

## NEW PROGRAM ARRANGEMENT

INITIATING a series of progressive measures designed to equip your magazine for greater service and usefulness during 1933, this issue of BROADCAST WEEKLY introduces a new system of grouping programs. The previous practice of dividing the week's schedule by days into seven main sections is discontinued. Under the new arrangement the division is by stations. Each station is listed but once in an issue, and all programs broadcast by that station during the whole week arranged in continuous chronological sequence under the station caption.

This arrangement has the obvious advantage of permitting listeners to survey at a glance and with a minimum turning of pages, the entire week's schedule of their favorite stations. It is inaugurated solely for your convenience, in response to many letters specifically suggesting and requesting such a change. Whether it becomes a permanent policy is for you to decide. BROADCAST WEEKLY is *your* magazine. The radio audience must be served. Its will must prevail. What is your pleasure? Shall the new arrangement continue or the former grouping be returned?

Than the recent presidential election no single circumstance since the discovery of radio has served so impressively to demonstrate its tremendous power and influence in the social, economic and political life of America. Service performed by the broadcasting stations in diffusing political infor-

mation, patriotic though such service may have been in intent and accomplishment, was *not* rendered gratuitously as a contribution to public welfare. It was bought and paid for by the candidates, their parties, or their respective supporters. How lucrative this business was can be judged by the amount and scope of political broadcasting. Stations are entitled to a fair return on their investment, but the public, as "owners" of the air, are likewise justified in insisting that an equitable share of such income shall be spent for public benefit.

Every home and radio listener in the West is vitally concerned with questions and issues such as this. Yet only by presenting a united front and speaking with a common voice can any group of people, however numerous or sincere, protect its rights or enforce its will. BROADCAST WEEKLY affords the bond with which to unite these scattered ranks into a mighty army, and the medium through which to make its collective voice heard and heeded. This army needs 50,000 more recruits by January 1 to make its 1933 campaign successful. Every one of your friends owns a radio. This is your cause and theirs. *You* know the battle BROADCAST WEEKLY is waging, the additional joy and happiness it brings. Tell them. Induce them to subscribe. 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# PERSONAL PICKUPS

Mrs. H. J. K., Seattle. Richard Gordon's early boyhood was spent in Bridgeport, Conn., where his father was engaged in real estate. No relatives or ancestors had ever followed the stage;

in fact the Gordons had always rather looked down upon the theatrical profession. With a grandmother who practiced medicine (the first woman physician, incidentally, in that part of the country), and an apothecary uncle, a fine precedent, it seemed, had been set for young Mr. Gordon, but for some unknown reason he wanted to be an actor. Eventually he was sent to the American Academy of Dramatic Arts, and in 1921 played his first lead in a road show of the "Village Postmaster." The legitimate stage lost him to radio about three and a half years ago after many successful seasons with such noteworthy stars as Ethel Barrymore, Gertrude Lawrence, Carlotta Monterey (wife of Eugene O'Neil), and others of like prominence, too numerous to list. "Sherlock Holmes" was an old familiar character to him when he made his microphonic appearance in the role, yet Mr. Gordon admits suffering acute "mike fright" when he played the part before his invisible audience for the first time. He is a handsome gentleman; tall, broad of shoulders, with dark brown eyes and graying temples; devoted to his wife (Emily Anne Wellman) and two children.

B. D. W., Portland.—Ferde Grofe's family had hoped he would become an important factor in the business world, but at fourteen, Ferdinand Rudolph von Grofe ran away and got himself a job as elevator operator. Shortly after that he became a truckman, then a milkman, a heaver in an iron foundry, a pressman in a book bindery, and then he composed a march for an Elks' Reunion. That was the beginning of an eventful musical career. He toured the California mining camps with Professor Jerome,

played viola in the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra, became Paul Whiteman's right-hand man and for thirteen years scored the "Jazz King's" tunes, prior to becoming a baton wielder himself. He is a squarely built man of indeterminate age with a pleasant, round face. Makes his home in Teaneck, New Jersey, and conducts a real estate firm "on the side."

Alice, Sacramento.—Nick McCarrick (Harl Smith's orchestra) hails from Ohio, is twenty-seven years of age, good-looking with dark curly hair and broad Irish grin and has sung with Harl's aggregation for six years. The pianist is Hap Miller, composer of "I'm Living My Life for You." The Boswell Sisters are New Orleans girls.

R. W. O., Seattle.—Marge of the famous Myrt and Marge team was christened Donna Celeste Damerel and belongs to







Not being satisfied with the acquisition of radio's two most successful comedians — "Amos 'n' Andy"—they took on "The Rise of the Goldbergs," another skit type act, which they recently piped around the NBC network from coast to coast.

That means we are being reminded twice an evening, five evenings a week, that the manufacturers of this product bids us to try his goods. The Goldbergs, new here, have been a tremendous hit in the East, where they have been amusing dialers for the past three years. They may be dialed from 9 to 9:15 o'clock on the KPO net nightly except Saturday and Sunday. The addition of this bill has meant the chopping off of the Amos 'n' Andy act on Saturday nights.

In addition to these two nation-girdling broadcasts, the same sponsor is paying the bill for "Cecil and Sally" transcriptions in Australia.

The Pontiac automobile folk, who wound up their NBC affair some time ago, have signed for more air time, but this time with Columbia. It's a thirteen weeks' contract and calls for a nation-wide release, including KFRC locally, beginning January 5. No dope yet on the program ingredients.

Eleanor Allen, organist, and Eugene Eubanks, reader and production man, both ex-KFRC are job-hunting, due to another economy move on the part of the station. Earl Towner, vocal director, will double in brass, manipulating the stops and keys of the great console when necessary. Fred Lane, announcer for the past five years there is now engaged in free-lance writing. 'Tis said, too, that Bill Wright, all around character man and producer, may be given additional duties, but nothing definite yet.

The voice of NBC's "Singing Lady" has been stilled, at least temporarily. She checked out of the Sutter Street program factory November 18 after ten months on the air for the Kellogg cereal people. Claire Upshur was the "Singing Lady."

Here's what we call perseverance or sumpin'. Jackie Archer, singing pianist, gets

her beauty sleep every night, but hops out of the "comfies" regularly in order to get to KJBS at 12:30 a. m. to play a fifteen-minute program.

\* \* \*

A broadcast paid for by the Velvet Mittens Company is one of the newest commercials to hit the NBC airwaves hereabouts. It's a KGO event released Tuesday mornings from 10:15 to 10:30 o'clock.

Signal Oil has renewed its "Tarzan of the Apes" series on KPO; Paraffine Companies, Inc., has done likewise to its "Jordans at Home"; and the Borden Milk Company has renewed.

'Member Harvey Hays, the "Old Timer" in those Great Northern broadcasts, a couple of years ago? A great favorite, that fellow, and a fine showman, too. Well, we thought you might be interested to know that he can be heard four mornings a week now in the "Words and Music" program released by the NBC-KPO net at 11 o'clock. Dial him on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Just as we forecast a few months ago in these columns, KPO has begun work at the site of its 50,000-watt transmitter south of San Francisco. Don Gilman, NBC lord and master here, says that KPO will probably have its new voice on the air by April 1, 1933.

The new transmitter, a grand affair, is to be situated on a site four miles east of Belmont in San Mateo County. Twenty-five acres of ground are included in the project, which will represent an investment of a quarter of a million dollars.

The NBC engineers pointed out to us that the marshy tidelands on which the transmitter will be situated, make the site exceptionally favorable. You see, the salt water base supplies an efficient ground for broadcasting. The transmitter towers, three of them, will rise three hundred feet in the air.

An honor was paid to KOMO and Hector Cherigny, KOMO continuity writer, when a copy of a story used in the Sunday night Pioneers program, built around the establishing of the Nippon, Yusen Kaisha line between Seattle and Tokyo, was sent by the N. Y. K. officials to the royal family of Japan. . . . Due to the conflicting Columbia chain broadcast of the American School of the Air, Ken Stuart's Carnival of the Air is now going on one hour later. . . . Donna Rue, late of California, made her debut to Northwest radio patronizers recently when she was featured on the Fisher's Blend Party program via KOMO and KGW. . . . The guest artists who have been appearing on KOL's daily Carnival Hour have been picked from auditions held at the station and it is

Ken Stuart's hopes that he some day may be able to put some of the contributors on the program for keeps.

How'd you like a job like this? An eastern sponsor has shipped a gal over to Europe. Those NBC Radio Guild Plays have been changed to Mondays at 1 p. m., the production on November 21 being "Richard the Third." . . . Ben Klassen is being featured as soloist in that Arzen Melody Time which is being NBC'd over KGO on Wednesdays. Walt Beban's orchestra is on, too. . . . Bob Stevens has replaced Irving Kennedy in the Cocol Four, male quartet, on the Associated Spotlight, the latter devoting his efforts to solo work on the program.





• • • KOMO's "Pioneers" program, which is a dramatization of the history of Seattle, has in the cast several former stock actors who played in Pacific Coast cities, including: Leon Cluff, Howard Eclair, Roger Joseph, Richard Lekaye, Keith Parks and George Routh. George Godfrey is the director.

• • • C. Roy Hunt, general manager of KOIN, announces that plans are complete and operations under way for the construction of a new and more powerful transmission plant on the company's property west of the Portland -Oregon City limits. Because of the extreme height of the towers, a special survey was necessary by the Aeronautical Division of the Department of Commerce, which resulted in permission to erect the towers, specially painted and lighted for the protection of aircraft. The new "masts" will be of structural steel 300 feet high and 600 feet apart.

• • • Televisors prefer brunettes, blondes cause no end of trouble for the studio make-up man, and no beauty dares use red lipstick when she appears before the broadcast cameras. • • • "The Goldbergs," one of the most successful radio strips on the eastern ether lanes, is now being heard in the West over an NBC-KPO network five nights a week. Brought to listeners by the sponsors of Amos 'n' Andy, "The Goldbergs" is being offered transcontinentally almost three years after the series made its debut in the East. Gertrude Berg is the author and leading lady, James R. Waters portrays the part of Jake, around whom the plot revolves, and the Goldberg children are played by real children who are microphone veterans in spite of their youth. Sammy is Alfred Corn, and Rosie is Rosalyn Silber.

• • • Miss Betty Webb, who plays the role of Nur-Ulan, the lovely untamed daughter of the Tartar chief, and Omar's sweetheart in "The Story of Omar Khayyam," heard over CBS stations each Thursday night, was recruited from the stage. Though young in years, Miss Webb has to her credit three New York productions and two seasons with William Hodge in the Schubert production, "The Judge's Husband."

• • • Now Graham McNamee is even with Ed Wynn. Several weeks ago Graham's tongue slipped and he pronounced the word "gasoloon" on the Texaco Fire Chief program over NBC networks. Ed wouldn't let Graham forget this slip and kidded him consistently. The other night Wynn's lips went wrong and he said "grassoline." Now Ed is ready to let the whole matter drop. 

# HERB DANA, Football Official

HERB DANA didn't join the Navy and see the world. He joined the Army instead, and there got the beginnings of a knowledge of football that since has distinguished him as one of the best known grid referees in the country.

Listeners to the Associated Spotlight program now hear him regularly in a 15-minute talk on "The Huddle Side of Today's Football Games."

Dana has introduced a decidedly new angle into the general run of sports resumes. His references to the various outstanding plays of the game he has refereed the same afternoon, touch a new high in accuracy and inside information, since he is able to offer what he has actually seen in the close-up—and sometimes worm's-eye view which only a referee can enjoy. The tall, broad-shouldered blonde who today is a familiar and color-

ful figure on western gridirons was born in Omaha, Nebraska in 1900 and left high school to join the medical corps of the Fourth Nebraska Regiment. He had been introduced to athletics in high school through baseball and basketball, but in the Army he learned sufficient about football to earn himself a place on the Nebraska U varsity when he enrolled later to get the balance of his academic training.

Playing guard for Nebraska for four years, he came up against many of the men whose teams he now referees from time to time. His opponents of those days included Slip Madigan, now of Saint Mary's and Clipper Smith and Buck Shaw, now of Santa Clara, all of whom were Notre Dame men at that time. And Paul Schissler, now coach at Oregon State, coached him in both football and basketball

part of the time he was in College.

Dana had studied business administration, and on leaving college and being married, went first to Denver in the Internal Revenue department, and later into business for himself as expert accountant. At the same time he started officiating the games around Denver, and later in those of the Big Ten conference.


In 1928 he came to the Pacific Coast to sell adding machines, and found that his reputation as a referee had preceded him westward. January 1, 1929, he made his western debut at the Rose Bowl game between Georgia Tech and California.

Since then he has had a full schedule throughout every football season, and has officiated in every Stanford-California game, every Rose Bowl game, but one and every California-U. S. C. game.
