

ADVERTISING MAY SAVE FOREIGN BROADCASTING

THE superiority of American methods of financing and operating broadcasting is proven by the difficulties which foreign countries are encountering in continuing their services through world depression and which may swing broadcasting technique in many nations to the American plan, it is held by radio leaders who have been watching with interest recent developments abroad.

Government monopoly of radio, supported by fees imposed upon receiving sets, as practiced in many countries, has lost ground during the past two years because of unemployment and reduced wages which have made it impossible for many to pay the taxes.

This situation has resulted in the closing of government stations in India and in more or less contraction of broadcasting service in other countries where license receipts have been insufficient to maintain the stations, necessitating the use of government funds which can be illy spared. Even in countries where the stations are privately operated, there is strict government control of programs and outside of the United States there is little in the way of advertising permitted on the air.

Reports to Washington indicate that in a

number of foreign countries proposals have been made to widen the scope of broadcasting income by permitting sponsored programs. At the present time the question is being given serious attention in Japan, where programs are subject to strict governmental censorship.

Japanese stations are financed by the collection of fees on receiving sets, but large numbers of owners have failed to register their sets and pay the taxes. An important factor in the situation is the complaint that the programs lack interest, which is believed to influence many to withhold payment of their fees as a gesture of protest.

Up to the present moment no advertising has been permitted from Japanese stations, but a movement is on foot to have this regulation rescinded in order that the financial difficulties of the broadcasters may be ameliorated and better programs provided.

All stations in Japan were on the air for a total of 24,450 hours last year, according to government statistics, but 9,250 hours, or more than one-third, were devoted to announcements; 6,194 hours, or one-fourth, to educational material; 2,136 hours to children's programs, and less than 7,000 hours to entertainment of popular character, it is shown.

MICROPHONE GOSSIP

• • • Tom Hutchinson, NBC's production manager, is the author of several plays which enjoyed successful Broadway runs.

• • • Tom Hanlon (KFI, KECA), junior announcer in years only, is not such a junior to look at. He is well over six feet, weighs 225 pounds, and looks like the answer to a coach's prayer. Tom is infectious good humored, has light brown hair, happy blue eyes, and cheeks pink as a Highlander's. He's still single.

• • • The two warbling canary birds heard over KJBS every morning have been named "Killo and Cycle." The names were bestowed on them by Gladys Francis, Ralph Brunton's secretary.

• • • Jerry Jermain and Mildred Bailey, KTAB, are "teaming" again. This "Long" and "Short" pair have done a lot of music together. The only difference in their act now is that they are doing "classics" instead of jazz.

• • • Gregory Golubeff, known to coast audiences as director of the Texaco radio symphony on Sunday chain programs, has joined the music staff of KTM, where he will play balalaika and bass.

• • • Georgia Williams, violinist with KFI the past year or so, transfers radio allegiance over to KTM, where she will play viola with the plectrum ensemble and second violin with the miniature symphony.

• • • Last October a group calling themselves the Eight o'Clock Players was formed for the purpose of broadcasting the older dramas. These enthusiasts were prompted to bring old masterpieces to the radio audience because this field has been practically untouched. These dramas have stood the test of time as fine literature and as artistic achievement. The Eight o'Clock Players broadcast over KLX every Sunday evening from eight to nine. They are ably directed by Everett Glass, whose work along Little Theatre lines is widely known and praised.

• • • Mickey Gillette, KFRC saxophone artiste, approached realizing a life's ambition recently when he discovered a house on fire and ran to turn in an alarm. It always had been his ambition to turn in a fire alarm. He ran around for ten minutes until he finally stumbled into a policeman at the fire alarm box who had beat Mickey to it by a hair breadth.

• • • Alex Gray, baritone of "Music that Satisfies" (CBS), recalls the time he needed a big hand and didn't get it. The occasion was in his early adventuring days as he stood on the Liverpool waterfront. He was seeking a job as engine "monkey" on a boat sailing for New York. The officer in charge of hiring new men lined up a hundred candidates and told them to hold out their hands. • • • New San Francisco studios for KROW have been opened at the Manx Hotel, W. A. Miller, general manager of the station, announced. Lester Smith, who was for several years associated with the management of stations in Portland and Seattle, is to have charge of the studio here. Located on the ground floor of the hotel, just off the main lobby, the studio has been so arranged as to provide for a control room, directors' booth and artists' lounge.

• • • Russ Columbo, NBC's "Voice from the Golden West," recently received a five-page anonymous letter titled "The Voice of Love." Columbo says it is such beautiful prose he intends to have it framed.

• • • Mary Wood, charming young Denver soprano who recently became a star on the National Broadcasting Company's San Francisco staff, created a sensation way back in her freshman year at the University of Colorado. Learning that applicants for parts in the Senior Play were being tried out, Mary, on a bet, calmly offered herself as a candidate. She did so well that she won the leading rôle, and not until the next day was it learned she was a Freshman. There was no precedent for such action, and no one knew what to do about the situation, so Mary played the rôle, to the loud huzzas of her sorority sisters.

• • • Axel Alexson, Jamboree Comedian (KFRC) whose name is Clyde Barlow, will make a comedy picture for the Johnson Picture Corporation in Hollywood this month. The picture will be released by RKO.

• • • More than eight years ago, when Charles H. Gabriel, Jr., now program director of KNX, in Hollywood, was musical director of station WGN, Chicago, he and Drury Lane, staff soloist of KNX, formed a strange and lasting friendship. Gabriel's hobby, then, as now, was writing detective and adventure stories for popular magazines. Drury was then staff singer over WGN. In addition to possessing a beautiful lyric tenor voice, Drury was an expert stenographer. While WGN was on the air, Gabriel would

play the piano and Drury would sing, taking turns at the announcing. Then they would go home together, and Gabriel would dictate one of his gripping stories while Drury took it down on the typewriter.

• • • Ernie Smith of KTAB's "Sport Page of the Air" swims out of doors every day. Ernie once held several records in swimming competition.

• • • Minetta Ellen, whose ordinary speaking voice comes over the "mike" with such ease and clarity, is one of the Eight o'Clock Players, KLX. Over the New Year recess Director Everett Glass hunted and 'phoned around until he had her located, and she has nobly led off the "female" players in each of their Sunday night drama broadcasts. First it is moralizing serenity, then real tragedy, and then high-society comedy.

• • • Walter Johnson, well known colored pianist heard over KJBS, was born in Boston, graduated from the New England Conservatory of Music in his home town, and after playing concerts in Chicago and New York, toured the world. He plays jazz as well as classics. He also has a number of phonograph records and piano rolls to his credit. Johnson is playing a San Francisco engagement at the Apex Cafe, where he is in charge of Curtis Mosby's Blue Blowers.

• • • The recent death of William Wrigley, Jr., head of the chewing gum concern which sponsors Myrt and Marge, brings to light many stories of the romance of a business that has made one of America's great fortunes: millions of dollars from penny profits. A short while ago Myrt and Marge received a letter from one of their loyal listeners, Mrs. Lena La Course, 22 West 116th Street, Chicago, who said that thirty-six years ago she started working for Mr. Wrigley—but not in a skit. She wrapped gum, along with forty-two other girls, in the early days when every stick had to be wrapped by hand. The gum business has grown some since then; wrapping is done by machines now, and profits have been so cultivated by a great business genius that the concern he started thirty-six years ago now supports one of the costliest radio entertainments as a gesture of good will advertising.



SILHOUETTES



IT was nineteen years ago that Harrison Holliday, KFRC manager and famous master of ceremonies on the Golden State Blue Monday Jamboree, saw his first radio aerial.

It was a very mysterious looking affair. Four copper wires flashing in the sun, with large glass knobs separating them from the spreaders at each end. The affair was suspended over the residence of Louis Clement, who lived near Lake Merritt, in Oakland. Young Holliday, aged 11, felt that he should do something about it. With his imagination on fire he hunted up a technical magazine, where he found an advertisement of the Electro Importing Company, and sent for a crystal detector and a loose coupler. That was the beginning of the radio experience for the man who has piloted the destinies of KFRC to one of the outstanding radio broadcasting stations in America.

Between then and his connection with the opening of KFRC he was an amateur operator of note, establishing a long distance radio telephone record for the Pacific Coast by communicating with Vancouver, Washington; he was a commercial operator at sea, and with Harold Shaw he built the old Emporium station, KSL. He helped install the original 50-watt KFRC on the roof of the Hotel Whitcomb.

Those weren't all the things he was doing, however. After graduating from Lowell High

School in San Francisco he attended Stanford, where he studied law. That institution failed to make a lawyer out of him, however, as you well know.

Harrison was born in San Francisco, though his early youth was spent in Oakdale, Pacific Grove and Oakland. The year of his birth was

1900, the year McKinley was elected. It is said that his first words: "Well, I see McKinley got it."

In 1928 he was married to Juliette Dunn, who was one of his radio artists on KFRC. They have a little boy, Harrison, Jr., who is known as Skippy around the house. He is just beginning to take an interest in what comes out of the loudspeaker. His father listens a great deal, not only to his own programs, but to those from the other stations and networks as well. He

also listens in on the short waves on a receiver he constructed himself. He still holds the amateur license, 6 BN. It has become a sort of a hobby with him. He plays golf and tennis and looks forward to some day continuing his sea experiences as a private yachtsman.

"PROSPERITY, if you're listening in, please come home! All is forgiven."

Against the background of his theme song, "It's a Lonesome Old Town," Ben Bernie, the Old Maestro of Jazz, is speaking. A mischievous glance and a reference to some feminine entertainer—

"I have a noddin' acquaintance with the lady. You know, noddin' doin' when I asked her for a date."

The Bernie wisecracks, like the brook of which Tennyson wrote, go on forever. They're the Bernie stock in trade. From just another orchestra leader they have elevated him to the rôle of one of America's most popular master of ceremonies.

In the big charity shows staged in Chicago there is frequently a mild and diplomatic argument as to the choice of talent. There's never a squawk on the selection of the master of ceremonies. Bernie has been elected to the post for life. Bernie has discovered the secret of a nonchalant brand of humor that appeals to the gallery as well as the front row.

Born Benjamin Ancel, the son of a blacksmith who lived and conducted his shop in the shadow of the Brooklyn Bridge, he became the subject of the first controversy in his family. His father decided he would be an engineer, a super-blacksmith. His mother insisted he would become a violin virtuoso.

At 15, young Mr. Ancel was a professor at the Mozart Institute in New York (a banjo free with every course of instruction). There was still some talk of that engineering business in the Ancel household, so Ben was confining his music to vacation periods and struggling through his mathematics. Ben will tell you the only thing he remembers of the subject is that the signs in some of the calculus equations resembled the sound holes in a violin.

Came vacation time after his second year of higher education and Ben was demonstrating violins in a New York Department store (\$4.98, case included). Given to wisecracks, even in those early days, he was explaining to an amused group of onlookers that the life of a violinist was a very low one, but if anyone insisted on becoming a fiddler, one of those \$4.98 specials was as good, or as bad, as any other instrument.

Joe Schenk was among those amused spectators. So was Ben's boss. The erstwhile musical instrument salesman found consolation in an invitation to try-out for the Loew circuit. The brand of humor clicked, and Benjamin Ancel became Ben Bernie of the team of Bernie and Klass (\$35 a week).

Once during those early vaudeville days Ben aspired to the classics. He was attempting a violin solo in a small Kentucky town when a native of the foothills, bearded and filled with the freshly made product of his own corn patch, turned the course of the Bernie career.

Bernie's music had failed to move the house. The native made several scathing re-

marks. Bernie talked back. The crowd roared and demanded more. Ben knew, now, what they wanted and he soon was teamed with Phil Baker. It was comedy, nothing else but. The pay checks improved. The partnership continued until wartime, when the Bernie and Baker paths separated. Unlike many another dissolved partnership, the central figures in this separation continued to be the best of friends. Today, more than twelve years later, Ben Bernie is one of Phil Baker's best boosters, and Phil Baker never misses a chance to back the Bernie stock.

Immediately after the war Ben was seized with an idea for a new type of dance band, a novelty band, with the conductor doing something besides beating the air with a baton. From the offset the result of the idea was big-time and headline vaudeville.

Booked into the Hotel Roosevelt Grill in New York for a month, Ben and his band stayed on for five years. London and Hollywood came to know the aggregation—then came Chicago.

At present, indications point to a Chicago epidemic of Bernie-itis, sufficiently widespread to keep the "Old Maestro" in the midwest metropolis for many a year. Depressions to the contrary, he is packing them in, night after night, at the College Inn. "I hope you like it," a byword wherever Bernie has played, has now become a catchphrase throughout the country, due to Bernie's broadcasts over a coast-to-coast Columbia network.

Golf, horses, contract bridge and hamburger sandwiches are the Bernie favorites. He's crazy about police dogs, and kept one in the hotel until it bit a newspaper columnist. Then the management tactfully, but firmly, suggested a kennel. He's sentimental about old friends, and foolishly generous to touch-artists. He dislikes high-hats, literal and otherwise. He never speaks unkindly of anyone. He is superstitious about horses born in August, and left-handed waiters.

The members of his orchestra, who know him best of all, describe him briefly but emphatically—"One swell guy."

... RADIO NEWS ...

REVOCAION of the broadcasting license of Rev. "Bob" Shuler's station, KGEF, at Los Angeles, threatens to bring about a demand for Congressional determination of the limits of free speech which it will be impossible to ignore.

Aroused by alleged misstatements by Rev. Charles E. Coughlin of the Roman Catholic Church at Royal Oak, Mich., over a chain of twenty-one stations, regarding prohibition, Clarence True Wilson, general secretary of the Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and Protestant ministers "who forced the vinegar of deception down the throats of innocent people," the Methodist board has inaugurated a campaign to have the whole matter considered by Congress.

No complaint will be made to the Federal Radio Commission at this time, officials of the board assert, because "the question of liberty of speech involved in the Shuler case is too deep and too broad to become a matter of precedent. It should be more carefully considered by Congress, with perhaps revision of radio legislation, and a broad general policy should be laid down to which all stations and those who use their facilities should be made to conform. Until these principles have been made clearly defined, action can be deferred.

Station KGEF, it is declared, was ruled off the air in the face of petitions signed by 140,000 residents of Southern California requesting its continuance. "The fact of the matter is that Dr. Shuler had made things very uncomfortable for the underworld of Los Angeles," it is contended. "He had sent into retirement a district attorney, a mayor, and one or two chiefs of police. The forces which profited by the incumbency of these men naturally wished to get rid of the adverse publicity which resulted in their downfall.

"The commission in its action also brought in the religious question, alleging that the continuance of the license would have a disruptive effect upon community feeling owing to the antagonisms which Dr. Shuler occasionally expressed as to the Roman Catholic Church. Of course the action of the commission is irrational and on the basis of the facts presented to it, it should have allowed the continuance of the station.

About the same time this happened, Father Charles E. Coughlin, a Roman Catholic priest, resident in Royal Oak, Mich., sent out over a hook-up of twenty-one stations located in the vicinity of Detroit, an attack upon prohibition, Clarence True Wilson, and "the thousands upon thousands of preachers who forced down the throats of innocent people the vinegar of deception."

"The American people will insist that if 'Bob' Shuler is kept off the air, Father Coughlin shall be also. Evidently the Radio Commission strained at a gnat and swallowed a camel. That it will suffer from an attack of acute indigestion is one of the surest things we know."

IDEAS of industrial leaders regarding the "saturation point" of the American market for various commodities—the theoretical number of radios, automobiles and what-not which the people of the country should buy—are undergoing radical revision as a result of the experiences of the past two years.

Saturation was a lovely mark to aim at during the boom years, and ranked with ever-increasing "quotas" for salesmen, "high pressure" selling and other products of the efficiency experts' minds, but could not stand the test of hard times.

For a decade the automobile industry pointed to the number of people in the country, the tremendous mileage of good roads and the wealth of the nation as concrete evidence that the saturation point was in the far distant future, even though there are now some 27,000,000 cars in use. This year the manufacturers have changed front and while they hope to sell 3,000,000 new cars, most of these will be replacement sales, and they are about ready to admit that future expansion will depend largely upon increasing population.

In the radio set industry, a saturation point of some twenty odd million sets was aimed at as against the 13,000,000 or so already in use. Today, the set manufacturers gravely question the accuracy of their aim. Sales in 1932, it is feared, will be about half of those of last year, which, in turn, were less than half the sales of 1929 in value.

In a frantic effort to keep business at a normal level, the majority of manufacturers

during the past year have been selling their products at less than cost of production, it is claimed, and more than half of them have been forced out of business. The number of persons employed in the industry last year was about 100,000—one-fifth the number employed before the depression. The whole industry, according to one prominent manufacturer, is "sick nigh unto death."

The whole question of saturation, it is now realized, was based on the false premises that there could be no break in our continuing prosperity, and that everybody felt they must have these things. No industry has ever achieved saturation—that mythical point where everybody who should have a product has it—yet manufacturers in many lines have reached the point where they produced largely for replacement even though there were still millions of potential customers.

BRROADCASTING activity continues to increase throughout the world, a recent count of stations by the Department of Commerce showing 1,423 of which 617 are in the United States and 806 in 70 foreign countries.

Private broadcasting is permitted in only twenty-eight countries outside the United States, the study disclosed. Twenty of the seventy foreign countries which have broadcasting have only one station each.

Following the United States in the number of stations are Canada with 85, Russia with 78, Cuba with 53, Mexico with 47, and Argentina with 38.

IRVIN S. COBB, American humorist, again brings his stories, genial wit and southern drawl to the Armour program for a limited engagement over a nation-wide NBC network.

Cobb's humor made such a smashing hit with Armour program listeners last winter that he was finally persuaded by the National Broadcasting Company to return this winter for a series of at least ten broadcasts.

He will draw on his wealth of stories, observations, anecdotes and experiences for his microphone chats. Cobb will be heard with the Armour orchestra under the direction of Roy Shield, the Fireside Singers (a male quartet), and Edna Kellogg, soprano.

Known universally for his magazine stories, books and plays, Cobb is an example of the small-town boy who made

good. Beginning as a cub reporter in his home town of Paducah, Kentucky, he became editor of the *Paducah News* when he was but 19 years old. Metropolitan journalism lured him, but it was not until 1904, four years after his marriage to Laura Spencer Baker of Savannah, Georgia, that he took his savings of \$200 and went to New York.

With his first job on the *Evening Sun*, Cobb began the brilliant career which swept him into the literary hall of fame as a special writer, war correspondent, humorist, and author of plays, books and magazine stories.

Cobb will be heard over the following NBC-KGO network station KGO, KHQ, KOMO, KGW, KFI, and KSL; Fridays at 6:30 p. m.

AS an extension of its recently inaugurated frequency checking service for broadcast stations, R. C. A. Communications, Inc., is planning the erection of a laboratory on the West coast similar to that now in operation at Riverhead, Long Island.

For several years the organization has maintained the Riverhead laboratory to keep close check of the frequencies on its own transoceanic stations and those of foreign correspondents. Recently facilities of the laboratory were made available to American broadcasting stations, and among the many broadcasters utilizing the service have been stations situated as far from New York to California.

Use of these facilities, it is explained by officials of the company, enables the stations to keep more accurately on their assigned frequencies and tends to make less difficult the coordination of stations' operations with the supervisory activities of the Federal Radio Commission. This laboratory service could not be maintained by individual stations except at a prohibitive capital expenditure and operating expense.

A typical example of the usefulness of the service given by the Riverhead laboratory, to be duplicated from California, is the assistance rendered a group of broadcasters who wished to synchronize their programs but whose limited station power and service range made the use of connecting land wires uneconomical. The frequency checking service made it possible for these stations to operate with a considerably higher degree of effectiveness.






