STATIONS WARNED TO IMPROVE PROGRAMS

FURTHER evidence of the rising tide of dissatisfaction with the advertising phases of the average broadcast program is seen in the warning delivered by Chairman Saltzman of the Federal Radio Commission that broadcasters must seek to improve their programs to keep pace with improvement in technical operation.

Addressing his remarks to the recent meeting of the National Association of Broadcasters, General Saltzman intimated that the broadcasters must tone down the advertising portions of their programs and seek a higher plane of dignity. The public, he suggested, is becoming restive under the flamboyant phrases of the broadcasting advertiser.

"There are sponsored programs and sponsored programs," he asserted, "programs in which the advertising is palatable and programs in which the sales talk is nauseating. Broadcasters, if they listen to the trend of public opinion, will commence to take steps to make these sales talks more palatable. Right now the problem is theirs and they should hasten to solve it."

Many broadcasters agree heartily with the views expressed by the head of the radio commission. However, they point out, the "toning down" of the advertising material

can be accomplished, as things now stand, only by the adoption of a decisive policy by all the broadcasters or by coöperation of all the advertisers, either of which is difficult and almost impossible to secure.

With the programs of several competing manufacturers following one another through the same station, it is pointed out, each tries to make his "selling talk" a little more effective than his competitor's, resulting in the extravagant use of time and language which are complained of. In some instances, advertising is sent over the air which would not be accepted by the publishers of some newspapers and magazines.

That there is a steadily growing demand for a house cleaning is not to be denied. Whether this will culminate in a demand for legislation or in a "buyers' strike" against offending advertisers is becoming a serious question. A few years ago a buyers' strike, apparently simultaneous in all sections of the country, slowed up American business almost over night. That strike was directed at high prices, and was very effective. A new strike against over-advertised products is not an inconceivable result of the failure of broadcasters and advertisers to heed General Saltzman's exhortation to improve the quality of their programs.

I might add that (as Mr. Harry C. of San Francisco says) the placement of the "mikes" may be the cause of improper broadcasting of their music although I find no trouble, as in case it is too loud I just turn down my volume control and acoustic control, which enables me to get the volume that most suits my own individual taste.

I also note that one of your critics wants more church and religious music during the

week. I daresay that the radio business would drop off terribly were this done. When a man, or woman, returns from a hard day's work they don't want to listen to sentimental or religious music or sermons; they want to be happy and enjoy something snappy that takes away all thoughts of the dreary day's work.

Before I close I would like to add that I hope the worthy Captain Dobbsie and Shell Happy Time are here to stay. Also Amos 'n' Andy, Cecil and Sally, Spotlight Revue, and Lucky Strike Orchestra. Also Happy Go Lucky Hour.



SILHOUETTES



TWO little girls sat on a grassy hillside and listened spellbound to their 12-year-old brother as he told them fairy tales of his own invention.

"Don't stop!" begged the smaller one as the youthful narrator stopped for breath. "Tell us some more, Baron!"

The little girls are grown now, but throughout the Pacific network of the National Broadcasting Company, wherever the voice of Baron Keyes reaches, other children beseech him, in hundreds of letters scrawled in juvenile handwriting—"Tell us some more."

And Keyes, creator of the Air Castle and spinner of delectable fantasies about its inhabitants, obligingly calls upon one of the most fertile imaginations in captivity and tells more and more adventures of Clickety-Clack, the Little Wooden Man, and his friends.

That creative ability of the quiet, youthful NBC star—he's still in his thirties—makes him a paradoxical figure when you consider all that he has achieved. A song writer whose ballads are known the country over, and a musician who has developed the art of "syncopating between" his voice and the piano, Keyes never took a music lesson in his life. His own technique, an immensely difficult and intricate affair for those who would imitate it, is executed, he claims, purely from instinct. True syncopation, he says, comes that way, from within. Everything about Keyes and his

artistic efforts are original. His Air Castle stories are created in a world of his own imaginings, owing nothing to other fairy tales, and even the songs he sings on the radio program are his own, with words and music especially

written for each microphone presentation.

One of the earliest recollections of the song writer is the time he discovered syncopation—by pounding on a newly painted canvas of his mother's with a rag doll. He does not remember what judgment was visited on his head for wrecking the picture his artist-mother had just completed, but he doesn't think it was very terrible. The household where Baron and his brothers and sisters grew up was notable for its pleasant informality, and although the word "self-expression" had not yet been invented, Baron's mother evi-

dently believed in it. Although she herself was a trained musician, as well as a painter, she let him develop his own technique at the piano when she saw that he would not take lessons, and she encouraged him in the invention of the fairy tales he told his younger brothers and sisters.

The Air Castle and Clickety-Clack are a direct outgrowth of those days, and Baron Keyes admits he still enjoys spinning fairy tales as much as his youthful listeners enjoy listening to them.

He was just 17 when he wrote his first song, which was "Boy Blue," and before he was much older he was writing and producing a musical review for the Junior Chamber of Commerce in Milwaukee—his first professional engagement. The songs which flowed so freely from his fingers as he bent over a piano made him one of the most valued members of the staff of a large musical publishing house for a number of years, then radio claimed him and brought him to California to stay.

That was seven years ago, and his name now is well known to the followers of every broadcasting station in California. His radio work, he says, has brought him a richer experience than any other career could have offered; out of the hundreds of letters which come to him from listeners he makes music and returns their gifts a hundred-fold.

Forty-eight of the original songs for children which he

has written to accompany his Air Castle program recently were collected into book form for use in the public schools, with illustrations by the well-known English artist, Eulalie.

MMURRAY BOLEN and Harris Brown (Murray and Harris of KFRC) got so tired of running into each other all over the country that they decided to team up and get it over with.

At least, that's the way they account for their partnership of comedy and song which has provided entertainment for radio fans throughout the Pacific Coast during the past four years. "Guess we've appeared in person or as a network feature over practically every station in the West," said Murray, as the popular duo was interviewed in KFRC's studios. But back to the story:

Murray and Harris were born only twenty miles apart. Murray's introduction into the world took place in west Concord, Minnesota, just twenty-seven years ago, while just a few months later Harris took his first bow in Rochester, Minnesota. Neither met nor heard of each other until thirteen years later, when they met on the baseball diamond on their opposing grammar school teams. That was the first of a series of meetings as strange as you'd expect to find in a fiction story.

Both graduated from grammar school the same spring. Fall found them registered together at Pillsbury Military Academy at Owatonna, Minnesota. Harris had a flare for writing plays and it naturally followed that he was soon producing the school's entertainments. Murray

proved adept at writing and arranging the musical part of the programs.

When military school days were over, the boys were again separated—Harris to go to the famous Mayo Clinic at Rochester to study surgery, and Murray to Carlton College at Northfield Minnesota. His ambition was to become an electrical engineer. His interests turned to radio and

while still in school he designed, built and managed the college broadcasting station, which is still operating just as Murray built it. The station, KFMX, was the first college-operated broadcaster in the country.

Meanwhile, Harris, after two and a half years at Mayo's, decided that he liked producing and acting in musical shows much better than he did removing appendices, gall stones, and adenoids. He toured the West as a musical comedy producer and did fairly well at it.

Murray got his B. A. degree at Carlton and promptly migrated to Chicago, where he

utilized his college training to play the trombone in Art Landry's orchestra. About that time he received word that his mother, who was in Los Angeles, was ill. He hurried West and while in Los Angeles was offered a post as announcer at KFI. He stayed.

Another meeting between Murray and Harris was inevitable, for Harris had turned his talents to the beckoning charms of radio. He, too, had migrated westward and was then barnstorming stations on the Pacific Coast. When he hit KFI he naturally ran into his old friend and co-producer. They immediately sat down and recounted their experiences since school days and decided to team up.

Murray and Harris were an instant success on the air. A combination of their individual talents was bound to be. Both could sing well. Harris was clever at producing comedy and continuity. Murray played a number of instruments extremely well and was good at writing and arranging music. They appeared over stations up and down the coast, the former American Broadcasting Chain, the National Company's network, and finally, KFRC, where they have been delighting audiences during the Jamboree and Manhattan Reflections programs. They have also gained a wide following as the Benchbrook Boys.

Married? No, boys say they have been too busy thus far to pay any serious attention to the opposite sex.

Hobbies? Murray's chief delight is amateur radio. Harris turns to gardening for his relaxation.



MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Ferde Grofe, one of the country's foremost arrangers and composers who is responsible for the majority of the beautiful arrangements heard from Paul Whiteman's orchestra, is a conductor in his own right, but looks more like a business man wielding the baton than a musician.

• • • Freddie Rich and Abe Lyman, both Columbia orchestra leaders, have had a common experience. Freddie in 1926 and Abe in 1929 took bands to Europe to play play a four-week engagement. Both remained seven months without a week's lay-off, so well were they received.

• • • Presaging a new era in the relationships of the United States with the Orient, KNX has been requested by the Broadcasting Corporation of Japan, through Yutaka Itow, its chief engineer, to grant permission to the Japanese Company to re-broadcast all programs emanating from the Hollywood station.

• • • Carlton Bowman, youthful Denver tenor, is the third singer to leave the KOA staff and go to New York to become a member of the famous Seth Parker radio troupe heard every Sunday over a National Broadcasting Company coast-to-coast network.

The other two singers, both of whom were heard regularly over KOA before leaving Denver, are Norman Price, tenor, and Edward Wolter, baritone.

• • • Art Lindsay, new announcer on KFI-KECA, was formerly with the National Broadcasting Company in San Francisco, and a member of the Announcers' Quartet there. He is 29 years old, tall, and easy-going.

• • • Jerry Herst came to KJBS as an announcer. No one even suspected that he could sing, until one day he was asked to help out in a vocal trio.

"I've never tried to," he replied, "but I'll take a chance." He took the chance and now is heard in songs and patter with Frank Galvin every Sunday afternoon.

• • • A new organization, known as the Eight O'Clock Players, has started a weekly broadcast of famous plays from 8 to 9 o'clock every Sunday evening over station KLX, Oakland. Everett Glass, well-known bay region director, prominent members of the University of California Little Theatre and well-known actors of the East Bay, have organized the group for the purpose of producing worthwhile plays over the air.

• • • It isn't necessary to be a former Indianapolis man to get on KTM's staff. Still, it helps. Indianapolis is represented by C. B. Juneau, production manager; Mayfield Kaylor, continuity head; R. E. Deardorff of the commercial staff; F. E. Barnecko, night host; and David Carlyle, tenor.

• • • Gerda Lundberg, the Swedish nightingale, is back in the studio after a prolonged absence, due to an appendix operation! Gerda may have lost her appendix, but she has lost none of her charm or vocal abilities!

• • • Andy Young of Andy and Chester broadcasting fame returns to the studio microphone of KMTR following an extended illness which made it impossible for him to keep his 1:15 p. m. program. This program is popularly known as "Andy and Chester" the Banjo Kings. Andy is also starting a KMTR polo team. His penchant for riding has been his hobby and now, despite the reported depression, Andy has acquired a young polo pony which he keeps at a local stable. In keeping with this latest addition, he is now specializing in a banjo arrangement of "The Old Grey Mare."

• • • Gus Arnheim, whose orchestra is one of the three celebrated musical organizations to be featured in the New Lucky Strike Dance Hour Series, broadcast over the NBC coast-to-coast network, was once the piano player in a band at Los Angeles' famous Coconut Grove, where he now presides as leader. Sophie Tucker, "last of the red-hot mamas," discovered him and took him on a vaudeville tour. The first song he ever wrote was "Sweet Sue."

• • • It's almost as difficult to break into radio as it is into the movies, according to Harrison Holliday, KFRC manager.

During the past four years, says Mr. Holliday, more than 225 auditions have been held. A conservative estimate of the number of hopeful singers, monologists, musicians, and announcers who have tried for a microphone job totals well over the 4000 mark. 



... RADIO NEWS ...

DESPITE the fact that a number of television stations are broadcasting regular programs and that thousands of receiving sets already are in use, leaders in the radio industry are not yet prepared either to say definitely that television is here on a perfected basis or that it, like prosperity is "just around the corner."

Efforts to determine the exact status of television meet with so many varying responses as to bewilder the earnest seeker after knowledge. From some quarters comes the claim that television as it is now broadcast is so near perfection as to affirmatively answer the question whether it is here, from other students is heard the belief that it will be perfected within a year or eighteen months, while still others say there is no telling when it will be perfected, but it certainly has not yet reached that stage.

Those who refuse to accept the view that television as it now is will be the television of the future base their views on two grounds, the first that present television requires entirely too wide a frequency band and the second that the disc method is too difficult to permit the production of "fool proof" sets such as are now offered for broadcasting.

The width of the band required, it is pointed out, is such as arbitrarily to limit the number of stations which can operate simultaneously, and thus offers the greatest handicap to popular distribution. In order to have nation-wide television it will be necessary, as in nation-wide broadcasting, to have facilities for a sufficient number of stations to cover the entire country and to afford a choice of programs, it is claimed. In this respect, it is alleged, television is but little better than was broadcasting in the early days of the crystal set—by holding your breath you might get something, but stations were few and there was little, if any, choice of programs.

The other objection centers about the necessity of finding some substitute for the revolving disc which will require no skill on the part of the receiving set owner to bring in a program properly. Devices to supplant the disc are now being developed.

Blurry, jumpy programs, it is held, have no place in television, as they have no place in broadcasting, and the television set for popular use must be so built as to enable the reception of a clear, continuous program with the same simplicity as a broadcast feature now is tuned in.

THE new KJBS transmitter at San Francisco will be put on permanent operating basis Sunday, November 15, Ralph Brunton, general manager, announced today.


The KJBS transmitter is said to be of the most modern and efficient type in America. Among other advantages it gives 100 per cent modulation, multiplied effectiveness with no increase in power, greatly improved all-around efficiency, and is a model of artistic achievement.

The station continues to operate with a maximum power of 100 watts but, with modulation increased from less than 60 to 100 per cent, listeners will receive the station's signals several times louder. This also means practically perfect transmission of every audible sound picked up by the microphone. These improvements eliminate many so-called "dead spots" or areas in which the station could not be properly received.

The new transmitting apparatus is the latest type Western Electric and is installed in the station's headquarters at 1380 Bush Street, and is open for inspection to the public throughout the day.

Additional features of the new equipment are that it gives uniform frequency response and passes all frequencies in the audible range. High and low notes, sibilants, and certain other sounds heretofore received indistinctly are transmitted perfectly. It includes latest refinement in crystal control apparatus to hold the station on its assigned wavelength, giving increased frequency stability. The control room is provided with glass observation windows so visitors may observe apparatus functioning without endangering themselves.

This work, it is estimated, gives KJBS the most advanced transmitter equipment of its power rating in America.




