

TELEVISION PROBLEMS STILL ACUTE

THE present comparatively high price of the cathode ray tube system of television is proving its greatest handicap, according to radio experts, who see in the disc method of scanning the only present practical means of producing inexpensive television sets.

Many problems, however, remain which must be solved before television can be offered as a satisfactory means of home entertainment, it is declared. Outstanding among these problems are the need for greater detail in the received picture, the development of portable transmitter pick-up equipment, the perfection of transmitting systems having a satisfactory and reliable service range, and the production of easily operated receivers at a reasonable cost.

When these requirements have been met, it is predicted, television popularity will grow at even a greater rate than did that of broadcasting.

"With the present economics of broadcasting," it is pointed out by the Radio Manufacturers' Association, which has just completed a study of the subject, "it has been impossible to secure much data on the entertainment value of the subjects that can be

broadcast, due to the cost of presenting programs. The Federal Radio Commission has up to the present time considered television only experimental, and will grant no commercial rights; this means that all broadcasting must be done for the experimental value only and no paid programs can be transmitted by television."

Even when commercial rights are granted by the government, however, the question will still be presented whether advertisers will assume the increased costs that television must impose for its successful operation or the public can in some way be taxed to bear the burden.

"Regardless of the present problems that confront the industry," the radio association feels, "there has been enough work done to justify some predictions which can be conscientiously made. With the development of new short-wave channels at frequencies higher than 35,000,000 cycles, reliable transmission of television can be predicted. Ample room for an adequate number of transmitting stations can be found in this short-wave region. It is perfectly conceivable that a sight and sound service can be worked out to be received on a single receiver with a simplified tuning and control mechanism."



MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Buddy Rogers, idol of the screen, soon will lead his own thirteen-piece dance orchestra—his California Cavaliers—in broadcasts over a National Broadcasting Company network from the Hotel Pennsylvania, New York City, it is announced by the NBC artist service. The announcement was made after Rogers had signed a contract to succeed Rudy Vallee and his Connecticut Yankees in the hostelry, starting Monday, March 28. The salary given in the contract is said to be a record for a hotel orchestra conductor. Buddy Rogers and his California Cavaliers will play both dinner and supper music in the Hotel Pennsylvania Grill, maintaining the same schedule as that followed by Rudy Vallee's orchestra, but the definite time for the broadcasts had not yet been decided, it was said.

Rogers, now appearing with the Ziegfeld show, "Hot-Cha," recently deserted the Hollywood movie lots in favor of a radio career, coming to New York. His signing of the contract this week climaxed weeks of negotiations with many hotels and night clubs which had bid for his services.

• • • The newest "find" at KJBS is a young San Francisco chap with broad athletic shoulders, and Irish smile, and a silver-toned voice. His name is Pat Buckman. Of course, his physique had nothing to do with his securing a job on the KJBS staff; neither did his pleasing personality; but when Pat stepped up to the microphone for a try-out recently, everyone in the studio stopped what they were doing and listened. The next day the lad was put under contract. Critics who have heard the young Irish tenor predict that he will go far in radio, but from the mail already received from some of the station's feminine listeners it looks as if he has already "arrived."

• • • KFWI announces the addition of a new artist to its Sunday afternoon program. Mr. Nathaniel Anderson will appear at five o'clock in a fifteen-minute program of dramatic recitations. He has had several seasons' experience on Broadway and has appeared in Shakespearan productions. Mr.

Anderson is a brother of the famous "Bronco Billy" Anderson.

• • • Georgia Fifield, director of the KNX players, has cast and directed all of her radio plays, that she probably holds the record, having produced something over three hundred and fifty radio plays and created some two hundred rôles, in radio plays.

• • • In a recent questionnaire, KFRC staff artists were asked "What are your particular aversions?" Answers came thick and fast.

Edna Fischer's particular aversion is getting up early! Murray Bolen especially dislikes "gents who shoot eighteen holes in under 80, and falsetto radio tenors." Bill Wright can't think of anything worse than pieces of shell in walnut brittle. Cal Pearce, who sports a very trim and tiny one himself, detests long untidy mustaches. Juanita Tennyson's aversion is loud music and conversation going on simultaneously. Mary Lewis Haines doesn't like idle vicious gossipers or noisy jazz. Mickey Gillette shudders at the sight of anyone chewing gum. He also adds woolen underwear to his list. Norman Neilsen hates limburger cheese. Mac of Haywire orchestra fame, states his big aversion is reformers with a mission. "Fat heads" covers Walter Bunker's aversion list. And Pedro says work is the one thing in the world he is averted to. Meredith Willson gave title-gagging, gray and caviar as his dislikes.

• • • Georgia Stark, coloratura, and staff artist at KNX, collects ear rings, some of which she has gathered from the four corners of the globe and which are very, very valuable.

• • • Fred Berrens, Columbia orchestra leader, comes from a family of comedians and his early days were spent almost entirely around the theater. However, his parents saw to it that he took the time to start studying music at a very early age. When Fred was but seven, Jacob Gordon, an outstanding playwright of some years ago, wrote a

part for him in his adaptation of Tolstoy's novel, "Kreutzer Sonata." Fred was given the role of Albert, a child violinist. He played the same part later in several revivals.

• • • Axel, popular Swede character of Golden State Blue Monday Jamboree fame, began work in Hollywood on March 8 for the talkie "The Phantom Express," in which he is starred as the Swede fireman. Axel, whose real name is Pete Barlow, won the motion picture contract after Emory Johnson, film director, had heard him on the Jamboree.

Upon completion of the picture about April 1, Axel will return to his accustomed spot on the KFRC program.

• • • Rose Wood, who received such high praise for her portrayal of Hedda Gabler in the University of California Little Theater production in February, plays the part with the Eight O'Clock Players, KLX, on Sunday, March 20, from 8 to 9 p. m., when this drama of Ibsen's will be broadcast under the direction of Everett Glass. This gives Rose the rather odd experience of playing the same role with two different directors, all within a month. To show that character actresses can be very unlike their parts, Rose just adores perfumes, goes quite "nutty" over a whiff here and there.

• • • Dick Gordon, the Sherlock Holmes of the George Washington coffee program, heard over NBC networks, who has been on the stage for twenty years, says radio acting is as difficult to master as stage technique. "I learn something new each day about broadcasting," he says. "The microphone is a most exacting master."

• • • Friends of Seldy Roach, veteran actor who is a member of the NBC National Players, are apt to find a live message from Seldy at Christmas or birthday time, in the shape of a fluffy little canary. Seldy raises fine canaries as a hobby; he seldom has less than thirty-five at a time, and he has never sold a bird—always gives them away.

• • • Vaughn de Leath, the original woman singer over the radio, appeared on the stage for the first time when she was but three years old. The occasion was a hometown minstrel show. When but 12

she conducted an orchestra and a year later she started song writing. At the age of 15 she made her debut as a concert artist.

• • • KTM has put in a high frequency loop for bigger and better broadcasts. All of its technical equipment has been modified so as to reproduce on a flat line all frequencies between 40 and 8,000 to make the broadcast more effective. The telephone company has modified the toll lines between the transmitter in Santa Monica to the studio in Los Angeles so it, too, will reproduce those frequencies.

• • • Jerry Jermain of KTAB made a week end flying trip to Los Angeles recently. Jerry says that for once she was glad she is big. Easier, you know, to find in a wreck.

• • • Jennings Pierce, chief of the NBC announcing staff in San Francisco, jingles an iron bank on his desk every time one of the announcers fail to turn in his "Pro-19"—a report covering the program in which he has officiated at the microphone. Twenty-five cents is the fine for each offense, and every time the bank gets full the whole staff enjoys a big dinner together.

• • • The Most Reverend Archbishop Edward J. Hanna, D. D., is to give a radio address through KTAB on Tuesday evening, March 22, from 7:45 to 8 o'clock.

He will speak in behalf of the Good Friday Reverent Observance Committee which was organized to interest business leaders and merchants of the city in the plan for a cessation of business activities during the three-hour period beginning at noon on that day.

Already a series of radio talks telling of the movement have begun and will continue up to the evening of the Archbishop's address.

A proclamation has been issued by Mayor Rossi calling to the attention of citizens the city-wide observance of Good Friday. The San Francisco Chamber of Commerce and the Junior Chamber of Commerce have already expressed their interests in the Good Friday movement.

Through Eric E. Wickstrom, chairman of the Men's Commission of the San Francisco Church Federation, which consists of delegates from all of the Protestant denominations, that organization has pledged its cooperation.

... RADIO NEWS ...

BROADCASTERS throughout the country are preparing to meet the requirements of the Federal Radio Commission's new frequency-control ruling which will go into effect next June, which will clear the air of much objectionable interference and accomplish the equivalent of increasing the power and service area of every regional and local station in the United States.

Regional and local stations (those not operating on cleared channels) in every part of the country are installing frequency checking and controlling devices, which will enable them to keep their transmitters operating almost exactly on their assigned frequencies.

The new regulation, adopted by the commission June 22, 1931, and effective one year from that date, provides that all broadcasting stations shall maintain their assigned frequency between the limits of 50 cycles above or below the channel allocated to them. That is, a station operating on 650 kilocycles, for example, must maintain a frequency during operation between 650,050 and 649,050 cycles.

Under the present law a 500-cycle deviation from the assigned frequency is allowed. This means that under the present law the station's frequency may change as much as one kilocycle, but the new regulation limits this permissible change to one-tenth kilocycle.

Engineers who have studied the possible effect of application of the new ruling believe that it will improve reception to a greater degree than any step yet taken in this field. The annual report of the commission called the new regulation a "recognition of the greatest technical advancement in the broadcast transmitter art in recent years." Too great a deviation from frequency brings about what is known as "heterodyne" interference. All radio listeners are familiar with the results of such interference, which sometimes mars the finest programs.

With frequencies of all stations maintained within the 100-cycle limit, the majority of this heterodyne interference will be eliminated. Also, maintenance of frequency, engineers point out, will amount to the same thing as

increasing the power and service area of each station under even the most unfavorable conditions.

THE Seattle Automobile Show, February 29 to March 5, featuring the Associated Spotlight cast as stellar entertainment attraction, closed with an all-time attendance record of 27 per cent above 1930, the best previous record, and over 191 per cent above the 1931 figures.

Seattle automobile show officials declared the Spotlight cast so great a drawing card that hundreds of persons were turned away nightly for lack of sufficient accommodations in the large Seattle Civic Auditorium. On the closing night, Saturday, March 5, additional accommodations were provided to take care of a crowd of 10,000 persons, and the Spotlight cast gave a complete extra evening performance to the regularly scheduled afternoon and evening appearances. The extra performance was broadcast direct from the auditorium stage through KOMO, Seattle, and the five stations of the coast-wide KGO-NBC network, as the Spotlight's regular Saturday evening program.

Members of the Associated Spotlight cast who traveled to Seattle in a special car appropriately decorated with "Let's Get Associated at the Seattle Auto Show" banners included Cecil Underwood, master of ceremonies; Walter Behan, Benny Walker, Max Waizman, Bobbe Deane, Inelda Montagne, Marjorie Primley, Annette Hastings, Refa Miller as Miss Associated, Harold Peary, Harold Dana, Gwynfi Jones, Armand Girard, Capt. Bill Royle, and Charles Ford.

Following is an interesting tabulation of paid attendance for 1930, 1931, and 1932: (12 performances in 1932 as against 14 appearances in 1930 and 1931).

MORE than five years of planning by officials of the League of Nations last month came to fruition when, from its own radio station at Nyon, a short distance from Geneva, the League sought to compose the difficulties between Japan and China.

As far back as 1927, officials of the League recognized that speedy communication was essential to the harmonizing of differences between nations before they reached the point of actual war. With this in mind, a study of the possibilities of radio was undertaken, and early in 1928 experimental broadcasts were sent from a high-powered Dutch station.

Gratified by reports of reception of these programs at far distant points, the League made plans for erection of its own station, only to run into difficulties with the Swiss government, which feared that the operation of a League station in time of war might threaten the neutrality which has been Switzerland's policy for many years.

As the League station would be located in Swiss territory, the Swiss government, still remembering the strenuous efforts necessary to avoid being drawn into the World War, was anxious that its operation should be so arranged that under no circumstances could Switzerland be held responsible for any communications which might meet with the disapproval of any other government.

After lengthy negotiations, it was agreed that the League should build a short-wave station in connection with a long-wave station previously constructed by the Societe Radio Suisse, the government monopoly, which would operate both in time of peace but turn back the stations to the League in the event of emergency, the Swiss government to be held free of all responsibility for their operations.

In normal times the League will have a delegate at the station and will be represented on the board of directors of the company; in times of crisis, when the League is operating the station, the Swiss government will be represented by an observer, and it is definitely provided that the use of the station by the League at such times shall in no case be invoked against Switzerland as affecting her international responsibility.

Although the decision to establish radio communication was made following experimental broadcasts of League propaganda for general consumption, and that phase of the work is expected to be important, the League in announcing the purposes of the station laid little stress upon such activities.

"In normal times," it was declared, "this station would deal with telegrams between the Secretary-General and delegations and the greatest possible number of non-European states. It would provide a broadcasting service for circular telegrams, and information for the various governments and administrations and, if necessary, the press. It would facilitate the rapid transmission of important documents to distant countries, and would thus strengthen the ties between the League and non-European states. By telephonic broadcasting it would also keep the public throughout the world better informed of the work of the League."

Direct services have been opened from the new station with New York, Shanghai, Nagoya, Japan, Buenos Aires, and Rio de Janeiro.

RELATIONSHIP between the motion picture and broadcasting industries may come under Congressional scrutiny as part of an exhaustive investigation of every phase of the motion picture industry which is being sought by Senator Brookhart of Iowa.

While the Senator does not refer to radio in his resolution of inquiry, he does seek for a probe of the inter-relationship between the film industry and the music publishers, sound picture apparatus manufacturers and certain other groups, in the prosecution of which, according to observers in Washington, radio broadcasting would almost certainly be involved.

The outstanding example of the motion picture industry's interest in broadcasting is in the Radio Corporation of America through its film and theater company, Radio-Keith-Orpheum. The proposed investigation would go deeply into the financing of the motion picture companies during the past six years, including the recent refinancing of RKO by which, it is alleged, the Radio Corporation greatly increased its control of the company.

ATEN-YEAR-OLD boy sat on the stool of an old-fashioned piano in a small-town dancing academy, his fingers racing over the keys, his eyes proudly following the whirling figures of the grown-ups who danced to his tune.

The little boy is grown now, and dancers all over the world sway to his music as it comes from phonograph records. Radio audiences also hear it, since Roy Shield, noted composer and conductor, has joined the staff of the National Broadcasting Company, to act as orchestral supervisor.

One of the outstanding figures in the musical world of today, Shield has followed the career he began as a small boy in grade school, through all the changes modernity has brought to his chosen vocation. He was one of the first orchestra conductors to recognize the fact that an orchestra playing in an auditorium and one whose music is being recorded on a phonograph disk, represent two utterly different problems of instrumental balance. He brings to his work as orchestral supervisor of NBC the experience he won as manager at various times of RCA-Victor's foreign, domestic and West Coast departments.

Waseca, Minnesota, was Shield's birthplace. Both his parents were musicians, but

with no professional leanings, and Shield's musical talent, manifested at an age when most youngsters are playing with kindergarten blocks, was a continual surprise as well as a matter of pride to his family.

Shield's first interest was in the piano, and before he was

eleven, he was playing for local dances. At fifteen he was a concert pianist on the Redpath-Vatter circuit, traveling through the Middle West. His ability won the attention of Chicago musicians, and he was awarded a scholarship at the Columbia Conservatory of Music, Chicago. Later he entered Chicago University, and when he was graduated returned to his concert career.

Between tours he found time to engage in composition and conduct orchestras, and when he joined the RCA-

Victor Company as manager of its foreign recordings he was an authority on harmony and instrumental balance.

His appointment as manager of the company's West Coast division brought him to California. Fond of fishing, golf and outdoor sports, Shield finds relaxation in them, but his greatest diversion is—work.

By way of "resting" from conducting orchestra and directing recording operations for RCA-Victor, he has written 200 original "goofs" for the Hal Roach comedies in the last two years. "Goof" is the term which musicians call those gay, nonsensical airs which accompany the peregrinations of Stan Laurel and Oliver Hardy, and similar picture comedians.

Mr. Shield looks to radio, particularly in the West, to supply most of the entertainment stars of the future.

"The larger portion of American talent always has come from the section west of the Mississippi," he says. "The youthful westerner who possesses real talent has every opportunity to make a name for himself, now that radio unites the two coasts of this country."

IF YOU want to find Ann Chase around the NBC studios, look for a girl with a bag of golf sticks or a book under her arm. And if

you see a pretty, warmed-skinned young person with hazel eyes and golden-brown hair carrying both the clubs and the book, you can be quite sure it's she.

The charming young actress, who recently joined NBC National Players, is a person of varied tastes. Her hobbies are many, and she admits that one of the charms radio-acting has for her is that it gives her time to indulge in all of them. They include such widely different diversions as studying the history of costume, writing plays, reading Shakespeare and Dostievsky, and hitting a little white ball more surely and accurately than most of the masculine golfers who rashly compete with her.

Add to all these accomplishments a native shyness which makes it hard to discover just how talented their owner is, and you have Ann!

Born in Kansas City some twenty odd years ago, she was sent East for her education. She attended the Swarthmore School and then enrolled in the Carnegie Institute of Technology, Pittsburgh, as a student in the Drama School. Upon graduation, she joined the Charles Wagner productions, and then played in several stock companies, including the Mt. Gretna Players in Buffalo, New York.

Ann was a member of the Civic Repertory Company of Los Angeles for some time, acting as stage manager as well as playing in a number of its productions. She stage-managed the production of "Peter Pan" in which she

came to San Francisco and, eventually, to NBC.

RAY PERKINS, genial new master of ceremonies on the Fleischmann hour, is more than an entertainer. He's an institution in himself.

Ray is one of the few men on the air—or on land or sea, for that matter—who can get along absolutely under his

own motivation. Ray, it seems, writes his own songs, lyrics, poems, chatter, piano arrangements, and announcements under compulsion. Though he is willing to borrow from George Gershwin or Noel Coward in the matters of numbers, his monologues are all entirely original.

Although for the past year he has been on the air alone in three or four programs a week, Ray has never stolen, borrowed, or appropriated a single joke not his own. That is a record few humorists can tie.

Nor is singing his own songs a new experience to Ray. He spent a year in Hollywood as dean of the Warner Brothers' song writing staff, grinding out such hits as "Under a Texas Moon," "Lady Luck," and "Smilin' Irish Eyes." He even admits in garrulous moments to the composition of "Soft White Hands," the theme song for his hand lotion program.

Finally, that Perkins fellow is no slouch as a pianist. There is just the slightest possibility that he owes his wizardry over the keys to the years when he was seriously engaged in studying music under the tutelage of a score of the nation's greatest pianists. But part of the credit must go to his accomplice, Clarence, the piano.

At the last accounting Ray admitted that he was unable to play the zither, but he has been seen lately going around with a strange looking instrument under his arm. He makes no promises for the future.

In Dollo Sargent, NBC's regular midnight organist on KGO and KPO, to whose exquisitely lovely programs we so often listen, and in Paul Carson, whose "Bridge to Dreamland," on Sunday evenings, over KGO is one of the gem programs of the week, this chain has two concert organists whose work is not excelled by that of radio organists anywhere. A BUSY SHAKER OF THE RADIO PLUM TREE

Diligent in His Business

From the number of synthetic old men
whose quavering voices radioishly implore
us to buy, for pity's sake, some of this or
some of that something advertised on the
air, a body would think that radio is old
and in the hands of the elder air statesmen,
but the truth is that radio is every and
anything else but.

Radio is a new thing under the sun—newer
than depressions, or flaming youth move-
ments, or airplanes, newer even than bud-
get buying.

And, being thus new, the hand that first
shakes the plum tree of success is kin-
cousin to the lips that first scrunch the
ripest fruit and blood-brother to the brain
that thinks up the fastest ways to get to
the plum tree.

All of which leads us around to Ralph Brun-
ton of KJBS in San Francisco, who sits
not and schemes in the sacred secrecy of
a swell suite of offices, but rather installs
a radio in the roof of his semi-luxurious
limousine and then takes program pros-
pects a-riding.

They go out where trees grow, and flowers,
and green grass; where the sun shines and
birds sing and all is as the good Lord
kind of hoped all would be when he made
it that way, and when they get out there
and Ralph turns a little doodad and con-
nects with some program on KJBS, the
two of them can sit and smoke and listen
in peace and comfort and understanding—
and know what they are doing when the
time comes to do it.

In other words, Ralph recognizes that radio
is a new thing, set to old rules from an old
rule book—"Seeist thou a man diligent in
his business, he shall stand before kings."

And now, until this time next week, good-
bye and good luck to every one of you.

BILLY JONES and ERNIE HARE

IT has been thirteen years since Billy Jones and Ernie Hare first met; eleven years since their first broadcast—yet the start of another season finds them still together, and still radio headliners, heard Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday nights at 9:30 o'clock, P.S.T., through the NBC-KGO network.

Their first program went on the air in 1921 from the makeshift studio of the old WJZ station in Newark, N. J. It was received through earphones, and Jones and Hare performed for ninety consecutive minutes. They have been entertaining listeners almost continuously ever since.

In eleven years on the air they have been identified with less than half a dozen programs. Singing together, joking together, they have laughed and jested their way into the acquaintance of millions. They have seen a whole decade of changing public taste, and have remained successful and inseparable.

They were born on the same day of the month and, although not related, their mothers had the same maiden name, Roberts. They are the same height; the same weight, and are even beginning to look alike. Both had a try at business before taking the advice of friends and going on the stage, and both were successful in their own right before they met and launched a new career in radio.

Ernie Hare was born in the South, in Norfolk, Va., to be exact. As a boy he sang in church choirs, but for a career he selected the baking powder business. He became a traveling salesman, but failed to down the desire to sing. Whenever he found himself stranded in a small town over Sunday he always hurried around to the nearest church and offered his services as a soloist.

In his home city of Baltimore, Md., he sang in five churches and attended the Peabody Conservatory of Music. Once he gained sufficient faith in his own voice he lost no time in breaking into the theatrical profession. He made Broadway in four years and his record there includes fourteen musical shows, among them "Sinbad," in which he understudied Al Jolson. Then he met Billy Jones.

Jones will tell you he was born in the South, too. He was—on the southern half of Manhattan Island. He also sang as a choir boy during his early school days, but abandoned the thought of a music career and went to work in the Custom House. This was abandoned in favor of a place in a bank, which in turn gave way to hard labor.

He herded sheep in Wales, mined ore in upper New York state, climbed poles for the telephone company, and made cable for Western Union. All the time he continued to sing for his fellow workers and friends. Eventually they persuaded him to give his voice a real trial, and he too was launched on a theatrical career.

After several seasons in vaudeville, he reached Broadway and scored a real success in musical shows. More musical shows, vaudeville, and concert tours followed. Then he started making phonograph records. Meanwhile, Ernie Hare was also making records, and it was in a recording laboratory that Gustave Haenschen, now an NBC orchestra director, introduced them.

The team of Jones and Hare was born that afternoon. Haenschen wanted someone to sing a duet for a record his orchestra was making. Billy and Ernie offered to assist him before going their separate ways. To their surprise, they found that their voices blended exceptionally well. They liked each other's songs. They liked each other's jokes. They liked each other. They left the laboratory together and, before reaching the street corner, had decided to stay together. For a while they appeared in vaudeville. Then, more for the fun of it than anything else, they faced a microphone "that looked like a tomato can hanging on a hook," and gave that ninety-minute program. One broadcast led to another, and today the boys claim the distinction of being the first entertainers ever to be paid for radio work.

By 1925, the year the National Broadcasting Company was organized, they were the sensation of the networks. One series in which they appeared ran for five and a half years and another for three years. They now are launched on a third-long-time contract.




