



The Public Is Radio's Greatest Censor

REFUSAL of Congress to invest the Federal Radio Commission with the power to censure programs has not deprived the public of its ability to eliminate undesirable advertising by refusing to listen to the offending stations.

Discussing the various phases of the commission's work in a recent address, General Saltzman referred to the numerous complaints which reach Washington from time to time regarding various advertising programs, declaring that, while the commission is without authority to stop such programs, stations that carry advertising to excess "are merely hastening the day when grave consideration must be given the question of whether they are operating in the public interest, convenience, and necessity."

Although Congress did prohibit the Radio Commission from censoring programs, there is another censor that can do much to regulate objectionable advertising and other obnoxious fea-

tures of radio programs. That censor is the listening public for whom Congress wrote the radio act of 1927.

The average broadcaster today is much in the position of a storekeeper. The storekeeper keeps on his shelves the goods that the people want to buy. In general, the broadcaster puts on the air the kind of programs his listeners wish to hear. If you are tired of the advertising of beauty parlors or filling stations, or the merits and price of the last consignment of prunes, you can censor that program by turning the dial to another station. The broadcaster, in general, wants to know what his listeners want to hear. Let him know. Of course, he must accept advertising; otherwise, his station will die, but the value of his advertising and the rates he is able to prescribe depend on the number of hearers he reaches. If excessive and objectionable advertising causes a large number of his hearers to tune in another station, the effect will be magical on the broadcast owner.

Are We Slipping?

My ballot is enclosed, as I cannot miss a chance to increase the list of those who want the best possible programs. But do you realize that this ballot does no more than express approval of existing programs? In no sense can it be truly considered a vote for what we want in the future. Again there is no one type of program even "the majority" will be pleased with for any length of time, except perhaps those people whose feet are more active than their brains; and for them there are already plenty of dance programs. Imagine the monotony of any type of program that meets "mass preference."

What all thinking Americans—and there are a-plenty of us—really want is continuous improvement in all programs that meet our common desire for progressiveness. We want diversity, variety, interesting information, a real worthwhileness in every point. Many as yet like our pills of knowledge sugar-coated, but more and more are learning to take them larger and with less sugar. We Americans who are thoughtful are watching and waiting for radio to meet this need—the opportunity is here; the material in endless variety is here; we want bread to grow on and you give us stones "to pass the time away"—time, TIME. Program makers have made a good beginning; don't I beg, try to reverse our efforts by favoring the development of any program (more than we have now) of "mass preference," or "majority choice." Give us of the best, but give it in various ways to meet the needs and desires of different types of people. Keep jazz, crooning, dance music, funny business, advertising as much as possible in a class by themselves and off all thoughtful programs. Crime plays should not be allowed if we are to regain our respect for law.

I have been greatly impressed in talking with hard-working people of little education to find them so tired of jazz and appreciative of really good programs. "Why don't you

write and tell them?" I ask. "What's the use? I've tried it and they keep up the same old stuff." And that has been my own experience.

Now as to renewing my subscription to BROADCAST WEEKLY, I shall miss the magazine greatly, for I have bought or subscribed for it since the beginning of 1924 and have kept all back numbers. But I find it no longer a pleasure, and for two reasons. One is your change of reading matter from radio information and interesting stories and comments to small gossip and flaring pictures that add nothing of real value but keep radio on a small-town basis instead of the cosmopolitan factor it really is—a universal factor. The other is that the chief part of your magazine—the programs—are, by the change to small type and crowded pages, an eye-strain to the many whose eyes are no longer young or whose health is such that their radio means much to them. Surely there are enough of these among your subscribers to warrant going back to safer and saner type and paging. There is no longer any space to mark a desired number, and this after all your discussion about it! HERE is something important enough for a VOTE. If you go back to your larger type and two column spacing, I shall be glad to subscribe again.

You have done fine work with the programs in face of many difficulties. And there is a fine field for the right magazine. I am sorry you have lowered your standards.

I should like to see this letter in your Open Circuit and any discussion it may stimulate.

Likes Present Arrangement Best

I vote with those who are in favor of your present arrangement of programs by station instead of by hours. It was this arrangement which caused me to subscribe to the

BROADCAST WEEKLY, and I would hate to see it changed. Others have mentioned the same thing, but I have not yet seen a reason given. My reason is that we are unable to get clearly a number of stations which are listed. Under the present arrangement, we can quickly pick out the stations which do come in clearly and select our program without needlessly reading the entire list of programs for each day. The other type of arrangement is given in the daily papers, and I find it unsatisfactory. May you continue the present way and improve it.

The improvement which I have in mind is the one suggested by another reader—that some definite order of listing the stations each day be followed. The BROADCAST WEEKLY is primarily a reference work. All reference works of the higher types spare nothing in an attempt to make it easier for their readers to find that for which they are looking. From the standpoint of make-up, the present plan has the complete daily program for each station on the same page. I believe your readers would appreciate the greater convenience of a definite arrangement of stations, and would not at all be bothered by having a station program continued on the next page, when there was not enough room on the preceding page. An alphabetical arrangement by station call letters would be ideal.

So much for the arrangement of your admirable reference magazine.

Having had enough of a musical education to create a desire for greater appreciation of the truly great musical works, I have been watching the symphony programs and have been adding a copy of the score to my library when a symphony was scheduled. Soon after this plan was started, the printed programs of these symphonies began to give only one number instead of listing their entire program. Would it be possible for these stations to give a complete program of these symphonic programs?

Some stations give lessons in French, Spanish, or Italian, which invariably come in the afternoon. There must be many of us who would like to continue our knowledge and understanding of these languages, who can only listen in the evening. This should offer an opportunity to an advertiser who wants to make his time on the air stand out from his competitors. We all like the entertainment provided by our radio, but I for

one would like to use some of my leisure time in personal improvement. There may be others who have the same desire.

SILHOUETTES . . .

FROM an audience of hardened "nugget-hunters" in an Alaskan dance hall to radio's thousands of invisible listeners is a far cry, yet it is the path which Bob Moore, KROW's popular tenor, has traveled in his twenty-odd years of trouping.



BOB MOORE

A genuine old-time showman is Moore, in spite of his youth. His theatrical career opened at the age of eleven in the "nickel-odeons" of Seattle. Patrons of the "La Petite" theatre in the Washington city were diverted with the youthful singer, whose boyish voice was heard three and four times daily in "Just as the Sun Went Down," "My Darling Nellie Gray" and "After the Battle, Mother" illustrated with stirring scenes on colored lantern slides.

At nineteen, hit by the wanderlust, Moore ran away to San Francisco, where he became a favorite entertainer among the "honky-tonks" of the Barbary Coast. Habitues of "The Blue Mouse," "The Black Cat," "Spider Kelly's" and "The Manger" knew Moore, and were enthusiastic over his sentimental tenor ballads.

More than once, in those days, Moore was a guest at Coffee Dan's and vied with Al Jolson, then working there, in touching the heart strings of patrons with "mammy" ballads.

Established as a popular favorite in old San Francisco, the young tenor was again bitten by the wanderlust, and set sail for Alaska, where he became a member of Dr. Wright's Quaker Line Tent and Medicine Show.

Traveling from town to town in the northern winter was "show business under difficulties," Moore reports. On one occasion, the Wright troupe was lost for thirty-three days in the pass from Kenai to Anchorage, and forced to take refuge in an abandoned Aleut Indian cabin.

The northern drifts losing their appeal, Moore returned to the States, and sang in theatre prologues in Seattle. Montana and Wyoming also saw Bob in these days, but as a black-face comedian in medicine shows.

Bob's wife is Vivian Moore, KROW's staff organist and official accompanist. Their careers converged in Seattle, where Vivian was playing piano and organ in theatres. Radio has known and liked their music for the last seven years in Portland and Seattle, and more recently from KROW.

ANew claimant to Jenny Lind's title, "The Swedish Nightingale," is now before the public with a voice far more reaching than the original ever dreamed of reaching, for this "Swedish Nightingale" is now singing to a vast radio audience through the medium of KECA every Saturday evening at 6:45 o'clock.

The mantle of Jenny Lind was wished on Elsie Eyre by an Eastern musical critic who declared Miss Eyre best fitted of any lyric soprano to carry on her well deserved sobriquet. And Miss Eyre's background is rich in romance.

Some years ago a little shepherd girl daily tended her flock in the meadows deep in the forests of Orebro in Sweden. To her attentive audience—the whispering pines—she sang with abandon the folk songs of her Viking ancestry. One day a young nobleman came with his hunting party. The voice haunted him. He returned the next day—alone—found the owner of the crystal clear voice, wooed and won her. And Elsie Eyre is the granddaughter of that peasant girl, and nobelma.

Miss Eyre's first training was in the McPhail School of Music, Minneapolis. Then under Richmond T. Percy and Frank La Forge in New York. She concentrated on German, French and Italian operas, oratorios, German leader and all music necessary for thorough equipment for her objective—the concert stage and opera. She mastered the roles of "Elsa," "Nedda," "Marguerite," "Micaela," "Juliet" and "Mimi." But constantly she is called upon to repeat the plaintive echoes of Swedish folk songs.



ELSIE EYRE

NAPLES, city of music and beauty, bestowed her heritage of these gifts upon Betty Marino, NBC violinist. The strikingly pretty girl with dark eyes, who is heard on many of the programs emanating from the San Francisco studios of the National Broadcasting Company, was born in America, but her parents were Neapolitan. Music brought them to this country.

Music was almost inevitable for Betty's career, also, for her father was a harpist in the Seattle Symphony Orchestra; his brother, Pietro Marino, is a violinist with the Metropolitan Opera Company, and Betty's mother's brother, Nicoli Pinnella, is a flutist.

Betty began her study of the violin at the age of nine.

"I really preferred the harp, but my father wouldn't teach it to me," she recalls. "He said it was too big and heavy, with too many strings to tune, and too many things to worry about."

So Betty took the violin, but not altogether meekly. She was supposed to practice an hour before school, two hours after school, and then again in the evening, and when the hours got too arduous, Betty used to soak her violin strings in water so they would break. So much ingenuity should have been rewarded some way, but Betty blushes now to admit it.

"When I was permitted to begin making public appearances with my violin, I didn't mind the practice so much," she laughs. "The hard, unremitting toil which all my relatives impressed on me was so necessary to an artist's career, suddenly had some meaning in my eyes."

Angeles offered a position as first violin, and Betty took it. Following that engagement, she became acquainted with Eva Garcia, now an NBC artist also, and she and Miss Garcia and a third girl formed a trio of piano, violin and cello. Betty also organized a woman's

BETTY KELLY, NBC soprano, is a true westerner. The pretty young singer heard on many NBC programs, was born "where the West begins"—at Crestabutte, Colorado. When Pacific-bound trains reach this small town on the top of a mountain 11,000 feet above sea level, its passengers learn they are in the real West.

Betty lived in her high home for the first five years of her life. Her father was superintendent of a coal mine. When the family moved to California Betty attended the Oakland schools, and there are many East Bay residents who recall her as a tiny girl, standing on a table in order to be seen, while she enthusiastically sang "Mickey." The fresh, exquisite quality of her voice showed itself early. An older brother encouraged the little girl to sing. When Betty said good-bye to him, and watched him march away to the World War with his regiment, he carried with him his little sister's promise to learn "lots of songs" while he was gone.

Betty kept her promise, but the brother she loved never came back to hear her songs. She sang them to wounded war veterans in government hospitals, instead, and it was while she was entertaining the ex-service men that someone heard her, and offered her a chance to appear before the microphone.

Mahlon Merrick, NBC orchestral leader, heard her in radio "bits" and decided her voice had the ingenious quality he was seeking. An engagement with NBC followed, and Betty was a star at 20.

Swimming, tennis and driving are Betty's hobbies. Her ambition is to continue her musical studies and eventually enter opera.

orchestra which she directed in a tour which took them to Florida, Cuba, and finally Canada.

She returned to San Francisco to find radio work holding an inviting hand in her direction. She made her microphone debut six years ago, and has been a radio artist ever since.

Away from the studios, Betty is a keenly alive, all-around sportswoman. Golf, tennis and driving are her diversions, although she had to give up a promising amateur career in the first two because they tended to lessen the suppleness of her fingers.

He will continue with concerts at KYA, San Francisco, where he was studio director prior to his appointment as Western Representative of the NWBS. Dixon's duties as studio director at KYA were assumed by Rush Hughes, son of Rupert Hughes, the novelist.

• • • In answer to a question given on a radio questionnaire as to "What Do You Want the Public to Know About You?", Johnny Murray, KFVB tenor, gave forth the following grave information: "I refuse to eat food served to me sprayed with parsley; the part I like to play best is 'Dailey' in 'Flat Feet.' I never wore a beret—and that ain't all!" And then they say that singers don't have a sense of humor!

• • • Do you often wonder where radio funsters get ideas and material for their acts? Tom Breneman, feature director at KNX, Hollywood, can tell you where at least one of his ideas came from; in fact the idea was quite painfully borne to him. Giving in to necessity Tom had three teeth pulled the other morning and immediately thereafter his two famous characters, "Tom and Wash," visited the local dentist and poor "Tom" lost three teeth and "Wash" stood around laughing at him.

• • • Caltanna Christoph, soprano, who has joined the KFRC staff, has only recently been associated with Nat Shilkret's orchestra in New York, doing novelty and classical numbers. She was in vaudeville for about three years with her own act. Her native state is Montana, her adopted state California—thus her stage name, Caltanna. Miss Christoph is heard regularly over KFRC, including a weekly appearance on the Golden State Blue Monday Jamboree.

• • • Joseph Knecht, veteran of radio broadcastig and for five years concert master of the Metropolitan Opera House, died Saturday night, May 30, at his home, 500 West 110th Street, New York City. He had been suffering from heart trouble for some time, but death came suddenly. With him was his wife, the former Emilie Krafft, of Boston, and his daughter, Mrs. Florence Beggs. Knecht has been associated with broadcastig since 1923, when he conducted the Rose Room Orchestra from the Waldorf Astoria Hotel over WEAJ.

• • • In a mobilization test to see just how many members could be depended upon for time and labor during a catastrophe, radio stations in California were requested to make announcements on May 28 at 7:30 o'clock, asking that all American Legion members get in touch with their local Posts at once.

A report to NBC as to the result of the test reveals that 46,341 Legionnaires answered the call as against 31,100 in 1930. Other American Legion units to respond follow: Twenty-six hospital units, 137 Posts partially equipped and trained for fire fighting, 3719 Boy Scouts and 2635 auxiliary women members of the Legion. Members were notified in advance that such a call would be made at 7:30 o'clock, some night during the week, but the day was kept a secret.

• • • Paul Pitman has returned to the KPO airwaves with a revival of his "House of Dreams" program, which is heard now every Monday and Wednesday afternoons, 1:30 to 2 o'clock. The broadcast is a half-hour friendly chat and counsel for mothers and homemakers. Appropriate music with featured soloists is a high spot of the program.


• • • In response to a death bed request, a Seth Parker hymn was sung at a funeral held in San Rafael the other day. The undertaking parlor called NBC in San Francisco and asked for a copy of "The Old Rugged Cross." Not having an extra copy of the hymn in the music library, NBC made arrangements to secure it from the Calvary Presbyterian Church in San Francisco, where Seth Parker songs are frequently featured as part of the services.

• • • Peter Biljo, whose "Around the Samovar" is a popular Columbia feature on Sunday nights, reveals that the domra, one of the oldest musical instruments in the world, is very much in use today, and is a vital part of the Balalaika orchestra. This primitive instrument of seven frets was introduced into Europe in the thirteenth century when the Tartars invaded Russia, and from it have sprung the mandolin, banjo, guitar, violin and even the ukelele. The balalaika, Russia's national instrument, is the domra's direct offspring. In Russian orchestras, such as Biljo's, the domras carry the melody and the balalaiki provide the accompaniment.

• • • Emily Rayburn Kneiss, well known book reviewer of the West, and for many weeks featured over KPO, is in New York at the present time, preparing future book reviews which she will broadcast from KPO, when she returns to the air this fall.



Questions & Answers

By N. EARL BORCH

Consulting Engineer of the California Electrical Construction Company

All questions should be put in clear, simple form, and should ask directly what is wanted. Give full name and address. Personal replies or diagram will be supplied for a fee of one dollar each.

QUESTION: We have considerable interference in Merced from a loud roaring noise which sounds like a large dynamo or generator. This noise comes on sometimes during the day, but usually during the early part of the evening. The noise is general over the whole town and heard on electric sets only. Reception is impossible when it is on. Could this come from the large electric substations of the power company in this vicinity? Also is this possible to come from an amateur broadcasting set, of which we have several in Merced? Efforts have been made to trace this noise by local men, but without success to date.—C. H. U'R., Merced, Calif., May 26.

ANSWER: From your description it would seem as though the roaring sound is coming from high tension power lines, although by no means certain. The interference from apparatus such as diathermy machines used in doctors' offices, smoke precipitating-devices used in large factories, and other apparatus of similar nature cause a type of interference which may readily be confused with high tension power-line leaks. When such a leak is present it is not very difficult to locate because the audibility of the resultant sound from the loudspeaker of the receiver is very nearly proportional to the distance away from the source; so much so that the source may be found by means of an ordinary portable radio receiver temporarily installed in a car. The most popular method is to drive along the high tension power lines with the receiver in operation and to particularly note the change in intensity of sound of the interference along different portions of the line. Thus, by a process of elimination, an area may be found where the interference is considerably more severe than elsewhere. Then, by tapping each power-line pole in turn with a sledgehammer the definite location of the fault may be accomplished. When the faulty pole is tapped there will be a change in the sound of the interference from the loudspeaker.

The power companies employ men for this purpose, and I would advise that you consult with them before doing anything else.

Otherwise, if you attempt to do this yourself you may tap poles containing apparatus which would be disturbed by tapping. In fact you may have the whole fire department out after you if by tapping you trip the delicate trigger in the alarm box.

I would also suggest that you investigate the type of high tension equipment used in factories in your city. Factories where coal is used extensively, or factories where refining processes for various materials are employed.

You may also by a process of elimination find out what doctors or chiropractors are using devices, commonly called diathermy. These devices use a high frequency, high tension spark for its operation. Its adjustment is such as to place the wave from it well within the frequencies used in broadcast and thus it becomes a miniature broadcast transmitter of interfering waves which raise havoc with reception from other stations. After such devices are located, the time when these apparatus are in operation can easily be checked and, by this means, the source determined.

If, after investigating the above possibilities you still have the same trouble, I shall be pleased to advise you further.

QUESTION: We have a very good A. C. radio, a Stewart-Warner, series 900. Has been very good, but KGER drowns it almost out. KNX, KFWB, in fact up to KFSD. Can you tell me why, or who to go to to make a complaint if any is due? It's worse at night just when we want to hear all programs the most. I hope it isn't the set, for truly it's been and still is so good only for KGER interfering.—Mrs. Lee H., Long Beach, Calif., May 15.

ANSWER: It is rather difficult for me to advise you as to what to do so as to eliminate the interference of which you are complaining. Long range suggestions as to possible remedies can at best only be very general in character. Therefore it is perhaps best if you consult a local man who can, upon inspection of your particular condition, advise

you as to possible methods for interference elimination.

I would suggest that you consult Mr. G. R. Walters, who is the chief interference engineer for the Radio Trades Association of Southern California. His office is located at 1301-2 Commercial Exchange Building, at Eighth and Olive, Los Angeles.

I know of many other cases in Southern California similar to yours in nature, which have been corrected through this association, and I know Mr. Walters will extend you full cooperation.

Trusting this will be a means for improving your reception.
