NO PROGRESS TOWARD EQUALIZATION

FAILURE of the Federal Radio Commission to make any headway with its task of equalizing broadcasting facilities among the several zones, as required by the Davis amendment to the radio act of 1927, may result in a demand from Congress for some definite steps to provide for equitable distribution if the question of radio legislation is brought up during the coming session.

Statistics of distribution just compiled by the commission show that there is as yet little parity between zones, or even between the states in any zone, at the present time. One zone, it is shown, is 10 per cent under its quota, while another is 26 per cent over. Within the same zone are to be found states 104 per cent over quota and 65 per cent under, and in no zone is there anything approaching equality of distribution.

Since the beginning of the current year, it is disclosed, the commission has made no progress whatever toward equalization but, on the contrary, has further increased the disparity between zones. While facilities in the first zone have been improved from six per cent under quota to five per cent under, and in the second zone from 12 per cent under to 10 per cent under, the fourth zone has been given additional facilities which bring it from 12 per cent over quota to 26 per cent over and the third zone has been

increased from 11 per cent over to 16 per cent over. The only zone which has not changed its status is the fifth, which remains 16 per cent over quota.

Among the states, it is shown that Florida has more than double the facilities to which it is entitled, being 104 per cent over quota, on the basis of the commission's own "unit" allocation; Utah is exactly 100 per cent over quota, Nebraska 79 per cent over, and Tennessee 76 per cent. On the other hand, Wyoming is 86 per cent under its quota, South Carolina 65 per cent under, and Mississippi 46 per cent.

A survey of the heavily populated states shows considerable disparity of distribution. New York is 12 per cent over quota, Illinois 54 per cent over, but Pennsylvania is 27 per cent under, Massachusetts 16 per cent under, and Michigan 18 per cent under.

In the first zone only New York, New Jersey, and Delaware are over quota, the last two only slightly, while every other state is under quota. On the other hand, in the fourth zone only Indiana, Wisconsin, and Kansas are under quota, with every other state over, the smallest excess in that zone being 12 per cent in Missouri and running up to 79 per cent in Nebraska. The fourth zone is the most out of line with the with an excess of 26 per cent.

MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • "You're getting a bit gray about the temples," said Edna O'Keefe, KFRC star, to her fellow artist, Pedro Gonzales recently.

"Leesten" (it was reported to the publicity department Pedro replied), "I don't care eef I am getting purple, what I don't wanna get ees barefooted on the skull."

• • • Some folks break into newspaper work; few have it thrust upon them as Cecil Underwood, NBC announcer and master of ceremonies of the Associated Spotlight Revue, did recently.

Cecil went home to Colfax, Washington, for his vacation, and the first person he met on the street was the editor of the town's weekly newspaper.

"Come into my office," said the editor, and when Cecil did so, his host swiftly locked the door.

"Here's a typewriter and paper," he said. "The Spotlight Revue is the one big program so far as Colfax is concerned, and you don't get out of this office until you sit down and write me a story about it."

Cecil surrendered. He wrote ten columns about the Spotlight program and the artists on it in an hour and a half, and the editor printed the story verbatim, although it took nearly all the reading space in the issue.

• • • Ted Husing will break all existing records for sports announcing if he carries out the fall schedule of broadcasts that has been arranged for him by the Columbia Broadcasting System.

During 1930 Husing traveled 31,650 miles and described sixty-five athletic events. Up to September 1 of this year, with four months to go, Ted had covered 26,448 miles in describing fifty-six sports events. These figures, of course, do not include Columbia's schedule of football broadcasts, which will swell the total considerably.

• • • KTM has now installed an 8,000 cycle line from its Los Angeles studios to the transmitting department down in Santa Monica. This gives it the highest frequency capacity of any remote control line in South-

ern California and makes for truer reproduction of music and speech.

This carries the highest audible frequency and gives from 40 to 50 per cent more than the average receiving set will reproduce, according to C. B. Juneau, production manager.

• • • KFWB's organist, Price Dunlavy, takes an intense interest in his profession, and was one of the founders of the Los Angeles Theatre Organists' Club, the most successful organization of its type in the country.

• • • Readers of BROADCAST WEEKLY will welcome the news that Anna Kristina, Swedish character actress, who hails from Sweden and Minnesota and who has been broadcasting over eastern stations, has returned to San Francisco and will shortly be heard on KPO again, the station on which she was a regular featured artist for several years.

Anna is also well known as a vocal star—a soprano—and for these occasions she uses the name of Helga Erickson.

The delectable humor of her programs, given in her familiar dialect, are as intriguing as her sunny outlook on life, as the Swedish KPO star states "everyting ban fonnny if you just look."

• • • Norman Thue and Lawrence Groshoff, better known to listeners of station KHQ in Spokane as "Dutch" and "Norm," have just returned to their respective duties of pounding a piano and strumming a banjo, after a recent sojourn in the wilds of Northeastern Washington in search of the elusive trout.

• • • Back in the gay 90's, when women wore mutton leg sleeves, bustles, and long trains, Roy Leffingwell wrote his first song, "Every Girl's a Flirt." Now he is ready to publish his latest, "Some Day My Love Will Find You." And the cycle comes around again for women are returning to puff sleeves, long skirts, and bustles. Leffingwell is KECA's music philosopher with a morning broadcast daily.

• • • Robert Bowman, KHJ announcer, has been appointed Program Manager of KGB, the Don Lee station in San Diego. Bob is the polished, youthful voice which, for the past six months, has announced the dance programs nightly from the Biltmore Hotel. He is an electrical engineer from the University of Dayton; a fiddler from station WLW, Cincinnati; an expert from the Engineering and Research Department of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company; and came to KHJ sixteen months ago in the capacity of technician. Mr. Bowman has always felt the announcing urge, and was given a chance to air his silky voice on a few KHJ programs. The result was instantaneously pleasing and he became radio's announcing-technician.

• • • Edna Fischer, KFRC pianist, recently established new marathon records for all time when she played five shows daily at the Warfield Theatre and at the same time took care of all of her radio work on the station.

She just about lived in her grease paint, with no time to take it off while covering the laps between studio and theatre and theatre and studio.

Incidentally, with so much playing, her wrists started to swell before the week was out.

• • • Carlton Bowman, youthful Denver tenor, is the third singer to leave the KOA staff and go to New York to become a member of the famous Seth Parker radio troupe heard every Sunday over a National Broadcasting Company coast-to-coast network.

The other two singers, both of whom were heard regularly over KOA before leaving Denver, are Norman Price, tenor, and Edward Wolter, baritone.

• • • Throughout Northern California communities are selecting their best young singers for the coming California State Audition of the Atwater-Kent Foundation to be held over radio station KPO October 25 and 26. The state audition will result in the selection of a boy and girl who will meet the winners of other western states at the district audition to be held over KPO November 16. Out of this latter contest will be chosen the two fortunate singers who will qualify for the national audition to be

held in New York in December and which carries with it participation in cash awards totaling \$25,000 and scholarships in America's finest conservatories.

Hays has just returned to the NBC Chicago studios after a vacation in Glacier National Park and the Western country typified in the radio dramas. He reports having had a great time but a rough one. He made a 400-mile tour on horseback through country he never dreamed existed.

• • • Al Pearce, on his recent triumphant trip to Seattle with the KFRC Happy Go Lucky Gang, promised both Tacoma and Portland that he would bring his big radio show to those cities, if possible, before next Christmas.

• • • What seems to be a new depression joke comes from Fletcher Henderson, whose orchestra broadcasts over CBS waves from Connie's Inn in Harlem. Announcer Louis Dean and the colored maestro were discussing various musicians. "What is so-and-so doing now?" the announcer asked, referring to a formerly prominent band leader who had disappeared from the limelight.

"Why, he's working for Walker and Turner."

"Walker and Turner," mused the announcer, "I don't believe I know that outfit."

"Walker block and Turner corner," Henderson explained.



SILHOUETTES

AS AN artist, Toscha Seidel has austere ideals of beauty and musical perfection; as a man he has a vast exuberance that is commonly more associated with the light-hearted Latin than the somber Russian.

In the Columbia studios, where Seidel allows no visitors—not even close friends—while he is broadcasting, he is the earnest zealot, fervently revering his art, talking tensely to his pianist, half caressing his violin, as he lifts it up, tuning it; striding up and down with a look of impatient frustration until he begins his program; then playing raptly. Outside the studios, around and about the offices and corridors of the Columbia Broadcasting System, he wanders with a brisk restiveness, enlivening the dull atmosphere of office routine with his explosive laughter. Everybody likes him.

Toscha Seidel was born in Odessa on November 17, 1899. His father was a business man and his mother a school teacher, but Toscha was born with an instinct and an appreciation for music. When he was only three years old he used to delight his uncle, a violinist of some local fame, by criticising his playing with a keenness that was innate.

It took a deal of persuasion on the fond uncle's part to overcome the parents' prejudice against encouragement of a child prodigy, but one day he brought home a quarter-size fiddle, and began giving the child lessons.

Before Toscha was seven he made his first public appearance in Odessa and when he was eight Professor Alexander Fiedeman took him to the Sterns Conservatory in Berlin as a scholarship pupil.

Three years later Leopold Auer was in Dresden, and Fiedeman took to him his protégé. The master heard the boy play and immediately took him as a scholarship pupil, turning him loose in 1914, a finished mas-

ter of the violin at the age of fifteen.

Seidel went to Norway for his first concert tour, and stayed to tour the other Scandinavian countries. It was the only part of Europe not then in the turmoil of war, and the rest of Europe, including his own country, did not see him again until long after peace had come to that part of the world, for he came to America in 1918, played in every big city from coast to coast, and then began a 'round-the-world tour that took him through Australia, New Zealand and South Africa.

In appearance, Toscha Seidel is the antithesis of what one would expect to find in the artist. His delicate rendition of classical music suggests the tall, austered and spiritual esthete; but he is short—about five feet, six—broad of shoulder, powerful of limb and rugged of countenance. He has the sort of build that is the despair of tailors, and yet is extremely well groomed, almost dapper. He has a tendency toward corpulence, but is not fat.

Toscha Seidel has hunted big game in Australia and has tobogganed with the King of Norway. He is something of a gourmet and has tried strange dishes all over the world. The best thing he ever tasted was Baked Alaska at New York's Hotel Lafayette, and the worst, fried sea gulls with a Maori tribe in New Zealand. He was made an honorary chief of a Maori tribe after they heard him play, because, he claims, they were fascinated by the rapidity of his fingering rather than the beauty of the music. His great hobby is bacteriology, which he first became interested in during a bubonic plague in Australia.

A HIGH, sweet tenor, at once clean-cut and rich in its tone, floats through the microphone in an operatic aria, and soon the telephones at the National Broad-

casting Company's San Francisco studios begin jingling.

"Who is that Italian singer on your staff?" is the question which the studio staff has come to expect almost every time Ben Klassen appears as a soloist. Ben, tall, blonde and boyishly good-looking, grins shyly when he is reminded of the "Italian" quality of his voice.

there. His musical ability manifested itself early in life, and he studied violin during his grammar and high school days, playing in various orchestras in Los Angeles during his junior and senior years.

Once graduated, Ben expected to become a business man, and laid aside his violin to do so. He was an accountant with the Standard Oil Company in San Francisco when a business associate heard his voice, raised in song in a playful mood one day.

"You've got a tenor voice—just what we need for the Family Club quartet, he announced, and Ben, surprised, but amiable, agreed to join the vocal group. As the Olympians, the quartet sang before the microphone for the first time in 1928, and Ben was offered a contract at KGO.

He accepted, but prudently continued in his office position until the quality of his voice had proven over and over again that it must be his life-work.

One of the most versatile artists at NBC, Ben sings ballads, folk-songs and popular airs on one program, and then steps into

an operatic role in a radio presentation without difficulty. The ease and purity of his tone is remarked by all who hear him, and he is one of the group of NBC singers whom Emil Polak, noted coach who is NBC'S musical counselor in San Francisco, has pronounced the equal of any similar group in the Metropolitan Opera Company.

The NBC star was born in Lincoln, Nebraska, and never intended to be a singer until a career as one almost was forced on him. Ben's family moved to Los Angeles when he was a tiny boy, and he obtained most of his education

ONE of the latest stage folk to desert footlights for the NBC microphone is Carlton E. Young, tall, dark, good-looking young actor who has joined the staff of the San Francisco studios.

He made his radio debut in one of the Rin Tin Tin Thrillers, but NBC audiences heard him most regularly as Michael Lorn in the mystery serial, "The Game Called Murder."

Young was born in Westfield, New York, but went to Pittsburgh, Pa., to learn about acting. The Carnegie Institute of Technology, famous for its drama school, sent him out as one of the most promising of its group of youthful Thespians, and he has fulfilled that promise. He has played leading rôles in stock productions in Buffalo, Atlanta and New York, and appeared in principal rôles in productions on Broadway before coming west.

He and his pretty blonde wife were members of the Civic Repertory Company in Los Angeles, and Young has played in several productions seen in San Francisco. He had a major part in "Elizabeth the Queen," with Pauline Frederick. Books and music occupy the

young actor a great part of the time that he is not studying a rôle. He prefers Shakespearian parts, and he is a bit of an authority on Shakespeare and Ibsen. He composes for piano as a diversion from acting.


Murray and Harris at KFRC are entertaining. Offer some neat novelties. Good teamwork. Smack o' big time.

GHOSTS IN THE AIR

was the latest addition to the writing staff at the studio. The conversation had drifted to the sequence of unearthly events that had made the night of October 21, 19—, the most terrifying period in the history of radio. "I remember every detail leading up to that night as though it had occurred this evening," Hogan continued. "The way the sun colored up and sank in a bank of low fog in the west."

The night's events, however, really began with the appearance of the moon along about nine o'clock. It came out blood red. A most peculiar phenomenon.

Blood red and trailing streams of scarlet. But it didn't frighten anyone. The moon does peculiar things out here on the coast. People looked at it, commented and forgot about it.

That was nine o'clock. At ten there suddenly appeared out of the west a great wedge-shaped phantom of blackness. If it had been silvery white under the moon one would have said "fog." But it wasn't silvery and it didn't billow like incoming fog. It was like nothing except a great wedge of night! Black.



THE power of the Unknown over man's thoughts and actions is tremendous, beyond any other earthly force. It colors his imagination; it stirs wonderful and mysterious emotions; it gives him his religion; it fascinates him and it frightens him. What person hasn't shivered with delight and fear over some mystifying occurrence? An unexplained footstep! An unseen presence! A telepathic message! Forebodings—

Bill Hogan arose, laid his burning pipe on the mantle and heaved another chunk of root-wood on the fire and resumed his sprawling posture in the battered red-leather chair. It was midnight, but he'd insisted on Connaughton dropping in on the apartment for a final smoke and chat. Connaughton

starless night. It came with maddening deliberateness, thrusting the point of the wedge between the earth and the dripping moon.

The moon was blotted out, the stars were gone and there was no longer any sky. Even the city itself was wiped out. There was cold, blackness all about and that was all.

"One of the plant boys and I went up on the roof of the studio to have a look about, and I tell you Connaughton it was so black we had to hang onto each other to keep from being separated. And cold! The atmosphere fairly sizzled with frost. And not a breath of air stirred!"

Queer about nature, Hogan mused. One could almost believe that she *knew* what was about to happen, and like any good stage manager set the stage for the drama.

Have you ever noticed? Gloomy overhanging skies; dripping trees; moaning winds and weather-beaten shacks for her tragedies. And again musical streams; sunshine; warm, scented evenings and mossy nooks for her love scenes! You can't get away from it. Nature abhors incongruity.

Well, the stage was set on the night of October twenty-first: A scarlet, dripping moon and then blackness. Utter blackness!

At ten-fifteen the studio was releasing a forty-five minute program of concert music featuring Eileen Arlette, a charming girl of perhaps twenty-two with a rich contralto voice. One of the production men, Jimmy Coleman, had known her in musical comedy and had brought her to radio. That was about all anyone knew of her except that she was married.

Promptly on the second the conductor raised his baton. The announcer signaled, picked up his channels and threw the program switch. The conductor's baton descended bringing forth a thunder of drums and a crash of cymbals, and the orchestra was away.

"Most of the radio sets in the various studio offices are connected directly with the plant room," Hogan explained. "However, the one in my office picks the program out of the air. I arranged this purposely so that I would get exactly the same reception as the public. Sometimes there's a whale of a difference."

He unscrambled his long legs and got out of his chair. His pipe on the mantle had burned itself out. He took it up, refilled it and sat down again, scratching a match on the heel of his shoe.

He tuned in on the concert and listened critically for a moment and then had relaxed, taking up a radio engineering magazine. The music swept on and on. It reached bewildering heights with flurries of emotion. It swung low into smooth rhythmic languor. Again it became excited with its passion and again fell away only to culminate in a tremendous burst of melody.

There was a pause, a simple statement from the announcer, and the orchestra swept into the opening phrase of Tannhauser's "Evening Star." And in a moment Eileen Arlette was singing. Hogan laid aside his magazine to listen. The lovely, lilting melody of her voice held him enchanted. He wondered savagely why *he* couldn't find a girl with a voice like that. That's why he was a bachelor at thirty-five. He had known as many as three or four girls he could have loved, but they hadn't

waited for him. By the time he'd met them they were other men's wives.

Suddenly he sat erect, a cold wave of apprehension gripping his spine. What in Heaven's name! There it was again! A ghastly maniacal chuckle . . . a ghostly inhuman ripple of laughter!

He leaped to his feet and dashed through the plant department and into the control booth. Coleman was producing. Hemmingway was at the mixing box. They both looked up with startled expressions as Hogan threw open the door.

Who laughed?

The two men exchanged puzzled glances.

Someone laughed in the studio . . . Who was it?

Coleman grinned without exactly seeing the point of the joke.

"I'll bite! Who did?"

Hogan's blood began to boil. He started to raise seven kinds of particular fireworks, but suddenly he hesitated. He glanced through the double glass windows into the studio. There was not the slightest sign of disturbance. Eileen was before the mike, a lovely bit of youthful femininity in her trailing evening gown. The conductor, his flaming hair on end, was deeply absorbed in his score and every musician was a study in concentration. Even the announcer was studiously checking his report.

Hogan hesitated, glanced dubiously at the two men beside him in the booth and without a word walked out. A puzzled frown creased his forehead as he returned to his office. What was the matter with him? Was he hearing—He pushed the thought aside. There wasn't anything wrong with his ears. Someone was playing a joke—

There is was again! Only it wasn't laughing now. A ghostly voice trying to say something. Hogan stood rigid, his ears straining to catch the words. . . They were intelligible words, but faint; so faint, so bodiless that even with his ear against the loud speaker he couldn't quite catch them. It was heartbreaking. He held his breath until he had to struggle to regain it.

Ghostly voices! Terrifying voices speaking through the somber wistful music. He had heard of such things. Mysterious voices in the air attuning themselves to a given wave-length. He'd even read an article in a pseudo-scientific magazine conjecturing on the probability of linking the living and the dead through the medium of radio.

Fine beads of perspiration stood out on his forehead. If he could only catch a single

word. There was desperation in the voice now! What was that? His ear was becoming attuned. There . . . THERE!

He started back as it caught the words. Twice it was repeated! **Eileen . . . Eileen . . .** Some one was calling to the singer. A voice had gotten through. A voice in agony was coming through. Coming through from WHERE?

His telephone bell rang sharply. Impatiently he jerked the receiver from the hook. Hello! Who is it? Program Manager? What in So-and-So was happening down there? Hogan swore. Well, how the blankety-blank did he know? He hung up the receiver with a clatter.

Again the bell rang. With a savage movement he grabbed up the instrument. Well? This time a feminine voice wanted to report that a beautiful program was being spoiled by interference. They could hear voices and couldn't the station do something about it. Again the receiver went up with a bang. It was quite apparent that the whole world was in on this business.

He jingled the phone hook for the operator. If any more calls came in about the program in A studio, tell 'em the trouble will be cleared up in a few minutes. Any MORE calls! The operator's weary voice came back with rich sarcasm. The switch board was flooded with them. Hogan grunted. Well, that was someone else's worry.

"Evening Star" had drawn to a close and the orchestra was now in the midst of a Victor Herbert Medely, but still the voice whispered and gasped. Fading—fading—fading until it was only the faintest whisper and then back again with desperation; fighting, struggling to get through. Hogan stood moping his face in a panic.

"I'm a sonovagun if I knew what to do," he confided. "I was in a cold sweat and no two ways."

Suddenly the voice broke through with vivid clearness. **Eileen . . . Eileen** it wailed and then faded away into an ethereal sob. And again the vague, wandering wordless murmuring began in the background. With sudden purpose, Hogan again went to the monitor's booth. He summoned Coleman outside and whispered to him. An expression of concern clouded the producer's face. More whispering! Coleman hesitated and then nodded in agreement.

He went into the live studio and motioned silently for Eileen to follow him out.

"Was the balance all right?" she whispered anxiously at the door.

"Bill Hogan wants us in his office for a moment."

Hogan closed the door softly behind the pair and motioned them to the loud-speaker. Suddenly through the music came the same wild, soulless chuckle that Hogan had first heard. THE motion picture pipe organ, once silenced by the advent of talking pictures, has come into its own again, according to Ralph Brunton of radio station KJBS.

Brunton has completed arrangements with the California Theatre, San Francisco, to broadcast its \$50,000 mighty Wurlitzer each morning, except Sunday, at 10:05 o'clock. It is said that this is the largest and finest organ in the West available for broadcasting. It is more than five times as large as any instrument now on the air in this territory, and is the equivalent of a 200-piece orchestra.

Incidentally, this will introduce a new organist to San Francisco music lovers. He is Dow Le Roi, who will preside at the console of the great organ. Mr. Le Roi comes from the Northwest, where he was featured organist for RKO, Publix and Fox theatres, and is far from being a novice in the broadcasting field. It was he who sent the first organ program over KOIN years ago when radio was considered a novelty. In his broadcasts over KJBS, Mr. Le Roi promises a new type of popular organ recital, entirely different from anything that has heretofore gone on the air.






