TELEVISION IN THEATERS

PLANS for the introduction of television through the motion picture houses, in a desperate endeavor to secure some of the early profits before traveling "shows," already beginning to appear on the road, kill the business, are being laid in New York.

Unable, apparently, to fit television into the regular theatrical pattern, motion picture interests are understood to be preparing to adopt this new form of entertainment as an adjunct to, but not a part of, their daily performances by providing television showings in theater lobbies which also may be picked up on home sets soon to come into the market.

Long consideration by the theatrical industry has failed to develop any plan to adapt television to the ordinary motion picture screen, and some doubts are being expressed that it ever will be suitable for regular performances in theaters, although originally hailed as a possible solution of the problem of motion picture distribution.

Information now reaching Washington indicates that a prominent corporation is negotiating with two important theater circuits with a view to having television sets used in lobbies or in special "television rooms" in theaters to entertain patrons waiting for seats.

Special transmitters will be used which can pick up the pictures on the screen or show special films, and the programs also could be picked up on home receivers which the company is preparing to market.

Another development in the television field within the past few weeks has been the planning of numerous traveling units which would set up "demonstrations" or television shows in important towns at a flat admission charge. Traveling "demonstrations" much resembling the early itinerant motion picture shows are already in the field, but the organization back of the new plan would offer a "de luxe" exhibition.

Simultaneously with announcement of plans for the practical application of television comes information from Boston that Hollis Baird of the Shortwave and Television Corporation has developed a white light for television which it is claimed brings the long desired freedom from pink pictures, a revolutionary advance in the television art.

Television is a question of light, pure and simple, for it consists solely of pictures drawn with light. In the wonder of how a picture can be successfully broken up into elements and then reassembled again, the idea that television is fundamentally a question of light sources has been forgotten and merrily the discussion of mechanical versus cathode ray television has gone on. The two latter things should be considered beyond their scanning systems. If we consider the light itself, the possibilities of future television become more easily conceived.

This new light now gives commercial home television its first white pictures. This step was thought to be several years off. Instead, it is already here.

Mrs. O. B. W., Lompoc.—Sarah Kreindler has been off the air for a number of months but is



SILHOUETTES

AGATHA TURLEY, KPO's Irish soprano, became a singer by chance.

It was during a party at her home in Belfast that the idea of becoming a vocal star first occurred to her. With a group of other colleens, Agatha, although she bears a Greek name is a daughter of the auld sod, was singing and her voice attracted so much attention, and the praise that was bestowed upon her caused her to think seriously of studying singing. She immediately foresook the violin, the instrument of her first choice, and took lessons in voice with a German tutor, who entered her in the Feis Ceol Singing Contest at Dublin after several months of training. It was not strange that she won not only the cup symbolic of the best voice in Ireland, but the gold medal for interpretation as well, for her voice is one of exquisite texture, a similar honor won by the great John McCormack when he was a struggling youth in search of fame.

Since that occasion Miss Turley has never had to pay for a singing lesson. She has made her way by winning various scholarships.

Her first public appearances on the concert stage were made in Belfast and Dublin. Later she was billed to tour with John McCormack, both having the same teacher, but an attack of appendicitis prevented.

Although Miss Turley likes best to sing the songs of her native isle, she has appeared

in over thirty-three operas in both America and Europe and has won exceptional praise from the musical critics.

A peculiarity in her work is that she likes to sing songs arranged by Herbert Hughes, because she says "they are so discordant and very difficult to follow." In that Miss Tur-

ley means that to the unmusical ear they would sound discordant and uninteresting, but to her they are intriguing, and she evidently enjoys the mastering of them.

That Miss Turley should take to music is not unusual, for her mother was a noted contralto of Belfast, and her father, James Turley, is the conductor of the choir of St. Mary's Cathedral there. Besides playing the violin and singing Miss Turley is proficient on the piano and has composed many songs, notable among them her "Mo-

Buacail Dub" (My Black-haired Boy) and "An Irish Lullaby," both songs carrying the lilting, tuneful rhythm so predominant in Irish music.

Golf is her hobby. She won the mixed doubles cup for the North of Ireland in 1927. Sounds like a tennis racket, but golf goes that way in Ireland. They don't have "birdies," either—it's "bogey."

Four years ago Miss Turley was confidential secretary to C. W. Woodman, Minister of Appeals for the Northern Government of Ireland, proving that the little singing star is equally at home in the business world as in the field of singing.

LET those who aspire to a radio career and feel that it's all in the "breaks" you get take heart. Robert Olsen, KFRC tenor, was persuaded by friends to go up to the old KFRC studios in the Sherman Clay Building and try out. He was totally unknown. Harrison Hollaway heard him and he has been a featured performer on KFRC ever since. And that was over five years ago.

Olsen had been in the wholesale grocery business before he knocked timidly at the door of radio and was admitted. Music was a side-line. He began to do a little singing when he was ten years old and participated in the usual school entertainments. After High School he took a commercial course. Evenings he spent practicing or singing at lodge gatherings and en-

tertainments of all sorts. Sometimes he was paid a little something for his efforts, but not often.

His first triumph was in 1914 at the old Majestic Theatre in the Mission, when, at the age of 19, against a field of twenty-two aspirants, he won a nickle cup for drawing the most applause from the audiences on three successive nights. Bob still has the cup, though it isn't in very good condition.

Robert Nelson, which is his real name, was born right here in San Francisco, out in what was then called the Noe Valley, next door to Governor Rolph's house. San Francisco has always been his home town. When he was 21 he married Muriel Walsh, who was just 17. Parents objected and so they eloped. After the ceremony they wandered all over California on a honeymoon until a dearth of finances brought them home again. They have two children, a girl twelve and a boy thirteen.

Next to music Bob has always been very fond of sports of all kinds. He played baseball in school. You can often find him at the ball games in the afternoon.

He is a friendly and obliging man, and very conscientious. He will go to almost any length in serving his radio audience, in the matter of requests, for example. He has made Victor records for the past two years. One of his hobbies is gardening.

PAUL WHITEMAN sleeps but four hours a night. He insists that this amount of sleep is sufficient for a mature person in good health. He cites Thomas

Edison as an example of a great brain existing on that amount of sleep.

The King of Jazz arises every morning at 6:30; takes a swim in the pool of the Edgewater Beach Hotel, Chicago, where he is playing; exercises for twenty minutes in their gymnasium, and then eats his breakfast of a double order of grapefruit juice, a double order of thin, unbuttered toast, and two cups of black coffee.

He is at his office in the Chicago studios of the National Broadcasting Company every day but Sunday at exactly 9:00 o'clock. His duties as musical supervisor usually occupy his time until 1:00 o'clock. From 1:30 until 3:30 the Dean of Modern Music is usually to be found in the audition room, and 3:30 until 4:00 o'clock finds Whiteman busy looking over the latest output of the music publishing firms.


Then home in his car, which he drives himself. It is of the least expensive make. A dinner of grapefruit served in halves on lettuce leaves, perhaps a broiled lean chop, a bit of cabbage or other green, a piece of fruit for dessert, a demi-tasse, and the King is off to a corner with a book. Sometimes he varies this routine with a game of chess or checkers, in which he is inordinately skillful.

At 8:00 he is usually reviewing the news of the day with the many newspapermen that like to drop in the Whiteman suite for an after dinner smoke. Everything and everybody is analyzed, taken apart, put together again, and fully discussed. The radio men make Whiteman's apartment their headquarters as they pick up his tips on the trends in modern music.

At 9:00 or 9:30 he is at work planning his radio programs and conferring with his announcers. At 10:00 he is hard at work directing his band at the Edgewater Beach Hotel. At 2:00 the dancing ceases and that is Whiteman's favorite time for a rehearsal of half an hour.

And so to bed for a rather well-earned four hours. Sleep well, Big Fellow!





MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Publicity folk generally are pictured as telling the world about everything, but two members of NBC's Press Relations department in San Francisco proved their ability to keep a secret, and are being congratulated for it.

For ten weeks Miss Marie Elbs and Milton Samuel sat at adjoining desks, writing stories about radio artists and maintaining the everyday relationship of a business office, and not one of their fellow members in the department guessed they were married.

The ceremony took place at Lake Tahoe on September 5. The bride and groom returned without telling a soul of the event, and did not divulge it until November 14 at the NBC party in honor of the opening of the engagement of NBC's Mahlon Merrick and the Vagabonds at the Palace Hotel. Lloyd E. Yoder, manager of the Press Relations department, first to be taken into their confidence, announced the marriage, and while a spotlight played upon the young people, Merrick and the Vagabonds interpolated the Wedding March in the midst of a dance number.

• • • That famous girl trio, the Three Co-Eds, under the new name of "The Bluettes," will be heard over KHJ on the Resinol program "Hollywood Gossip" with Radie Harris.

For five and one-half years these girls, Meredith Gregor, Marian Peck and Theresa Aezer, have been singing together. There were only four or five such trios in New York when they reached that city in 1927. They antedated the Girl Friends. After singing in the RKO and Loew circuits and at the Publix theatres, they appeared for two years on KFI programs, and now will be featured regularly at KHJ. They have broadcast from many cities and are all native daughters of the Golden West.

• • • Miss Dorothy Collins has joined the KTM sales staff to handle beauty shop, interior decorators, and home furnishings accounts. She was formerly a professional interior decorator in exclusive Pasadena and Los Angeles shops.

• • • How much variety of entertainment does a large chain station offer its listeners during the daily eighteen hours on the air? Harrison Holliway, KFRC manager, estimates that the Don Lee station during the daily period offers an average of 47 different vocalists, 18 different bands and orchestras, 14 different announcers, and 7 different plays or skits.

This does not include the special reporting of news events, sports talks, interviews, reports of athletic contests, etc.

• • • Winnie Parker and Don Ricardo, low-voiced artists of KFI-KECA count their radio fans as far as the cocoanut isles. They have received appreciative letters from the Hawaii Radio Club. And now down in Tahiti, they hear from two American girls who are running a plantation, taking a stop-over on a "bum" around the world. Just to keep up on the best tunes of the day they regularly tune in when Parker is on the air.

• • • John Kennedy, formerly engineer with KMTR, has been transferred to KMCS in Inglewood. Kennedy is well known for his connections with the British Navy, where he served during the war as a lieutenant. He was also aide to the Prince of Wales during his war service.

• • • Dorothy Lewis, contralto of KPO, has been missing from the KPO air lanes for several weeks owing to the serious illness of her mother. Miss Lewis was called hurriedly to Portland, her home city, but will return in several weeks. Her place has been taken by Margaret O'Dea, well known local contralto. Miss O'Dea will remain at KPO, so that on the return of Miss Lewis, dialers of KPO will have the privilege of hearing both of them regularly.

• • • Al Pearce and his KFRC Happy-Go-Lucky gang honor all married couples over seventy-five years of age with emblems for Silver, Gold, and Diamond Wedding anniversaries.

About fifteen hundred married couples have written in and claimed the Happy-Go-Lucky emblems.

• • • Margit Hegedus, young violinist extraordinary of KHJ, who was said to have been playing at that station for ten years, has actually been there a year. The slip was due to the utter neglect of Hungarian in the otherwise versatile publicity department. Miss Hegedus has been in America for a decade.

• • • John W. Holbrook, New York NBC announcer, was awarded the 1931 radio diction medal of the American Academy of Arts and Letters.

Holbrook, 25-year-old Bostonian, received the award at an academy meeting in New York. Hamlin Garland, chairman of the academy's radio committee, made the award in the presence of President Nicholas Murray Butler and others. Garland said Holbrook's voice combined "the best English and American English," and commended his taste, pronunciation, grace and authority.

"In making our third award we have found the decision more difficult for the reason that the general level of announcers has risen," Garland added.

Honorable mention was given David Ross of the Columbia Broadcasting System; William Abernathy, Washington NBC studios; and Sen Kaney, Chicago NBC studios.

• • • Although but twenty-one years old, George "Bud" Fisher, daytime KMTR announcer, brings to the microphone a "nose for news," developed on a San Francisco newspaper. It is generally conceded that young Fisher's knowledge of what the public wants to read make it possible for him to inject interesting comments into broadcasts, thereby supplying the radio public what it wants to hear.

• • • Paul Pitman, former "Big Brother" for KPO, is now identified as Managing Director of the Forum, an Oakland club which corresponds with the Commonwealth Club in San Francisco. Pitman's headquarters are in the Hotel Oakland.

• • • Maria de la Pena, handsome daughter of Old Mexico, in two short years has identified herself as one of the leading interpreters of old Spanish songs in Los Angeles. To the strum of her own guitar she sings lilting folk songs of Spain and Mexico to listeners of KFI-KECA. Miss de la Pena is twenty years of age. Radio marks her first professional work.

• • • On the door of Bob Bowman's busy office at KGB is lettered "Program Director." But if the truth were told—and Bob's other duties at KGB were inscribed on the glass—a larger door would be necessary. "Program Director" is an inclusive title, for Bob is: "Program Director, Chief Announcer, Publicity Director, Production Manager, and Continuity Writer." In his radio past, Bob has been violinist, technician, and announcer in stations in the East and on the Pacific Coast.

• • • Anne Olander, of the charming contralto voice, featured as assisting artist with J. Warde Hutton's Concert Ensemble in their twice weekly CDLBS program from KGB, San Diego, may be titled "artist" in several different branches. In addition to developing her lovely voice, she has mastered oil painting, etching, the making of wood block prints and bas-relief wood plaques. For those romantically minded we might add that the charming Anne is also Mrs. Dick Rickard.

• • • Albert Gillette, former baritone star of KPO is now Director of Programs for KGW, Portland. Word from the north indicates that the KPO favorite of several years ago is enjoying unrivalled success as the helmsman of KGW's programs.

• • • Richard Davis, tenor soloist with KFI-KECA, wins an admiring audience through the pure, unadorned manner of his delivery. (Fourteen years of solo work in various churches of the country explains this.)

• • • Liborius Hauptman, KTM's staff pianist for the little symphony, and former music director at KGW, has the habit of crossing his legs when he plays the piano. . . . wagging time with one foot and using the other one for the pedal.

• • • The new announcing voice of the KGB staff belongs to Talbert Morgan, who hails from "Birmingham, Alabama, suh!" His past involves Stanford University and Washington and Lee University. His present and future revolves around radio. Tal has attained no little fame as a writer of popular song lyrics, his "You Qualify" being slated for early publication. "Another Day" and "Fifty-Fifty Love," featured on Anson Weeks' CDLBS programs, were also worded by this young Southerner.







Cecil and Sally in "The Funniest Things." Who with the air audience has caused S and W they will be heard over

A LITTLE less than two and a half years ago an almost unknown boy and girl made their appearance on the air over the American Broadcasting Chain in a 20-minute skit called "The Funniest Things." Today this young couple share the affections of millions of radio listeners throughout the United States, Canada, Australia, New Zealand and even far-away Africa. It seems almost needless to state that their names are Johnny Patrick and Helen Troy, known and loved by the air audience as "Cecil and Sally."

As this is written, plans have been completed for Cecil and Sally to be heard "in person" nightly over the newly formed "Gold" network of the National Broadcasting Company, which includes stations KPO and KYA, San Francisco; KECA, Los Angeles; KFSD, San Diego; KJR, Seattle; KEX, Portland, and KGA, Spokane. They will immediately go on KPO, KECA, and KFSD, KJR and KGA, and as soon as the time is available, will be heard upon the remainder of the "Gold" network stations. Their "in person" appearance, which will originate in the studios of NBC in San Francisco, will supplant the electrical transcriptions of "The Funniest Things," which have been released in the past over these stations, excepting KPO, which has broadcast them "in person" for the past two years.

The beginning of "Cecil and Sally" dates back to two and a half years ago. Johnny, who had been singing regularly over the now defunct ABC network from KYA, was

given a nightly 20-minute "spot" to fill. The idea of a nightly skit portraying the lives, loves and laughter of an average young American boy and girl had been formulating in the back of his mind for a long time. He telephoned Helen.

"How would you like to play the part of a giggling girl in a nightly skit I am going to put on the air?" he asked her.

"I'm not a very good giggler," Helen replied over the phone. "Why don't you make it a little harder and have me lisp, too?"

"A swell idea!" replied Cecil. And so what Helen suggested jokingly as an added task for herself has been her lot ever since the opening night of "The Funniest Things."

When financial difficulties overtook the ABC network and it was dissolved, Cecil and Sally had gained such a tremendous popularity among the radio audience that they were immediately offered a place at KPO. But Washington and Oregon listeners, who had enjoyed them via the ABC chain stations in the Northwest, soon made it apparent that if they were not to hear their nightly

episode of "The Funniest Things" they would tear their radios apart and use them for firewood. Anyway, the demand for Cecil and Sally was so tremendous that it was decided to make recordings of their act and release it in that manner to stations otherwise unable to broadcast it. Within a short time, more than 50 stations throughout the United States had subscribed to the recording service. Just recently, the sponsors of Amos and Andy signally honored Cecil and

Cecil and Sally (we just can't get around to calling them Johnny and Helen) are as human and lovable away from the studio as they are on the air. Fame and no small fortune has spoiled them not one bit. They both admit a "timidity complex" and for this reason make no public appearances. For the same reason, they allow no visitors in the studio when they broadcast.

They both like to get away from crowds and the noise of the city and at every opportunity hie themselves away to the ranch of their friend and admirer, Bill Hart, former movie two-gun man and now retired on a great ranch in Southern California.

Upon a recent visit, Hart presented his two young friends with twin German police puppies. "Sally named hers 'Bill' in honor of Mr. Hart," says Cecil, "but I named mine Nero. I guess guess you know why?" "Do you ever get 'mash' notes from your listeners?" we asked.



Vincent Leahy, advertising manager of the company, S & W has during the past four years brought radio audiences a series of consistently high-in-entertainment value programs. Hugh Barrett Dobbs, now one of radio's outstanding personalities, gained his first fame as director of the S & W Morning Exercise period. Others who have been brought to

the air by the company are Charlie Hamp, Charlie Wellman, Tom Mitchell, Barbara Blanchard, Kenya Bill, E. Harold Dana, Eva Gruninger Atkinson and the popular S & W Quartet. Cecil and Sally "in person" over the NBC chain marks another forward step in the activities of S & W to bring radio audiences worthwhile radio entertainment. Tune in on "The Funniest Things" any night except Sunday and we believe you will agree with us that S & W has succeeded—*admirably!*

AL PEARCE WELCOMES MORTON DOWNEY TO SAN FRANCISCO



When Morton Downey, Columbia network star, arrived in San Francisco en route to Los Angeles with Mayor Walker and his party on November 24, Al Pearce, genial Happy-Go-Lucky director, was one of the party which met him at the Ferry Building. Al was there to invite the song star to be a guest at the Happy-Go-Lucky Hour. Downey appeared on the following afternoon, November 25.

FAILURE of the Davis amendment to the radio law to bring about parity of broadcasting facilities among the States may result in further revision of the statute so as to provide for equitable distribution of facilities on the basis of receiving-set ownership.

Under the present law the country is divided into five zones, each of which theoretically is to have the same amount of broadcasting facilities. The result is that a compact zone with highly congested population and a widespread zone with small, scattered population are supposed to have the same facilities for radio reception.

The last census of population included a count of families owning receiving sets and developed some information which it is declared tends to make the Davis method of

equalization less desirable. It showed, for instance, in the view of many observers, that in some areas the percentage of radio owners was materially less than in others and, further, that this difference was not entirely accounted for by the ease or difficulty of securing reception but, to large extent, by economic and literate standards, density of population, and other factors.

With concrete information as to set ownership available for the first time, a demand is springing up for a new distribution of facilities which will take these various factors into consideration.

Technical as well as human problems have been encountered in the distribution of facilities in accordance with the Davis amendment, engineers assert, some of which, involving laws of radio at variance with those enacted by Congress, have tended to nullify its effect. Much has been learned about radio since Congress undertook to regulate the art. Some of this information indicates that radio waves are not entirely amenable to legislation and laws of nature cannot be repealed. Congress, therefore, will have to bow to the inevitable and frame its legislation to meet conditions as they exist and not as they ought to be.


