

INTERNATIONAL FREQUENCY DIVISION SOUGHT

NEGOTIATION by the State Department of treaties with Canada, Cuba, and Mexico allocating broadcasting frequencies so as to prevent interference is being sought by Senator Clarence C. Dill of Washington as a result of recent reports that Cuban and Mexican stations were operating on American frequencies or so close to them as to cause serious heterodyning.

A number of American stations, it is declared, have complained that Mexican or Cuban stations operating on the same wavelengths have materially reduced the area within which they can be heard. The situation has become greatly accentuated within the past year and unless action is taken to bring about an amicable agreement between the four North American countries a serious situation is bound to result, according to Senator Dill.

Criticising the apparent lack of interest in the matter by State Department officials, the Senator asserted that he had consulted with them several times in the hope that some action would be taken in the direction of international allocation, but nothing has yet been done. All the efforts of the Federal Radio Commission to eliminate interference between American stations, he pointed out, can be nullified by foreign broadcasters.

The Mexican authorities, the Senator charged, are granting permits for the construction of stations by individuals and

corporations which had previously been denied permits in this country and alleged that in some instances these Mexican permits had been used as a threat of interference with American stations unless the latter "bought off" the Mexican license holder.

"Radio broadcasting stations in Mexico and Cuba are using frequencies being used by radio broadcasting stations in the United States and thereby causing interference with the service of these stations to the American people," Mr. Dill explained, "and it is reliably reported that a number of additional broadcasting stations are planned and under construction near the American border of Mexico.

"There is no international agreement or treaty dividing the use of frequencies for radio broadcasting among the nations of North America, and only by such an international agreement can the governments of these countries protect the broadcasting stations within their borders from interference by other stations in other North American countries.

"The value of vast investments in the broadcasting business and good reception by the receiving sets of the millions of listeners in the United States are dependent upon the prevention of interference by radio stations located in adjoining countries."



MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Jack Arnold, Myrt and Marge's lawyer friend, is getting to be as popular with the radio audience as he is with the Wrigley girls, in their five-a-week over the Columbia chain. Even at the Leavenworth penitentiary, where the boys like to forget prosecuting attorneys, this is a favorite, they say.

In real life he's Vinton Haworth, who has been doing radio dramatics for several years, after an apprenticeship in stock and vaudeville. He played in the first radio mystery drama in 1925, and produced the first synchronized sound and television drama in the midwest, for W9XAP. He was announcer for the Three Doctors before joining the cast of Myrt and Marge.

• • • When Robert Olsen, popular KFRC balladist, appeared with the Golden State Blue Monday Jamboree gang at the Stockton Memorial Auditorium, March 12, it marked his first personal appearance since he began radio work more than five years ago.

• • • Dick Stevens, newest KFI-KECA announcer, graduated to the microphone from the control rooms of the same stations. Dick is an ex-gob who entered radio as a ship's operator. He gives no explanation for his choice between engineering and announcing.

• • • Harold Peary, NBC player who has portrayed stage and radio villains all his theatrical life, and boasts that he never has enacted a virtuous citizen yet, got so tired gumming a moustache to his lips for personal appearances, that he has raised a real one. It is the traditional Curse-you-Jack-Dalton hirsute adornment, and carefully waxed.

• • • The gag team of Roach and Crary (KGER) or vice versa, made its appearance on the Hasher's Revue on a recent Wednesday evening when it was suddenly discovered that Kitty Brown, author of the humorous feature, was confined to home with a "code in the noze." Mel Roach and

Clarence "Tadpole" Crary, KGER announcers just got busy with their old vaudeville gags from way back and literally paralyzed the audience in the studios. . . . no report of the general effect on the etheral listeners having been received to date.

• • • So accustomed to their morning program are the mocking birds who sing each morning in "Crosscuts from the Log o' the Day" through the NBC-KPO network, that all Dr. Laurance L. Cross, star of this program, has to do to start their chorus is to place a microphone beside their cage.

• • • Margaret Kintz-Duncan, (KFI-KECA) roly-poly, smiling bright-eyed and capable pianist of the Lyric Trio and accompanist de luxe. Margaret is unique among pianists, she doesn't mind playing innocuous accompaniments without screen credit. She is probably the best sight-reader known in these parts; can read at sight a Chinese laundry sign. Born in Indiana, long enough ago not to be a flapper, she studied with Lhevinne and Stojowski. Margaret is married and has three children, and her hobby is collecting books. Oddly enough, she reads 'em, too.

• • • Jack Plumlet, one time program director at KYA, and formerly associated with various Southern California stations, has been added to the commercial staff of KTM. So, too, has been J. H. Alexander, for a number of years connected with newspapers in the state of Kansas.

• • • Morton Downey, who often accompanies himself on the piano when rehearsing songs for his broadcasts, as well as during many personal appearances, never took a lesson in his life. He employs only the sharps and flats, not being versed in fingering the natural keys.

• • • John deJara Almonte, NBC night executive, collects miniature China animals and now has 144 on display in his office. The largest is four inches high and the smallest is slightly bigger than a pin head.

• • • Helen O'Neill, producer of many of NBC's most sparkling musical programs, was a featured musical comedy player before she turned to radio.

• • • Walter Damrosch, NBC musical counsel not only directs the musicians in his symphonic presentations, but also carefully rehearses the vocalists whenever they are to appear on one of the Damrosch programs. He works patiently for hours in preparation for a one-hour broadcast.

• • • Elbert Lachelle, KTAB organist, comes from Salem, Oregon, where his mother tunes in to his recitals every day.

• • • Ted White, NBC's minstrel of love songs, numbers picture stars of the first magnitude among his listeners. Nancy Carroll, Adolphe Menjou, Gloria Swanson and Harold Lloyd are among the film celebrities who tune their radio sets to Ted's programs.

When he was in Hollywood, Ted was much in demand as a soloist, and he has sung at most of the famous stars' homes. Nancy Carroll's favorite song is "With a Song in My Heart." Menjou likes to hear Ted do "The Peanut Vender." The first time the NBC tenor ever sang "I Surrender Dear" was at Harold Lloyd's house, and he had to sing it fourteen times before his audience let him stop.

• • • Sylvia Froos, 18-year-old NBC vocalist, is accompanied by her mother whenever she appears in public, whether at the broadcasting studios or on the vaudeville stage. Miss Froos sings "hot" love ballads but says she has never been in love.

• • • Bonnie Carroll, former San Francisco newspaper woman and magazine "editoress," is the newest addition to the staff of people who produce KFRC's daily "Feminine Fancies" period.

Miss Carroll will hold down the desk of continuity editor, but she says she would rather be called the "housekeeper" of this period, which is designed exclusively to aid women listeners in their household problems.

Coincident with Miss Carroll's appointment, it was announced that Smiling Billy Goodwin, one of KFRC's newest announcers, has been named as the Feminine Fancies announcer. Billy succeeds William Wright.

• • • Ilomay Bailey, former vaudeville star songstress, returned to the footlights for the first time in several years on February 26 when Lee Sims, in whose NBC ether act she has been featured recently, began a series of person appearances at the Oriental Theater in Chicago.

• • • Ray Canfield, director of the KFI-KECA Beach Boys, is recognized as the greatest ukelele player and arranger in the world today. Approximately ten million copies of sheet music with his arrangements have been sold, including "Moonlight and Roses," "St. Louis Blues," "Chloe," and "Springtime in the Rockies." His books on ukelele playing are read in five languages. Hawaiian music owes much of its appeal to certain Canfield innovations, used by the Beach Boys: a bass voice in contrast to the highly-pitched voices of the other singers, a plucking bass fiddle. Canfield is soon to be ordained as a minister of the gospel.

• • • Shermar's has brought out the "Song of Steel," a song for medium or low voice and piano. The words are by Edward Lynn, of the KTM continuity staff, and the music by Charles Wakefield Cadman, distinguished musical authority. It was brought out originally two years ago as "Rivets" but has gone through several changes in the new edition.

• • • KJBS has discovered a new use for their electric siren which was cast aside when the station discontinued giving out the fire alarms several months ago. The blast is now used to announce that the KJBS news reporter at the United Press wire room has a late news flash regarding the Chinese-Japanese war situation. These news flashes are sometimes given in the middle of a regular program and are given to the listeners hours before it appears in the newspapers.

• • • Silvio Lavatelli, violincellist of KFI-KECA studied in the same class with Rhespighi in Bologna (this is not bologna). Toured as joint recitalist with Elman, Mary Garden, Arthur Rubenstein and others. Concert successes throughout South America and European capitals. Was primo 'cellist with the Chicago Civic Opera for fourteen seasons. He plays an instrument by Oddona of Turino, one of the finest samples of the 'cello-maker's art.

... RADIO NEWS ...

THE complexity of the problem and not a desire on the part of the Department of Justice to be lenient has been the cause of delay in pushing to completion the Government's anti-trust suit against the Radio Corporation of America.

So many important points are involved in the case that it has been impossible to prosecute it with any speed and it has been necessary for the department to make an exception to its policy of handling all cases with its own personnel and employ outside counsel to assist the Government staff, according to John Lord O'Brian, assistant to the Attorney General in charge of enforcement of the anti-trust laws.

"This case has perhaps the widest scope of any anti-trust case ever instituted," Mr. O'Brian declared. "It is an extraordinarily complicated case, not only because of the intercorporate relationships of the parties and various contracts between them and also with outsiders, but because of the cross licensing of patents, which is one of the major subjects of complaint by the Government."

"The group, it is understood, have between 4,000 and 5,000 patents between them and under them various cross licensing has been done and licenses have been granted to outsiders."

"The case is of such a technical and involved character that it was found necessary to employ special assistants," he explained. "The case is steadily in progress of preparation for trial. A very large number of records have been examined; the files of the various defendants have been searched. A great many people have been interviewed and listened to in connection with it. A certain amount of negotiation has been had with reference to one single feature of the case; that is, the inter-relationships resulting from the use of patents."

"There has been a suggestion made that it might be possible to create some sort of a patent pool to open those patents to the general public, in a manner satisfactory to the Department of Justice. That arrangement, if effected, would not dispose of the case. Other serious anti-trust features complained of would still remain to be tried but

the proposed pool would dispose of one important phase of the case."

These negotiations, however, he explained, have as yet not resulted in any definite agreement between the Government and the defendants.

That the case will have to be decided by the courts is declared by Attorney General Mitchell to be a forgone conclusion, counsel for the defendants having definitely indicated that even if the patent issue is disposed of there are other complaints in the Government's bill which cannot be disposed of by negotiation. "The inter-relationship of the parties, their intercorporate relationships, their various contracts and their conduct toward the world remain to be tried and will be tried," he stated.

The suit was filed in the United States District Court in Delaware, March 13, 1930. No date has yet been set for trial, nor will the case be brought up until an agreement has been reached with respect to patents or it becomes evident that negotiations to that end are unavailing.

A DETERMINED attack upon the bill introduced in Congress by Representative Amlie of Wisconsin, prohibiting commercial radio advertising on Sunday, on the ground that it is religious legislation, has been launched by the anti blue-law organizations of the country.

Pointing out that Congress is prohibited by the Constitution from enacting religious laws, warning is issued that if Congress can prohibit commercial advertising by radio on Sunday it can with equal propriety prohibit commercial advertising in Sunday newspapers or in store display windows.

"To single out radio stations, and radio stations only, to the exclusion of all other means of commercial advertising on Sunday, brands the proposed legislation as class legislation and therefore unconstitutional," it is declared by C. S. Longacre, head of one of the national organizations opposed to "blue" laws. "Nobody's rights are invaded; nobody's health is impaired, and nobody's safety is endangered by commercial advertising over the radio on Sunday. If a person does not want to listen to it, he has

his own remedy in his receiving set. All he needs to do is to turn it off or shift the dial to another station till he finds what is agreeable to his taste."

"Some people," Mr. Longacre commented, "seem to be very helpless. They simply cannot adjust themselves to the world's environment and they want the Federal Government to help them be religious when they have not enough backbone to shut off their own radio set to undesirable matter."

"Personally, I do not enjoy jazz music coming over my radio set, but I would be the last person in the world to ask the Federal Government to pass a law prohibiting jazz music over the radio. Some people seem to think that if there is anything in the world that they don't fancy, or is contrary to their religious predilections, Congress ought to pass a law prohibiting it at once. Some folks entertain the notion that Congress can legislate on every subject under Heaven, both civil and religious."

DECIDED difference of opinion as to the possibility of providing more channels in the broadcast band is becoming evident among radio experts, although it is generally accepted that the number of usable frequencies in other portions of the radio spectrum eventually will be materially increased.

The present 10-kilocycle separation between broadcasting frequencies is based upon the "side bands" of the broadcast signals, and until these are greatly reduced, it is declared, it will be impossible to narrow the separation.

Regulations of the Federal Radio Commission, effective next June, restricting permissible deviation from assigned frequency to 50 cycles—the present permissible maximum is 500 cycles—will reduce interference between stations on adjacent wave lengths, it is pointed out, but has no relation to the side bands.

A great deal of effort has been expended upon the narrowing of the side bands but as yet no means has been found whereby these waves which accompany the broadcast signals can be eliminated. Until this can be accomplished, a separation of 10 kilocycles will be necessary to prevent interference.

Many experimenters who have interested themselves in this problem have abandoned

their effort in the belief that its solution rests not with the further refinement of present equipment but with the development of new apparatus specifically developed for the purpose.

CONSTITUTIONALITY of the radio law of 1927 has again, in effect, been upheld by the United States Supreme Court through its refusal to review the case brought by the owners of Station WMBB-WOK, license of which was revoked by the Federal Radio Commission in 1928 as part of its effort to bring about the equitable distribution of facilities required by the Davis amendment.

Declaring that the commission had made no attempt to show that operations of the stations were not in the public interest, convenience and necessity, the qualifications required by the law for the licensing of stations, WMBB-WOK asked the Supreme Court to pass upon the validity of the law itself, admitting that there was no complaint against the commission, which had merely taken advantage of the powers granted it by the statute.

The chief contention of the station was that the Government, by licenses issued it for the period from 1925 to 1928, had imbued it with certain rights by reason of its priority of operation, deprivation of which without just compensation was contrary to the fifth amendment to the Constitution.

More than \$100,000 had been invested in the station, the court was told, and the revocation of the license, prohibiting the use of the property, constituted deprivation without due process of law.

Attacking the constitutionality of the radio act, the station asserted that the standards of public interest, convenience or necessity "are so indefinite and uncertain as to vest in the Federal Radio Commission an uncontrolled and arbitrary power over broadcasting stations, and is therefore an invalid delegation of legislative power.

"Under its power to regulate commerce," the station's brief continued, "Congress may not destroy without compensation a legitimate business in one section of the country in order to make room for a like business in another section of the country and thereby produce a more equal geographical distribution of the particular business."

ALICE JOY, vocalist of the Prince Albert Quarter Hour, heard in the West over an NBC transcontinental network, Monday nights from 8:15 to 8:30 o'clock, P. S. T., is a self-made singer.

In her childhood days she had to go several miles to school from her home outside the city limits of Streator, Ill. She sang along the way. Not loudly—just hummed, because she enjoyed hearing her own voice against a background of winds sighing across wheat fields.

Neighbors knew her love for songs. They often pushed little Alice onto a "grown-up chair" and clapped until she sang "Annie Laurie." Alice hasn't forgotten those juvenile triumphs.

As she completed her grammar school activity and entered the Streator high school, her love of song took definite shape. Class lessons, under a veteran teacher, caught her interest momentarily. The thought of becoming a great singer spurred her ambitions, but dull practice dampened them. She gave up her idea of working toward an idealistic musical goal, and contented herself with ordinary singing.

Chance meeting with some theatrical friends offered her a stage career. Already well versed in piano playing, she joined a group of five, a piano

quintet. Youngster though she was, here was something worth while. The quintet eventually played in every state in the union except Texas.

The first admirer Alice had was the son of wealthy parents. He sent her roses in a Tulsa theatre, and followed her from the Oklahoma metropolis across the states to Atlanta, Georgia. His parents

finally induced him to return home.

War swept the world.

During Liberty Loan drives Alice sang her way to the hearts of enthusiastically purchasing crowds, and helped out in soldier camps as a singer and in dialogue. In Canada she married Captain E. Robert Burns, a holder of England's Distinguished Fly-

ing Cross, and credited with several German planes. He had been returned to America and was doing publicity work—a war hero in post-war days. Alice suddenly found herself listening to folks saying "Good morning, Mrs. Burns." And she was happy.

Days and years drifted along without much adventure. When theatrical engagements permitted she appeared before audiences. Her voice held much promise, according to Captain Burns' belief, but he did not urge his wife to go too seriously into vocal study.

In 1929 Alice took part in an RKO Theatre of the Air broadcast. Her hands shook a little, but she bravely went on before an unseen audience and sang the "Last Rose of Summer."

Her fan letters smacked of tears. A radio audience had been won over and she appeared from time to time until the radio director of a large advertising agency heard her recently at an informal gathering. He was struck with the sincerity in her work.

A sponsored program was "in the making" and he suggested Alice. She clicked. Today she is one of radio's successes.

Alice frankly prefers ballads and folk songs to anything else.

She sings as she talks, "in chest tones." Has no accom-

panist at the piano. Does her own rehearsing. Has never composed music, but hopes to do some serious work when she can have her own studio and shut herself up with her piano and grind.

"I know it will be hard work, but I love it," she says, "but I'm so afraid of outside intervention—people who will want to make me sing their way. I prefer my own."

Standing about five feet four inches, Alice weighs around 125 pounds. Her hair is a very dark brown. So are her eyes. Her face is oval, and her cheeks are ruddy.

She adores red in her clothes. Likes sports wear better than evening gowns, but favors shimmering cream-colored dress for the supper-dance.

Will not wear flowers. Loves them too much to watch them fade. Lets her flowers at home wilt rather than throw them out. Does not like jewelry and refuses to wear even an engagement ring. Pins on a cameo and wears her birthstone, an opal, occasionally. Is in every sense a home girl.

Thinks cooking great sport. Prefers a three-inch steak, sliced through and crowned with fried onions.

At the Metropolitan Opera House she sits entranced through a performance of "Tristan and Isolde." Will walk miles to be able to hear Beethoven's great Fifth Symphony.

Greatest thrill was when she boarded a Staten Island

ferry boat—first time she had ever been on the water—felt the ship move away from the wharf, and saw the Statue of Liberty. She shuns aviation because her heart flutters when she leaves the ground.

Would rather read English novels than any world-famous detective story. Ballads make her cry. She enjoys the cloistered seclusion of an ivy-covered church. Ambition is to give a good performance on the air—always.

A YOUTHFUL veteran of the theatre exchanged footlights for microphone when Ruth Anne Matteson joined the NBC staff in San Francisco.

Just twenty years old, Miss Matteson has been playing character, ingenue and leading roles on the stage for three years. She was just seventeen when she decided that no career except that of an actress was meant for her. In spite of the fact that she

was in Hollywood, in a girl's school, at the time, she didn't visit a moving picture studio, but a stock theatre, in search of her desire. She made her debut as Kitty in "The Butter and Egg Man," much to her family's astonishment, and then went out with a road production.

She has been kept busy on the stage almost continuously ever since then and has a number of interesting leading roles to her credit in coast productions. She played opposite Joe E. Brown in "Elmer the Great"; opposite Taylor Holmes in "The Nervous Wreck" and "No, No, Nanette"; in "The Masquerader" with Guy Bates Post; "Mother's Millions" with May Robson; and "Daddies" with Robert McWade. She might be a picture actress by now if Leo Carrillo hadn't offered her the lead in "The Broken Wing" just after she had some test pictures made in Hollywood.

The possessor of an unusually lovely speaking voice, matched by blonde charm, Ruth is said to have almost every qualification which will be necessary for radio acting when television arrives. 


