RADIO TO BE A FEATURE OF CHICAGO FAIR

A RADIO section depicting graphically the development of the art from its earliest days to the present time will be one of the important features of the Chicago World's Fair in 1933.

The exhibit will be arranged through co-operation with the Radio Corporation of America, which already has done much work on its own account toward the collection of historical exhibits for museum purposes.

In view of the fact that radio is a comparatively new industry, this will in all probability be the first comprehensive historical exhibit ever prepared. It will include representative types of apparatus used from the early days of Marconi up to the present time so that step by step the progress and development of this communications art to its present high plane of entertainment and education through broadcasting may be traced.

One of the interesting features of the display will be the first commercial wireless station built for regular service in the United States by Marconi, which may be regarded as the birthplace of the present vast system of wireless communications. It is expected that this station will be transported to the radio building at the fair intact, and that it will be fitted with the same type of equipment that Marconi and his assistants used there in 1900, at a date in radio even prior to the historic flashing of the letter "S" across the Atlantic.

The historical exhibit of radio will include

complete, installed models of early spark transmitters showing the principal steps in the development of this apparatus. Efforts will be made to procure for display purposes the first Alexanderson alternator.

The aim of the radio display will be such that the casual visitor passing along the main exhibition will obtain a general and lasting impression of the radio development that has been one of the marvels of the present generation. The earlier types of equipment will be those employed in marine and point-to-point communications work. Sufficiently detailed exhibits will be included to give the display a real educational value for individuals who are "radio-minded." The growth from the first communications receivers, detectors, wave meters, spark gaps, sending keys, each of which developed along its own line, will be portrayed in the display.

Another objective of the display is to give the general public a better impression of the vast amount of scientific research and engineering work behind such a modern technical industry as radio.

The present intention is to complete the display with exhibits evidencing many of the vast number of ways in which radio has contributed to modern progress over and beyond its most familiar use in broadcasting. Each section of the exhibit will be provided with photographs telling in picture form and in an associated text the detailed story of the exhibit.



Right to the Point

As I always read "The Open Circuit," there have been accumulating quite a number of matters about which I have felt like writing as briefly as possible, and what appears in issue just received for week of August 23 to 29 as to change of programs is the trigger that explodes my charge. It is strange that so very few stations will say a word when they substitute, but I am surprised that KFRC should be so rude to Wm. E. H. and wonder if his inquiry may not have been a little sharp. In many cases it may be the circumstances fully excuse the station from announcing the substitution, but in most cases they should say something even if only equivalent to "We are sorry," and some of the more thoughtful and courteous will start the custom, but a few will never learn the lesson of courtesy.

I read with special care what Gordon M. had to say very courteously presented by you as "A Few Words of Constructive Criticism," and was greatly surprised to think that any one who had ever really paid much attention to the Broadcast Weekly would stop or forget it for the reasons he stated.

It is true that, taken by themselves, such changes in programs are many, but as compared with the bulk of program information furnished, they are exceedingly few, and the percentage of such changes would astound him by its very small fraction, all things

considered. Of course there are more changes in certain lines than in others, and by certain stations than by others, but in my own case not one half of one per cent of the programs I seek are changed, and I have simmered down in the main to KGO, KPO and KFRC, and last Sunday there were 8 on KFRC, 9 on KPO and 11 on KGO. On Monday there were 4 on KFRC, 10 on KPO and 12 on KGO. And neither of these were exceptional in my experience, and there was only one substitution in the 54 programs that I tuned in those two days. I make a careful study, often a week in advance, of the programs, and with the aid of Broadcast Weekly I would never dream of going back to haphazard twirling of the dials, of which in the olden times I did much, and ranged all over the world, including even waves far below and far above the ordinary broadcast program band, and when an active member of the A. R. R. L. At the same time I study the daily papers, always looking over Dyne's notes in the San Francisco News, at least. The development of such information by Broadcast Weekly, and the work of the stations weeks in advance is simply marvelous and very greatly appreciated, and I shall not recite such grief as I have had.

I have long suspected one reason for present and varying arrangement of stations in Broadcast Weekly was to prevent any feeling by any station that it did not have as good an average place as any other, and have been pretty well satisfied with result, although I would like to have my three favorite stations together, but I always look at the other stations, on the watch for something I may want which does not conflict with something else I want more, and really don't think the matter of arrangement is very important, if one will mark with blue and red pencil or even black each day.

In fact the kickers seem to me very shortsighted as a rule, and I'll go no further at this time.

SILHOUETTES

A RIGID baton, directed by a flexible brain occupying the skull of Raymond Paige, musical director of KHJ, has accomplished what has been called impossible in the past. Heaven, to the manager of a radio station, is a place where radio orchestras can play symphonies, grand operas, musical comedies, jazz, and popular ballads with equal facility. Probably every major station has experimented hopefully with orchestras and directors in the hope of creating such a heaven on earth. But Raymond Paige, if the records of radio history are complete and accurate, is the first mortal to make the splendid little idea work smoothly. Therefore, Mr. Paige automatically becomes an immortal—although he is still subject to colds, chills, blains, stomachaches, and the various disappointments of life. Let us be very blunt about the whole matter: The KHJ orchestra, when directed by Raymond Paige, can play all types of music with equal facility. It might be noted here that practically all modern melodies played by KHJ on its major programs are special arrangements by the KHJ staff arrangers and the chief arrangers of the motion picture studios.

Although Mr. Paige would win the musical decathlon at the Olympic games, he insists that there are directors who would break the tape first in any single event. It is just too bad that the leaders of the great symphony orchestras—many of them, at least—can't even get off their marks when it comes to playing even the light classics, let alone jazz and musical comedy. And it is equally sad for the managers of radio stations that our geniuses of syncopation give up when confronted by anything cooler than 175 degrees fahrenheit—let's say, centigrade—easier to spell—or born before 1910.

For all this, there's a reason. You might as well know the whole truth now. When little Raymond was fourteen years old, Chicago thought it saw through its smoke another fiddle genius. The lad was clever with

the bow. One night, in a fairly conspicuous recital, a four-year-old Russian with large ears was pushed in on a kiddie kar and made our boy look like a ham without mustard. For six weeks Raymond didn't feel like eating. Then he made a second discovery: That the four-year-old had, in turn, been completely outclassed by a Bulgarian, age three and three-quarters. Immediately (this being an age of specialization) the future musical director of KHJ determined to specialize in generalizing. He wandered or ran from one field of music to another, and with his tremendous power of absorption, unusual physical and mental vitality, an amazing enthusiasm, gathered experience. Playing in symphony and grand opera orchestras; attending hundreds of rehearsals under the great conductors of grand opera and symphony; learning musical comedy at the feet of Victor Herbert and going on the road as concert master of a musical comedy show; headfirst into the show business; making the Orpheum and Pantages circuits; in charge of routing,

ing, revision, coaching acts for the Publix houses; drilling dancing and vocal choruses, preparing jazz band novelties; learning dance music from the big jazz boys and conducting his own bands in big hotels and theaters; and finally into the lap of radio and KHJ. Musically speaking, Raymond Paige has been everywhere and is at home every place. He is a glutton for experience and saves and catalogues every one of them for future use. In radio, future use means tonight or tomorrow at the latest. Six nights a week KHJ draws heavily upon his knowledge of symphony music, musical comedy, jazz, and showmanship. Raymond Paige is a rare leader, a demon for any form of punishment, a spouting fountain of ideas and, as far as KHJ is concerned, is the pink pearl of radio. His ambition is to be musical director of KHJ, but a bigger and much better musical director of a bigger and much better KHJ.

. . . RADIO NEWS . . .

DISCONTINUANCE of the practice of printing the names of sponsors in their radio columns is strenuously defended by newspapers which have adopted this policy, who point out that the public is interested in stars and not producers.

"The radio listener is much more interested in who the speaker will be, who the singer will be, who the orchestra leader will be, than he is in what breakfast food company or what shoe company may be sponsoring the performance," it is declared by the editor-in-chief of a national chain of papers which has revised its radio listings.

The new policy, it was declared by another editor, is merely an extension of the policy used in the operation of newspaper dramatic pages for half a century. "It is assumed upon the dramatic pages that the readers are interested in the shows and the stars, not in the financial backers of the shows or the owners of the real estate upon which the theaters stand," he said.

"It is perfectly true that the activities of certain producers and managers—Belasco or Morris Gest—for example, make news and, therefore, is printed as such. In just the same way, the activities of a sponsor originating a new program is news and as such is printed. But the listing of radio programs is another thing. The reader is entitled to the listing of those who will entertain him but is not primarily interested in who is offering the program."

DESPITE the most diligent efforts of the Federal Radio Commission to reduce the number of broadcasting stations to a point where interference would be minimized and service to the public at a maximum, that body was successful in decreasing the number of broadcasters by only nine during the fiscal year ended June 30 last.

Figures just made public by the commission, summarizing its work during the fiscal year, show that twenty broadcasting stations were deleted, but five of these were consolidated with other stations and two stations were consolidated into one, while eleven new stations were given construction permits. The total number of stations, accordingly, was reduced only from 621 to 612.

Failure of the commission to eliminate the large number of stations which members of the body have held to be superfluous is generally accepted as indicating that eliminations in the future will be few, because of the difficulty of finding cause for revocation of licenses which will stand the test of court suits. Only by finding conclusive proof that the operations of a broadcaster are not in the "public interest, convenience and necessity" can revocation be sustained.

In all fairness to the commission it must be said that, while anxious to reduce the number of stations materially, it has used no pretext to bring that about but has based the few reductions ordered solely upon the requirements of the radio law. The figures for the last fiscal year indicate that only fourteen stations actually went off the air, the consolidations being voluntary as, probably, were some of the fourteen deletions.

The outlook for the future, it is held, is that, in order to bring about the equalization of facilities demanded by the law, the number and strength of stations in under-quota areas will be brought up to the level of those areas most over their quota, instead of the over-quota areas being reduced to quota strength.

"**I**N UGANDA—on the Equator, mind you! It's probably snowing . . . while in Arctic Lapland, where there are reindeer, the Laps are doubtless panting at 100 in the shade . . . yet, I've never been hotter anywhere in the world than in New York!"

This is to comfort sizzling New Yorkers who may be longing for the comforts of an Iceland or any other distant Arctic land.

"And, as for Alaska, there are flies and bugs in profusion there in the summer."

The speaker—Carveth Wells, that "charming liar" and inimitable teller of animal and adventure tales, was doing some high-powered weather debunking at his apartment, 716 Madison Avenue, New York City.

Between periods of mopping with a huge handkerchief your reporter heard faintly:

"Yes, I know New York is hot. Cairo is having a temperature of only about 80, and

Singapore is seldom any hotter. In Stockholm when the thermometer gets up to 65 people are actually overcome and a few die of the heat.

"I imagine Death Valley here in the United States and the Red Sea are the hottest places in the world. I know the Red Sea is hot because I've stoked a ship there in the worst imaginable weather.

"Of course it is true that parts of the Sudan are stifling. Once while crossing the desert on a train I held a piece of bread out of the diner window and, in a minute, it was toasted perfectly!"

At that moment the coatless reporter's feet fell from the table and he weakly motioned for respite.

Wells, from his kitchen, broadcast snatches of narrative.

"Malaya? Yes, it's pretty hot out there when you get in the sun. The Straits have a mean sun temperature of 160, although it's never more than 80 in the shade. But, it's always necessary while surveying (Wells spent six years in the Peninsula as a railroad engineer for the British government) to have a fellow carry a parasol over your transit. Otherwise the sun would quickly warp the metal and completely throw out your calculations. That's heat, if you like!

"Since I spoke of snow in Africa, I should say that the snow falls the year around on the Mountains of the Moon in Uganda. I visited the mountains two years ago and had to fit my porters out in heavy clothes and blankets before we started. The range is continually hidden in mists, and the temperature was twelve below freezing in August. That's why I said it's probably snowing there today. One can get a glimpse of those strange and forbidding peaks only once in twenty years because of the eternal storms.

"The coldest place in the world? Verkolansk in the state of Yukutsk in northern Siberia holds the record, I think. The thermometer actually gets to 90 below zero. My own coldest moment was experienced in Saskatchewan, where I was surveying for the Grand Trunk Railway. The temperature often dropped to 70 below. When you got up in the morning you'd find that a pail of water by the stove would be hot on the stove side and solid ice on the side away from it."

Which all goes to prove that New York

must be hot and that the Paul Bunyan tradition isn't dead yet.

Wells, between radio engagements with NBC, is writing a new travel thriller which is to be published in the fall under the title of "Adventure." Among his better known books are "Six Years in the Malay Jungle" and "In Coldest Africa."

ACTUAL creation of the patent pool suggested for the radio industry has been brought perceptibly nearer by the participation of the important manufacturers of radio equipment in the negotiations between the Department of Justice and the Radio Corporation of America, undertaken in an effort to settle without lengthy court proceedings the questions raised in the Government's suit against the company and its associates.

While the patent fight is one solely within the industry, the issue involved affects every individual who may purchase a radio set, it is declared. Monopolistic control of patents, it is pointed out, with some important improvements owned by one manufacturer and others equally important by another, keeps the industry in a state of ferment and leads to continual litigation over charges of infringement. On the other hand, a patent pool, with every manufacturer privileged to use the improvements therein upon the payment of reasonable royalties to the patent owner, has been a proven solution for these same difficulties in the case of the automobile industry and is expected to bring about the same result for radio.

Although the broadcasting industry is still young, as industries go, there are many thousands of patents applying to radio developments, which at all times must be considered by each manufacturer, lest, inadvertently, he trespass upon the property of another. At the same time, it is claimed, the acquisition of a large number of these patents would be sufficient to give one organization a monopoly in the industry, this having been charged against Radio Corporation from time to time. A patent pool, it is contended, would give all manufacturers equal opportunities to participate in new developments, and, by eliminating expensive litigation and other barriers to progress, would tend to reduce costs to the public.

A general "house cleaning" is necessary, in the opinion of many, if Government control is to be prevented. If the Government takes over control of radio, it is declared, broadcasting will resolve itself into more or less of a private hobby.

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
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
