



ANTI-CENSORSHIP DRIVE

CHARGING that radio stations censor the material they broadcast in order not to embarrass business interests of reigning political powers, the National Council on Freedom from Censorship plans an energetic campaign to eliminate censorship of radio, films, plays, and books, to be opened in Washington when Congress meets next December, coincidentally with a drive in the forty-eight states looking to the abandonment of local censorship, the chief example of which are the boards of censorship set up in a number of states to pass upon motion picture films.

The National Council on Freedom from Censorship was recently organized in New York, its board comprising a large number of prominent authors and actors familiar to the public in books, films, and radio plays. The council is a subsidiary of the American Civil Liberties Union, an organization alleged to be "tinged with pink," which has been in the forefront of many fights for freedom of speech and action.

"The growing censorship over the stage, movies, books, newspapers, and radio has prompted the American Civil Liberties Union to organize a nation-wide movement to oppose it," officers of the council declared in making known the purpose of the organization. "No centralized agency to fight against censorship in all its phases exists.

"The censors rest their case on protection of the public chiefly from 'obscenity' or incitement to crime, and occasionally from

'sedition.' 'Obscenity' is their big card. "The law contains no definition, and the censors themselves can not agree," it is pointed out. "Books sold openly on every newsstand may not be dramatized as plays. Plays that run for months on Broadway, and operas acclaimed for centuries, may not be dramatized for the movies. Many things commonly heard in talkie dialogues may not be broadcast on the air."

The platform of the organization calls for an amendment to the Federal radio act setting up machinery to prevent censorship at the stations or discrimination in Washington in the issuing of licenses.

"Censorship of radio," it is declared, "hides behind station policies. Unlike the publishing or theatrical business, radio is a strictly limited field in which competition for public favor runs high. The general policy, therefore, is to avoid controversial subjects that might cause embarrassment to business interests of incumbent political powers.

"Three major considerations must be met by any program aimed at making radio free from censorship, and firm in its rightful place as a constructive educational medium.

"First, it must prevent a continuation of selective censorship at the stations, now greatly in evidence. Secondly, it must prevent domination of the industry by two or three large groups. Thirdly, it must protect public interests in free speech against discrimination in issuing licenses."



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SILHOUETTES

EDDIE LYNN. Do you remember him? Used to run a Kiddies' Hour over KHJ in the old days. Well . . . he's a poet now. Writes the verses which Charles Wakefield Cadman and other big-shot American composers put to music. Never wrote a line or thought about it until four years ago. Now his name appears on some of the finest songs written in this country today. He has many thousands of friends among the children and fonder parents of Southern California. They've heard that he is now on the continuity staff of KHJ, and the line forms on the right and left of the secluded corner of KHJ, where Eddie picks wild ideas out of the air and tames them into domesticated radio programs. Eddie, himself, doesn't punish the microphone much himself any more; but the prestige and fame of this ex-announcer, radio publicist, actor, and patron saint of radio's youngsters is spreading far beyond the field of radio.

Eddie Lynn was born at Bay City, Michigan. Well, why not? In 1918 he was a big business man owned and operated by Henry Ford in Detroit and himself was operating twenty stenographers. Had his name on a door and fancy letter heads. Pretty good for a little Jewish boy just out of high school. He had a good job here when something snapped in his brain and he wrote his first verse. He immediately left the money marts; retired to a shack in the Hollywood hills (he built it himself), and, for six months, lay on his back under a mountain lilac and thought big, beautiful thoughts. These, transmitted to paper, came into the possession of Uncle John Daggett of KHJ. Eddie was invited to read some of them as a regular feature. There was no money involved, it is reported. The lard was licked

clean from his larder when Eddie got \$7.50 from KPLA for a Thanksgiving Day program. Thanksgiving Day! You bet it was. Followed nine months at KMTR with continuity writing and children's programs. Then KTM as chief announcer and writer. Then four months in a hospital and KHJ. On the side, Eddie amassed wealth by writing lyrics for several of the fat-salaried lyricists of the motion picture industry. He got \$15 for doing the lyrics for one super-special—and the lyricist under whose name they appeared got \$2,500 plus royalties. Oh, yes! Magazines pay him from one to five dollars for his better stuff. Something *must* have snapped in his brain that day four years ago. Of Mr. Lynn's 300 poems of recent vintage, over thirty have been taken by composers of the more arty type. He is Cadman's close friend and chief collaborator. When you hear "Little Blue Gate," "Glory," "Rivets" coming over the national chains, or sung by the great concert

and opera singers, just put a little gold star to the credit of radio, which, by making it possible for Mr. Lynn to eat, makes it possible for him to contribute in such distinguished fashion to the literature and music of modern America.

THE great majority of radio listeners miles away from the scene of the sporting events look to their radios to convey them there, to bring them the color, the feel of the crowd, the intensity of the atmosphere, the gayety, the drama of it all. They don't want a minutely detailed description of the contest, be it prize fight, football or baseball game. They want only the important happenings. The details they will read in their newspapers.

These are the precepts of Graham Mc-

Namee, the most famous of all radio "mike-men," who won his greatest fame by his radio reporting of sporting contests, political conventions, and great public gatherings. McNamee is the veteran announcer of the National Broadcasting Company staff.

"When I take my seat at the ringside at a prize fight, I think to myself that every person who is going to listen wishes he could be there with me in the flesh. Then obviously my first duty to the listeners is to do the next best thing—take the thing to them, take it in all its color, its gayety, its intensity. I must make the listeners feel that they are actually looking, seeing, and hearing everything at first hand, and not through my descriptions," McNamee said.

"The radio announcer's first duty to the listeners is a combined one. He must inform and entertain in equal quantities. I must say when one of the fighters gets a black eye, but I must also tell the listeners about the people in the fourth row shouting hysterically for a knockout or the fans in the gallery staging a fight all of their own. I must report all important details of the actual contest, but the trivial, non-essential details I must eliminate."

McNamee believes that the rabid fan is in the minority among the listeners to a sporting broadcast.

"These enthusiastic followers of the sport who know all the players by their first names and know every rule of the game backward actually rave and tear their hair when the announcer fails to report some detail that doesn't matter in the least. For example, a heavy hitter is at bat. Two balls are called. I announce it. Then a strike, I announce it. Then out in the center field the fans start throwing pop bottles at the outfielder. I tell about that. Then comes the announcement, "Three strikes and he's out." Immediately the rabid fans are as mad as wet hens because no mention was made of the second strike," McNamee declared. "The rule holds for football, base-

ball, or prize fights. The rabid fans are in the minority. The great majority of the listeners wish to be transported to the scene. The unimportant details must be sacrificed for the human touch." McNamee was indignant when it was suggested that excitement occasionally betrayed by his voice was feigned.

"Feigning nothing," exclaimed McNamee. "I seldom report a football or baseball game but what I don't get as wildly excited as the wildest fan. There is nothing feigned about it, although excitement in the voice naturally arouses excitement in the people around the loudspeakers and therefore makes the report more realistic."

Perhaps thousands of McNamee's admirers do not know it, but he is in almost as great demand as a singer as he is as an announcer. Before McNamee went to radio and worked his way up to the position of the world's premier "mike-man," he was a concert singer. When he became associated with NBC as an announcer, it was understood that his announcing was not to interfere with his concert engagements.

During the past season McNamee has appeared in recitals and concerts 120 times. Most of the engagements were in the New England States, the States of Washington, California, Texas and Florida. Next season his advance bookings have almost reached that figure.

McNamee believes that radio is just beginning to realize its immense possibilities. He foresees the day when there will not only be a radio in every home, but loudspeakers will be distributed along public thoroughfares to enable people to know what is going on even while on the streets. As to announcing, it is now a profession that is attracting hundreds of youths who wish to make it a life work. The day will come when the best of these youngsters will find their places before microphones and in the lives of radio listeners.

"Some day the profession of radio announcer will be as firmly established as dentistry and other similar professions."

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

TWO interesting contrasts in beauty types have been selected to represent station KGO, San Francisco, key-station of the Pacific network of the National Broadcasting Company, in radio's beauty classic, the third search for the most beautiful radio artist in America.

Betty Kelly, blue-eyed, youthful soprano, whose fresh, unsophisticated voice is featured on numerous NBC programs, and Ann Chase, charming young legitimate actress, who recently joined NBC's National Players, will endeavor to win the radio crown of beauty for the West this year.

The radio artist who wins the national beauty classic will reign as "Miss Radio" over the exposition at Madison Square Garden, New York, from September 21 to September 26.

A distinguished board of judges will select the winning entrant, who will be brought to New York during the week of the Radio-Electrical World's Fair as the guest of the Fair management. A suite at the Park Central Hotel, and a car and chauffeur will be at "Miss Radio's" disposal throughout her stay.

Last year's judges, who included Florenz Ziegfeld, noted theatrical producer, and McClelland Barclay and Harrison Fisher, eminent American artists, selected Bernadine Hayes of WBBM, Chicago, who has been featured in several talking pictures and has filled numerous personal appearance engagements in Los Angeles.

The two NBC stars who have entered the contest present two distinctly different types of charm. Betty Kelly is a slip of a girl who looks as if she might just have arrived from the "ould country," with her Irish colleen's eyes, dark curls, and white skin.

Ann is a slim, poised figure, with golden-brown hair, soft, hazel eyes, and a skin which the California sun has tanned to warm duskiness. College trained, with a background of culture, she belongs to the younger school of actresses which has made the stage of the present day so interesting. Born in Kansas City, Mo., her family sent

her East for her education. Ann attended Swarthmore, and then enrolled in the drama school of the Carnegie Institute of Technology in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, where she was graduated with the highest honors in her class.

Her first engagement was with an eastern repertory company, and she played several seasons in stock before coming to California. She was a member of the Civic Repertory Company of Los Angeles, where she stage-managed several productions, including the "Peter Pan" production in which she came to San Francisco. The National Broadcasting Company offered her a contract, and she left the footlights to adventure behind the microphone.

She likes radio, she admits, because it gives her opportunity to indulge in all the varied hobbies she enjoys. These run all the way from play-writing, Shakespeare, costume history, and Russian novels, to golf, at which she beats most of the masculine players who challenge her.

Betty Kelly, despite her Scotch-Irish ancestry, is a true Westerner. She was born "where the West begins"—at Crestabutte, Colorado. When Pacific-bound trains reach this small town on the top of a mountain 11,000 feet above sea level, its passengers learn they are in the real West.

Betty lived in her high home for the first five years of her life. Her father was superintendent of a coal mine. When the family moved to California, Betty attended the Oakland schools, and there are many East Bay residents who recall her as a tiny girl, standing on a table in order to be seen, while she enthusiastically sang "Mickey."

The fresh, exquisite quality of her voice showed itself early. An older brother encouraged the little girl to sing. When Betty said good-by to him and watched him march away to the World War with his regiment, he carried with him his little sister's promise to learn "lots of songs" while she was gone.

Betty kept her promise, but the brother she loved never came back to hear her songs.

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. . . RADIO NEWS . . .

REPRESENTATIVES of a large number of broadcasting stations now having frequencies at either end of the broadcasting band are expected to appear before the Federal Radio Commission October 16 to safeguard their privileges under conditions which would exist if the commission were to grant the application of C. R. Cummings of Williamsport, Pa., trustee for Community Radio, for twenty-five frequencies, either from 550 to 880 kilocycles or from 1,250 to 1,500 kilocycles, on which it is proposed to place several hundred small broadcasting stations.

Because of the fact that the application of Community Radio is not confined to a single group of frequencies, the commission has announced that any station which believes itself to be adversely affected by the granting of the application may intervene.

Approximately 110 stations would be forced out of position if the commission should set aside the frequencies from 550 to 880 kilocycles, while about 300 broadcasters would be affected by the granting of the frequencies at the other end of the dial, from 1,250 to 1,500 kilocycles.

The application of Community Radio seeks reallocation of facilities so as to set aside twenty-five of the present channels for its use, the channels so allocated to be subdivided to provide 125 adjacent "community" broadcast channels having a two-kilocycle separation. The plan of the organization calls for the construction of a broadcasting station in every community in the country having a population between 10,000 and 100,000 power to be allocated on the basis of one watt for each 1,000 of population to the nearest multiple of five watts.

The organization plans the immediate establishment, if its application is granted, of 267 stations, the number eventually to be increased to 400 or more, but it is estimated that as many as 800 stations could operate without interference, if properly separated geographically, affording broadcasting service to as many small communities which now must depend upon outside stations, often at such a distance as to eliminate all possibility of anything like a local interest. The 400 stations which Community Radio plans

would cost approximately \$6,500,000. The other stations, it is believed, would be built by independent interests.

Service to Community Radio stations would be based upon chain programs emanating from a group of at least five stations, which would be established in large educational and amusement centers, which would form the backbone of the local station's programs, to be supplemented by local entertainment and advertising features. The organization claims to be assured of adequate financial support, and is willing to bind itself to have the initial 267 stations ready for operation within seven months.

Considerable doubt is expressed in Washington as to the willingness of the radio commission to disrupt the present set-up without having some definite plan before it for the disposition of the many stations which would have to be ousted from their present assignments. There is no place in the broadcasting spectrum outside of the frequencies they now occupy where the 100 to 300 stations could be accommodated, it is pointed out. This factor, more than anything else, is held to militate against the chances of Community Radio being given the block of twenty-five frequencies which it has requested.

While officials of the commission concede that it would be highly desirable to spread the benefits of broadcasting as planned by Community Radio, they point out that, so far, it has been impossible to devise a plan of allocation which would accommodate the 612 existing stations without interference on the eighty-nine frequencies now available, and that the situation would be made even worse if it became necessary to jam them all within the confines of sixty-four frequencies.

COURT review of the refusal of the Federal Radio Commission to grant the application of a part-time broadcaster for full-time privileges, when the state in which the broadcaster is located is under quota and there is an overquota state in the same zone, has been asked by Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt, former assist-

ant attorney general, acting as counsel for Station WJKS, Gary, Ind.

The appeal filed by Mrs. Willebrandt brings before the courts for the first time the issue of equalization, written into the law by the so-called Davis amendment.

The station's application for full-time privileges was denied by the commission, and the appeal to the courts, based on several grounds, is chiefly concerned with the contention that approval of the application would have served to carry out the intent of the equitable-distribution amendment.

The state of Indiana, it is asserted in the petition, has less than its allotted share of facilities while the state of Illinois, in the same zone, is over quota. The court's attention is directed to General Order No. 92, establishing the "unit system" of calculating the distribution of broadcasting facilities, and to General Order No. 102, designed to make Order No. 92 effective, the later order being explained as providing that an applicant from an under-quota state seeking facilities from an over-quota state in the same zone shall be given preference.

If the petitioners are successful in showing that the refusal of the commission to grant the requested assignment can not be justified as being in the "public interest, convenience, or necessity," it is anticipated that a number of applications will immediately be submitted from broadcasters in various under-quota states for preferential time, powers, and frequencies now enjoyed by stations in over-quota states in the same zones.

TEN airway radio communication stations are to be placed on Federal airways before June 30, next, it has been announced by the aeronautics branch of the Department of Commerce, in extension of its weather information broadcast service to aviators.

The stations will be located at Spokane, Wash.; Pueblo, Colo.; Springfield, Mo.; Houston, Texas; Miami, Fla.; Milford, Utah; Minneapolis-St. Paul, Minn.; San Antonio, Texas; Titusville, Fla., and Mobile, Ala. Eleven other stations now under construction are scheduled to be completed in the near future.

There are now forty-eight radio communication stations in operation along the air-

ways, furnishing weather and other information which is broadcast by radiotelephone to airmen in flight. The stations are established at intervals of approximately 200 miles along the Federal airways system.

In addition to the broadcasting stations, it is planned to install thirty new radio range beacons and to complete fifteen now under construction, which will give the department a total of ninety-six beacons.

Patrolling of coasts by fast cruisers equipped with radio is to be tried out by the British government as a result of a demand for more adequate protection, following a yachting accident in which a prominent member of Parliament and five companions were drowned.

The use of lifeboat cruisers capable of receiving distress signals, it is held, would be of immense advantage in areas traversed by large numbers of vessels, such as the English Channel. It is pointed out that these boats could receive information regarding accidents, not only from vessels in distress, but also from shore stations observing the difficulties of boats such as yachts and other types not equipped with radio, and could provide relief at distances beyond the range of the ordinary coast guard equipment.

He added morosely that it was a pretty serious business having a man locked up undeservedly. And that didn't bring any particular comfort to Orville's tortured soul.

Finally, after much clearing of throats, raising of eyebrows, and red tape, March was brought out of confinement to face his accuser, and a more abject and repentant accuser never groveled before a defendant.

The same aloofness that had drawn Orville to the man and led him to accept his check still clung to March. His replies to Orville's mouthing explanations were cold, crisp monosyllables. He accepted Orville's apologies without comment and promised nothing, finally walking out of the Hall of Justice leaving Orville still paralyzed with the thought that ten and perhaps fifty thousand dollars of his bank account was about to take wings.

"Poor Orville," grinned Hogan.

"Well, did March sue him?"

"Sue him? How could he? March never had an account in the bank in his life."

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
