KEEP THE AIR LANES CLEAN

A LUSTY laugh is the safety valve of the human soul. Stark realism drives people mad. The appalling suicide rate during recent years indicates not only the greater prevalence of tragedy and want, but also a lamentable lack of "comedy relief" in modern living. Radio can dedicate itself to no more important task during 1933 than that of making people laugh more and have more real inspiring fun.

The brand of comedy broadcast to date has left much to be desired. For the most part it has been amateurish, half-baked stuff mouthed by persons whose chief qualifications seemed to be their phenomenal endurance and utter disregard for the feelings of the audience. Of recent months it has all too often been decidedly "suggestive." The propriety of such broadcasts is not even controversial. They have no place on the air. They can be justified neither on the basis of comedy appeal nor audience following.

If any appreciable percentage of listeners insist that their entertainment be brewed of lascivious and garnished in smut, let them betake themselves to the brothels that cater to depravity, but not ask nor expect decent people to breathe the stench of such putrid fare in their own homes.

A man's home is his castle, the refuge of his family. The right or privilege of entering that home for any purpose whatsoever implies the duty and obligation of respecting its sanctity. To state that of-

fending programs may be tuned out merely begs the question. It should be absolutely impossible to tune *in* programs which by even the slightest suggestion or implication violate the wholesomeness of home atmosphere or contradict the ideals which a home symbolizes and inculcates.

Radio of all public forces, must be kept spotless, because it is essentially the property of the home. Nothing will more quickly bring radio into disrepute, stunt its growth and development, and alienate its millions of fine, clean-minded supporters than its perversion and misuse for sensuous entertainment. BROADCAST WEEKLY does not like to believe that any radio station or program director would deliberately broadcast salacious or suggestive material. But, accidentally or otherwise, such dialogue has been broadcast. Its continuance, therefore, can leave no alternative but the conclusion that such action is deliberate and the avowed policy of any such offending stations.

People need to laugh more. Let there be more comedy on the air, but let it be good, clean, wholesome comedy that the entire family may enjoy. And let broadcasting stations here and now dedicate themselves to so rigid and unswerving an enforcement of this principle that no matter where a childish hand may stop the magic dial, those listening ears will hear nothing that can possibly misguide that youthful fancy and smirch that budding character.

ETHER GLEANINGS

THE San Francisco Police Department's head man—Chief William J. Quinn—will be the principal figure when a gripping new serial drama is launched over the NBC sky lanes later this month.

The Barbary Coast, San Francisco's once world-famed and gay night-life district, will be the theme of the new series. Real instances, dealing with the apprehension of hardened criminals, confidence men, and racketeers who drifted into this section from the four corners of the globe, will be dramatized by the NBC Players.

Chief Quinn, as he did in his recent Chinatown series, will relate the story during each broadcast, which will be followed by the dramatization. Carlton E. Morse, NBC author, will collaborate with the Chief in writing the dramas.

Chief Quinn was one of the first police executives in the country to recognize the merits and possibilities in radio. Long before the San Francisco Police Department radio station was built, the local John Laws used station KJBS to keep in constant contact with the few radio-equipped police cars that were then patrolling the San Francisco streets. Radio proved such a success in running down the criminals that it wasn't long before the city constructed its own station and placed scores more radio-equipped cars in service.

Quinn believes that these dramatizations of real police happenings over the air is the best possible way in which to better acquaint the public with the workings of its police department, to give them a better knowledge of the ways of criminals and, most important of all, to aid in stamping out crime.

Spike all those rumors, you Eb and Zeb fans, about the boys concluding their series on KFRC. When it became known that Al Pearce, one-half of the well-known comic team, was going to Los Angeles with the Happy-Go-Lucky gang, many dialers believed that it spelled the end of the Corn Center episodes.

Jack Hasty, who pens the serial, informed us that Al will fly up to San Francisco several times a month to make the Eb and Zeb episodes by electrical transcription. In that form they will go on the air regularly as heretofore.

Another of Al Pearce's characters—Elmer Blurt—will no longer be heard on the Jam-boree, where it was created, but will hold forth hereafter on the Merrymakers, KHJ

frollic, which is winged out to other Don Lee stations every Sunday night. Jennison Parker is the author of those spasms.

The yarn was originally produced on the NBC for S and W a couple of years ago under the title, "Kenya Bill."

A group of NBC artists are participating in the play, which is being directed by Tom Hutchinson. Others in the cast are: George Rand, the original Kenya Bill; Cameron Prud'honme and Fred Thomas.

Tommy Harris, KFRC songster, hasn't much faith any more in "good luck" charms. He cornered us up at the studios t'other day and weeped out the misfortune he had during the recent Happy-Go-Lucky tour of Southern California. And it all happened in one day. First he came out of the theater in which they were playing in Santa Ana to discover that thieves had broken into his car and stolen all his street clothes. So he had to wear his stage togs around until he looked up a haberdasher. Then he got a letter stating that his pet dog had died in San Francisco. To climax the day, he lost \$60 in a poker game with some of the "gang."

At times young fellows are able to convulse audiences with laughter—literally "roll them in the aisles"—but I believe that it takes time and experiences to turn out a comedian equal to any situation—and, after all, that is what determines his quality. All these crazy antics and inflections of the voice that tickle the risibilities of the audience aren't impromptu. They are a matter of evolution. Ever since I received my first important comic rôle, I have tried to be original, to cultivate those odd twists of the voice and body that make the man a clown."



MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • The recent CBS broadcast of the Elks' Memorial Services, which featured George M. Cohan as master of ceremonies and a special orchestra under the direction of B. A. Rolfe, also included songs by the Queensborough Elks Glee Club, directed by Clayton J. Heermance. Heermance, an attorney whose hobby is music, is the father of Bud Collyer, Columbia serenader, and June Collyer, popular film star.

• • • Miss Margaret Cameron, lyric soprano of KGB, is not only a versatile radio artist but it quite a polo player. This talented young lady is a member of Coronado's younger set and a member of the polo team.

• • • Victor Arden, whose orchestra is heard on Columbia's Sunday matinee, is half of the well-known piano team of Ohman and Arden. He and his partner met right after the war when they worked for a piano roll company. Phil Ohman is at the ivory keys in Vic's band.

• • • The twenty men in Phil Spitalny's orchestra are all competent arrangers. Each aids in the preparation of Phil's programs. At a weekly meeting they discuss how the numbers should be treated. Phil also has induced his men to exchange lessons on their various instruments so that within a year he expects to have the most versatile band in radio.

• • • The Boswell Sisters have started their third big scrapbook of unusual fan letters. Already pasted in the new volume are missives from an engineer in Rotterdam, a geologist in the Andes Mountains of Peru, an American

business man in Jerusalem and a British Army officer on duty somewhere in East Africa.

• • • Dr. Walter Damrosch, dean of American conductors and director of the NBC Music Appreciation Hour, at the age of eighteen was elected permanent conductor of the Newark Harmonic Society, a prominent vocal organization. Less than four years later he conducted his first opera at the Metropolitan.

• • • Al Jolson believes in appearing properly dressed for his Friday night broadcasts before a large audience at the NBC Times Square studio. However, this is for the benefit of the invisible army of listeners. As soon as the program ends, he turns from the studio audience a moment.

"Are we off the air," he demands of the production man. When assured that he is, Jolson heaves a great sigh of relief, loosens his coat, removes his collar and tie.

"Good, now I can get comfortable," he confides to the seven hundred visitors present.

• • • A Christmas present for each member of the "Memory Lane" cast arrived in a big box addressed to H. C. Connette, dramatist of this well-beloved NBC serial. "Ma Smithers" and "Jerushy Scroggins" (Eileen Piggott and Olive West) received each a big jar of delicious home-preserved fruit; Connette got a basket of figs and other fruits—also "home-made"—and the other folks in the cast got enormous avocados, grown on the sender's own ranch.

• • • From the KNX mail bag: Sol Hoopii's Hawaiians were heard by a listener in St. Johns, Newfoundland, during an entire half-hour pro-

gram recently. . . . Captain R. E. Carey, master of the steamship President McKinley, followed KNX election returns for several hours as his ship approached Yokohama (November 9, Japan time). . . . A resident of Dublin, Ireland, listens to the Golden Memories programs. In his regular letters to KNX he lists the musical selections in which he has heard Drury Lane, Wilbur Hatch, and Fred Olsen. . . . H. G. Hiliger of Chicago always gets home by ten o'clock Friday evenings to listen with his family to "The Royal Order of Optimistic Donuts," released 8 to 9 p. m. P. S. T. . . . A fan in Philadelphia pasted a magazine picture of Marion Mansfield on an envelope, wrote "KNX" thereon, and the letter was delivered to the song star with precision and dispatch.

• • • Each Sunday night a group of youngsters from the Edenwald School of the Hebrew Orphan Asylum, New York City, attend the Chase and Sanborn broadcast at the NBC Times Square studio as guests of Eddie Cantor, star of the program. The boys have choice seats, and Eddie gives them special entertainment later.

• • • If Charles Shepherd of KFI ever runs short of batons, he needn't worry—he could really direct the orchestra with that always mobile mop of black hair. (Oh, yes, and if listeners should inquire, Maestro Shepherd is unmarried—and he grins when he admits it).

• • • In a special Sousa Memorial Concert over National Broadcasting Company networks recently, Edwin Franko Goldman, famous band leader, asked the radio audience to suggest a title for

a new unnamed composition. Up to December 20, Goldman has received 8,763 letters.

Goldman wrote the new march as a companion piece to "On the Mall," but had not yet named it when the Goldman Band presented a concert over NBC networks in commemoration of the seventy-eighth birthday of John Philip Sousa.

• • • Leon Belasco's CBS orchestra provides the music at New York's newest rendezvous for the Park Avenueites who don't want to go home. The Prosperity ("Just Around the Corner") Club holds a session at the Hotel Ambassador on Saturday nights, and the tariff, in keeping with the times, is \$4.98 per couple. Leon reports that another idea in keeping with Prosperity is the sale at the Club of such exotic delicacies as hot dogs and hamburgers.

• • • Although Edith Meiser, author of the Sherlock Holmes dramas, heard over NBC network from New York, was trained for the stage and became a star in Theater Guild productions on Broadway, she turned to radio writing because of her lifelong enthusiasm for Conan Doyle thrillers.

• • • While Lanny Ross, NBC tenor, was playing in "Rackety Rackety House" at the Century Theatre in 1912, at the mature age of six years, his father happened to be playing on the roof of the same theatre in a play called "Joseph and His Brethren." Some one stopped young Lanny backstage to ask a question about his part, and he suddenly added proudly as an afterthought, "My father's in a play upstairs. He's an actor, too."

• • • Ann Barley is now assisting Tom Everitt in writing the "March of Time" heard over a coast-to-coast CBS network. Miss Barley is

a former newspaperwoman and has also been on the stage—an ideal background for preparing dramatizations of current events.

• • • Guy Lombardo, who seeks diversion by combing corners of the globe with a short-wave receiver, stayed up until 5 a. m. the other day to tune in Australia. After much delicate tuning, the Australian waves finally brought in the latest recording of some Lombardo rhythms.

• • • Ed Wynn, the Texaco Fire Chief heard over NBC networks, has a friend named J. Weatherstrip Reilly. The Chief says he was born during the war and they called him weatherstrip because he kept his father out of the draft.

• • • Tom Alton, night-time guardian of the KFI-KECA outer portals, is a former member of the U. S. Secret Service, having put in several years with the father of Captain Don Wilkie whose weekly tales of the secret service enjoy a wide hearing.

• • • Bob Taplinger, CBS writer, sought to dispel the illusion held by many that the voices of Jack Benny and Goodman Ace belong to one and the same person, in the recent "Meet the Artist" broadcast when Benny was his interview guest. During the program, he arranged for a surprise switch-over to Chicago and "Easy" Ace exchanged pleasantries with the "nickel-back" comedian.

• • • They do these things at NBC microphones: Frank Munn looks up at the microphone. . . . Cliff Hall, the "Sharley" of the Lucky Strike program, seldom looks away from the script and drops each page as he finishes it to the floor. . . . Gustave Haenschen does a "Charleston" on the conductor's stand. He directs without a baton. . . . Heywood Brown is invariably coatless and has his shirt open at the neck. He never stands, always

sits. . . Richard Gordon never gestures, and keeps a solid stance on both feet. . . . William Shelley bends both knees as he reads from his script held tightly in one hand. . . . Rosaline Green whispers to the "mike" as though she were telling her audience a secret.

• • • On Tuesday, January 3, 1933, KJBS celebrated the commencement of its ninth consecutive year of broadcasting.

Special programs commemorating the event were presented throughout the day with a brief talk on the history of radio broadcasting being given by Bernard H. Linden, supervisor of radio for the Sixth District.

Since 1925, when the station first came on the air with a five-watt transmitter, its growth has been consistent.

In a summary of activities for 1932, Ralph Brunton, general manager, reports that the station aggregated a total of 6668 hours of broadcasting with a daily average of eighteen hours and ten minutes. This is more air time than any other station in Northern California.

Of this total time, 5073 hours, or 76 per cent, were devoted to sustaining programs from which the station received no revenue.

An announcer, talking without interruption, would require more than ten days and nights to broadcast the courtesy announcements released during the year.

KJBS enters its ninth year of broadcasting activity with plans formulated to further increase its value to radio listeners, both from an entertainment and educational standpoint.

• • • Mary Wood, NBC soprano, is an accomplished dancer, and looks forward to television and the opportunity it will bring to use both her voice and her talented toes in musical comedy.



SILHOUETTES

ONCE upon a time there were two young men who could subject the piano keyboard to a psycho-analytical treatment of "Yes, We Have No Bananas," or vice versa. They used music to express what Peter Arno does with pen-and-ink. Humor usually was the dominant note. They pictured the famous American folk song in the tippy manner, or with the bravado of an intense patriot, or mayhap like one who is Sweet, Simple and Girlish. On the other hand, they played classic music with the faultless technique and superb color of concert pianists.

Jacques Fray, the Parisian member of the team, was born February 18, 1903. His father, with the correct impulses of a banker, sent him to the University of Paris to acquire business acumen through the medium of degrees in science and literature. But Jacques, to his father's surprise, chose the keys of the piano rather than those of the cash register. Before he became known to American music-lovers, Jacques was absorbed in musical affairs in Paris and London—writing articles, giving recitals, and composing for musical comedies and revues. Occasionally, he performed at Radio Paris, and for British listeners-in.

His favorite sport is tennis; his favorite book, *Les Freres Karamazov*. He says he is 1 metre, 84 centimeters in height, and weighs 77 kilograms. (Or six foot, one inch—weighing 169 pounds.) He talks with an accent and innumerable gestures, has blue eyes and light brown hair.

Mario Braggiotti's six foot, two inches of height is dominated by marked temperament. He is an attractive young man with dark-eyes, brushes his light hair in a smooth pompadour, and is amusing. He owes his variable personality to education in Boston, Florence and Paris.

As a small boy, Mario listened to his father who was a singing teacher in Florence, and yet received the strictness of study expected of him by Boston ancestry and the Chadwicks. He was taught to study, hard and intensely at the piano, and out of that rigorous training emerged the technique which won him acclaim later.

He is happiest at the piano, and some day hopes to devote all his time to composing and conducting. He already has produced musical comedy and classic writings and makes most of the unusual arrangements featured by the team.

Fray and Braggiotti met in a music publishing house in Paris. Jacques Fray was with a young American girl. Mario Braggiotti, remembering his prep school days in Rhode Island, sat down at a nearby piano and played a tune currently popular in America. The homesick visitor was delighted. Not to be outdone, Jacques Fray sat down at another piano and joined him. The result pleased them both so much that they introduced each other to themselves, and thereafter joined their talents. Heard over the Columbia Broadcasting System.

BERNIE CUMMINS has a John Barrymore profile . . . is a smart dresser . . . is married to a New York heiress . . . gave up professional boxing to become a musician . . . today conducts his orchestra with the remarkable rhythm heard over the Columbia network.

Born Bernard Joseph Cummins in Akron, Ohio, March 10, 1902 . . . one of ten children . . . parents both musical and of Irish extraction . . . started his orchestra at Cincinnati in 1923 at a little place called "Toadstool Inn" . . . began as a drummer . . . today waves a baton in the unusual tempo which has made the Cummins unit popular at many notable resorts.

Opera Advance Publicity Not Available

FOR most of the last four years I have been a subscriber to BROADCAST WEEKLY, and this is my first letter. I felt that such compliments as I could pay have been better expressed by other appreciative subscribers; and I have been unwilling to make complaints, since I realize how difficult it must be to achieve such excellent success as yours has been in keeping program announcements up to date. But now you have disappointed me in a way I cannot overlook; and in an entirely friendly spirit I beg to protest.

This is the second season of broadcasts by the Metropolitan Opera Company of New York. Last season you announced in BROADCAST WEEKLY only a very small minority of the Metropolitan Opera broadcasts actually given; and in consequence I missed most of them, only to learn that friends who looked up their radio broadcasts in the daily papers had been receiving these programs. This year, so far, it is the same story; you have not been announcing Metropolitan Opera broadcasts received through local stations. If I recall correctly, you did announce the first opera broadcast of the season, but since then I have looked in vain in BROADCAST WEEKLY for these programs. Only the other day the Metropolitan broadcast the whole of Mozart's "Don Giovanni," but you did not announce it. I notice, in the issue of December 25-31, just received, that on page 8, under "Ether Gleanings," you state that "Haensel and Gretel" will be broadcast on December 26, but you do not state the hour;

and under the day's listings for December 26, pages 40-43, you do not announce this program.

I dislike to be critical, in view of the excellent service you render, but I for one am suffering a serious musical loss because of your failure to list these Metropolitan Opera programs; and this is the second season in which you have failed your opera-loving subscribers in the same manner. Can't you do something to improve this condition? It would be deeply appreciated.

DX fans are often puzzled by the time difference throughout the world, and have difficulty in computing the time at distant points with respect to the local time. Particularly is this true in the short-wave field, where foreign DX reception is not only possible, but a regular occurrence. For instance, when the Pacific network gives us the London rebroadcasts, no doubt many listeners are puzzled to know the hour in London corresponding to Pacific time. The accompanying World Time Chart answers all questions concerning world time.

The local time, under the "Pacific" heading, corresponds to the time indicated on the same

horizontal line in any other part of the world. It is seen that 2 a. m. here is 10 a. m. in London, 9:30 p. m. in New Zealand, 8 p. m. in Sydney, 7 p. m. in Japan, etc. If you should hear Manila on short waves at 6 a. m., you will know that it is 10 p. m. there. In order to determine whether it is the same day, or the preceding or following day, follow this rule: Crossing from dark to light area at midnight, indicates the following day. Crossing from light to dark area indicates preceding day. As an example, 4 a. m. here is 9 p. m. in Tokio of the preceding day.
