



## CANADA FOLLOWS U.S. IN RADIO CONTROL

**P**AVING the way for possible nationalization of Canadian broadcasting, the Supreme Court of Canada has rendered a decision that the control of radio belongs to the Dominion government and not to the provinces, thus disposing of a problem which for a time threatened the success of proposals that the Dominion take over and operate a chain of stations covering the entire country.

The Supreme Court's decision was rendered after lengthy hearings on the contending arguments for provincial or Dominion control of radio broadcasting. The dispute started in connection with the refusal to grant a broadcasting license to a station which was to put on the air a program sponsored by the Quebec provincial government.

Arguments for provincial control admitted that there were certain questions in regard to which the Dominion government had jurisdiction, but it was contended that radio broadcasting for private purposes, especially in cases of small stations whose normal ranges do not extend beyond the borders of the province, should be subject to provincial regulation. The proponents of local jurisdiction, moreover, stated that although international agreements and treaties with respect to the use of radio were necessary and should be formulated by the Dominion, the central government had no right to enter an international agreement concerning a matter of provincial control which would have the effect of compelling a province to do

something against its will.

For the Dominion it was argued that radio broadcasting, by its very nature, could not be considered a local question; that waves are sent out in all directions for hundreds and thousands of miles and are capable of interfering with other broadcasts even beyond the range in which they can be effectively received. Centralized authority is essential, it was claimed, to permit instant control when necessary, and can be accomplished only by the federal government.

Canadian broadcasting stations, privately operated as in the United States, have not, in general, been profitable, due to their inability to secure as great a volume of advertising as can stations in this country. For this reason there are large areas which have little or no native broadcasting service. There has also been complaint that the high-powered American programs are overshadowing the Canadian stations, and a decided demand has been voiced that the Canadian Government take over all broadcasting and provide a string of high-power stations across the country to furnish an "all-Canadian" service.

The desirability of government operation was some time ago made the subject of an investigation by a special committee, but no action has been taken as yet upon its report. Settlement of the controversy over control, however, is expected to bring about a renewal of consideration of Canada's radio future which may lead to definite action.



### ***Buys Sponsored Products***

This discussion on jazz and classic music has been both interesting and amusing. We like the classical programs best, such as the Standard Symphony Hour, Shell Happy Time and the splendid programs the Raymond Paige orchestra brings to us. But we like some of the better class programs of popular music and light opera; also the Paul Whiteman, Bill Hogan and Gus Arnheim dance bands. The thing that distresses us is the fact that so many broadcasting stations put their best programs on the air at the same hour, and the rest of the time we search frantically all over the dial for something besides jazz and prize fights, and finally shut off the radio in disgust. We do not mind the advertising, so long as we like the entertainment, and it has always been our policy to purchase, whenever possible, goods sold by the sponsors of our favorite programs, and to write the artists and stations telling them we enjoy the broadcast. When we do this we can tune in on our programs knowing we have paid for our admission to the show.

And now that the Federal Radio Commission has granted an increase in power to KFI, why not be fair to the Don Lee chain and increase such popular stations as KHJ, KFRC and KOIN to the 5000-watt class, so that people living a few miles away can get more of their studio programs. I have been an ardent radio fan since the days of crystal sets and ear phones, and have watched KHJ's growth from infancy to the fine station it is today, and I do not hesitate to say, taking their programs hour by hour, and week by week, that it is Southern California's finest and best loved station, and Robert Swan is the prince of announcers. We also think the Raymond Paige musical organization the finest in this part of the state. And I would like to say to Jane D. of Sacramento that Charles Cartier and Tommy Harris do not make the Happy-Go-Lucky program for us. We liked the program before they ever sang on it.

### ***We'll Try It Out***

For several years I have been a subscriber and constant user of your BROADCAST WEEKLY and to this day find difficulty in locating the station programs with the changing positions which you have for them from day to day.

It is quite apparent that the mechanical arrangement is based on complete programs for separate stations in each column or page, so that there will be no carry-over to the next. This has its virtues from the publisher's standpoint, but I feel that it is more than counteracted by the confusion it brings to the reader. Personally, I can see no reason why the programs cannot be continued from column to column or page to page just as the chapters of a book. My personal preference would be that you begin each day's set of programs with the CBS program, followed by the NBC, and then each station given in alphabetical order. The reader would then quickly be able to look up his favorite programs alphabetically and be more inclined to use the magazine.

Furthermore, I note that many programs, especially those given in Los Angeles, are different from the broadcasts sent out over the radio for the time given. I am especially interested in the Arizona Wranglers, for instance. There are many times when I have turned to KNX for that program and found an entirely different program being broadcast. Would it not be possible to induce the managers of the more distant stations to send in more correct programs for their stations for the following week?

This is intended to be a constructive suggestion which would increase my appreciation of your magazine and probably do the same for other readers. I trust that you will accept it in the spirit in which it is written.

# SILHOUETTES

AS a boy, Max Dolin, violinist in NBC's House of Color program, walked miles through the snow to take music lessons. He gave his first concerts hoping there would be enough receipts to supply a square meal. Today the mellow tones of his

violin are carried through the air to audiences far greater in number than any who ever saw him in public. Early struggles for recognition have been followed by a series of artistic triumphs in concert, vaudeville, hotels, motion picture theaters and, now, before the microphone.

Odessa, Russia, was Max's birthplace. Of his whole family, Max was the only one musically inclined, and when he was nine years old he was admitted to the Imperial School of Music at Odessa. Alexander Fiedelman was his first teacher.

When an uncle in Paris offered him a home and opportunity to continue his studies in France, Max accepted, and Bertelli became his teacher for the next three years. He gave his first public recital in London hall.

Then followed the most trying experience of his life. The youthful violinist toured the world, playing in Europe, South America and the United States.

"Often I came before my audiences dressed in meticulous evening clothes and wondering if, when the concert was over, I would have enough money to buy myself a meal," Dolin recalls.

But fortune's tide turned, and Dolin became musical director of the Biltmore Hotel in New York for eight years. A successful tour of the Keith vaudeville circuit came after that, followed by the musical directorship of the President's Palace Hotel in Havana, Cuba, where he enjoyed such popularity that the management would not let him go for three years. Dolin came to San Francisco in 1923, to become musical director of the California Theatre, and he has remained in San Francisco ever since. After a brief vacation from radio he returned to NBC.

SIX years ago a young musician had an idea. The musician's name was Dudley Chambers. His father was Paris Chambers, possibly one of the most famous trumpet players who ever lived. And during his many trips in this country and Europe, the father took the boy, and naturally beautiful harmonies were instilled into the young boy from his earliest memories.

As he grew older beautiful harmonies kept running through his mind and it gradually became his desire to find four singers with real voices who could sing these harmonies. He tried this voice and that voice and then began months and months of rehearsing. Finally he brought them to KNX in 1926. Their success over the air was immediate and their popularity was such that they were sought for the Hollywood Music Box Revue, in which they appeared during the entire run of the show.

Then followed a year's tour of the Public theatres during which the organization acquired a marvelous balance and rhythm so rare in male quartets. About this time the Duncan Sisters made their first motion picture venture and when they were planning their prologue to go with the picture at Grauman's Egyptian, they immediately sent for the Rounders. When the famous sisters went with the picture to open its San Francisco opening, the Rounders went too. And while in the northern city, NBC officials promptly signed the boys for a series of appearances which lasted for a matter of two years; in fact, until "music came to Hollywood." And along with music came the Rounders, and for the past two years they have been heard in many of the most popular talkies released.

And now Chambers, the boy with the idea and the beautiful harmonies, brings his group back to KNX, where you can hear them every Tuesday and Thursday from 8 to 8:30 in their "Four-Men and Clark" programs.

WHILE most young ladies turn to the harp, violin, piano, voice and the other mediums of music associated with femininity, Betty Ann Pope of KPO's "Who Cares Hour" chose, instead, the more masculine banjo, with the result that today, although Betty is only 18 years old, she is to be rated among the best banjoist of the day.

"Of course," stated Betty with a flash of pearly white teeth, "during my school days, which ended at Lowell High, my parents insisted upon my studying piano, but when I graduated they allowed me my own choice of instruments—the banjo and guitar." Then as with her digits, which show remarkable alacrity on the strings, she swept back a straying bunch of brown hair, which matched the brownness of her eyes, she smiled—"you know it's no mean task to lug these instruments around"—by way of example she lifted up the banjo and handed it to the reviewer, who immediately decided he would not care to be the husband of a banjoist, if being a husband of one meant toting around her banjo.

But Betty is not satisfied with being proficient on the piano, banjo and guitar. She has joined the O'Neill Sisters' Academy and is studying tap and eccentric dancing, and when not practicing either her music or dancing she drags out her Spanish books and studies the lingo of Spain. That should be helpful in her dancing—that Spanish touch. On her waiting list of instruments to master are the xylophone and the saxophone. "After that, I might consider ideas on marriage," she replied to a question as to whether she was married or not.

"Betty Ann Pope and her Novelty Five," plays for clubs and entertainments and keeps herself about as busy as a half dozen individuals. Her hobbies are swimming, tennis and basketball.

AN inveterate hobbyist whose hobbies have a habit of outgrowing the hobby stage—that's a brief of Earl J. Glade, a western radio pioneer and KSL's managing director.

Radio was a hobby with Mr. Glade, and then he promoted, from the ground up, one of the first commercial broadcasting stations in western United States—KSL today an important link in the NBC coast-to-coast chain.

A lot of things happened in those early days of radio that Earl Glade does not talk much about now. He resorted to all the expedients of pioneering in a masterful and successful effort to hold together and keep going a great movement that had a great future, but no present. Perhaps the least painful of the ordeals was announcing and singing "in person" hour after hour and day after day, to stay on the air when talent and money were both scarce for "experimental purposes," and "wild goose chases." But that was then, and since then Mr. Glade has built two great intermountain radio stations and is managing director of both today—KSL and KLO.

The NBC coast-to-coast broadcast of the Tabernacle organ and choir was one of Mr. Glade's hobbies. It has been a nationwide feature for over twenty months. The KSL Tabernacle Midnight Hour was another. It now enjoys a wide international following.

Perhaps Earl Glade's chief hobby is "words." He is language conscious and speaks like a scholarly book reads. He has inspired thousands of young men and women in classes of two of the great universities of Utah for more than twenty years with his practical enthusiasm in the application of business theories. Only a year and a half ago did Mr. Glade relinquish his part-time professorship at the University of Utah.



His three brothers and sisters all performed on various instruments. At one time the group formed a seven-piece orchestra and traveled as the "Ward Family." Doubling on different instruments made it possible for them to present several different combinations.

• • • The Denver Municipal Band, under direction of Henry Everett Sachs, has begun its sixth summer season of broadcasting over KOA, the National Broadcasting Company's Denver station. It is to be heard every Saturday at 8:15 p. m. (MST.) The band is one of the country's leading municipal musical groups. Among the outstanding instrumentalists regularly brought to Denver to play in it are Matteo Manna, cornetist with the Chicago Grand Opera Company, and Clarence Johnson, saxophone soloist formerly with Sousa.

• • • Arthur Pryor's father, who was a distinguished bandmaster of his day, also was noted as a clog dancer. He was the clogging champion of three middle western states, including Missouri, and taught the late Dave Montgomery of Montgomery and Stone his first steps.

• • • KNX, Hollywood, is also preparing for the day when television arrives.

The latest recruit to the KNX staff of entertainers whose qualifications for television appearances are unlimited is Bernadine Hayes, radio queen, whose blond beauty is no small part of her success at the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel, where she appears during KNX's broadcasts of Sam Coslow and his orchestra nightly.

• • • Katherine Claire Ward, known to KFVB listeners as "Mrs. Dailey" in "Flat Feet," was the inspiration for "The Strawberry Blonde," a song written by her husband, Charles Ward.

• • • Not unlike the "talkie" tests which prospective screen stars undergo in Hollywood are the tryouts given at KJBS (San Francisco) for all members of the dramatic cast.

Before a production is released for broadcast purposes it is recorded on a wax disc and the result run off so that the cast can listen to the reproduction of their voices and in this way benefit by any correction in faulty pronunciation.

These tests are being given by Josef Swickard, former character man in the movies, who hopes by these means to fit his dramatic cast for some stellar performances in a new series of dramatic productions which the station is to release shortly.

• • • Frank Bull, station manager and popular singer of radio KMTR, is just the type that will make television a pleasure. He is tall, has black hair, dimples, and magnetic brown eyes. Mr. Bull has had an interesting career. He was born in Kansas and attended grade school there, but he received his high school and college education in Los Angeles. After completing college he entered the business world. He became a banker—organizing a bank in Beverly Hills—but he went radio. Since coming to KMTR he has produced many interesting programs—the Ethiopian Oriental Supper Club, the Two Franks, and others. Frank Bull is a favorite sports announcer. He has the capacity of re-creating the play-by-play descriptions of all the games in an impartial, unruffled, altogether excellent manner. After all, anyone can be a banker, but it is not every station who has a "Frank Bull."

• • • Frank Winegar, leader of the Village Barn Orchestra, heard over the Columbia system, is believed the outstanding golf player among the nation's orchestra leaders. As an undergraduate at the University of Pennsylvania, some four or five years ago, he starred as a member of the Red and Blue golf team.

• • • Carlton E. Morse, author of NBC mystery serials, dramas and comedy skits, is no longer the only member of his household whose work is broadcast through the ether. Two songs by Mrs. Morse—Patricia A. Morse to poetry editors!—were sung by Barbara Blanchard in the Pacific National Singers program Monday night, June 29. Mrs. Morse wrote the lyrics, and Charles

Runyan, NBC organist, set them to music. The two songs are "When I Am Gone" and "Song."

• • • Zeta Harrison, star of the Henry Duffy Players, and her brother Alexis have been winning signal honors over KPO by their excellent and delightful interpretations as members of the Children Players, directed by Mrs. John Cuddy, radio dramatist. Both Zeta and Alexis are "finds" of Mrs. Cuddy and were trained and developed by her, and both have won individual honors as stars of the Children's Theater before entering the radio field. Alexis is also a baritone of exceptional ability.

• • • Eugene Hawes, who lives the character of "Pedro" for the benefit of KFRC audiences, says that he has no desire to play Hamlet, like most comedians. He believes in sticking strictly to his "knitting"—if it isn't funny he can't use it. He's always looking for a laugh. He writes all of his own acts and some day he expects to devote all of his time and energy to writing. As regards his prejudice against work he says that he didn't invent laziness, but he improved upon it.

• • • Curtis Benton, famous fights announcer of KNX, Hollywood, who it is claimed, rattles off more words per minute than the noted Floyd Gibbons, has a few words of advice for "would be" boxers.

In every other line of business a man is judged by what he has to give but in the boxing brotherhood a man is judged by the amount he can take.

A strong ambition is no asset when it is coupled with a weak chin—those boys should stick to selling newspapers.

A boxer with a pair of fast feet cannot avoid a ten-second nap if he is not equipped with a nimble set of brains—his business is running foot races.



# FACTS

## About Broadcasting, of Interest and Significance to Every Radio Listener

PREVIOUS articles appearing in this space have shown that radio advertising now pays practically the entire cost of American radio programs. The following paragraphs present facts, figures and opinions apropos of this situation.

The manager of the radio department of a large advertising agency states that the American system of utilizing advertising to defray broadcasting expense has given the American people "the finest programs money and genius can evolve" and has evolved "an advertising medium where the advertiser is enabled to sell his wares by contributing to the daily contentment and culture of millions." Certainly it is significant that a responsible executive of a large commercial advertising organization should so describe the objective of radio advertising.

The advertising manager of one of the largest firms of its kind in the business field insists on having three questions answered before undertaking the expense of broadcasting: First, what will be my potential audience? Secondly, my actual radio audience? And third y, what effect will my programs have in inducing listeners to buy my goods? Notice in this the emphasis placed on the actual purchase of the product advertised.

An official of the National Broadcasting Company states that the public does not object seriously to radio advertising providing it is properly presented and measured with reference to the length and

nature of the program. The President of WMAQ, Inc., of Chicago, estimates that the annual broadcasting bill for the nation is \$75,000,000, and believes that much of the agitation against radio advertising originates with other advertising media who "see in the operation of broadcasting stations on a commercial basis additional competition for the advertiser's dollar." Which obviously is all the more reason that every radio listener should *patronize deserving radio advertisers* at every opportunity, to offset the effects of this selfish criticism.

A vice-president of the Columbia Broadcasting System declares: "Most newspapers today accept advertising matter which no self-respecting radio station would permit, but that is not generally regarded as justifying government ownership of our newspapers. For broadcasting, government ownership and operation provide the only apparent alternative to commercial support through advertising. . . . Would you really like to have the Senate select your orchestral programs, or the House of Representatives take over the management of Amos 'n Andy? Not until we are ready to let the Federal government censor our daily reading matter shall we as a nation be content to let government functionaries tell us what we shall hear." And in the meantime, the more you spend for *radio-advertised merchandise*, the more radio advertisers can afford to spend for radio programs.



\* \* \*


