

LIFEBOAT RADIO PERFECTED

FORESHADOWING the day when all trans-oceanic passenger vessels will be required to equip their lifeboats with radio apparatus, the Matson Navigation Company is making radio a part of the regular equipment of the lifeboats on its new vessel, the "Mariposa," which will be put into service early next year.

In all probability it may never be necessary to use the lifeboats, and naturally the company hopes that this may be the case. But if it does become necessary to abandon the vessel at sea, officers of the company are resolved that passengers and crew shall only be subjected to the hardships of small boats for as short a time as possible. The radio equipment will direct rescuing vessels, eliminating the lengthy searches which at times have been necessary under similar circumstances in the past.

A number of handicaps had to be overcome in the development of the lifeboat equipment by the Radiomarine Corporation of America, which is making the installation. Naturally, it had to be so designed as to make a minimum of weight and use the least space possible, yet be protected from water and the corrosive action of salt air.

Power will be supplied by storage batteries, while a motor-alternator will produce the high voltages necessary to the operation of the vacuum tubes. Both transmitter and receiver are provided, the latter having a

simple circuit and using only two tubes, designed for headphone reception. Two tubes are also used in the transmitter, which will have a range of fifty miles on the intermediate frequency band and several times that distance on short waves.

In order to provide for instant use in emergencies, the batteries in the lifeboats will be kept continuously charged from the ship's electric lines. When the lifeboats are in use, a control panel which is part of the equipment provides means not only for switching on the radio but also for controlling illumination within the boat and for the operation of a searchlight. In addition, provision is made for the insertion of a key in the light line of the boat, for visual code signalling.

If the new lifeboat equipment lives up to the expectations of its designers, it is probable that it will be adopted by a number of steamship companies in the near future. Accidents involving abandonment of a ship are few, but when they do occur so many lives are endangered that no expense is spared to provide the greatest possible safety and reduce the hardships which must be experienced when, say, a ship must be abandoned in the North Atlantic in the dead of winter.

This is a move in the right direction and will undoubtedly bring the Matson Navigation Company much good will.

H. G., Glendale.—Walter Kelsey's music may now he heard on KFRC.



• • • Roy Leffingwell opened his KECA program at 10:30 a. m. Thursday, October 1, by playing the celebrated Movement in Blue from his Color Symphony. Ordinarily done by a full orchestra, its rendition in the form of a piano work is somewhat out of the ordinary.

The KECA music-philosopher's talk on the broadcast was "Making a Home Out of a House."

Whenever the local library branches have a run on Marcus Aurelius, Epictetus, and some other philosophical authors and their works, it merely means that Roy Leffingwell has been talking again.

Each week-day morning at 10:30 o'clock from KECA he does a brief music program and ends with a few philosophical words of advice. These old-time philosophers, says Roy, were great guys in their time, or words to that effect. Thereupon all his fan audience rush over to the library branch and delve into the musty tomes.

• • • Jackie Adair, former vaudeville and cabaret favorite, known as the "blue streak of the blues" has teamed up with the Joy Boys, Frank Galvin and Jerry Herst, on KJBS. Miss Adair is well known in local club and fraternal circles through her personal appearances. She has a very pleasing style of delivery and her songs over the microphone demonstrates her sparkling personality.

• • • Stuart Buchanan (KNX) is adding new leaves to his growing crown of laurels. Having soared into the limelight for his brilliant dramatized presentation over KNX of the trial of David Clark, he is making a new bid for prominence as a football announcer.

• • • Louise Fordham, mezzo-soprano who several years ago was one of the scintillating stars of "Dobbsie's" Shell Happytime period over KPO, has returned to the KPO studios after spectacular triumphs on "Broadway."

The diminutive little star, whose charm, personality and warm flexible voice made her the "idol" of Greenwich Village and

He cites having heard WABC, WPG, Atlantic City; WNAC, Boston, and KMOX, St. Louis.

Atta Girl, Dora!



We are pleased that so many of the good programs discontinued through the summer are now returning to the air.


Little Jeannie Lang of the Gilmore Oil program on the air Friday night deserves a lot of praise. What a sweet voice she has. Won't you please print her picture?

AIDA CAVALLI, comedienne of the "Looking Glass" program presented over KPO Monday evening, 9 to 10 o'clock, refuses to woo the God of Favor by caroling the arias from "Aida," although she has studied the Verdi work and has a delightful soprano voice, but chooses rather to win popularity by singing such catchy and tricky numbers as "Giddy-ap Gari-baldi."

Perhaps the parts she played in "Huckleberry Finn" and "Tom Sawyer" with Jack Pickford in silent pictures before the talkies became the rage, inspired within her a love for frivolity, because today Miss Cavalli shuns anything bordering on the serious. When it comes to singing comedy numbers, Aida is like a playful kitten with a ball of string—she likes to toy with the humorous passages, carelessly coaxing forth every laugh, cavorting and acting up before the KPO microphone with utter abandon—just like a kitten is wont to do as it romps and plays.

Her nearest approach to becoming serious is during her search of antique shops for some article that attracts attention more, perhaps, from the price tag attached than from actual value, for Aida is a collector of antiques. Her home is, in fact, a curiosity shop of relics. Whenever Miss Cavalli finds some object that intrigues her the close observer will note that she draws herself up to her full height of 5 feet 2 inches,—the excitement that lights up her gray eyes—and that she will invariably take off the tight fitting little hat that snuggles down on her dark brown hair and ruin it to such an extent that her milliner's sales are thereby increased.

A brief survey of her career discloses that she was born in San Francisco, schooled here and in Berkeley, and studied art at Percy Clement Brown's art school. Fol-

lowing a course of dramatic study she appeared with Charles Ruggles at the old Alcazar Theatre during the regime of the Belasco's. Then Miss Cavalli made her debut in silent pictures and later made her bow to radio audiences as a member of KPO's former Variety Hour, one of the real popular programs of early broadcasting.

Miss Cavalli's hobbies, other than antique hunting, are golf (she handles a mean "mashie"), interior decorating and drawing. Her pen and ink sketches are the bright spots of many advertisements.

her bow professionally was not made until radio came into its own. Since then she's been heard by the audiences of many other stations and through those affiliated with NBC since shortly after the Pacific Division inaugural in 1927.

Popular tunes and light operatic numbers are Gail's favorites. Her ambition always has been to sing on Broadway in musical comedy.

The soloist was born in Kansas City, Mo., but before she more than learned to walk, the family was living in Los Angeles. There Gail grew up, completing her academic education and beginning her voice culture—a natural outlet for a child whose parents both were singers.

Of her radio début, seven years ago in Los Angeles, Miss Taylor says:

BROADWAYS and Boulevards — literally and figuratively — brought Gail Taylor, soprano soloist, to the San Francisco studios of the National Broadcasting Company.

"Broadways and Boulevards" was the program which gave Gail her big opportunity in radio and from Broadway came the songs she sang.

A quiet girl, with large brown eyes, Gail Taylor began singing as a child, but

"The studio was tiny, thickly padded, and stifling. It was high on a Los Angeles building and one reached it after taking the elevator to the top floor, climbing a ladder and literally 'walking a plank.'"

In Fresno, Miss Taylor was a radio soloist more than a year, and before coming to NBC she was a KGO artist. Jennings Pierce, NBC's chief announcer, was responsible for Gail's NBC premiere. Formerly an associate artist at KGO, Pierce learned that "Broadways and Boulevards" was scheduled to open in the San Francisco studios and urged Miss Taylor to try out for the solo rôle. She appeared for an audition and was signed immediately. Her voice then was characterized as "perfect for microphone" performance.

Home-making affords Gail's greatest happiness, next to her singing engagements.

Interior decoration is one of her hobbies, and golf the other. Swimming fits into the picture, too, with a daily dip and sun bath a part of her régime for "keeping fit" for the microphone.

THERE are always people back of the scenes of radio broadcasting who are seldom heard about by the radio fans and yet who contribute difficult creative work to the programs.

One of these is Earl Towner of KFRC, who has recently become director of the Feminine Fancies Orchestra, in addition to his other duties as vocal director for the station.

Towner has been working "back-stage," or, may we say, "back-mike," at KFRC, with the exception of one short break since 1927. His work has been chiefly confined to training voices and making vocal and orchestral

arrangements. He came to the station originally, however, to sing basso with the Strollers, one of the station's male quartets. Now he is occasionally heard with the Buccaneers.

Towner's musical training was obtained largely from his attendance at the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston. He also studied composition and conducting with George W. Chadwick, and voice with Stephan Townsend.

Towner has a home in Berkeley. His wife is also a musician. She is organist and vocal director at the First Methodist Church in

Oakland. There are three children: Edwin Earl, 14; Phyllis, 5, and Mildred, 1½. Edwin Earl, known as Ted, following the high-brow footsteps of his father, is the pianist in the jazz orchestra at the Berkeley High School. The others haven't manifested any decided musical predilections as yet.

Towner's hobby fits right in with his wife's idea of "what a good husband should be." He's one of those husbands who is "handy about the house." Handling carpenter tools is his greatest delight when his musical duties give him a rest. He will fix a broken garage door, mend a step, or put up a shelf in the basement with the greatest alacrity. He is five feet ten inches, weighs 140 pounds, has plenty of hazel in his eyes, though rather a scarcity of hair on his head. He is always good-natured, and appreciative of a bit of humor. Hard working, conscientious, and a "good guy."

You hear his voice occasionally talking with Bill Wright on the Don Lee chain's afternoon feature, Feminine Fancies. He has been conducting the Jamboree Band during the absence of Meredith Willson.

* * *



... RADIO NEWS ...

RADIO advertising in South America is gaining impetus with the increasing number of receiving sets, but is still in its infancy as compared with the elaborate programs presented in the United States, according to officials of the Department of Commerce who have just completed a study of the subject.

Outside of Argentina and Mexico, the programs of the great bulk of Latin-American stations consist of phonograph records. Unlike stations in the United States, which permit the advertiser to make up his own program, the South American custom is for the station to provide the entertainment, usually consisting of records interspersed with advertising announcements. Practically all stations except those which are government owned accept advertising, most of them deriving their main income from this source, it is stated.

ACHECK for \$7.20 and an honorary membership in the Forest Ranger Force were the rewards Floyd Gibbons, NBC headline hunter, reaped for his part in fighting a fire which threatened to destroy valuable timber lands in Yellowstone National Park recently. The pay was at the rate of thirty cents an hour for twenty-four hours, he revealed.

Accompanied by his brother, Donald M. Gibbons of Minneapolis, and Hal Elkins, a ranger, Gibbons was headed into the wilds of Montana with a pack team of eleven mules, a ton of provisions and camp equipment the first week in September. On the fifth day of their journey they noticed, high up in the mountains, a great quantity of smoke and later ashes began to fall about them.

On the Two Oceans Plateau they discovered a rangers' hut. They found a telephone in the cabin and immediately notified Chief Ranger Roy Toll at headquarters seventy miles away. Toll said he had already dispatched fifty men in boats across Lake Yellowstone, but they would need pack animals badly, as there were none available in that isolated part of the park. Gibbons immediately offered him his mules.

The mules were used to haul equipment

and provisions up Shipmonk Creek. The thirty-mile journey was made twice each day.

The fire covered two or three square miles, Gibbons declared, and it was a fearful inferno. Rangers called it a "crown fire," since the tops of the trees were aflame, although the underbrush was afire as well. On the third day it rained and the fire in the trees was extinguished, and a day later the rangers were able to get the brush fire under control.

Upon his return to Yellowstone the honorary ranger membership was conferred on him by Horace Balbright, director of national parks in the Department of the Interior.

AN emergency need demands emergency measures.

The Chest goal in San Francisco is \$2,500,000. Pledges, not payments, will be asked from San Francisco donors during the Community Chest campaign from October 26 through November 18.

San Francisco has long been known as a friendly city. This emergency must not discredit our reputation.






