## WIDENING OF BROADCAST BAND BEING PUSHED

A STRONG drive for the widening of the broadcasting band is being made by American interests, which see in the failure of the United States to fall in line with European views which call for the segregation of more frequencies for this service a possibility that we may be crowded out of important channels.

European broadcasting is conducted on short, medium and long waves, while in this country it is confined to the medium frequencies, from 550 to 1,500 kilocycles.

The question of widening the broadcasting band is expected to be brought up at the international radio conference to be held at Madrid in September, and American interests are anxious that the United States delegation be provided with a program for which they can work when the question arises.

A plan for adding something over 17,500 kilocycles to this band has been drafted by the International Broadcasting Union, a European organization, for submission to the conference. This is believed to be too much, and that its adoption would require drastic reallocation of a number of important services in the bands which would be taken for broadcasting, and American representatives will be urged to adopt a scheme calling for the addition of some 15,000 kilocycles for use by broadcasting and television stations.

The proposal which has been laid before the government agencies which are drafting the American program for the conference would drop the lower limit of the present broadcasting band from 550 to 540 kilocycles, add two long-wave bands running from 150 to 285 kilocycles and from 370 to 460 kilocycles, and three short-wave bands.

Not only is it necessary for the United States to change its present policy of confining broadcasting to the 550-1,500 kilocycle band in order to prevent European nations from going ahead with their plans for expanding broadcasting frequencies at the expenses of services here, it is contended, but additional channels are highly necessary to prevent interference and friction among the North American countries.

It is pointed out that extensive plans were made some time ago for the construction of stations in Mexico which were to operate upon frequencies held by important stations in this country, and that this scheme was nullified only by the depressions and then not until two frequencies had been invaded by Mexican stations. The return of prosperity, it is declared, will bring about the resumption of these activities and it is highly desirable that new frequencies be secured so that a compact for broadcasting channel allocation between the North American countries can be made.

# MICROPHONE GOSSIP

• • • Jack Douglas, called KFRC's "street singer" by Harrison Holliday, "because his voice is so guttural," must believe in numerology. His real name is Douglas Crickard, and he's the brother of Jack Crickard, the noted Harvard football star.

When Douglas decided to carve out a career for himself as a singer, he also decided that he did not have the right name. So he took his brother's and his own surname, mixed them up and out came Jack Douglas. The initials suited him, too, for didn't Jimmy Durant, Jack Dempsey, John Drew and even John Doe gain fame with them?

There must be something to it, for Jack is already making a name for himself in the world of broadcasting. He may be heard over KFRC and the Don Lee network each week during the Golden State Blue Monday Jamiboree.

• • • Monroe Upton, "Lord Bilgewater" and "Simpv Fitts" to NBC audiences, built the first radio station in Shanghai, China—ECO. He and a friend smuggled radio equipment into Shanghai, through an embargo on all wireless apparatus, due to the war, and gave English and American residents their first radio programs.

• • • Clay Osborne, of KFI-KECA's production staff, spent all morning recently building himself a new lion's roar.

He used a butter barrel, three big pieces of butcher's wrapping paper, some twine, a stick of violinist's rosin, and a generous dose of ingenuity. The result, however, justified every bizarre ingredient.

• • • The wide, open and dusty spaces have furnished radio with some popular features of late. We've had Arizona Wranglers, Missouri Hillbillies, Wild West cowboys, Beach boys and many others—and here come the Desert Rats, KFI, Fridays at 4 p. m.

The Desert Rats come under the leadership of Bill Simmons, composer of popular and cowboy songs, and one of the most picturesque characters in the West. Chuck Darling, harmonica player and singer and Frank Walker, steel guitarist, complete the team.

The parts of Ole and Sambo are taken by Simmons and Slim by Walker, and of Windy by Darling. All three men are Victor recording artists.

• • • Phillips H. Lord, creator of the rôle of "Seth Parker," familiar to NBC listeners everywhere, writes more than 40,000 words a week for his radio presentations, magazine articles and other solicited manuscripts.

• • • Six months ago, Ted Bergman, radio's Joe Palooka, visited a friend who at the time was rather glum. The friend explained that he recently had met a very charming girl who had broken a date with him the night before.

Ted, then a confirmed bachelor as are most men before they're married, sought to cheer the other. "Don't fret about it," consoled Ted, "any girl who'd break a date isn't worth bothering about."

The other day, Ted, newly married, took his bride of two weeks, the former Finette Walker, to visit the same friend.

You've guessed it. She was the same girl who had broken the date, doing it to meet Ted later that evening.

• • • Barbara Jo Allen, pretty NBC actress, would rather travel than do anything else, she admits. She has covered considerable space in her journeyings for she lived in Paris for a year, and in London for almost as long, and she traveled through Italy, Switzerland, Sicily and Africa all alone, when she was scarcely out of her 'teens.

• • • Recently Ray Howell, midnight to 1 a. m. announcer of KNX, in Hollywood, received long distance phone call from Ed Anderson at Ely, Nevada, asking Ray to play a selection for Anderson's aged mother in Great Falls, Montana, whom Anderson had not seen for sixteen years.

Ray obliged. About ten minutes later, a very excited little lady telephoned from Great Falls, Montana. It was Anderson's mother. She had heard the announcement. She requested that a number be played for her son.

Ray did so. Anderson called up the following evening from Nevada to thank Ray.

• • • In typical "Memory Lane" fashion, with ice cream and a cake with candles, fellow members of the NBC program department in San Francisco, celebrated H. C. Connette's fiftieth birthday, on May 2.

The NBC playwright was overcome with emotion when he was ushered into the office commandeered for the surprise party. One of the most unique gifts the historian of Goshen Center in the gay nineties received, was a quaint old needlework picture, made of vari-colored yarn in the manner popular in the "Memory Lane" era.

• • • Artur, the wonder-dog who smokes cigarettes, owned by Bill Sharples of KNX, in Hollywood, was recently depicted by Ripley in his famous "Believe It or Not" feature. This wonderful dog, was presented to the originator of the Bill Sharples Breakfast Gang idea, heard every morning over KNX, by Steve Saunders, owner of Homo, the famous motion picture dog.

Saunders sent Artur to Bill with a note reading to the effect that Bill's program was so human that the donor was convinced that Bill was a real lover of animals, and therefore would appreciate the dog.

• • • Burr McIntosh, grand old man of stage and screen, acts as master of ceremonies for KTM and the Taxpayers' Association program two evenings a week. He published the first pictorial magazine back in 1908; was Taft's official photographer at the Philippines in '08; was with Denman Thompson in "The Old Homestead" back in the gay nineties and recently staged a comeback in the films.

• • • A new sound effect recently was developed by sound engineers of the New York studios. They simulated sounds of milking a cow by squirting water from rubber bulbs into a tin pail. The sound effect was used in a skit of the Stebbins Boys.

• • • A ten gallon hat bearing 275 signatures, artist's picture of Great Falls, Montana, and the seal of the state of Montana, is the valued possession of NBC tenor, John Fogarty. W. J. Fogarty, of Casper, Wyoming, brother of the artist, writes KOA in Denver that this famous hat was presented to Fogarty by his many friends in Montana, and

that it bears the signatures of the governor of Montana, associate judges, district judges and nearly three hundred other prominent citizens. The picture of Great Falls was drawn by Olaf Seltzer, artist.

• • • George Malcolm, giant 6 foot 8 inch night doorman of the National Broadcasting Company Building, at 711 Fifth Avenue, almost had his spirit broken recently when Jack Hightower, the 8 foot 6 inch circus giant, arrived for a broadcast. As Jack unfolded himself from a taxi and looked down on George, who was politely holding the door, the doorman's jaw dropped.

"Well, his feet aren't any bigger, anyway," George said, defensively.

• • • Dancing in the dark is not unknown to radio audiences, but playing in the dark is quite another thing. Tommy Christian's Orchestra, heard over Columbia from a New Jersey amusement park, set that precedent.

Shortly before Christian and his band were to take the air at one o'clock in the morning recently, something went wrong and the lights of the park were extinguished. Did that stop them? It did not. Engineer Robert Trago whipped out a pocket flashlight and used it to help him handle the controls. Announcer Louis Dean lighted matches to assist him through the continuity. Christian employed a lighted cigarette as a baton. And the musicians played the program of popular songs from memory.

• • • Mayor James Walker of New York appeared for an appointment with the Columbia microphone twenty minutes early, the other night. He was so far ahead of schedule that the studio from which he was to speak had not yet been cleared of Abe Lyman's Orchestra. When the mayor saw the tall leader he recalled the occasion, eight years ago, when Abe, as master-of-ceremonies, introduced him over the air from the Cocoanut Grove at Los Angeles.

• • • Stuart Buchanan, versatile dramatist and announcer of the News over KNX, in Hollywood, is turning lecturer.

His two most recent engagements were talks before the Hollywood Woman's Club, and the Foreman's Club of Los Angeles. For his lecture before the Hollywood Club, he chose as his topic Robert Browning's

dramatic monologues. Mr. Buchanan took his Master's degree in studies of Robert Browning.

The talk to the Los Angeles Foreman's Club, conducted at a Los Angeles hotel, was on the Radio News and radio drama.

• • • Ward Wilson is going the way of all successful radio artists—he is playing in RKO vaudeville around New York. He works as a "single," with a microphone the only props required, and he gives some of the impersonations most admired over the air.

• • • When Arthur Allen first was asked to go on the radio he was reluctant to make the step. He had had 15 years on the stage and was inclined to stick to the footlights. But he succumbed eventually and today he is playing Esley Stebbins, of the Stebbins Boys, and is acknowledged a leader in his type of broadcast performance.

• • • Harry Richman, who, among other accomplishments, is a song-writer, once undertook to start one of his own compositions on the way to popularity. His idea was original—instead of trying to get it played in New York, he took the tune to Atlantic City for a week-end. Besides wangling the Atlantic City orchestras into playing it, he walked up and down the boardwalk with a megaphone, singing at the top of his lungs. Week-enders returned to Broadway humming the tune and trying to find the publisher. The number was bought by a big music house and suppressed, because it was similar in title, though not in melody, to a piece the house was about to launch.

• • • Anita Calfot, NBC's engaging little girl actress, has only one complaint to make against her career thus far. Because she is so young, she is almost always cast to play a small boy's part. "And I would so like to be a girl sometimes," says Anita.

• • • Chasing grandmothers is Lyn Church's, KFRC mike-man, latest hobby. But don't get excited for it's only in pursuance of his duties as the newly elected Historian of the Society of Mayflower Descendants of California. It is his duty to pass upon the validity of an applicant's claim to membership, which must rest upon lineal descent from a passenger on the famous old Mayflower.

Church got bitten by the genealogy bug while in college at Harvard. He has kept up his interest and has been active in the affair of the California Genealogical Society.

• • • Bennie Walker, editor of the Woman's Magazine of the Air, knows whereof he speaks when he introduces home science recipes. He once cooked for 205 men—the company to which he was attached during the war—and he insists he still cooks as he did then—"by flavor."

• • • Times are changing, even in the orchestra business. The few "traps" the orchestra drummer used to carry around on jobs are now superseded with several thousand dollars' worth of equipment necessary in present day drum work.

When Eddie O'Malley, KFRC's new drummer reported for work recently, he was accompanied by a large truck loaded to the rim with his equipment. A large freight elevator was loaded with capacity to carry it to the KFRC studios in the Don Lee Building. According to O'Malley, the loaded elevator carried better than \$2,700 worth of percussion instruments.

• • • Eddie (Tiny) Thomas, saxophonist and tenor at KTM, weighs only 270 pounds and has been in radio since 1922, when he was with the original Packard Six at KFI.

• • • A black eye, blue ear and a number of bumps on the heads of NBC announcers at KOA in Denver have convinced them that it is best to beware of Charlie S. Schuerman, orchestra director, in sports as well as in the studio. Julian C. Riley and Les Weelans, regular announcers for KOA, were out playing tennis with Schuerman last week when the genial maestro "cut loose" with a drive that ended squarely in the eye of Riley. A little later another caught Weelans on the left ear. Now, quite naturally, the boys watch more carefully when Mr. Schuerman is wielding the baton over them in the studio.

• • • Blossom Seeley, variety headliner now heard over an NBC network, is one theatrical star who didn't have to change her name. When she was born in San Francisco, Miss Seeley's grandmother took a peek and said, "She's as pretty as a flower; let's call her 'Blossom.'"

• • • Brad Browne, since joining the Three Bakers Sunday evening, finds himself in Bronxville a close neighbor of Darrel Woodyard, baritone of the Bakers trio, who is just across the line in Tuckahoe. Jack Parker, another member of the trio, is not far away in Mt. Vernon. Leo Reisman has his New York home just around the corner from Browne.

• • • Gregory Golubeff, leading the plectrum ensemble for KTM, used to direct the Texaco symphony over a coast network on Sunday nights. Liborius Hauptmann, concert pianist, was formerly music director for the now defunct ABC coast chain. Gladys Johnson, leader of the girls' orchestra, used to play at KGW, Portland. Edmund Lytton, music director, was graduated from the conservatory in Brussels. Bart Sims, organist, was for 15 years organist in a California film palace.

• • • Victor Moore, by acclamation, is conceded to look less like an actor than any other player on Broadway or in the broadcasting studios. He dresses very quietly, with a plain stiff collar, a derby and he would not think of wearing spats or carrying a cane.

• • • Meredith Willson, KFRC's musical director, was so busy following his music that he was 27 years old before he paused long enough to learn to drive an automobile. He's 29 now and pilots his own nifty Cadillac Cabriolet.

• • • Brad Browne, of the Three Bakers, would be Dr. William I. Sirovich's ideal of a radio critic. Asked for an opinion of any of the regular broadcast features, he invariably replies "Swell!" He is a constant listener-in, and hates particularly to miss an episode of any of the continued stories of the air.

• • • Graham McNamee might never have been an announcer had he not wandered up Broadway at lunch time in May, 1922. McNamee was doing jury service and out of curiosity walked in to take a look at the studios. He applied for a singing job and this led to an announcer's rôle.

• • • Edna O'Keefe, popular KFRC hoop-boop-a-doop girl, is taking her recent marriage to Ronald Graham, KFRC staff

baritone, very, very seriously. Since the nuptials, Edna has taken cooking and sewing lessons and, according to Ronald, has turned into a really good housekeeper.

• • • Carveth Wells, NBC explorer, recently received a combination timepiece and stop-watch as a gift from the Society of American Magicians for being master of ceremonies at the Society's annual meeting and show in New York City.

• • • Before their advent into radio, these KNX people were variously engaged. . . Stuart Buchanan as a college professor. . . Velta Darling as columnist for newspaper syndicate. . . Jack Carter on the London stage. . . Georgia Fifield in stock in the East. . . Eddie Albright and his brother operating one of the first gasoline service stations in Chicago. . . Marie Golden an efficient private secretary and expert stenographer. . . Michael Kelley being trained for the British Diplomatic Service. . . and Tudor Williams acting as British Vice Consul in Rome. . . Drury Lane mining coal in Pennsylvania. . . Gertrude Ridenour successful eastern buyer for an exclusive shop in Kansas City. . . and Mary Rossetti in musical comedy on Broadway. . . Tom Wallace interested in physical education for children in Long Beach.

• • • Alice Joy, NBC contralto, is starring at the RKO Palace Theatre in New York where Eddie Cantor, Russ Columbo, George Jessel, Julia Sanderson, Frank Crumit and other famous folk of the entertainment world have been heard this season.

• • • Victor Young, whose string and marimba orchestra is heard with the Mills Brothers when they broadcast, is in receipt of a fun letter that has caused him to scratch his head in wonderment. "I have lived," says the writer of the letter, "to hear what I have never expected and now I can die in peace. At last you have given us something Americans should bless you for each night in their prayers—an orchestra without saxophones."

• • • Billy Jones and Ernie Hare have turned operatic composers. The singing comedians, who broadcast over an NBC network daily except Saturday and Sunday, are writing occasional burlesque operas into their sketches and taking all the parts themselves.

**B**EHIND the heart-touching notes of "Mother Machree" or "I'll Take You Home Again Kathleen," as Irving Kennedy sings them, is the impish twinkle of an irrepressible comedian.

But under the the clowning and merry-making that makes the NBC studios a gay place to be when Irving is on a program, hides the quality of soul which draws all classes of listeners to the microphone to hear him. Unlike many popular tenors, he gets comparatively few letters of the kind which used to be known as "mash notes." Instead, gentle old ladies write to Irving and tell him how much they enjoy the simplicity with which he sings old-time ballads. Little girls tell him about their pets and their dolls, and men write, to say they'd like to have him sing before their club if he visits their city.

One of the most famous singing coaches in the country described him as the possessor of "the only voice I have ever heard which combined everything—talent and soul."

But Irving wasn't unduly flattered. He has the rare ability of judging himself more severely than anyone else, and his own standard is a steep one—he hopes to reach it some day.

In the meantime, however, he goes on being one of the most versatile artists in radio, offering lovely melodies on the air one night, and being Ikey Leshinsky, of the School Days skit in the Associated Spotlight program, the following one.

Irving was born in Brooklyn, New York, in a house where his family has lived for 48 years. Of Scotch and Irish descent, he has two famous ancestors—Mary, Queen of Scots, and Alexander Hamilton. As a child, the NBC star learned to sing Scotch ballads and Irish love songs, but he never thought of singing as a profession until he was all grown up and practicing law.

One day his cousin, Olga Cook, prima donna of "The Student Prince" heard him singing. She took him immediately to a teacher, and four years later he made his professional debut with the Webber Quartet. Afterward he was featured in Irving Berlin's Music Box Revue, and in the Marx Brothers' "Cocoanuts." He was filling an engagement in a San Francisco Theatre when he signed a contract with NBC, and he has remained here ever since.

**W**HENEVER the piping voice of a little boy comes through the loudspeaker, those who know Ben McLaughlin chuckle.

"There's 'Little Bennie' again," they say, picturing the 240-pounder with the wide smile who is talking into the microphone.

"Little Bennie" is only one of the many accomplishments of this NBC artist. His own voice is a strong, vibrant one with a ringing laugh, and he sings in a warm, caressing tenor tone upon occasion, so his portrayal of the enfant terrible of so many NBC programs is a continual surprise and joy to his friends.

Bennie discovered he wanted to be an actor when he was just 13 years old. His father staged benefit entertainments in Bennie's native town of Slatington, Pa., because he enjoyed the experience. Bennie played in some of the entertainments and was infected with the Thespian ambition. His father didn't object to his aim: he made just one stipulation, that Bennie learn some other means of supporting himself first, so that if drama failed him he could always turn to another career.

The elder McLaughlin was a baker, and Bennie prudently followed not only his parent's advice but his vocation also. The World War came along, and Bennie enlisted. He was made camp cook when the authorities discovered his ability along this line. That's when he began to get what he calls "stout."

After the Armistice, Bennie came West and spent several years in Los Angeles, singing with the California Male Quartet, at the Mission Play in San Gabriel and appearing as character man in prologues at Sid Grauman's original "Million Dollar" theatre.

He joined a quintet of male singers which was signed for radio performances, and thus came to the San Francisco studios of the National Broadcasting Co. Mrs. McLaughlin is a violinist who formerly directed a feminine orchestra in Philadelphia.

Besides appearing in the Associated Spotlight Revue. Ben sings and plays in many of the NBC radio dramas, and as Bennie Walker, he is the editor of the Woman's Magazine of the Air, in which he entertains an audience of thousands of housewives every week-day morning.

**A**LL those old jokes about saxophonists seem to have been constructed especially for Walter Beban.

The slim, boyish figure of the conductor of the NBC Associated Spotlight orchestra, is a radiating center for all such jests at his pet instrument. He tells them on himself or flings back terrible puns in answer to them as he progresses through the NBC corridors from program to program, and everybody, including Walter himself, enjoys it.

He's been engaged in such repartee practically all his life, which may be why he knows all the answers by now, for he was in his very early teens when he first began playing saxophones and he was just fifteen when he went around the World with the famous Columbia Park Boys'

Band of San Francisco, under the leadership of the late Maj. Peixotto, its founder. All went well on the trip until the boys reached Louisville, Kentucky, on their way home, and Walter and fifteen other members of the band had to scrub elephants in a circus playing there before they received money enough for their railroad fare back to San Francisco.

That was the NBC star's first taste of trooping and good

experience it proved to be, he admits now, adding a characteristic statement that it was "just training for the Depression."

But even before that, Walter had some noteworthy experience. Born in San Francisco of a family which contains another famous name — George Beban, the actor, now deceased — NBC's saxophonist extraordinaire was an athlete before he finished public school. He put the eight pound shot forty-nine feet, eleven inches; also, ran 100 yards in ten and three-fifths seconds — two records which never have been broken, thus far, by any other 115-pound youngster.

Walter raced to San Diego during the Panama Pacific Exposition (1915) with fifty-six other San Francisco boys. They carried letters of greeting to the Exposition president in San Diego, and Walter and three others arrived the fourth day, having made thirty-five miles a day. And while he wasn't busy with events like these, he was boxing and wrestling at the Olympic Club.

In 1917, Walter was playing in Sophie Tucker's vaudeville band after sixteen months as a single on the Orpheum circuit. When America entered the war, he left the band to join up with the "Bantams," Canadian volunteers, but his father had him discharged because of his age. Later he enlisted in the Marines at Mare Island.

Beban came to NBC from Australia, where he went with the first American dance band to play in the Antipodes, and for four years he directed the orchestra in the world's largest dance hall, at Sydney, Australia. He became an NBC star shortly after the inauguration of the Pacific Division.

And the universal conference on blues has been adjourned?



# ... RADIO NEWS ...

THE importance of the presidential campaigns and the gradual return of confidence are looked to by the radio industry as influences which will bring about definite progress of the trade toward recovery within the next few months, and the improved prosperity of this industry will, in turn, tend to improve conditions in other fields through the increased employment and purchasing power of its thousands of employees.

These, the most cheerful views expressed by industrial leaders for some months, are the sentiments of David Sarnoff, president of the Radio Corporation of America, whose optimism is based upon the actual recovery already made by that organization which, for the last quarter of 1931, showed a loss, but for the first quarter of 1932 has reported a substantial net profit.

"The prospect of radio for the remainder of the year is dependent largely upon the general business trend, and about this one must hesitate before making any prediction," Mr. Sarnoff admitted. "Nevertheless, I believe that the constructive efforts being exerted in many quarters will begin to bear fruit during the current year so that, even though industry may not for some time regain its normal levels, the readjustment to new conditions will have advanced sufficiently to justify the expectation of an acceleration in business.

"In the manufacture of radio receiving equipment, there are some factors which do not apply to business generally. Radio broadcasting has become such an established medium for information that the position of the radio receiver has been altered. It is not a novelty, as it was ten years ago, nor is it confined to supplying amusement and light entertainment, although its place in the home entertainment field is unchallenged; it is now generally recognized that radio is a household and business necessity.

"During the present year, with a presidential campaign in progress which promises to have unusual interest, radio will have added significance in national affairs. I feel it is not too much to say that to know the presidential candidates, to feel their personalities, and to obtain the full information

needed for the exercise of the franchise, there will be an increasing reliance by the public this year on radio. Because of this great service offered by broadcasting, we hope for an improvement in the volume of sales during the balance of the year."

AN entirely new language, intelligible only to the members of the radio fraternity, has been developed by the radio amateurs of the country as a means of reducing the time required for the transmission of long messages which, in view of the large number of amateurs operating, aids in the elimination of interference.

This "radio language," it is explained by C. A. Briggs of the American Radio Relay League, in writing of amateur operations in the Yearbook of the United States Bureau of Standards, is a new and standardized form of language based on abbreviations which are practical, and presents an interesting example of a logical and well-founded practice arising out of experience. It is world-wide and, on account of the energy of the American youth in developing radio, is based on English. It is so comprehensive that amateurs have sometimes talked to each other without realizing that neither could speak the other's language.

The air language is characterized by an abbreviated and apparently phonetic spelling of most of the words, the phonetic aspect being due to the substitution of letters which can be sent with a few movements of the telegraph key for others which are longer, "i," for instance, being used for "y" because it is sent as two "dots" while "y" requires three "dashes" and a "dot."

Adoption of this new language has come about gradually, all with a view to saving time. The amateur, Mr. Briggs explains, works with varying and uncertain conditions, with transmitters of low power, and with interference of all sorts often amounting to a bedlam. Frequently contact is made and communication established only with great difficulty. The curious, brief air language has a tremendous effect in permitting intelligent contact to be made and messages to be exchanged.

Mr. Briggs gives as an example of this

language the following code message, not easily deciphered by the uninitiated: "W3CAB de W3NY R ge om tnx fr call ur fb dc sigs qsa 4 R 5 in Balto hr 2 msg fr Wash qsh? qrk? qri? qsb? ar."

Decoded into understandable English, this means: "W3CAB being called by W3NY. I hear you, good evening, old man. Thank you for calling me. Your fine business direct current signals are of good readability and quite strong here in Baltimore. I have two messages for delivery in Washington. Will you take them? What is my signal strength? What is the character of my signal and what is my frequency? Go ahead."

Hardly the language in which to greet the friend you meet upon the street, but a time saver and a destroyer of international language barriers for the amateur key-pusher upstairs who, through it, is able to talk with another young (and not always so young) amateur whose only spoken language may be Chinese or French, Arabic or Swedish. No matter what they speak, they all know the code.

**A**LL offers to compromise the Government's antitrust suit against the Radio Corporation of America and affiliated organizations on a basis of anything less than complete surrender by the radio companies will be rejected by the Department of Justice.

The intention of the department to carry the case to a final conclusion has been made clear in a report by Attorney-General Mitchell to the Senate Judiciary Committee, in which it is explained that the amended bill of complaint recently filed in the Federal Court in Delaware was merely for the purpose of keeping the suit alive and not intended to inject any new issues.

Under the rules of court, it was pointed out, a suit in equity is dismissed if no action has been taken in court for one year. Very nearly a year having elapsed since filing of the original petition with no further court action, although the department has been actively working on the suit, some step was necessary to keep the case alive.

Delay in the prosecution of the suit, Mr. Mitchell reported, has been due to negotiations whereby some of the points in dispute might be disposed of without trial, thereby saving time and money. Most of these negotiations have centered about the establish-

ment of an open patent pool, whereby any manufacturer in the radio industry could secure the use of patents by payment of fixed royalties.

The defendants in the case have sought to use the patent pool as a bargaining point, the report charged, urging that if they accepted the pool the Government should drop its opposition to other activities which are complained of in the court petition, among them, the Attorney-General declared, "arrangements between the defendants which restrict competition between themselves."

"The department," Mr. Mitchell continued, "has taken the position that even though the patent pool were established it could not acquiesce in the continuation of the other arrangements between the defendants if in contravention of law. Our negotiations have been proceeding on the theory that if the defendants would eliminate all those arrangements, contractual and otherwise, which seemed to be in violation of the antitrust laws the suit would be discontinued for the simple reason that there would be nothing to litigate about. It is hardly necessary to say that we have no authority to agree to the continuance of any arrangement which is forbidden by law."

**B**ROADCASTING stations giving "Naval Observatory" time will be required to secure their signals direct from the Naval Observatory in Washington and may no longer pick them up from the Western Union wire time service, as a result of a complaint to the Federal Radio Commission from Captain S. C. Hooper, director of naval communications of the Navy Department.

Upon application from broadcasting stations, the department authorizes the rebroadcasting of time signals if the station intercepts the direct transmission of the signals from Washington, Captain Hooper pointed out. The rebroadcasting of observatory time signals which are transmitted over a land wire, however, is objectionable because of the inherent time lag in the system which creates an appreciable error in the signal.


