

A NEW DEPARTMENT

In itself an epochal achievement this service will be still further enhanced in scope and value by its context and circulation as a department of BROADCAST

WEEKLY, guide and informant of the Western radio audience and largest and oldest publication of its kind in existence. It will enable advertisers to reach both trade and home simultaneously and effectively at *single* cost. It will keep the viewpoint of audience and buyer constantly before those engaged in the design, production, and sale of radio equipment. And in exactly the same measure it serves the trade, it will benefit the audience by accelerating the development, facilitating the purchase, and increasing the distribution and use of better equipment.

Neither those within an industry nor those served by it can expect aught but stagnation and disappointment unless the happenings within that industry are adequately publicized and it is kept informed on what its buyers want, need, and expect.

ETHER GLEANINGS

WHO said anything about the broadcasting business being on the down grade? We strolled into the NBC's commercial department t'other day and learned that they are head over heels scheduling the new sponsored stuff that is coming up.

Likewise were we advised that no less than seven new big sponsored programs, some of them originating in the eastern studios, would be cracking through these here Western air lanes between now and the middle of next month and there's more in sight.

Among the larger ones is the Westinghouse Electric Company's thrice weekly coast to coast program which gets under way beginning February 14. It will be released over the NBC-KPO network from 8:15 to 8:30 p. m. on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday nights. Octavus Roy Cohen, the renowned playwright and short story writer, has penned a mystery story, monickered: "The Townsend Murder Mystery," which will be released for a period of eighteen weeks.

The Langendorf Bakeries are presenting a program five days a week over the coast net of the NBC, entitled: "The Langendorf Pictorial." It is a dramatization of the outstanding news and sports events. Rush Hughes is handling the program, which hits the ether from 9 to 9:15 a. m. over KGO and KFI.

Those travel impressarios—Thomas Cook & Sons, are to bring us a program beginning February 12, which will be heard every Sunday thereafter from 10:30 to 10:45 a. m. Malcolm La Prade will be featured in a series of travel talks. The KGO net is scheduled to release it.

Vincent Lopez's orchestra and two comedians, not yet named, are to be lined up for the broadcast of the Real Silk Hosiery Company, which begins February 5 and will be heard Sunday nights from 7:15 to 7:45 o'clock. KGO net deals it out here.

The Spratt's Dog Food people will pay for a program over the KGO coast chain beginning February 15 from 8:15 to 8:30 p. m. The Woman's Home Companion is slated to sponsor a series of talks over KGO beginning February 1 from 9:45 to 10 a. m. Sego Milk will start on KGO February 14 with a quarter hour program beginning at 11:30 a. m.

The NBC production staff was still more or less stunned at the recent resignation of

H. C. Connette, one of the gilded pillars of the continuity department and "daddy" of "Memory Lane," popular serial drama. Connette became peeved at the sponsor of the Goshen Center yarns, who insisted that he modernize the scenario and bring all the characters in it up to modern times and plant the scene in Long Beach. It would mean jumping the script ahead thirty-five years from the gay nineties to the present time. Connette maintained that such an act would kill the whole idea of the skits and so that's that.

Earle Hodgins, one of the veteran members of the NBC acting staff, formerly featured in the Medicine Show and Road Show, is no longer associated there.

The KFRC main studio, incidentally, one of the largest on the Pacific Coast, bulged with its largest crowd recently at the farewell program of the Happy-Go-Lucky gang from the San Francisco Don Lee radio outlet. And that isn't all. Twice as many clamored on the outside of the broadcasting sancto sanctorum to get a peek at the mike troupers.

Charlie Gilman, of the station's publicity staff, estimated the mass of humanity that had come to pay respects to Al Pearce and the gang at 1500.

And did this H. G. L. outfit wow 'em when they reached the Los Angeles studios! Reports from there say that there was a like demonstration. Such popularity must be deserved.

One of KTAB's newest sponsors is the Lincoln Finance Company, which is also a KFRC contributor and has been for four years. The KTAB program is released on Tuesdays from 8:30 to 8:45 p. m. The firm signed for fifty-two weeks, the first thirteen of which will be devoted to a program entitled: "Viennese Nights." They are electrical transcriptions.

Congrat., Bill Wright, on your recent appointment by Manager Holliday as production chief of KFRC.

Wright has been associated with the station for a number of years, during which time he has created no less than scrumptiously empty microphone characters, among the most popular being Hans von Hamburg, Steamboat Bill, Reginald Cheerily, Eb of Eb and Zeb. For the past year he has been

producer of the Blue Monday Jamboree. He succeeds Merle Matthews, who resigned to assume other radio activities.

The "Goshen Center Bugle" made its appearance around the NBC studios the other day. It was edited and published by H. C. "Hank" Connette, author of "Memory Lane," as a sort of card of thanks to the many friends of the popular air feature.

The majority of the KTAB studio staff office force have moved bag and baggage to the station's new studios and headquarters in the Sweet's Ballroom building in Oakland. The San Francisco studios, however, will continue to operate, a number of the station's popular daily features originating from there. They will include the X-bar-B Boys, Hill Billies and other features. Tom Morgan, manager; Glenhall Taylor, program director, and other officials will carry on their business from the new East Bay headquarters.

Bobby Burns, the Scotch poet, will be memorialized in a special "Scotch Night" broadcast over twelve stations of the Don Lee-Columbia broadcasting system on the anniversary of his birth, January 25. The program, which will originate at KFRC, will be broadcast from 8:15 to 8:45 o'clock and will feature "Scotty" Mortland, local Scotch bard and radio personality.

Baldwin McGaw, who retired from radio some months ago to teach dramatics, has fallen into the spell of the microphone again. He is appearing with the NBC Players in dramatic productions. Before his retirement from radio McGaw was drama director of KPO

Looney and Gooney, KTAB wits, who've been cutting capers before the mike these many moons, are of the belief that Amos 'n' Andy aren't getting all the listeners. So they have gone on the air at that same hour—8 to 8:15 o'clock—on Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights. They were formerly a matinee feature. We hear, too, that they have a sponsor considering their act. In real life they're Glenhall Taylor and Arnold Maguire.

Typically Bebanesque is the fourth annual "Mug-a-zeen" of the NBC, which was assembled and concocted by Walter Beban, playboy of the coast net headquarters. It's chock full of Beban wit and is headed off with a season's greeting from Don Gilman, the chain's head man here. Following are contributions by the various departments, funny sayings, caricatures of the NBC per-

sonnel, et al. And he soaked us a dime for it, the racketeer!

Charlie Park, who is public relations director for KTAB, pens us the dope that that station has inaugurated a Northern California program with the purpose of disseminating the history and natural resources of the cities, towns and hamlets which comprise that section of the state. It is being wafted out on Wednesday nights from 8:45 to 9 o'clock and is the first of an institutional group of programs by the station to serve public interest. Rah, rah!

We knew it was inevitable that "One Man's Family" would be sponsored. It was a nice "buy" for a wide-awake company who wanted something with great listener interest. The Wesson Oil and Snowdrift people have tagged their name onto the serial for quite a stretch of time.

The Carlton Morse serial has proven one of the most popular to hit the air highways hereabouts and we were more or less surprised that a sponsor didn't grab it long before this.





MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Bing Crosby's 1933 inaugural broadcast for Columbia over the Chesterfield program had all the scintillating sidelights of an opening night . . . Visitors fought for studio passes . . . for the first time more than a score of Crosby worshippers were admitted to the studio . . . fair women pleaded for a handshake or an autograph . . . ushers guarded stairways and passages . . . and Crosby, informally garbed in grey trousers, belted blue jacket, warm-tinted tie, and a pleasantly antique brown fedora, sang on . . . with his old friend and former accompanist, Lennie Hayton, conducting the orchestra . . . afterwards the deluge of messages and calls including a tribute from an invalid friend who welcomed him back to the air.

• • • Ernie Smith's Sport Page of the Air, at 6:45 o'clock every night on KTAB, went into its third year on January 12. Predicated on sports interviews, this review of current sports has achieved a wide audience. During the past year Smith received more than 10,000 letters, chiefly from sports fans who desired to express opinions of topics of the day. He received 2000 letters in five days at the end of the year when he asked if his audience wanted the program continued.

Smith plans to present to the radio audience interviews with Herb Dana, famous football referee, Joe Cronin, new manager of the Washington Senators, Red Grange, Brutus Hamilton, new track coach at California, Tiny Thornhill, new football coach at Stanford, Ike Caveney, manager of the San Francisco Seals, and Ray Brubaker,

manager of the Oakland baseball club, during the coming weeks.

• • • The other night when Fred Yeates, KFI-KECA, staff writer and known to his intimates as "Prof. Rinkelbrau," was being interviewed by Lorna Ladd, canine pandemonium was reigning at his home. Yeates' chow dog, a sensible animal who knows his master's voice, was with friends who were listening to the interview. Upon hearing the voice he knew so well, the dog did his dog-goned-est to get inside the radio set. He scratched at the cloth-covered speaker, growled at the tubes in back and finally went out-of-doors in search of the writer.

• • • Most unique New Year's greeting for 1933 thus far received is the legal looking document issued by Edward W. Firestone, drummer in the NBC orchestra who said his Happy New Year in the form of a will. Eddie, "being of sound mind, stout heart and a slim purse" does "hereby give, bequeath and devise unto my friends an equal share in the Riches of my Good Will, the Fortune of my Best Wishes and the Wealth of My Friendship."

• • • The great names of the silver screen went into a temporary but total eclipse on a recent evening when Kate Smith appeared in the annual Christmas benefit show in the Los Angeles Shrine Auditorium. Hollywood's most glamorous film personalities bowed graciously into the background as the current KNX headliner stampeded an audience of nine thousand persons with her Swanee music. The ovation was described by many fellow professionals who

were appearing on the charity bill as the greatest they had ever witnessed.

• • • Experiments are being conducted by KJBS in the realm of ultra-high frequencies.

Two transmitters are now in operation and tests are being made to determine the various fields of usefulness for these extremely short-wave frequencies.

The call letters of the transmitters are W6XAR and W6XAS. A schedule for broadcasting will be announced later.

• • • Returned from several weeks of barnstorming throughout the state, Glen Rice's Beverly Hillbillies are again on KROW, broadcasting on alternate afternoon and evening periods.

• • • Sidney Franklin, the distinguished Brooklyn bull fighter from Spain, or the eminent Spanish matador from Brooklyn — whichever you prefer—was a modest and retiring visitor in Columbia's reception room the other evening as he listened to his intimate friend Phil Regan, young tenor featured with Burns and Allen and Guy Lombardo.

• • • After considering suggestions received from many thousands of listeners Edwin Franko Goldman, famous American bandleader, has decided on a title for his newest composition which was first played during a Sousa Memorial concert over the NBC network. Goldman, who wrote the new march as a companion piece to his famous "On the Mall," has named it "Cheerio." Commenting on the selection, he said: "The title was selected by me, after

studying the suggestions made in 8,763 letters, because I believe it is most descriptive of the character of the march as I intended it. The title and others including the word 'Cheerio' were suggested by forty-seven different people." The composition was played by the Goldman Band during a concert broadcast on the occasion of the seventy-eighth birthday of John Philip Sousa last November.

• • • When Kate Smith, who is broadcasting temporarily from Hollywood, learned that her pet police dog was missing from the Long Island home of friends who were keeping it for her, she couldn't refrain from making a plea for its return during her radio program. Within ten minutes, five persons telephone the CBS New York studios, four saying that they had found the canine and the fifth offering Kate another dog in case the original wasn't found.

• • • Dolph Martin's Orchestra, now heard with the Travellers' Quartet over the CBS Jubilee programs, presents one of radio's most novel orchestral combinations. Instead of the usual saxophone section there is a flute, a clarinet and only one sax, while the brass section contains but a single trumpet along with a euphonium and a French horn. Martin says the peculiar instrumentation provides a tonal quality particularly well adapted to the novel arrangements he uses.

• • • Happy Jack Turner, heard in early morning piano broadcasts from the Chicago NBC studios once played for two and one-half hours in a marathon broadcast. He did not repeat a number, playing them all from memory, wore out two announcers and was still going strong when the broadcast ended.

• • • What do orchestra members do on their nights off? Believe it or not, the members of Ted Weems' band go and listen to orchestra music. They are frequently spotted on Sunday evenings listening to Joe Haymes' CBS orchestra at the Village Nut Club.

• • • The Bluettes, NBC singing trio, don't believe in depressions. They arrive at the studio every day now in a brand-new car which replaces the chariot which carried them back and forth across the continent three times. For the first time in their joint existence as Bluettes, they have departed from their color scheme, and the new automobile is black instead of blue.

• • • Paul H. Johnson, author of the new KROW serial, "Born of the Dead," has also written for the microphone such dramatized serials as "Murder at the Microphone," "The Man from Deathra," "Shears of Fate" and "I'll Be Hanged."

• • • Cyril Brewer, young baritone who has twice won the Washington State Atwater Kent auditions, is singing on several programs heard over KHQ. He is featured during a quarter hour presentation every Friday morning at 10, "Fiddle and I." Florence Waterhouse, violinist, and Marian Boyle, pianist, are the instrumentalists. Harry Lantry is the author of the scripts, and does the announcing. "Fiddle and I" has been a real success with the radio audience of the Inland Empire, both for the quality of the music and the originality of the continuity.

• • • To KJBS goes the credit of broadcasting the first swimathon heard in this area. The bathing pool of the Central Y. M. C. A. was the scene of this aquatic event with KJBS giving hourly re-

ports on the progress of the swimmers. This long distance contest was concluded after 36 hours of continuous swimming by relays of contestants.

• • • Xavier Cugat, violinist-caricaturist, finally got around to visiting the studios of KFI-KECA. As a member of Phil Harris' Orchestra, he sort of had a little curiosity to see what the place looked like. Many an artist who broadcasts "by remote" never gets a glimpse of the station that puts him into circulation.

• • • Mrs. Charles G. Specht, 69-year-old mother of the CBS maestro, Paul Specht, has never seen her son's famous orchestra, but she never misses one of their broadcasts. Mrs. Specht is still a resident of Sinking Springs, Pennsylvania, the tiny Pennsylvania Dutch settlement where Paul was born.

• • • Dick Teela, NBC singer, sang in a choir, drove a milk wagon, a hearse, played football, won the Wisconsin Atwater-Kent auditions, swam four hours in a storm when his speedboat capsized, and worked as a golf pro, all before he was twenty. Wandered into the NBC studios a few months back to see what they look like, and now he's regularly heard over NBC networks.

• • • Joan Renay is a late comer to KTAB, but is a songster with much background. Joan started her career at the Edgewater Cafe in Chicago, when Art Landre was doing his stuff with the baton. Later she was known as "four-feet-eleven of blues" over the Interstate between Chicago and New Orleans. Joan also sang hot songs over one of the coldest of American stations; the one at Anchorage, Alaska.

• • • Baldassare Ferlazzo, violinist, says his name is pronounced as though spelled, "Bald-a-sorry Fair-lat-zo."



SILHOUETTES



A DARK-EYED, dark-haired slip of a girl who looks as if she might be in her sophomore year at high school, is Kathleen Wilson, NBC actress. . . . Claudia Barbour in "One Man's Family" to you, if you listen to this popular NBC serial.

Appearances are, as usual, misleading. The slim little Kathleen is twenty-two years old, and in her short lifetime has had enough experiences to fill a novel. They range all the way from a childhood in a Berkeley household where Kathleen learned stagecraft and political economy and dancing and social science, to a year in the British Isles, traveling with Ramsey MacDonald's campaign party, and a winter in Florence, where she lived in an old Italian palace and studied painting and fencing. The latter art, taught by Piacenti, former Italian champion, she learned so well that when she returned to California she held the university women's fencing championship for two years. Her painting she regards as a hobby, one of the many mediums of art which she follows on the theory that acting is a combination of all the arts.

Kathleen is the daughter of Ben. F. Wilson, noted Berkeley writer and lecturer who has just recently arrived home from Russia. He and Kath-

leen's mother were returning from a trip to Europe when Kathleen made her appearance. It was in Girard, Kansas, but Kathleen's early memories are of the Berkeley home where she grew up. Violet Wilson and Irving Pichel, her cousins, were the founders of the Berkeley play-

house, and Kathleen made her stage debut with them. She played in Pelleas and Melisande and various Shakespearean productions. . . . "always a pageboy, never a star" . . . she comments sadly. Then when she was twelve she had her first real role—that of Alice in Wonderland, which enjoyed a long run.

On the day following her graduation from high school her father took her to Europe with him. There she met

Philip Snowden and Ramsey MacDonald—her father is an old friend of these two British leaders, having worked with them during the days when the British Labor Party was being organized. Kathleen and he accompanied MacDonald on a speaking campaign through Scotland; then, as Wilson was about to start a lecture tour he left Kathleen in Florence, Italy, for the winter, with friends. She lived in an old Florentine palace there—"I nearly froze to death" is her comment on that glamorous episode. When she returned to Berkeley she took a special course at the University of California, which she completed last spring.

Kathleen made her debut at NBC three years ago and has appeared in numerous serials, such as "Dead Men Prowl." She looks forward to the time when she will look old enough to play Lady Macbeth and similar roles on the stage; in the meantime she enjoys radio work and thinks Claudia Barbour the most interesting character she has ever played. Books, music, flowers and dancing mean much to her; she had danced since she was able to walk, and appeared with Ruth St. Denis when she was six; has done ballet work and appeared in dance recitals. In books, she prefers Russian novels; in music, Debussy and Ravel.

DX fans are often puzzled by the time difference throughout the world, and have difficulty in computing the time at distant points with respect to the local time. Particularly is this true in the short-wave field, where foreign DX reception is not only possible, but a regular occurrence. For instance, when the Pacific network gives us the London rebroadcasts, no doubt many listeners are puzzled to know the hour in London corresponding to Pacific time. The accompanying World Time Chart answers all questions concerning world time.

The local time, under the "Pacific" heading, corresponds to the time indicated on the same

horizontal line in any other part of the world. It is seen that 2 a. m. here is 10 a. m. in London, 9:30 p. m. in New Zealand, 8 p. m. in Sydney, 7 p. m. in Japan, etc. If you should hear Manila on short waves at 6 a. m., you will know that it is 10 p. m. there. In order to determine whether it is the same day, or the preceding or following day, follow this rule: Crossing from dark to light area at midnight, indicates the following day. Crossing from light to dark area indicates preceding day. As an example, 4 a. m. here is 9 p. m. in Tokio of the preceding day.



American Bosch Popularity Contest Closes

SPEAKING over a coast-to-coast network of the National Broadcasting Company and before a battery of newsreel cameras and newspaper photographers, Vice-President Curtis officiated at the Gold Cup Presentation Ceremonies held on the Capitol steps, Washington, D. C., at 11 a. m., Eastern Standard Time, January 3, 1933.

The United American Bosch Radio Star Popularity Poll thus came to a spectacular climax with a day of thrills for all. Arthur D. Murray, president of the United American Bosch Corporation, delivered a short address before the microphone, outlining for radio listeners the objectives and scope of the Poll.

The eight cup winners were:

Rudy Vallee, most popular orchestra leader; Morton Downey, most popular man singer; Jessica Dragonette, most popular woman singer; John S. Young, most popular announcer; Ed Wynn, most popular comedian, who was not present because of broadcast engagements in Chicago, but who was represented by Earl Benham, close per-

sonal friend; Richard Gordon (Sherlock Holmes), most popular dramatic actor; David Rubinoff, most popular in instrumentalist class; and Harry Horlick, director of the most popular programs in the miscellaneous class (A & P Gypsies).

Interesting highlights of the balloting are that better than 3,100 radio stars were voted on by the public. The ballots were presented to the public through the newspapers. Each ballot provided an opportunity to vote for 8 performers in different classifications. More than 25,000,000 individual votes were recorded. A force of 93 tabulators was given the stupendous job of recording these votes in a short period, and over 100 persons were necessary to handle the volume of mail which came from all parts of the country.

The purpose of the Poll was to learn the interest in the stars and their technique and to furnish some reliable index of the public's preference for various types of programs. This is the first time that any serious nation-wide Poll has been conducted to record the basic facts for the guidance of the radio industry.

Talking Wire Is Latest Sound Device

A new device that records sound on a thin steel wire instead of the customary phonograph record is being demonstrated to the trade by the Automatic Amplified Music Co., 280 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco, distributors of sound equipment.

The complete apparatus is

contained in two portable carrying cases and consists of the recording and reproducing apparatus, amplifier, loud speaker and microphone. A spool containing 10,000 feet of fine steel wire is used for recording. When the device is operating the wire is rewound on an empty spool in much the same manner that film is handled in a motion picture camera. It will operate continuously for forty-five minutes and the voice or music recorded can be replayed instantly and as many times as desired. Any part of the recording can be erased immediately and the wire used over and over again. The volume of sound is adjustable on the amplifier.

According to George Potter, manager of the public address department and who is in charge of the demonstrations, two of the first outfits were sold to a Los Angeles newspaper to be used for reporting purposes and three of the units were recently shipped to Australia where they will be used in connection with radio broadcasting.
