RADIO AIDS AND HINDERS LAW

USE of radio by violators of the prohibition, narcotic and customs laws, encountered by undercover agents of the Department of Justice engaged in attempting to stamp out the liquor, "dope" and smuggling rings of the country during the past year has added materially to the difficulties and dangers of an already hard and hazardous task.

On the other hand, however, Federal operatives seeking to apprehend violators of the radio law have succeeded in several instances, by listening in on messages from unlicensed stations, in uncovering new leads to bootleggers, rum runners and drug sellers.

Twenty-one cases involving violations of the radio act, chiefly operation of transmitters without station licenses or operators' licenses, often in connection with other offenses, were handled by the department during the past year, in some of which penalties running as heavy as three years' imprisonment have been imposed by the courts.

Radio equipment of high quality, expertly set up by operating without the formality of a license, recently played an important part in the apprehension of members of a liquor ring operating along the Atlantic coast. Complaints of interference from an unidentified station were received in Washington and resulted in an investigation under the radio act, with no suspicion that it might lead to anything more serious. Listening in on the station with a view to tracing its location, however, Federal agents discovered that it

was sending in code. After patient, arduous effort, the Government men succeeded in "breaking" the code, and found that the station was communicating with liquor-laden vessels several miles at sea, notifying them when it was safe to come inshore and directing them where to meet the small boats which would transfer their cargo.

By the use of directional apparatus, the Government agents finally succeeded in locating the station amid a group of sand dunes along a deserted stretch of coast. A raid was staged and the station was taken over. It was found to include an excellently constructed, powerful transmitter and all the equipment necessary for the operation of a first-class radio station.

While the Government operatives were in possession of the station, it became known to them that some of the ring's vessels were offshore. Sitting down before the set, one of the agents, in the ring's own code, sent instructions to the ships to proceed at once to a designated point, where, of course, they were met by other Federal men and taken over.

While in this instance a radio violation aided the Government in bagging larger game, there are other times where they served to circumvent operatives, as in the case of a group in the West when, discovering that Federal agents were about to raid one of their depots, a radio message from an unlicensed station served to foil the attempt, the agents, upon reaching their goal, finding that their birds had flown.



SILHOUETTES

WHEN radio actors gather in a corner of the studio and discuss the good old days when they were more familiar with grease paint than microphones, Henry Shumer, gray-haired, boyish-hearted member of NBC's National Players in San Francisco, is apt to smile quietly to himself.

Thirty-six years of stock companies and road attractions have passed lightly over Shumer's head—and he's not so old as you might suppose from that. For he started his career when he was just fifteen years old, and if you exclaim in surprise when he tells you so, he probably will add, in an offhand manner—

"But I was a circus acrobat for four years before that!"

Born in Detroit, Michigan, Shumer and two older brothers were enthusiastic members of the local Turnverein's junior organization before they started to school. So adept at gymnastics did they become that the summer when Henry reached his eleventh year, Robinson's Circus, which was starting out on tour, carried the three young acrobats along. For four successive summers they overcame parental objections and traveled with the circus, returning to their school-rooms each fall. Then a serious injury suffered by Henry's older brother, closed that chapter for good.

A taste of what it meant to win applause from an audience had decided the boy's destiny, however, and in the autumn following his last cir-

cus tour, he obtained a juvenile rôle in a Detroit stock company, and he has been acting ever since.

As long as his stage work did not interfere with his son's education the elder Shumer didn't object. Born in Germany, in a small town where, in the pleasant manner of the time and place, the entire population sang, danced, recited, and produced amateur

theatricals in a community spirit, the NBC actor's father had no small amount of talent himself. Years later, when Henry became one of the best known character actors of the Pacific Coast, he patterned many a German-dialect rôle after his gentle, humorous, kindly father.

Shumer has played more than 1300 parts on the stage in the thirty-six years he spent behind the footlights.

Some of the stars whom he supported in character parts were Nance O'Neill, Marjorie Rambeau, Belle Bennett, Leo Carillo, Pauline Lord, Otis Skinner, and Andrew Mack. David Belasco appointed him director of the Alcazar Theater productions when the late dean of American producers was a young San Francisco manager. When Belasco moved on to the East, Shumer stayed in the West.

"It always has appealed to me as a better home for the actor than anywhere else in the world," says Shumer. "For anyone who wants to play characters, San Francisco is the richest mine in the world. I used to ride back and forth on the ferryboats, studying faces, expressions and voices I could use in my characterizations on the stage, and I still get a thrill when I can reproduce before my mirror, some facial expression I have noticed in a passer-by."

Radio, Shumer finds, is just as plastic a medium, although the voice is its only channel, as the theater. Just now, he admits, he gets more fun out of "visualizing vocally" the somewhat baffled modern parent, Mr. Curtis, in "Keeping Up With Daughter," human-interest serial which is broadcast Wednesday morning over the NBC-KGO network. He is also interlocutor on the El Sidelo Minstrels program Saturday nights as well as taking parts in other NBC dramas.

A BUSINESS trip taken by their father was the prime factor in starting the Boswells on their radio careers. If Mr. Boswell had not left New Orleans for Florida on an extended trip some six years ago, the Boswell sisters might still be playing stately minuets and sedate classical selections on that time-honored trio of strings—the violin, cello, and piano. But the train had hardly left the station, carrying with it their stern musical mentor, when the three volatile girls—Connie, Martha, and Vet—laid aside the trappings of classicality and took up a more congenial set of instruments. With Connie playing the sax, Vet the banjo, and Martha the piano, the "St. Louis Blues" replaced the melodies of Brahms.

With the discovery of popular rhythms came the desire to sing the tunes they played, and from this transition emerged the Boswell Sisters, specialists in vocal harmonies which have brought them fame and fortune through their broadcasts over the Columbia network.

The girls are three-quarters French, and were reared in a home rich with the cultural tradition of old New Orleans. Both parents were musicians, and the girls began their musical studies when hardly out of the cradle.

Coöperation has been their byword since they began to play together as babies. Since only a year separates each from the other—Martha is oldest, Connie next, and then Vet—they have always done everything together. Once the art school which they attended held a Christmas pos-

ter contest. Although each of the sisters was proficient in her particular line, no single one had the all-around ability to produce a prize-winning poster. So while Connie conceived the idea, Vet did the actual drawing and Martha contributed the lettering and borders. Needless to say, their poster brought home the prize. It has been just this spirit of coöperation which

has enabled them to garner prizes ever since.

All during their school days the Boswells appeared at various home-town entertainments. Before long New Orleans began to sit up and take notice, for here were three beautiful youngsters who could play the old classics, set feet tapping to "hot" rhythms, vocalize expertly, and even write their own songs. Thus, even their stern father could only nod his head in approval when he returned from Florida.

Their first professional appearances were in vaudeville houses in and around New

Orleans. Through stage contacts they became acquainted with the microphone and quickly became great air favorites in the South. On September 14, 1928, the Boswells left the South to accept a six weeks' engagement in Chicago. The cool reception which awaited these young unknowns on their arrival in the big city contrasted strangely with the enthusiastic ovations they received once they had been heard. All theatre-going Chicago realized that these pretty-dark-haired Southern girls were capable of producing vocal harmonies which were different from anything they had ever heard.

After touring the Middle West, the girls settled down in San Francisco to devote themselves almost exclusively to radio and movie work. They first broadcast over a nationwide network as guest artists on the California Melodies program coming from Los Angeles over the Columbia chain. In June of this year they joined Columbia's ranks for a series of three-a-week sustaining programs.

The delightful harmonies produced by the Boswells were quickly and enthusiastically approved by the radio public, and the sister team soon took its place as one of the outstanding features on the air. In August, just before they left for an extensive vaudeville tour of the West, the Boswells were engaged by the Baker Bar firm for the series of broadcasts which they are now presenting every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday at 7:30 p. m., Eastern standard time, for Eastern listeners, and again at 8:45 p. m., Pacific standard time, for Western radio fans.

A CLOSE-UP OF MICHAEL RAFFETTO

MY first impression of Michael Raffetto was—“Oh, what a morose fellow. I shall never get a word out of him. He'll put me off with a weary roll-your-own-

hoop, young lady, and let me be—and not until hours afterward would I be able to think what I should have said. He was sunk deep in a chair, his chin hiding his cravat and his arms folded across his chest like that picture of Beethoven which hung above the piano (for inspiration's sake) when I was a little girl struggling with arpeggios and scales. And then the gracious hostess presented him and he bowed low, the way foreigners do in the movies, and his voice, when he uttered the usual formalities, gave me a genuine thrill. I knew instantly that my fears had been unfounded.

Presently we discovered we had mutual friends—Monty, why Monty is almost like one of the family, and Mary and Dick—and Dave? Why, Dave's my brother. You knew him at college? Well, well—such a small world. All we need now is for you to turn out to be the son of the famous innkeeper at Placerville. His name is Raffetto. You are? Why, then I know all about you. Monty has told us simply oodles of things. That's where he goes each summer to write, isn't it? He calls your father's hotel the most famous landmark in California. Is it still there and does your father still own it? It's a good thing we are not on the air with the romantic, stern Mr. Cope timing us.

The famous Placerville inn is in its accustomed place. There is a modern hostelry not far away, operated by Michael's brother, but Mr. Raffetto senior still holds forth at his old desk and plays the genial host to the “old-timers” who will have naught to do with fancy “trappin's.” They want their gold-rush dreams, and Mr. Raffetto is in no mood to retire. Everything works out to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Michael is the second son in a family of three boys and one girl. His grandfather, an Italian, settled out here in the early days, and Michael's father grew up in the Placerville region. The maternal side of the house was originally English and Irish.



As a youngster, Michael received violin instruction, but he reverses music too much, he says to play AT it, and, feeling that he was not a BORN musician, he studied law when he entered the university. Upon graduation he took an office in San Francisco, had a sedate attorney-at-law printed on the door, and practiced being severe. He can be, oh, so legal. I should hate to face him in court if he were not on my side, for with all his charming manner there is a merciless glint 'way back in his coal black eyes, and his mind works like lightning.

Well, the law business lost its flavor after a while and the wanderlust crept into his bones. He thought it would be interesting to see if Honolulu was as wonderful as its chamber of commerce proclaimed it to be, and one day the neat letters came off the door and Michael was on the blue Pacific. He found the islands enchanting. So enchanting in fact that he could not bear to settle down to a given routine, and when he discovered he could write several columns for a local newspaper without giving up his pleasures, well, that was true adventure.

Dramatics had always intrigued him. He had been quite active in campus productions and with time on his hands he gravitated theaterward. Soon he was “helping out” here and there back stage and in no time at all he had become the star of the then only stock company in Honolulu. When the company broke up he returned to San Francisco, played for a season or two at Wilkes, had an opportunity to work in pictures at Hollywood, finished his contract there, and then took over the position of dramatic director at the University of California.

Radio began to beckon about the latter part of 1929, and now he has no time for wanderlust or blue funks or legal matters. In addition to his appearance in the dramas, he writes all the continuity for the NBC Matinee, acts as master of ceremonies on that program, and reels off the “Numb and Dumb sketches.

He makes his home in Berkeley, is married, and has two small daughters, Gina and Sara.

MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Carl T. Nunan, Publicity Director of KPO and Far Western Manager of the Atwater Kent Foundation, left recently for Washington, D. C., to be present at the final audition of the Atwater Kent Foundation's National Radio Audition which was held at New York, December 13. Arriving at Washington, Nunan was the guest of the Foundation and participated in the functions arranged in connection with the entertainment of the contestants from the various states, which included a luncheon with President Hoover. Following the audition at New York, the KPO representative traveled to New Haven, Connecticut, to visit the city of his birth, which he left thirty-four years ago while a toddling youngster. Mr. Nunan has been in charge of the Atwater Kent Auditions in the West for the past three years and has been successful every year in producing national winners, California winning seven out of a possible eight places. An enviable record for any state to shoot at.

• • • Frank and Earnest, the new KFRC two-piano team, is composed of Frank Schivo and Earnest Hesketh. • • • Robert Noble, Ambassador of Happiness and cousin of the late President Harding, is to be heard over KMTR Sunday afternoon from 12:45 to 1 p. m. Mr. Noble was formerly National Director of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce, chairman National Speakers' Bureau of American Green Cross, and National Speaker of Near East Relief and member Speaker Bureau of the Los Angeles Community Chest.

• • • Louise Johnson, astroanalyst of KNX in Hollywood, does not give the impression of one who has been through harrowing adventures on land and sea. But, if the truth be known, she has barely escaped with her life from three shipwrecks, and twice narrowly avoided death in serious fires.

• • • After a successful engagement at the Cosmopolitan Hotel in Denver, Ted Fiorito and his famous radio and recording orchestra have been booked to play an engagement at the Rice Hotel, Houston, Texas.

• • • Maurice H. H. Joachim, the dynamic originator of the "Rajput" series over KNX, is expected to return to the Hollywood station about December 20, following a thirteen weeks visit to Chicago, where he appeared over WBBM.

• • • Billy Page, NBC juvenile star, is a modest lad whose schoolmates never learn from him about his microphone career. Thousands of western listeners love Billy Smithers, the little boy in "Memory Lane," but few of the members of Billy's class in high school know that he is the young hero of the radio serial. Not long ago Billy stood gravely in the midst of a group of fellow high school students and heard them talk about his ether self. "I wonder how old the boy is who plays Billy Smithers?" one lad said;

while another one, gazing abstractedly at Billy, said: "Gee, I'd like to see him"! He doesn't know yet that he WAS seeing Billy Smithers, for the young NBC star never so much as smiled.

• • • Gene Byrnes, radio's funny man, has joined forces with KTM as a full time staff artist. He will be heard on the bally-hooey program at 11 o'clock nightly, except Monday, and will be heard on many studio hours. Byrnes, known as Standard McWebster, and many other radio aliases, was formerly at KHJ, KNX and other radio strongholds.

• • • When Russ Columbo, NBC singer, came to New York from the fast moving tempo of Hollywood where he had his own Club Pyramid, he was amazed at the size of Manhattan's buildings and bewildered by the swiftness of Gotham's pace. Today he admits that he likes New York better than the western movie city. He even selected an apartment near the very middle of things at Fifty-sixth Street and Seventh Avenue, Manhattan.

• • • Lucile Fowler Marks, staff contralto at station KOA in Denver, fell hard for a special sound effect heard in a recent broadcast. In fact, her lights went out when a character in the play said fearfully: "Put out the lights"! Business in the script for the play required Lucile to step away from the microphone quickly, after speaking a certain line, while the property man stepped up and made a sound like a heavy object falling. Recent waxing of the studio floor caused the realism in the sound effect. Lucile slipped and fell heavily to the floor, saving the property man a half second of labor and making the sound effect the real thing. "It didn't hurt, much," Lucile said when the play ended. "But hereafter I think I'll stick to illusions instead of trying reality."

• • • A new addition to KGB's commercial staff is George Warren, who comes to the Don Lee System from several years with the Yankee Broadcasting System in Boston, his native city. George is rapidly becoming accustomed to the famous San Diego climate, and we have noticed that he speaks less frequently of "Deah old Bohston." It appears to us that California has won George completely.

• • • Mickey Gillette, KFRC king-pin saxophonist, whose work has been featured with the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra, rushes to the defense of the saxophone's status as an instrument easy to master. 

Bart. did an act with his uke and piano. But now he scorns such plebian instruments as the piano and good old uke.

Harold still chuckles over the astonished thrill he received when he found his own name, in the California branch of the family, in the back of an ancient Bible where the family history is till recorded, and kept up to date.

• • • Ted Weems, CBS orchestral director, is the only orchestra leader listed in the "Biographies of Great Men" issued by the Congressional Library.

• • • Paul Whiteman, the King of Jazz, is on a diet composed mainly of grapefruit, spinach, head lettuce and cabbage. It is these four articles of the garden that have been instrumental in bringing the big fellow down to a mere 207 pounds, just 76 pounds less than his weight four months ago.

... RADIO NEWS ...

PRiority of operation as giving a right to enjoyment of a radio transmitting license, held not to be a factor in the case of broadcasters, has become a moot question in television, with the Federal Radio Commission called upon to decide whether the fact that a particular frequency was already used by one station is sufficient justification for refusal of a license on the same frequency to another.

The policy of the commission in the case of broadcasting has been to vest no priority right to any frequency in any station, believing that the air should be kept free and open, without giving any particular licensee preference over any other. The question has been raised in the past, however, only with respect to broadcasting, and it is now contended that, in the case of television, the situation is different in that this phase of radio is still in a highly experimental state and stations attempting to work out new developments should not be handicapped by the interference which would result from the placing of several stations on a single frequency.

The question of priority rights was actively pushed during the early days of the commission, when that body attempted to reduce the number of stations with a view to eliminating interference. The radio law of 1927 specifically seeks to guard against the erection of priority rights by providing that no station license shall be granted until the applicant shall have signed a waiver of any claim to the use of any particular frequency or wavelength because of prior use.

This provision of the law has been used by the commission as the basis for its attitude that no station has any vested rights and, although at the time the law was enacted television had not been developed, it is believed that the phrasing of the act is sufficiently broad to enable the commission to extend it to all types of radio operation.

TWO of the broadcasting stations in India operated by the Government are expected to be shut down as a part of the economy program demanded as a result of depression, according to reports to Washington. Broadcasting in India, it is declared, has never been a success, and little opposition has been voiced to the closing of the stations.






