to the set owner. But the sponsor is in the same position as the transportation company.

The railroad, steamship line or aviation system is under no obligation to the passenger after the ticket is sold as regards comparison with any other form of transportation. The passenger is under no obligation to travel over any one system. If he dislikes one form he may travel differently next time. If the listener dislikes a program, he need not tune it in again. The commercial "plug" is the listener's "fare." It is for him to determine if it is justified and he need not "pay" it again if he feels the value isn't there.

Radio sponsors are not philanthropists, but their programs are given gratis. They have no claim on the listener except for the appreciation and recognition of product value inspired by the advertisement and commercial announcements. These are entirely voluntary. After all, most "something for nothing" enterprises have their commercial aspects and the radio sponsor's offering is as justifiable as the rest and more direct than most. The city building a children's playground is ostensibly charitable and humanitarian, but the taxpayer pays the bill and the city does the job to keep the citizen from moving elsewhere. Our richest men are philanthropic—they return to the public a portion of the wealth which they made through the patronage of the people.

Programs overloaded with advertising matter will not survive. Each program attracts its own audience. If it fails to hold that audience, then it becomes inefficient, and will be eliminated sooner or later. Most sponsors have made the necessary adjustment to insure public approval.

This adjustment is yet to be made on some programs. But the unthinking fan who raves and rants at sponsors in general because his admittedly top-notch entertainment program is punctuated with short commercial announcements is in the same class as the fellow who demands steak in a breadline. Unreasonable!

People Who Live Dangerously

THE crash of glass . . . The flash of a knife . . . The scream of a girl, and another hair-raising goose-pimple episode of a radio mystery-drama has come to a close. The avid appetites of a million radio fans have been appeased for another week.

And the most satisfactory part of the whole affair, so far as the dramatist is concerned, is the knowledge that not only has he made his five or six or eight characters "live dangerously" for a fast-moving half hour, but he has made a million radio fans "live dangerously" right along with them.

The whole success of a mystery play lies in being able to make the audience forget that it is listening to a play, and for a half hour transport it into the actual atmosphere of adventure, terror, horror and suspense.

And there is where the actors come in. The playwright might write the most breath-taking lines imaginable, but they would be so much sand on the beach if it were not for an intelligent producer to interpret those lines and a dependable group of actors to read them.

When you listen to breath-taking scenes on the air that make your eyes start and the cold chills race up and down your back, know this, that the actors who are reading those lines are actually trembling with terror; actually sobbing with agony of despair; actually screaming for help that may or may not arrive in time. Know that when a hunch-backed creature moves into the picture, the actor who is portraying the character is for the moment actually a vicious hunch-backed creature with curling lips and a maniacal glare in his eye, and not in the least a person you'd care to meet on the street on a dark, misty night.

Several months ago, in the adventure serial, "The Dragon in the Sun," there was

a villainous little character who walked with a cane. The character was played by Richard Le Grand, who, by the way, played the title rôle in "Captain Post: Crime Specialist,"

and is now playing the same character in "The Return of Captain Post." On this particular evening Le Grande brought his small son to the studio and the boy was given a seat near the microphone. The episode began, and when the boy suddenly saw his father turn from a "very nice daddy" into a snarling, contemptible character his amazement and horror stood out in every feature of his face. Le Grand was living the part so thoroughly that he deceived even his own

son. Miss Bernice Berwin, who plays the rôle of Patricia Post, the daughter of the captain of police in "The Return of Captain Post," at the close of a certain serial of mine was so near to a nervous breakdown that she was ordered away from the studio for a two-weeks' vacation by her doctor. And all because she had lived her character so fully that her nerves reacted exactly as they would have done had she actually gone through the break-taking experience.


After hearing Barton Yarborough smart-alecing his way through "The City of the Dead"; "Captain Post: Crime Specialist" and "The Return of Captain Post" in the rôle of Sergeant Jack Long, would you ever imagine that he is an unassuming young university graduate? Of course you would not, and the reason is, that when he steps before the microphone he forgets he is Barton Yarborough and for the period of the drama is none other than the wise-cracking, hard-boiled sergeant of detectives.

A very strange thing happened in connection with Michael Raffeto, who took high honors as public favorite in the rôle of Professor Ernst Qoon which he played in the

Questions & Answers

By N. EARL BORCH

All questions should be put in clear, simple form, and should ask directly what is wanted. Give full name and address. Personal replies or diagram will be supplied for a fee of one dollar each.

QUESTION: The pentode tube uses a filament voltage of 2.5 volts and draws 1.5 amperes. How many watts per hour would that register on a house meter where the line voltage is 115 volts?—James M., Idaho Falls, Idaho.

ANSWER: By ohms law, the watts consumption is equal to the volts times the amperes flowing. Therefore, 2.5×1.5 equal 3.75 watts. Assuming a transformer loss of 10 per cent, the wattage consumption in the a-c line due to the filament of the pentode will be 3.78 watts. The watt-hour is the quantity used by power companies to measure total power consumption for any length of time. This is arrived at by multiplying the instantaneous watt consumption by the number of hours in which this number of watts are being consumed. Thus, the filament of the pentode tube uses 3.78 watts and the consumption is 3.78 watt-hours.

Question: I have an Atwater Kent Model 40. Am across the street from KTAB and when I try to get station KGA, KTAB comes in, and I can't get it. When I tune in KNX it fades away. Have sixty feet of aerial and a good ground. Had tubes tested. They are O. K. Thanking you in advance, Yours,
A. J. D., Oakland Calif.

Answer: It is quite possible that the power line for your house lights is acting as a carrier for waves from KTAB. The effect of this will be to have the station come in on more than one setting on the dial. If such is the case, material benefit may be derived by the installation of a line filter in your power line. This filter must be tuned to the wave which it is desired to eliminate. A coil of wire consisting of approximately 75 turns of No. 14 double cotton covered wire wound on a three-inch form and with a condenser of .00035 microfarad capacity connected across the coil will constitute a filter for such a condition. Or, you may make an arrangement with your radio service man for a trial of some of the commercial filters, such as the Tobe, Dongan, Claroceptor, etc. If your condition is caused by your antenna,

the problem becomes more complicated. It will then be necessary to experiment with different types of antenna construction, that is, different lengths and different directions, until the proper one is found. Not knowing the particular condition under which you are operating, it is impossible for me to tell you anything definite regarding this antenna construction. I will say, however, that height of the antenna is a most important factor, and shielding the down-lead with conduit pipe or lead cable will in many cases tend to alleviate such trouble.

The fading on KNX is caused by natural conditions over which, at least at the present time, we have no control. Radio receivers having automatic volume controls will, to some extent, reduce the fading to a point where it is not so objectionable.

QUESTION: I am writing to ask you if you can help us in any way out of the following condition: We have a radio (electric) and our neighbor has an electric pump. When he is running his pump our radio pops and makes an awful noise, drowning out the music. It is very annoying. Is there a device which can be put on the pump or the radio which would do away with that interference? We do not want to cause trouble with our neighbor, so the matter would have to be handled very tactfully. I think we are on the same transformer as our neighbor and that may make it worse.—Mrs. Carl H., Cloverdale, Calif.

ANSWER: Any such interference as you describe may readily be eliminated by the installation of the proper filter. Unless the interfering pump is located very close to the receiver, practically all the interference will come in to your receiver by means of power wires. You do not give me much information regarding the type of motor, etc. If you will write me a letter in care of BROADCAST WEEKLY, giving the type of motor, the size in horsepower, and the distance your receiver is away from the pump, I shall be pleased to advise you as to what filter should be employed.



first Captain Post serial and which he is now playing in the present serial. It happened that I was forced to write "Captain Post: Crime Specialist" episode by episode, as it was being played. When I began the serial I gave no particular thought to the character of Qoon. He was just thrown in for variety's sake. But after hearing Raffetto interpret the rôle in the first two episodes I couldn't get the character out of my mind. Qoon, as interpreted by Raffetto, fascinated me. I found myself unconsciously building up the rôle. His suave, finished reading of my lines led me to feed him more and more until he became a character that attracted enthusiastic fan mail from the bleak, snowy regions of Northern Canada to the Texas border.

This is Miss Helen Musselman's first experience with us in the mystery serials, but it hasn't taken her long to catch the atmosphere that hangs over the NBC studios when there is a mystery drama in the offing. And her youthful, eager voice has done much to freshen and enliven the present serial in which she enacts the rôle of Doctor Carter's little stenographer, Celia Parks.

Bert Horton, who plays Perry Mills, the Doctor's assistant in the present serial, on the other hand, is an old trouper as far as mystery serials are concerned. He played in the first one I wrote in conjunction with Ted Maxwell, "The Cross-Eyed Parrot." Likewise he was in "The Dragon in the Sun."

And then finally there is Peter Wong, the young Chinese scholar and business man of San Francisco, who portrays the rôle of Ta-Quain, the Khmer priest. He is a new radio actor and an intelligent one and is doing much to give "The Return of Captain Post" authentic background and color.

So much for the actors. But there is another personage whose efforts you feel more than you can realize. It is the producer, Earl Hodgins. He is the man who moulds your show into a finished product; he stimulates the imagination of the players; he wrestles with the problems of sound effects and synchronization of sound and dialogue; he gathers up the loose ends; he stands in

the audition booth, his hands gripping the back of a chair until his nails are white; he is carrying the whole weight and responsibility of the show on his shoulders. If the performance runs smoothly and nothing occurs to take your mind from the enjoyment of the entertainment for one moment, then thank Hodgins. His is the glory and the honor forever.

And now just a final word about the writing of radio drama. When I first turned to the mystery story as a field of entertainment there was no such thing on the air, at least west of New York. It was a new field and I was a little vague and perplexed as to just what the public might demand in this line of radio entertainment. There was nothing to do but take the plunge, which I did with more or less misgiving. But we seemed to hit the right chord and now after more than a year and a half of mystery serials certain very definite—shall we call them "rules"—have been developed. For instance it is clearly established that the radio audience wants its dramas enacted against a highly colored background. Nothing common or ordinary. It demands great splashes of comedy mixed with the tense situations. It demands punch and swift movement in every situation and lastly it loves clear, concise characterizations that allow it to mentally picture and make friends with the people in the story.

And how the radio audience storms and tears its hair when the episode suddenly breaks off in the midst of some frightful experience. But it LOVES it and will be back at the same hour next week for more of the same.

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


