

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

PROGRAM CONTEST SURPRISES

THE final tabulation and classification of the ballots in BROADCAST WEEKLY's recent "Program Popularity Contest," brought many surprises. According to this survey, the most popular radio program reaching Pacific Coast listeners between 6 p. m. and 11 p. m., Pacific Time, is *Seth Parker*, broadcast at 6:45 p. m. each Sunday. Seventy-four per cent of all votes cast favored this program. Amos 'n' Andy were a close second with a 72 per cent vote. Other programs deserving special mention because of their marked popularity in the contest, are: Memory Lane, Spotlight Revue, Jamboree, Empire Builders, Merry-makers, Cecil and Sally, Watanabe and Archie, Calmon Luboviski and Claire Mellonino, Lee Roberts, Mystery Serials, Arizona Wranglers, Gilmore Circus, and the Demi Tasse Revue.

The vote showed the most popular listening periods of the week, in order of their respective ballot to be: Sunday, 6:45 p. m.; Monday, 8 p. m.; Tuesday, 8:30 p. m.; Wednesday, 7 p. m.; Thursday, 7 p. m.; Friday, 7 p. m.; Saturday, 9:30 p. m., 7 p. m. was the most popular

hour, independent of the day of the week, 8 p. m., second, 8:30 p. m., third.

Among the days of the week, Monday received most votes. Saturday, second; Tuesday, third; Sunday, fourth; Thursday, fifth; Wednesday, sixth; and Friday last.

In behalf of the great radio audience whom BROADCAST WEEKLY represents, we again express our appreciation to those loyal radio patriots who contributed ballots in this contest. You may have the satisfaction of knowing that you participated in and contributed to the most significant and most successful ballot in Western radio history. Broadcasting leaders throughout the entire nation are now analyzing and studying this ballot with the most profound care. It has already resulted in several program changes favorable to the radio audience and undoubtedly will cause many more.

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SHELL HAPPYTIMERS MAKING HISTORY

ARMLOADS of mail, a switchboard buzzing with telephonic inquiries and expressions of interest and unprecedented enthusiasm among artists are but a few of the many evidences of the success with which Captain Dobbsie's Hawaiian cruise of the "Shell Ship of Joy" is meeting.

So widespread is the interest in the Happytimers' jaunt to Honolulu aboard the Malolo that even the most conservative observers agree the sailing on July 11 will be one of the most memorable in the history of San Francisco's waterfront. Thousands of ardent fans and one of the most representative groups of public officials and celebrities ever assembled will gather to give Captain Dobbsie and his crew a rousing send-off.

Persistent reports include that Governor James Rolph, Jr., will be present to say "Bon voyage"; that the sailing will be broadcast from the dock and the deck of the steamer, with excited Happytimers broadcasting their breathless goodbyes and that the Hollywood movie colony will be represented by one or more stars who have arranged vacation schedules to permit them to accompany their favorite radio troupe. These developments are entirely possible, but the present status of negotiations does not permit definite announcement at this time.

But there are innumerable new developments to report since the first announcement last week. One of the most important of these is that three new song numbers have been written especially for the Malolo Happytime cruise.

"What Aloha Means," on which Captain Dobbsie collaborated with Merton Bories, who has written several other Hawaiian numbers including "Song of Hawaii" and "Goodbye Hawaii," bids fair to become an international hit. It will be introduced during the cruise. It was written as a special greeting to the people of Hawaii and in appreciation of their contributions to the pleasure and entertainment of Pacific Coast residents.

"Ship Ahoy," a sparkling background

number, ideally suited to the plan of the Happytime program as inspired by the cruise will be the "theme song" of the event. It was composed by Bories, and Dobbsie wrote the words.

The third number is "Cheer Up" and was turned out by the same prolific pair.

Dobbsie started a minor travel panic when he announced the cruise and Matson Line officials report unprecedented interest in Hawaii, with almost everyone wanting to sail on the Malolo July 11. That the Malolo passenger list will include one of the largest crowds of Happytimers ever assembled is already assured.

Technical arrangements for the unique series of ship to shore broadcasts are going forward on schedule, the National Broadcasting Company reports. Joseph Baker, KGO engineer, went to Los Angeles to supervise completion of the installation of special equipment while the Malolo was in that port. Baker will be in charge of the operation of the special short-wave transmitter installed by special permission of the Federal Radio Commission.

The transmitter, whose call letters are WIOXAI, is now being given preliminary tests to determine the most satisfactory schedule and frequency for the transmission and reception of the broadcasts. Two receiving stations are being utilized in the test, one at Point Reyes, California, and the other at Koko Head, near Honolulu. If the reception at Point Reyes is best, the program will be relayed to the San Francisco studios of NBC and then rebroadcast over the network which regularly carries the program, including KPO, San Francisco; KHQ, Spokane; KOMO, Seattle; KGW, Portland; KFI, Los Angeles, and KSL, Salt Lake City. If the pick-up at Koko Head proves more satisfactory, the programs will be relayed to a transmitting station at Kahuku, then flashed across the Pacific to Point Reyes, thence to San Francisco and rebroadcast.

This brief summary indicates the complex technical problems which the broadcast involves. Combined with the many problems presented by organization of preliminary


plans, negotiations with the Matson Line, selection of the talent and other detail, the plans represent one of the most ambitious radio events ever projected.

More than 18 months have elapsed since the idea for an honest-to-goodness cruise for the "Shell Ship of Joy" was conceived by E. H. Sanders, director of advertising and sales promotion for the Shell Oil Company. Execution of the idea presented many technical and legal obstacles, but Mr. Sanders, having originated and carried out many another unique idea, overcame them all through enthusiasm and persistency. It was Sanders who conceived the outdoor Christmas Tree idea, which was later developed in the annual Shell Christmas display and has attracted nation-wide attention. Incidentally, the outdoor Christmas Tree is now

tion for the special permit was prepared. The granting of this permit by the Federal Radio Commission last week marked the consummation of their negotiations.

The broadcast will be a "first" in radio history and it is appropriate that the Shell Happytime will execute it. The popularity of the program has never waned and the fact that through enterprise and hard work, they have brought this new distinction to Pacific Coast radio, is but additional proof that their popularity is well deserved.

Lest you forget, the initial broadcast from the Malolo will be heard over the NBC Pacific Coast network between 8 and 9 a. m. Monday, July 13. Subsequent broadcasts from the ship at sea will be heard at the same time on July 14, 15, 16, 20, 21, 22 and 23. There will be two morning broadcasts

in evidence at thousands of Pacific Coast homes every Yuletide. Sanders also inaugurated the "treasure hunts" which, sponsored by Shell, attracted unprecedented crowds when staged on the Pacific Coast and in Honolulu. He believes in "originating" rather than "imitating" and consequently tackled the Happytime cruise idea confidently of the success with which it has met.

Finally, a few months ago, they conferred with Don Gilman of NBC and the applica-

tion from Hawaii, either from the ship at the dock or from a land studio, on July 17 and 18. A special evening broadcast from Hawaii is scheduled to reach the Pacific Coast over the network between 8:30 and 9:30 p. m., P. S. T., Friday, July 17.

To prevent confusion, it is well to point out that Happytime followers need not be concerned with direct reception of the programs inasmuch as all of them will be re-broadcast and received over regular stations.

How's This Suggestion?

Now we are not highbrows at all. We like a good "silly" program such as the Gilmore Circus and the Jamboree. We might even like jazz if we did not have to hear it so much, but just figure what part of the time on the air is given to it. I mean time that we can't get anything else.

Now, what do we personally like? Good radio plays for one thing. We nearly wear our ears out trying to get Memory Lane and the KNX players.

Organ music we like when it is real music and not popular stuff. Concert and symphony orchestras. There are several good ones on the coast. Violin and piano music. I think Calmon Luboviski and Claire Melonino are the best of these. Why don't we have their pictures some time?

Then what I suppose would be called educational programs. The G. E. science talk each week, the Arco Birthday interview, interesting bits of local history and such. The news service and talks. If the subject is not of interest to us we merely turn off and figure that someone else likes to hear it. The cream of this group is The Reader's Guide. I wish KHQ would broadcast it, as KGO is hard to get here.

Last, but by no means least, operas, both grand and light, especially Gilbert and Sullivan. Does anyone ever tire of them?

Also it seems that the Sunday programs could be improved. Of course the wide variety of sermons now given allows each his choice. There are lots of good quartettes and, of course, Seth Parker, but part of the time it is impossible to get anything but poor popular music. Aren't there enough stations to furnish both?

Now before I close I must add our request to those already given for a systematic arrangement of stations and also the continuation of the full program of KSL and KOA. I see that the last issue has them.

We certainly like your magazine and read it all. I can't begin to say which part I like best. Oh, of course, your programs. You really give a good schedule, and as long as you do we will remain subscribers.

SILHOUETTES

BOB SWAN—the son of a big Pasadena gun—was born in the Crown City of land-poor but honest parents in 1899. His father arrived in what was then Pasadena in 1874, and grew up with the country and accumulated about nine-tenths

of it. No, it was Bob's grandfather who at one time owned most of what is now the business district of the Crown City. But the important thing, as far as radio is concerned, is that these holdings were lost in the panic of 1906. In short, in due time, Robert had to earn his own living.

The suave and sophisticated baritone voice, which is so closely associated with KHJ's announcing ace today, is what is left of a boy soprano. Under the banner of L. E. Behymer, Southern California's famous impresario, Bob toured the Pacific Coast and was patted on the head by music editors and a million mammas who wished that their sons were boy sopranos, too. Let us not forget that it was little Robert and his teacher who first sang "Sextet from Lucia" as a duet. Bob still does three men's work and gets away with it.

Bob's life and voice changed overnight. Typewriters, filing cabinets, adding machines, and double entries replaced the concert stage. Instead of an audience, he had a boss. The war saved him from this lingering form of suicide. The years passed . . . came the day when we observe a young woman sighing softly as Bob plays piano and croons in a jazz band at a summer resort. Her father owned and operated the resort. For the past twelve years she has owned and operated Bob.

In 1926, Bob entered radio through the microphone of KFQZ. Bob sang as he played. Until one night the announcer asked our boy to take the mike while he went out for a coke. He never came back, and Bob filled in as announcer in the meantime. Maybe the fellow never came back because he heard Bob announcing and gave up. After long and faithful service in the KHJ harness, Mr. Swan was elevated to the post of chief

announcer of KHJ. He is not only proud of being a radio announcer, but there is nothing in the world he'd rather be. He has reached the peak of his profession.

NO "angel" was long Don Cope, but he traveled the Pacific Coast and points farther inland for a pair of years or more with a mystery show that was supported by one "angel" after another.

Don, six-feet-seven KSL combination technician and production man, was booked for said tour as a violinist—but that was a mere incident in a rather colorful life.

In school, Don was brilliant enough to get by without being interested enough to care much. Music and literature were his attractions—but not attractive as presented in the pedagogical tradition. Don plied his violin bow and soaked himself in biographies of the masters and poetry of the moderns, and, without saying much, he stored idea after idea against opportunity.

Don Cope's first radio opportunity came a little less than three years ago, when he was hired by KSL, not as an artist or production man, but as a panel operator. Don's brother, John, had been instrumental in building the great intermountain station.

But opportunities came. In his spare time Don produced dramatic sketches, arranged musical continuities, and performed on programs in artist capacity. He was also entrusted with the panel operation of the KSL-NBC coast-to-coast Tabernacle Choir presentation.

One day late in March, Don Cope took a week's vacation from KSL and walked into the NBC offices in San Francisco. Then and there Don's rare combination of gifts and experience changed masters. He soon becomes one of NBC'S Coast production men.

Don Cope is a native of Salt Lake City, and—must we say it—he is very young and quite married.

THE time: 1916. The place: The old Pavo Real at Tait's on O'Farrell Street, where Fanchon and Marco attracted thousands who will remember "Tait's Revue." It was in this revue that Rosetta and Vivian Duncan made one of their first public appearances—but the orchestra leaders, what of them? Arnold Johnson whose organization contained musicians, the names of whom you still hear as national headliners; and following Johnson was Glenn Ellicott whose orchestras were booked at many of our most prominent watering places. But, you will ask, where have Arnold Johnson and Glenn Ellicott disappeared to? The answer for Johnson will be found on many recent popular recordings, while Glenn Ellicott is none other than "Charlie Glenn," whose program of old-time songs has been heard daily for three years over bay district stations.

Why did Glenn change his name? We'll let him answer for himself.

"I was stationed at Crissy Field as first lieutenant in the Army Air Corps when, due to physical injuries received during the war, I was retired in August 1927.

"Civil life was thrust upon me very suddenly and I was a 'stranger in my own home town,' as it were. There was no chance for me in aviation, due to my retirement, so I decided to try a return to music. With a fair knowledge of accompanying myself on the guitar, I started a little program of singing the daily news items in rhyme which, from the letters received daily, developed into rhyming and singing these same letters.

"So many letters asked for old songs that I tried singing a few, with the result that now, after three years, I have accumulated

the largest library of old songs on the coast. A recent count revealed over ten thousand, but to get back to why I changed my name: 'Ellicott' proved quite hard to broadcast intelligently, and hundreds of letters came to me addressed to Glenn 'Elephant,' 'Elegant,' 'Elliott,' etc. Then I decided to try using my complete middle name, which was Glendower. My first name being Charles, the public proved equal to the occasion by addressing me Charles 'Bungtower,' 'Hightower,' 'Beansour.' In fact I believe I had more aliases than a star boarder of the state, so something had to be done. It was Henry

JACK CARTER, "The Boy from London," of KNX, Hollywood, started out with the intention of being an operatic baritone. He studied in the London College of Music under the great Italian master, Uttley, and having acquired his vocal technique, toured in opera for a year. But his love of mimicry, the other opera stars got him into difficulties. He would have stage hands and other members of the troupe laughing themselves sick as he burlesqued the portly prima donna. And eventually the powers that be and the youthful Mr. Carter agreed to disagree.

Following his operatic venture, musical comedy claimed him and later, answering the call for more money, he entered vaudeville. And on various circuits he toured Canada and the entire United States. His vaudeville tours took him to Los Angeles and, like many another, he fell in love with the climate. Radio was just becoming commercially minded at the time and KNX was happy to use the comedian, and has been using him for the past five years.

During his years before the public he has memorized more than 600 songs and keeps them carefully tabulated in two little black books. He has crossed the Atlantic sixteen times. His chief hobbies are golf (and he shoots a wicked game, too—ask the boys at KNX) stamp collecting, and—well, as Jack would say, "Don't you think that's a bit personal, don' cher know?"

He is of about medium height, bordering on slender in build, has blue eyes and dark brown hair, meticulously kept. He is a good mixer, popular with old and young, and believes in the old adage "Laugh while you may and live in clover—for when you're dead, you're dead all over."

Blank, known to many as 'Hank,' who suggested cutting my middle name in half. So from then on it became Charlie Glenn. Very simple when explained."

So we find in the person of Charlie Glenn a veteran whose services in the army led him back to his original calling as an entertainer.

Charlie is now occupied in presenting his old-time songs over station KLS three mornings a week, and KYA on Sundays.

MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • KPO has added a brilliant array of artists to its staff during the past few weeks, notable among them "Smiling Eddie" Marble, the lyric baritone with the tenor quality, who hails from Waterloo, Iowa; Mel Peterson, formerly of Johnny Noble's Royal Hawaiian Hotel Orchestra, whose specialty is singing tenor and strumming a Hawaiian tiple of his own origination; Dudd Williamson, baritone, and Tom Smith, guitarist-tenor, who team together as "Dudd and Tom," and Yvonne Peterson, popular songologist. "Smiling Eddie" is well known to the Pacific Coast, having been attached to several northern and southern stations before becoming identified as a KPO star. Mel Peterson is well known to Southern California dialers, where he has appeared for several years. He is a graduate of the University of Hawaii and earned an enviable reputation as a star of the gridiron during his college days. The "tiple" which he plays is an intriguing instrument, designed by himself, made of koa wood, has fourteen strings and is the only instrument of its kind in the world. "Dudd and Tom" are products of the theater and have starred in vaudeville throughout the country. Yvonne Peterson is a banjoist and crooner of pleasing type.

• • • Frank Gage, versatile and popular radio artist, who recently joined the staff of KMTR, hails from Minneapolis, Kansas, has brown hair and blue eyes that speak more of the Emerald Isle than of Kansas. He has a pleasing singing voice, and when he plays a piano, it stays played. Mr. Gage has had a varied career. Before he became interested in radio he was an instructor and also in charge of the Electrical Engineering Laboratories at Boston Tech. Later he was consulting engineer for the New York Edison Company. Since he began his radio career he has been associated with many leading radio stations. He claims to be a checker champion—and song-writing and quartet singing are his hobbies.

• • • Personages of radio sometimes find odd ways or "accidents" as a means of getting into the microphone spotlight. The

latest feature on the air at KNX, Hollywood, is "Maxine's Shopping Service." And who is Maxine? Well, Maxine is Maxine Elliott, and she was a secretary in the program department of KNX, where she was called on one day to "go to bat" for a woman who had been taken seriously ill just as she was to go on the air.

That gave Maxine an idea and the "Shopping Service," a twice-daily feature offering her services for out-of-town shoppers, is the result.

• • • Joseph Henry Jackson, "Reader's Guide" of NBC, who reviews books for radio listeners every Sunday evening, celebrated the anniversary of his fourth year on the air not long ago.

He spent 182 hours talking before the microphone since he inaugurated his program in 1924, and counting up his past continuities he discovered he has written more than two million words for radio audiences in that time. The two million words would make 400 short stories of average length and twenty-five novels, and would fill 100 newspapers.

In case statistics still interest you, he has reviewed 1902 books and brought 111 novelsists before the microphone. Lay them end to end, and you'd have a fair-sized cemetery.

• • • Dell Raymond, KJBS crooner, holds the endurance record on that station. She has been connected with the studio for almost four years, longer than any other member of the staff. During this period Miss Raymond has built up a wide following, especially among the shut-ins whom she entertains personally from time to time in the various prisons, hospitals and charitable institutions when she is not broadcasting.

Miss Raymond, in private life, is the mother of a large family. She lost her husband several years ago. Before going into radio Miss Raymond was a successful opera singer. Her hobby is cooking rare Italian dishes for her family and her friends who vouch for their unusual deliciousness. While Dell Raymond's vocation is radio entertaining, her avocation is philanthropy

• • • Ben Bernie, who leads his Blue Ribbon Malt Orchestra in a program over the Columbia network each Tuesday evening, is beginning to suspect that many of the radio fans are using defective receiving sets.

Despite the fact he is announced as the "Old Maestro," a week never passes without the receipt of a score of fan letters addressed—"Dear Old Microbe."

• • • Listeners at KFVB will soon hear all manners of noises emanating from their loudspeaker. First National Studios have just bequeathed their sound effect records to KFVB—and there isn't a noise that you can name that KFVB can't produce, now!

• • • Imagine a piano running away from you just as you were in the midst of some ponderous number? This has been the misfortune of Eva Garcia and the Fealy-Ashley piano duo during several recent concerts over the NBC network. In an effort to make it possible to move the pianos quickly and silently, extra large rollers were ordered installed. But the pianos moved so easily that the radio artists found themselves chasing the instruments around the studios while on the air. A special piano stop is now being used to prevent a recurrence of this most disturbing situation.

• • • "Duke and Luke," popular harmony team from "N'Yawlins," and a new feature on KNX, "The Station of Features" in Hollywood, really came from the Southland. Duke first hit the limelight by winning a ukelele contest wherein he surprised them all by playing the instrument as one plays a banjo, melodies 'n' everything. Luke was manager of the stringed instrument department of a large music store. They teamed. And they play everything from "mean" blues to grand opera on their "runt" mandolins.

• • • Here is the way several of the members of the KFRC staff spent the Fourth: Bill Wright went to Byron Hot Springs, where it was quiet, he said. 



QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

By N. EARL BORCH, *Consulting Radio Engineer*

All questions should be put in clear, simple form, and should ask directly what is wanted. Give full name and address. Personal replies or diagram will be supplied for a fee of one dollar each.

QUESTION: I am a subscriber to Broadcast Weekly and read every page. I am looking for some short-wave receiving information.

I want to install another stage of "tuned radio frequency" in a separate case to my present set. Shall I send a drawing of the present stage and what other information?—Paul R. S.

ANSWER: Without knowing what type of receiver you are now using, it is, of course, impossible for me to advise you regarding possible changes. Offhand I should say, that if you want to increase the receiving range that a short wave superheterodyne would be more efficient. However, if your reception is already good, the addition of a tuned stage would help materially provided you can retain the efficiency of your present layout by so doing. If you will send me, in care of BROADCAST WEEKLY, information regarding your receiver, I shall be able to advise you further.

QUESTION: I have an airline "nine," which I purchased from Montgomery Ward & Co. last September. I wish to know what adaptor to use for attaching a set of phones to this set. Also what kind and style of headphones should I secure?

Willman S. G., Coachilla, Calif.

ANSWER: The best method for connecting one or more head phones to your receiver is to make the connection to the output of your set. To properly do this, you will need the following equipment:

1 dynamic output transformer of approximately 3000-ohm impedance (not critical).

1 variable resistor, 50,000 ohms.

1 phone jack.

1 cord plug and head set.

Connect the low impedance side of the transformer to the same terminals which now connect to the voice coil of the speaker. From one side of the high impedance terminals run a wire to one of the binding posts on the 50,000-ohm resistance which

should be conveniently located in the back of the cabinet. From the other binding post on the resistor a wire is run to the phone jack. This jack may be located in the back of the cabinet or may be mounted on the front panel of the set. The other side of the transformer is now connected to the remaining terminal of the phone jack.

If you are unfamiliar with such work I would suggest that you consult your radio service man before you attempt to do it.

The above combination will allow you to use the loudspeaker and the head set at the same time without any appreciable introduction of distortion. If it is your desire to use only the head set, you may make the connection in the plate circuit of the detector tube. It would be necessary for me to make a diagram showing such connection. However, your radio man can give you all help necessary.

Any good head set, such as Baldwin Type C, etc., will give you good results. I believe the resistance of the Baldwin Type C is 3000 ohms.

QUESTION: I am located about 135 miles from San Francisco. What I want to know is, will a crystal type radio operate a pair of ear phones at the above distance without the use of batteries?—C. E. H., Cow Creek, Calif.

ANSWER: In the past, many reports of distance reception on crystal receivers have come to my attention. Some of them I personally investigated. I found that in every case so investigated, the distance reception was due to some freak either due to some particular atmospheric condition or to another tube receiver being located in close proximity to the crystal receiver. I believe that in your location the investment in a crystal receiver will be waste of good money. The new battery receivers recently placed on the market are very economical in battery consumption. I would therefore suggest that you wait until you get a chance to get one of these.



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FIGURES representing the present expenditure for radio programs in this country are so stupendous as to stagger any but a sophisticated American imagination. Not even mythical Aladdin with his famous magical lamp nor the fabulous wealth of ancient kings could summon entertainment and instruction the equal of that now at the finger tips of every American radio owner twenty-four hours a day.

These programs are not merely *good*, in the main. Many of them are the best the world's finest talent can produce. Foremost leaders in every walk of life are now on the air. In the great ensemble of ethereal voices may now be heard the highest authorities and most capable exponents of science, art, religion, education, politics, music, literature, finance, home economics, and the stage—all are represented.

The rate at which the scope and quality of radio programs has been increasing may be judged from the following figures, which show the money spent for broadcasting in the United States during the past four years. These figures cover station time charges only, and only broadcasting done for advertising purposes. They do not include the cost of talent hired independently by the advertiser

or programs not related to advertising. Such figures would in all probability at least double the total.

Note that from 1927 to 1928 the expenditure almost tripled, and that in 1930 seven times as much was spent as in 1927. Further increases in expenditure with consequent improvement in program quality and variety depends entirely on the radio audience. Unlike theaters, publications, and other forms of amusement, radio broadcasters levy no direct charge. They rely entirely upon public cooperation expressed in voluntary purchase of the merchandise and service thus advertised. Remember this.

Write down the names of products mentioned in the programs you like, and where to buy them. Then next time buy that brand. And be sure to tell the merchant you were guided in your choice by hearing it advertised *over the radio*. The one sure way to get better programs and more of them is to *patronize deserving radio advertisers*.
