



# MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Velva Darling, KNX, commanding a great deal of attention with her sparkling "Hollywood Brevities," flew across the continent with Colonel Charles Lindbergh, and was the only Stanford girl to ever conduct a column for the Stanford *Daily*, the campus paper.

• • • The monthly encore of *Lost and Found*, their famous "Overflow Program," will go on the air Wednesday, March 30, at 9:15 p. m. The sudden and severe illness of Jemima has thrown their plans into confusion. Friends have suggested that they employ classified advertising to obtain a volunteer cat for the occasion, but as few felines have the profundity of intellect and poetry of soul which characterize *Lost and Found's* mascot, the subject has not met with favor from them.

However, "the show must go on," and, bowing to that inflexible rule of the world of pleasure, *Lost and Found* will appear as scheduled.

• • • Headlee L. Blatterman, chief engineer of KFI-KECA, is a graduate of practically every system of sound transmission, having been in turn engaged in research for Western Electric, as ship's operator, as telephone engineer, and for six years as engineer for KFI-KECA. Outside the office, Blatterman's chief interest is his rose garden, which he tends and cherishes with a devotion equal to that of a mountain cat for her young. Blatterman is known as "Father" Blatterman in view of his detached and contemplative demeanor, and his power for fervent invective.

• • • Axel, KFRC's lovable Swede, came into radio and his present fame because of a golf game with Harrison Holliday, KFRC manager. Before that memorial morning on the golf links, Axel, whose real name is Pete Barlow, was the drummer in the KFRC orchestra and a golfer of no mean repute. Holliday, being proud of his "under 80" game, challenged Barlow to a contest. During the course of the game, Barlow made a beautiful drive and approach, but was having considerable difficulty in sinking his putt.

In exasperation he exclaimed: "May guddness, I caneetta put dis crazy ting in da ho-ole!" Such genuine Swede dialect did not go unnoticed by Holliday, always on the lookout for new and unusual radio talent. He asked Barlow if he would do his Swede talk on the air. Barlow acquiesced and was an instantaneous hit. He was soon one of the stars of the Golden State Blue Monday Jamboree and it was during one of his Jamboree acts that Emory Johnson, Hollywood talkie director, heard him on the air and immediately wired him to come to Hollywood for a screen test for the picture, "The Phantom Express," in which the Swede fireman has a leading role.

• • • We are hearing quite a bit lately about two rising young poets, familiar to radio listeners. Foster Rucker, baritone singer and staff announcer of KFOX and his contemporary, Theodore Bliss, KFOX staff announcer and writer are attracting notice with the product of their hobby. Both boys have used their poems in programs and Rucker recently published a gift edition of a few of his verses. Now they are planning companion editions of their poems to be off the press at the same time and to have the same physical appearance and probably will be offered at the companion and single prices.

• • • Prettiest radio star in the Middle West is the title earned by Donna Damerel who plays the part of Marge in the CBS network program, *Myrt and Marge*, because she placed first in her territory in the national contest now being conducted to choose the Beauty Queen of American Radio. In the finals of the contest Miss Damerel, who is one of the youngest as well as one of the newest of the network stars, will compete with the beauties from the East and the West.

• • • "Times are indeed tough," thinks Harry Bechtel, jovial master of ceremonies for KYA's "On With the Show" program. In anticipation of the "kiddies' night" featured on the program, Harry carefully preserved a mammoth all-day sucker Santa Claus had brought. With many heart attacks

he rescued it from the edge of table and bureau, only to drop it and break it into a thousand pieces, when he was only 200 feet from the door of the studio, on the night of the show.

• • • More than 7000 persons packed the new Long Beach Memorial Auditorium when the KFRC Happy-Go-Lucky stars led by Al Pearce made a personal appearance there on March 5.

• • • Louis Relieux, who leads his Brown Palace Hotel orchestra in three broadcasts each week over KOA, Denver, resumed his right name when he brought his orchestra West. He is known widely throughout the East by his stage name, Lix Riley.

• • • Ronald Graham, KFRC's popular young baritone, has been spending his spare time away from the studio in remodeling a spare room of his home into a most unusual music library and den. Ronald likes bright colors and has done all the painting himself, besides building his own cabinets to hold the more than one thousand pieces of sheet music and many volumes of the great composers which are his. Edna O'Keefe, herself one of KFRC's best-liked stars, and wife of Ronald, made the drapes for the room.

• • • Martha Vaughn, lyric soprano, who has made a host of friends at KNX, is a marvelous housekeeper and loves every minute of it, happily married to Dr. Aloys Reiser, eminent composer and winner of the Hollywood Bowl prize for composition.

• • • Fifi, who has a pronounced French accent and since her debut on the Monday night Golden State Jamboree at KFRC several weeks ago has made considerable trouble for Axel, is a real French girl. Her accent is not the "acquired" kind, but the "real McCoy." During the war she was a nurse in one of the largest hospitals close to the front lines in France.

• • • The old theory that a bird sings just because it is happy, is not true, according to Dr. Laurance L. Cross, who pilots NBC's "Crosscuts From the Log o' the Day." The bird choir heard in this morning program includes mocking birds, canaries and a thrush, and all of them sing to compete with other music. They perform most brilliantly when a music box is played out-

side their cages just before they go on the air, causing them to sing as loudly as possible, in order to beat the music box.

• • • Jack Roseleigh, who plays heavy parts in many Columbia dramatic programs, started his long theatrical career as an usher in a Nashville stock company house. One day, the director needed an extra, and usher Roseleigh was drafted. He has never returned to the aisles.

• • • Paul McNally, who conducts the "Brainstormers," an early morning KTAB broadcast, made a good showing in the recent radio-golf tournament. No wonder Paul doesn't mind an early morning program when he gets up at dawn anyway to play golf.

• • • We learned recently, after much cross questioning, some interesting facts in the life of Bill Gould, announcer and staff writer of KFOX. Twenty years on the legitimate stage and in pictures have colored Bill's life richly. Among his treasured memories is a long standing and close friendship with Jack London, beloved California author of rough and ready tales. It was Bill who introduced to Jack London the notorious convict who gave him the material and idea for one of his most famous stories "The Star Gazer," which book was dedicated to Bill Gould. For years Bill was a regular weekend guest at the home of Jack London, Glenn Ellen in Sonoma County and his close association with the writer resulted in his name being referred to more than forty times in the biography of London, written by Pauline Jacobson.

• • • Vincent Lopez, orchestra director, now has permission to march with New York's finest in the annual police parade. The music maestro, following his appearance at the recent opening of the Hollywood Theater in New York, was taken away by a motorcycle escort and made an honorary member of the Honor Legion of the New York Police Department. Lopez has furnished music for many police benefit dances.

• • • The thousands of cards received each year by Irma Glen, Chicago NBC organist, are sent to a home for crippled children where the youngsters spend many happy hours in copying, and making books of them.

# . . . RADIO NEWS . . .

PROSECUTION of the Government's anti-trust suit against the radio industry, with the present depressed conditions making it difficult for the manufacturers and dealers to keep their heads above water, threatens to disrupt the entire trade, according to officials of the Radio Corporation of America.

Prosecution by the Department of Justice of the suit, in view of the changes in contractual relations with other organizations made by RCA to meet the Government's objections, is under attack and the department is charged with inconsistency in recently amending its petition in the Federal Court at Wilmington, Del., to enjoin "some of the very arrangements altered to meet the Government's views."

"We are unable to understand the action of the department in persisting in doing unnecessary things and making unnecessary charges, particularly in times of great business depression and even when there is and long has been great competition—more than adequate from every point of view—in the radio industry," officials of RCA declared in commenting upon the Government's latest move.

The department's plea covers activities of the defendants not heretofore complained of, charging them with attempts to restrain commerce between the United States and foreign countries, as well as domestic commerce, and adds to the list of defendants the National Broadcasting Company, the International General Electric Company, the Westinghouse Electric International Company, and RCA Communications, Inc.

Formation of the National Broadcasting Company by Radio Corporation, General Electric Company, and the Westinghouse Electric Company is charged with having been for the purpose of restraining competition in the business of nation-wide broadcasting.

"The department's demand for additional competition," RCA officials contend, "came at a time when there were so many competitors in the field that overproduction and cut-throat competition threatened the entire industry. This is even more true today, when prices for merchandise are lowest in the history of the industry and when few, if any,

companies engaged in the manufacture and sale of radio devices are able to earn a profit on their business."

The patent cross-licensing contracts of which the Government complains, it is asserted, were filed with the Department of Justice when they were executed and "have been considered by succeeding attorneys general. They were investigated for four years by the Federal Trade Commission and the complaint was dismissed."

The Government suit, it is pointed out, was instituted twelve years after the arrangements it attacks were made. The position of the organization, it is declared, was that any doubt as to the legality of the contracts should be cleared up, and to meet the Government's views RCA is withdrawing from participation in the General Motors Radio Corporation, has changed its contractual relations with the United Fruit Company, has amended certain of its international traffic agreements, and has given favorable consideration to the creation of an open patent pool. Yet, it is complained, these very things, designed to win the approval of the Department of Justice, are made the subject of complaint in the amended bill.

INDICATIONS that the influx of new amateur operators is weakening the control exercised over amateur activities for years by the amateurs' own organization are seen by Government officials in the large number of complaints recently received of operators using call letters not assigned to them.

The reports indicate that the amateur operators use the call letters of others while adjusting their sets, so that any infraction of the regulations occurring during the process will not be traced to them. Ordinarily, it is stated, the offending amateurs resume their own calls as soon as they are assured their transmitters are adjusted for proper legal operation.

In an effort to protect themselves against the issuance of new regulations which might materially reduce the scope of operations now allowed, as well as to eliminate undesirable operators, reports to Washington state, amateurs of longer experience in many lo-

calities are grouping for the purpose of tracing down offenders and are making reports to Washington.

It is pointed out by Government officials that the use of call letters not assigned to a station makes it, in effect, an unlicensed transmitter, the operation of which is a felony punishable by a fine of as much as \$5,000, or imprisonment for as long as five years, or by both fine and imprisonment. Because of the large number of cases reported, the radio division of the Department of Commerce has undertaken a drive against such offenders with a view to barring them from the air.

For a number of years the amateurs of the country were closely linked through a national organization, the Amateur Radio Relay League. Within the past year, however, a very large number of new operators has been licensed, many of which apparently are not members of the organization or fail to realize the importance placed by the body as a whole upon legal operation, and it is chiefly from this group that offenders come, it is believed.

**L**EGISLATION authorizing the War and Navy Departments to keep secret the details of certain apparatus for military or naval use has been given the approval of the Senate and an attempt will be made to secure its enactment before Congress adjourns in June.

Under the provisions of the measure, the two departments would be able to keep confidential their developments in the field of radio, including present experiments with radio-controlled vessels and possible research with radio-controlled torpedoes and aircraft. They would also be able to keep secret their work with respect to military transmission and interference with enemy radio communications.

Present law requires the publication by the departments of full information in connection with the purchase of all materials, proposals for which must be publicly invited. Under the proposed amendment, the departments would not be required to make purchases in this manner, but would be permitted to negotiate with individual manufacturers.

The measure has long been sought by the two departments, the Secretary of War recently explaining that "certain material,

apparatus and equipment used by the Army and Navy is of such a nature that, in the interests of the public service, it should be kept secret."

"Under existing law," he said, "it is impossible to procure such materials, except by Government manufacture, without disclosing their secret nature, because of the necessity for advertising, and the publication of specifications, etc."

Research laboratories of the two branches of the military service are actively engaged in work of a highly important nature, designed for the protection of the country in the event of war. The main points of investigation are in the fields of radio, chemical warfare and aviation. These three phases of military activity, it is believed, are the most important of all under modern conditions.

Because of the present inability to secure apparatus from private manufacturers without publication of important details, the two departments have been forced to manufacture for themselves all equipment of a secret nature, a matter of extreme difficulty in the case of articles of a character requiring machinery not readily available to them. These essential facilities, however, are to be had in a number of manufacturing plants.

**S**UBZERO temperatures which accompanied the severe storms which swept over a large part of the United States early in March caused considerable damage to the monitoring station of the radio division of the Department of Commerce at Grand Island, Nebr.

Ice formation and high winds resulted in serious damage to part of the antenna system, according to reports to Washington, while the extreme cold made it impossible to force sufficient steam from the main building to the engine room to heat the oil line, and, as a result, the oil flow stopped and the lack of lubrication damaged one of the motors.

In an effort to keep in operation such equipment as had not already failed, S. W. Edwards, in charge of the station, installed an electric heater to make possible the continued running of the one large motor still undamaged. This motor was of sufficient size not only to operate the heater which kept its oil line open, but to furnish power for the operation of some of the station apparatus.



# SILHOUETTES

**I**N 1922, Theodore Strong, organist, was first introduced to the ether audiences of Radio Stations WFAF, WJZ, and WOR, pioneer broadcasters on the Atlantic Coast—and he has been going “strong” ever since!

And if a “Believe it or not” column were in order for organists, Strong would be in the first row with a few records. Several years ago he attained a record of 1,000 radio organ recitals, playing 4,000 different compositions. In 1925 he gave the first radio performance on the Pacific Coast of an organ and piano composition, and organized the Tea Time Three, the first combination of its kind to feature pipe organ and piano duets with voice.

Born in New York City, Strong first appeared in public at the age of eight, proudly presented by his piano teacher as the star attraction of the “Ladies Aid” church entertainment at the village church in Mt. Vernon, New York. After the usual coaxing to practice and “clock watching”—the patience of his parents was rewarded by an ever growing interest in music and admiration for the pipe organ. At nineteen Strong started up the ladder of church positions. In the East and on the Pacific Coast he has served as organist and choir director in churches of almost every denomination and during the past seventeen years has played in 2,500 church services and given over 200 dedicatory recitals on twenty-five

different makes of pipe organs!

In New York he was organist at Aeolian Hall and Town Hall, was associated with the music editor of the New York Evening Mail, and his concert management activities brought him in contact with the leading musicians of America and Europe.

Three years ago, on a visit

to New York, while at Aeolian Hall he recorded for the Aeolian Duo-Art Reproducing Pipe Organ. Returning via the Northwest he played at Portland, Tacoma, Seattle, Arlington, and Spokane. He has made two trips to Salt Lake City, playing recitals on the magnificent organ at the Mormon Tabernacle, and for the past five years he has been at the Fifth Church of Christ, Scientist, in San Francisco.

The first radio performance of the Narrative Tone Poem,

“Pilgrim’s Progress,” for the organ by Ernest Austin, was given in its entirety on twelve consecutive Sunday evenings over KPO by Mr. Strong. As musical director of the Shell Happytime programs on which he is now heard each morning over KFRC and the entire Columbia-Don Lee network, he organized “The Celestians,” featuring pipe organ, harp, violin, and cello, a most satisfying combination.

Strong probably has one of the finest pipe organ music collections on the Pacific Coast, requiring two steel filing cabinets to systematically take care of over 10,000 compositions.

**J**UNE PURSELL, who sings in the manner of the late Nora Bayes, has signed a long-term broadcasting contract with the National Broadcasting Company, according to a recent announcement.

Miss Pursell will be heard from New York over an NBC-KGO network

Born in Indianapolis, Miss Pursell went to Los Angeles eight years ago for a visit. Instead of returning to Indiana, where she always had lived, Miss Pursell suddenly found herself embarked in radio and a vocal career.

“I had never even had a vocal lesson,” says Miss Pursell, “but I always loved to sing. While visiting in Hollywood I sang one night at a club. It was something of a dare. A little boy at a nearby table had a ukelele. I asked him if he would let me play it. He said ‘yes.’ I played and

sang for two hours and a half. KNX in Hollywood was broadcasting the program. That's how it all started, I guess."

As a matter of fact, hundreds of telegrams poured in while Miss Pursell sang that night from the Hollywood club, and officials of station KNX were so impressed with the young singer's voice that they urged her to keep on singing and they offered her a job.

"I'll admit I was bowled over," Miss Pursell says, "but I was delighted, and went right to work. I stayed at KNX seven years."

Between radio engagements, June Pursell became popular with Pacific Coast vaudeville audiences. She did a whole year on a Keith-Orpheum circuit and also sang in pictures. She appeared in several talking pictures in singing roles, and one of the last things she did before going east was to whistle for Pola Negri in the screen star's picture, "The Woman Commands."

In 1930 Miss Pursell won a Pacific Coast radio popularity contest and went to Hawaii as a prize winner. She has done several phonograph records and on the Coast has built up a reputation as an unusual ballad singer.

Friends urged Miss Pursell to go east. She went, and was engaged by the National Broadcasting Company after a first audition.

Miss Pursell is five feet four inches tall, weighs 125 pounds and is one of radio's most attractive singers. She has platinum blond hair and blue eyes. Her mother, Mrs. Della Pursell, went from California to be present at Miss Pursell's NBC debut.

HAP and Jack, KYA's rapid-fire song writers, are well on the way to a world record. This team has been on the air for over four years, now, and has, during that time, composed 1371 songs. The record at the present time—1500 over a period of six years—is held by Kenneth Howes of Kansas City. Looks like the boys are going to make it, doesn't it? They hope to have written

3000 tunes by the time that six-year period rolls around.

Now a word about the boys. . . .

Fred (Hap) Van was born almost in the shadow of the theatre, so to speak. His parents—Charles and Fanny—were both musical comedy and vaudeville stars. His father's brother was half of the famous comedy team, "Van and Schenck." His maternal uncle was Sam Bernard, the late musical comedy star. With a background like this, it was inevitable that Hap should follow the call of the footlights. He made his first stage appearance with Gus Edwards' "School Boys and Girls." Lila Lee was in the cast (as Cuddles) and so were Lew Brice, brother of Fannie Brice, and Georgie Jessel. When this engagement was finished he joined a vaudeville troupe, playing the Moss and Stoll circuit theatres in the British Isles. It was at the conclusion of this tour that Hap claims one of the most interesting—and uncomfortable—adventures.

Having ten days before his next engagement in New York should commence, Hap and a party of American showfolk decided "to run over and see Paris." Their visit was not enhanced by the fact that the roar of the German bertha met their ears soon after their disembarkment on the mainland. Not afraid, you understand—just cautious—the party made a hasty departure for Liverpool, meaning to return to America at the earliest opportunity. It seemed, however, that many other well-meaning Americans had also been seized with this commendable desire. All reservations were gone. It

# JUGGLING CHARACTERS

By **CARLTON E. MORSE**

*NBC Mystery Dramatist*

**H**OW," demanded a short-story writer, "are you able to write two stories at the same time and keep the atmosphere of the two separated, not to mention the characters?"

The situation which led to this question was the announcement that I would have two shows running at the same time over the NBC system. One, "The Witch of Endor" is a fast-moving-mystery serial with a background of horror and sinister shadows. The second serial is "One Man's Family" a drama of a modern family and the clash between the sophisticated modern ideals of the younger generation and staid conservatism of the parents.

Perhaps with this explanation you can see the question which arose in the short-story writer's mind. At first he was under the impression that at least one of the two dramas was already completed; in other words, that I was writing them one at a time. This is not true. They are being written episode by episode and week by week. The first part of the week is given over to the trials and tribulations of Dr. Gordon, his daughter Irene and their friends in the mysterious entanglements of "The Witch of Endor."

The second half of the week is devoted to Henry and Fanny Barbour and their five children about whom revolves the tale of "One Man's Family."

"But," persisted the questioner, when I assured him there was never any trouble of keeping the two stories straight. "how can you help but be thinking about your Witches brews, your black cats, your fear-haunted atmosphere of the mystery serial, when you're writing on the other story?"

This is not in the least true. When one becomes accustomed to the demands for swift, sure writing as is the case in the radio

field, he trains himself to drop everything from his mind but the subject at hand. If I sit down to a typewriter with a certain group of characters in mind, then nothing can distract from that group. To begin with, every character is given certain definite characteristics from which he must not deviate. These characters necessarily react in a normal way to the plot of the story and this obviates any possibility of a character getting out of hand.

To explain. In the "Witch of Endor" there is a character known as Wilma Daily. She is twenty-five years old, sophisticated and of a rather acid disposition. When placed in the supernatural atmosphere of the story it is her natural reactions to deride the physical manifestations which clash with reason. In the beginning she makes fun of witchcraft, but as the reign of horror and terror grows she is forced to consider the unnatural events which are taking place. She laughs at the situation less and less and becomes more and more cynical. She admits that certain unheard of events have occurred, but accepts them with reservations.

On the other hand Irene, the young, unsophisticated girl, reacts to these terrors with her deepest emotions. She is afraid of everything she doesn't understand; she is terrified by vague, flitting shadows; she cries out in horror at the mewling of a cat outside her door.

And so with each character. This is called consistency in characterization, and is definitely necessary to the development of personalities in drama.

Now, if all this is so, then how would it be possible for a writer to get one of these characters mixed with a character from another show, even though he were writing three or four dramas at a time? It isn't possible if the writer is at all adept at characterization.

While "Witch of Endor" is a mystery full of physical action, excitement and breathless situations, "One Man's Family" is a story of mental reactions, and sophisticated dialogue. The setting of the latter is modern, the characters are normal human beings reacting to normal situations.

Here we have a conventional mother and father with a housefull of grown children, all of whom feel that their parents are old-fashioned and out of date. They believe in personal freedom, and in the new modern code of self-sufficiency.

There is a pair of twins just nineteen . . . A girl and a boy. They typify the younger generation with all its sophistication, its wildness and its lack of restraint. They get themselves in trouble time and time again, but always they extricate themselves. They are sufficient unto themselves, refusing to allow their parents to interfere either in their pleasures or their woes.

Then there is the eldest son, Paul, who was a World War aviator and due to a wound must walk for the rest of his life with a cane. He represents the ex-service element in this country. He is cynical with the cynicism of the young patriot who fought to make his country a better place to live in, only to return home and find it the same old place. He is shy and a little bitter over his shattered body. He has a highly developed sense of justice, high ideals for himself, and a low opinion of the forces which rule the country.

Here again then, we have a definite group of characters each with his own definite characteristics. Not by any chance in the world would it be possible to mix them with the mystery serial group; not yet would it be possible to introduce the macabre atmosphere into the background.

In the one drama, the sinister element imposes itself upon the group of characters, in the other the personnel lives in a normal atmosphere, all its members reacting upon one another.

So my answer to my short-story friend is, the business of writing two serials at the same time offers no difficulties. One might as easily expect confusion in a woodchopper who interchanges his saw and ax.

**T**HE old saying "There is nothing new under the sun" applies to television, as it has applied to practically every other development in the past.

The self-propelled motor vehicle was invented nearly a century before the first modern automobile was put on the streets. For untold ages, man played with the thought of transporting himself through the air. The idea of projecting pictures over long dis-

tances has received the attention of scientists for half a century, although it is only in the past few years that any substantial progress has been made toward bringing the dream into actuality.

Like aviation and telephony, the development of television was dependent on scientific progress in other lines for its start. For centuries men have dreamed of a "magic carpet," but their imagination until a few years ago was far ahead of actualities. Now the airplane has brought distant cities close, and by the telephone and radio men may talk with others in practically any part of the civilized world. Soon they will be able to see those with whom they talk, though oceans and mountains may intervene.

As far back as 1884, the annals of science disclose, it was recognized by experimenters in the then uncharted fields of the air that to transmit visual images it would be necessary to resolve those images into elements, each element to be faithfully transmitted and reconverted into a corresponding light value at the receiving end. To accomplish this, scanning discs were employed by Nipkow, a German scientist, and ten years later Amstutz, an Illinois experimenter, carried the work on even further.

In 1913, C. Francis Jenkins, then better known as an inventor in the motion picture field than as a radio investigator, undertook a study of television which engrossed him for twelve long years, finally culminating in 1925 in a transmitter and receiver with which moving pictures could be projected over short distances. The following year, John Baird, an English inventor, announced similar success. Both have carried the development of their apparatus to a point where lengthy programs can be staged, with fairly reliable reception at rather distant points.

In 1928, the Bell Telephone Laboratories succeeded in transmitting a picture from Washington to New York, and since that time a number of other experimenters have entered the field of television development. Prominent among those who have carried the art to its present status are Philo Farnsworth, now with the Philadelphia Storage Battery Company; U. A. Sanabria of Chicago, the General Electric laboratories at Schenectady, the Jenkins Television Corporation and the RCA-Victor Company.

At the present time there are 27 licensed television broadcasters.


It's that constant nickel nibbling that he does that is going to make the difference next year in what he puts down in his income tax statement and what I don't put down in mine.

was England or steerage, and Hap chose steerage, with all its attendant miseries—for \$35. Chased by a German U-boat, the ship was two days late. None the worse for the sad experience, Hap came down the gangplank into New York City and stepped into the comedy lead of the "Love Nest Revue."

Meanwhile, while Hap was growing up on the stage, in a small Ohio town, another boy—without a theatrical background—was making plans for a dramatic career. Richard (Jack) Holdgraf first saw the footlights when he was appearing in a "home talent" production. Jack had been destined for the ministry, according to the Reverend J. Holdgraf, his father, but the idea did not strike Jack forcefully, and he accepted a contract as dramatic coach for the home town organization. His next job was with the Neil House Orchestra in Columbus. He did solo numbers. From this job, he progressed to a position as featured soloist with the Hotel Robert Treat Band in Newark, New Jersey. True this wasn't the stage, but it was nearer Broadway, anyway. At last he "got a break" and was hired as featured juvenile in the "Love Nest Revue," in which company Hap Van was the starred comedian.

During their association, while this show played Broadway, the boys planned and prepared a radio act, and at the conclusion of the engagement, decided to give it a try. It "took" with the Eastern stations, and Hap and Jack have been radio stars ever since.
