

## DRASTIC CHANGES PROPOSED TO RADIO CONFERENCE

**D**RASTIC regulation of radio communications and a massed attack upon American-controlled frequencies will be the outstanding features of the international radiotelegraph conference to be held at Madrid, Spain, next fall, it is revealed by copies of proposals to be submitted to the meeting by the various governments, just received in Washington.

The European nations, it is indicated, would welcome a general rearrangement of frequencies for all services, with the dual objective of securing some of the frequencies now controlled by this country in the communications field and the allocation for broadcasting of additional wave-bands used in Europe but not in the Western Hemisphere. Both suggestions are naturally repugnant to the United States.

Approximately 50 per cent of the world frequencies for international services are held by the United States, and for a number of years European nations have been casting covetous eyes in our direction and making many plans to halt the ever-increasing domination of world communications which America is building up. England, Germany, France, and Italy all are anxious to increase the number of frequencies they may use, but under present arrangements this can be accomplished only by stripping the United States.

In the field of broadcasting, the many nations into which Europe is divided has made it difficult to allocate exclusive frequencies, and in several of the European countries wavelengths both above and below the limits of the American broadcasting spectrum are being used. Fears that the use of these outside frequencies for broadcasting may result in interference with international services at some time in the future have led the European governments to suggest that they be made a part of the international broadcasting field, a proposal which is opposed by this government because such frequencies would be outside the range of practically all American broadcast receivers.

Regulation of international communications through censorship has been proposed by a number of nations, among them Japan, Czechoslovakia, and Austria. While any nation, of course, has the right to censor messages affecting her security, these recommendations would go further and apply censorship to press messages which might be damaging to the "good reputations" of a country. Apparently apprehensive that some foreign countries may take damaging action along this line, the United States will propose giving governments the right to suspend international communications, either in whole or in part, for an indefinite period if it is deemed necessary.

# SILHOUETTES

## REX DUNN, NBC Orchestral Leader

**R**EX DUNN, orchestral leader, who is a recent addition to the National Broadcasting Company's San Francisco studios, is one of the most versatile citizens of the musical world of today.

Musicians know him as the composer of numerous works for orchestras and string quartets. He conducted his own cantata, "The Peace Pipe," based upon passages from "Hiawatha," at the twentieth session of the Hague Peace Congress. He is an authority on ancient Celtic music and primitive Indian melodies. Incidental music he wrote for "As You Like It" is used in most productions of that play.

He wrote the musical continuity for the first screen musical comedy, "The Desert Song," as well as for many which followed, including "Viennese Nights," in which he made his only film appearance, as the "Kappelmeister," and he spent four years in Hawaii as conductor of the Honolulu Symphony, in which post he won a lasting place in the affections of audiences there.

A distinguished artistic heritage is Dunn's. An Englishman by birth, he grew up in an interesting atmosphere. The older Dunn was the organist of Westminster Abbey,

and a close friend of Danta Gabriel Rosetti, whose studio was near his own, in Hyde Park. Rex recalls evenings in the Rosetti studio, where Yeats, George Russell, and Swinburne gathered for long

discussions inexplicable to the little boy, and conducive to drowsiness on his part.

Rex was just six years old when he began singing in the boys' choir at Westminster. At nine he made his first "public appearance" by singing with the choir at a gala performance at the Crystal Palace, with royalty for audience.

His real musical education, however, began with the vio-

lin, and at fourteen he was sent to study under Daniel De Lange at the Royal Conservatory of Amsterdam. When he arrived in the United States, he was accounted one of the youngest conductors in this country.

His first trip West was to take the post of musical director at the Coliseum theatre, Seattle. He inaugurated Sunday concerts there, and was one of the first theatre leaders to offer musical programs which were not made and dance airs. The Consolidated Amusement Company liked his work so much that he was sent to Honolulu as its musical director. Instead of filling a short-time contract, he remained for four years, and when he left his farewell audience rose and sang "Aloha" to him.

Warner Brothers had called him back to California to compose musical scores for talking pictures, and he was associated with this work until recently.

Although the new NBC conductor tends toward the B. A. Rolfe and Paul Whiteman style of architecture, he prefers standard music to popular, and believes it is possible to make the former become the latter through radio and allied arts.

# MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • The first of the new "dynamic type" microphones to reach the Pacific Coast are now in daily use at KFRC in San Francisco.

The new mikes are declared by experts to be the first step in bringing listeners the full musical range, previously impossible due to restricted sound frequency range available in present day broadcasting and receiving equipment.

Sound frequencies heretofore impossible to pick up with the old type microphones are recorded with the new "dynamic" mike. Better response to very high pitch sounds, such as snare-drums, cymbals, hand clapping is noticeable in the new microphone. The much maligned soprano also gets a break due to the fact that her overtones, which were beyond the range of former equipment, are now broadcast, according to A. N. Cormack, technical director of KFRC, who supervised installation of the new microphones.

• • • Marking the first time that the city of Oakland has been the originating point for a transcontinental network broadcast, Tom Coakley and his Athens Club orchestra made their debut on the Lucky Strike Dance Hour Thursday, March 24. Born in Oakland on March 30, 1905, Coakley is one of the youngest band leaders in the country. He went to St. Mary's College for two years and while there won a letter in basketball and made a name for himself as the leader of the college orchestra. Later he went to the University of California, where he also made his letter in varsity basketball and received his B. A. degree there in 1929. He will take his degree in law at California in May.

• • • Lou Gordon, the tenor whose melodious tones are heard over KFI, was born in Russia and came to America after the revolution. The terse accounts he gives of his wanderings over China and Siberia with the festive Bolshevik on his trail, are exciting as any fictionized adventure story.

His specialty is singing character songs in foreign languages. Most of his fan mail compliments him on what a fine Italian-Frenchman-German-American style he has.

• • • Gertrude Ridenour, KNX, who has created such a sensation in radio circles in the West, made her radio debut through her activities in the Junior League of Kansas City, and just missed fame on Broadway with one of Al Jolson's shows because her young husband objected strenuously to her going on the stage.

• • • Jimmie Joy and his orchestra made their bow at the Bal Tabarin, San Francisco, March 24, taking the place of Tom Gerun and his orchestra, who have departed for the East, thus exchanging climes with Jimmie, who scored his first triumphs there.

Jimmie is a University of Texas graduate, who started playing saxophone in his college days and organized his first band at that time. He and his group of lively young musicians were a popular institution at the Hotel William Penn, in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, before they came to the Hotel Muehlbach, in Kansas City, and then to the Congress Hotel, in Chicago.

From there they went to the Lotus Gardens, Cleveland, where they played for dancers and broadcast over NBC station WTAM until they followed Horace Greely's advice and came West to the Bal Tabarin.

• • • Eddie Holden, KNX, creator of the lovable character of "Frank Watanabe," the Japanese houseboy, is a marvelous cook and actually boasts about his biscuits. Girls, you had best be looking to your laurels, for Eddie says he takes his hat off to no girl when it comes to getting up a delicious meal in a hurry.

• • • Harold Bechtel, KYA announcer and master of ceremonies on "On With the Show," is reducing. Once, when playing in a stock company as comedian, Harold almost lost his job when his weight fell off to a mere 190 pounds.

• • • Robert Hessler, KYA juvenile accordionist, although only eight years old, has a repertoire of forty-seven selections, both popular and classical, which he plays from memory.

## *Audience Shows Good Taste*

YOUR idea of a "Program Preference Ballot" has interested me from the start, although I have abstained from voting, for especial reasons. One of them is the fact that I am quite partial to certain "small time" stations. Since I foresaw a heavy vote for "chain station" programs (it turned out to be an almost exclusive one for them), I did not wish to be regarded as a "puller" for some of my rather obscure favorites.

Altogether, the public has voted with much better taste than I thought possible. With remarkably few exceptions, deserving programs were acclaimed. Of course, a few offerings which I consider outright and downright worthless and stupid have also carried a heavy, popular vote. It would be unfair to name them; the more so as my own personal taste cannot be regarded as authoritative. But I wish to say that to see such favorites of mine as Masters of Music, Standard Symphony Hour, Howard Barlow's Orchestra, and Stringwood Ensemble among the "select crowd" is encouraging, as to the generally prevailing good taste of radio audiences.

Now, I wonder if programs of smaller stations, of local stations such as KFWI, KLX, KTAB, or KYA, have made a showing at all at the "polls"?

With the exception of John D. Barry (KFWI) and the News Bulletin of KYA, I find no mention of them at all.

May I be permitted to list here a few of my favorites from "small time" programs? Of course, that does not mean that I am set against the chain stations. There are programs on CBS and NBC which belong to my daily fare (or weekly fare), so to speak, such as the Saturday Matinees of KPO, the New York Philharmonic of KFRC, etc.

But I would like to pay some tribute (in alphabetical station order) to Mischa Peiz's Orchestra on KFWI, to the King Sisters and


