

## Radio's Obligation to Children

TOMORROW morning's metropolitan newspapers will carry this or a similar scarehead caption—"BOY BANDIT DEAD IN DARING DAYLIGHT HOLD-UP." Back home, a grayhaired old mother, her anguished heart breaking under the tragic blow will tenderly fondle a bundle of faded baby clothes and cry aloud for her boy. But, over its morning coffee a sophisticated public hardened to the point of considering even murder nonchalantly will read of the event with scarce the flicker of an eyebrow. For, boy-banditry, terrible though its toll and inevitable its consequences, is now a commonplace, everyday occurrence the length and breadth of the land. By far the bulk of our prison population is made up of mere youths, many of them still in their teens. And juvenile crime has become the most pressing problem and greatest menace of modern America.

As the outstanding social influence of the day Radio can and must take serious cognizance of this crucial condition and throw into the battle for betterment the full weight of its tremendous force, patriotically dedicated and intelligently directed to that end.

Criminologists agree that unsocial proclivities are seldom hereditary. Children are not born "bad." Broadly speaking, they acquire criminal habits and tendencies from their environment. Of recent years those elements of this environment which exploit or report crime, real or fictitious, and publicize its perpetrators, have multiplied many times both in number and in circulation—newspapers saturated with lurid accounts of gangsters and gun play, books and periodicals that are a homicidal melange of murder and sex, billboards which drip blood, motion pictures

whose animated arsenals qualify for hero worship by committing wholesale slaughter. And the adventures of "Diamond Dick" which parents of another age wisely banned as so much printed poison, are mere bedtime stories compared to some of the gory dialogue that is this minute being broadcast on the air, in no small measure for the express consumption of children.

The children of today are the citizens of tomorrow. Child welfare and national development demand that these malign forces be suppressed, regenerated, or removed from the sphere of child influence. For its adult audience radio must provide the types of programs for which such listeners have expressed preference—mystery plays, dance orchestras, slapstick comedy, or anything that preference includes within the limits of propriety. But to its child audience radio owes a far greater and more important duty. Child appetite is an unsafe guide for child diet. Programs intended for juvenile ears must be planned and prepared not merely to please, but to conform to definite and inflexible standards of moral value and mental effect. Machine gun melodrama and dime-novel sensationalism have no place in such programs.

Whatever may be the faults or shortcomings of other agencies of entertainment and information, radio must recognize its greater obligation and "hew to the line." Continuity must be written not merely with the thought of satisfying sponsors and selling merchandise, but of serving childhood. The time has come when no sponsor or station may with impunity continue to sacrifice American children on the gilded altar of cash register receipts.

# ETHER GLEANINGS

THESE "first nights" at radio studio productions are always attendant with thrills—for this observer, at least.

We had the good fortune recently to be present at the debut in the KFRC studios of the Shell Oil Company's new night time air extravaganza. Although we've attended many such occasions over a period of years, each one has brought about that tingling sensation. There are more thrills in a radio "first night" than a dozen in the theater.

Those of you who heard it over the Don Lee-CBS chain know that it was a musical comedy, entitled: "Columbus Gets the Gems for the Ocean Trip."

More than two hundred invited guests filled the studio. The male artists, garbed in soup 'n' fish and the ladies in flowing evening gowns of the latest creation, clustered about the microphones waiting for the magic word that they were "on the air." To them it seemed like ages—waiting. It's a ticklish business. Waiting for the signal. A mike personality who had been overseas during the big squabble once told me that waiting for that signal was like waiting for the officer's word to "go over the top." It was just as nerve-racking.

The orchestra director's baton was held motionless in the air. The signal light flashed and the show was on!

For sixty minutes we were entertained with music, especially written for the show by Edward Harris, and good dialogue, highly seasoned with comedy, presented by a fine cast of actors. Stanley MacLewee wrote the dialogue. John Eugene Hasty, prolific radio playwright, whose successes include "Eb and Zeb," was in a new role—that of producer.

Among the principals were artists whose names are already household words in the West. John Fee was the Observer; Tommy Harris, Ball; Arthur Cunningham, the Sheriff; Baldwin McGaw, Columbus; Helen Jones, Isabella; Edna O'Keefe, Rita; Nora Schiller and Harris Brown. The vocalists included: Livia Maracci, soprano; Ted Roy, tenor, and a male ensemble. Edward Harris and Walter Kelsey took turns about directing the orchestra.

Harrison Holliday was there to greet the visitors. And in the adjoining studio, listening to the production with critical ears, were E. H. Sanders, advertising manager of the Shell Oil Company; MacLewee, advertising men, and radio experts.

The removal of Irving Kennedy, the NBC's golden tinselled tenor, from the Associated Spotlight turned out to be a lucky break for him, for he is hitting the high C's before the mike more than ever now. In fact, he's to be heard daily in a quarter hour program all his own, from 6:45 to 7 p. m. over the KPO network. He filled the gap left by the cancellation of the Cecil and Sally act. And what a lot of fun Irving is having, too. He's singing everything from ballads to high brow stuff and giving it to 'em in a variety of languages—seven different ones, to be exact.

Not content with penning "One Man's Family," those new Barbary Coast yarns and other NBC nick-nacks, Carlton E. Morse has ground out a half hour drama for KPO Monday night, January 30, at 8:30 o'clock. "War Paint" is the title. Hoop-la.

And while we're dwelling on the production end of the broadcasting business, let's remind you that Ted Maxwell, veteran radio actor, producer and author, is now scribbling those "Memory Lane" episodes. As told in the last issue, H. C. Connette resigned from the network because his opinions about the Goshen Center yarns didn't jibe with those of the sponsor. Maxwell is Pa Smithers in the skits.

There's another chap from that office we'd like to talk about, too. He's Marvin Young. He started his career in the movies. Began at the bottom as a prop boy and eventually worked himself up to a producer. He was planning to bring the famous Toonerville Trolley comics to the screen, when the talkies appeared on the Hollywood horizon, followed by a general upheaval in the picture business. He was caught in the cyclone which hurled him deliberately into a radio studio. For a long time he produced those opera hours over KPO before the NBC took over the station. Now his program creations are being aired over the NBC chain on the coast.

On January 31 we get those Eno Crime Club mystery dramas back again, but this time on the NBC. Last year they were produced on Columbia. They've been cut on wax for the Western release and will be heard over KPO from 8:30 to 9 p. m.

\* \* \*

That personal magnetism that is the Happy-Go-Lucky gang, has registered just

about one hundred per cent so far down in Los Angeles, we are informed. Great crowds gather at the KHJ studio daily to watch the "puffawmers" work, and so great is the demand for seats that many are now daily bringing their lunches, getting at the studio hours before the broadcast and making it a regular all-day picnic.

Nat Vincent and Fred Howard, familiarly known to dialers as the "Happy Chappies," are now peddling their musical wares over KNX in Hollywood. They were quite active in radio in the bay area several years ago.

\* \* \*

If you have listened to the program of Emilio Bronsilau on KYA you have heard him playing a guitar that was made in 1860 and is still going strong. Bronsilau is heard every Saturday night. Before coming to the microphone world he was widely known on the vaudeville stage.

\* \* \*

Once again Tom Coakley and his Athens Athletic Club dance orchestra are being heard over the Don Lee network.

This time Coakley is replacing Ted Fiorito and his orchestra, who are on a week's vacation from the Hotel St. Francis.

Coakley, you recall, climbed into national prominence some months ago when his band was chosen to represent Oakland on the Lucky Strike hour. Since then Coakley appeared for a several months' engagement at a Hollywood hotel and has been heard a number of times on Cap'n Dobbsie's Shell Happytime broadcast.

Dick Aurdant, for two years organist at the Fox Theater in San Francisco, has been named maestro of the stops and keys at the KFRC studios. He has officiated at the organ for a number of years at various San Francisco movie palaces.

\* \* \*

Carl Rhodehamel, for several years in charge of the KGO Little Symphony orchestra and more recent than that director of the station's publicity, before it was leased by the NBC, broke into news print recently. Rhodehamel, now an official of the Unemployed Exchange Association, is attempting to organize a symphony orchestra among the unemployed of Oakland.

Gene Sullivan, who gives those outdoor sportsman's talks over KYA, is preparing to publish a sports paper, which will be devoted to news of interest to lovers of sports in the great outdoors.

\* \* \*

That Talent Parade, new program started recently by the NBC, is turning out to be Discovery Night. The idea of the broadcast,

which is winged out Friday from 10 to 11 p. m., is to permit the invited artists to fulfill their secret desires of doing just what they want to on a program and not what the production department tells them. Drama artists have been discovered to be good singers and vice versa; musicians were discovered to have voices and announcers to be musically inclined. For this privilege of releasing their suppressed desires, the NBC artists are donating their time to the network.

Our northwest news gatherer, John Haughn, Jr., pens us these pertinent facts about radio conditions up that way:

Although Vic Meyers is now Lieutenant Governor of Washington, his program will continue over KOMO and he will make regular trips to Seattle in order to appear personally on the broadcast.

During the inaugural ceremonies at Olympia of the new Washington executives, which were broadcast by several stations in the state, KOMO, which picked up the event, did not release it on the air. The transfer was made by telephone from KOMO, which is the only station in the Northwest with portable equipment.

The Sunset Oil Company is sponsoring a new program over KOL and KVI. It features Hill and Dale, piano duo; Glen Eaton and Eva Gonella, soloists, and a trio. Wen Niles is the announcer.

The real name of KOMO's continuity writer, Hector Chevigny, is Hector Louise Chevigny de la Chevretiere.

**Brief Broadcasts.**—Carnation's "Cross-cuts from the Log of the Day" is now being broadcast over the NBC on Saturday mornings instead of Mondays, in addition to Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. . . . Harold Bock, San Francisco representative for Variety, national theatrical and radio publication, is convalescing from a recent major operation. . . . The Gilmore Circus now hits the airlines for a full hour—8:15 to 9:15 p. m., on Friday nights over KGO. . . . Public Food Stores gave out more than 15,000 Cecil and Sally calendars the day after the free distribution was announced on KPO. . . . Elvina Jensen of the NBC publicity department was recently named secretary to Karl Schullinger, manager of the Artist's Service. . . . Charles Chylinski, who conducts the Slavic programs on KYA, is an attorney. . . . Those Northern California good-will broadcasts over KTAB have been changed to Wednesday nights at 10 o'clock, Charles Park, the station's director of public relations informs us. The feature is scheduled to continue over a period of several months.

# MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Turning from his rôle of principal in "Memory Lane," NBC epic of Goshen Center in the nineties, Ted Maxwell ("Pa Smithers") becomes the author of the serial. Maxwell replaces H. C. Connette as writer of the popular NBC narrative which has been on the air since April, 1927. Connette's resignation from the NBC staff became effective January 22. Maxwell originated the rôle of Silas Smithers in the serial when he and Eileen Piggott ("Ma Smithers") and Billy Page (Billy Smithers) comprised its entire cast, and his familiarity with the characters and theme, as well as the atmosphere and midwest dialect, makes him the logical person to carry on the running tale of fortunes of the Smithers family. The new historian of the Goshen Center folks is well known as a playwright as well as a leading man of stage and radio experience. Born in Oakland, California, he has been associated with the theater since he was fifteen. In one winter, "snowed in" a cabin in the mountains, Ted wrote fifty-three plays, all of which have seen the footlights not once but many times. He was Jack in the Jack and Ethyl series, and as one of the most capable microphone actors on the Coast, is heard in many dramas broadcast from San Francisco.

• • • Earle Sanderson of KFWI was born in Tres Pinos, California, in 1906, spent his early youth in Livermore, California, and received his education in San Francisco. A flair for dramatics found him in Hollywood in amateur theatricals and later in pictures and radio plays. After a year of this, back to San Francisco and a member of the Players Guild, and

eventually on KFWI's staff announcing, writing and producing plays and an occasional mystery chiller. He has grey eyes, is 5 feet 11 inches tall, and weighs 170 pounds. He's single, likes to swim, packs a golf handicap of 10, and is a sun-worshipper.

• • • "Bing" Crosby, radio's most popular male singer, and George Burns and Grace Allen, radio, vaudeville and screen comedy partners, soon will return to Hollywood to appear in Paramount's "College Humor" with Richard Arlen, Frances Dee and Randolph Scott. The trio worked together some months ago in "The Big Broadcast," one of the most successful pictures of the season.

Wesley Ruggles is to direct "College Humor," which is from a novel by Dean Fales which Frank Butler and Claude Binyon have adapted to the screen.

• • • Marion Mansfield, vocalist, who is heard over KNX on various programs, has lived in France, Switzerland, Canada, and in Mexico. She is a native of Kansas City, Missouri.

• • • Radio performers found that radio played a part in foiling two robberies around New York last week. Eddie Cantor got a call from a friend who left the movies early Sunday to catch the beginning of Eddie's broadcast and incidentally interrupted a bird who was trying to break in to his apartment. Ward Wilson, a day later, was awakened by the noise of someone tampering with a window. He got the police on the phone; headquarters broadcast a radio alarm and officers arrived in time to catch the intruder.

• • • Ken Stuart, KOL's popular studio manager and sports announcer de luxe, is expected to return to work early in February, after an illness of two months. During his absence, the studio has been deluged with telephone calls, and so many people thronged to the hospital to see him, that even during his convalescence, the hospital officials had to deny all visitors.

• • • Charlie Wellman, KECA-KFI, is something of a rarity in the realm of radio artists. He actually listens to his radio when not himself engaged in making fodder for other folks' receivers.

• • • The debut performance of Ivan Ditmars' "Musical Technocrats," was heard over KOL and KVI, January 10. The program originated in KOL's Northern Life Tower studios, Seattle. Heard on the program were Glen Eaton, tenor ballad singer; Eva Gonnella, soprano; Hill and Dale, piano duo (Helen Hill and Ivan Dale Ditmars); and the vocal trio, Frank Anderson, "Doc" Hull, and Jack Hill, with Frank Anderson heading the trio. Wen Niles is master of ceremonies and special announcer on the program which will feature ballad, semi-classical, popular jazz and harmony numbers.

• • • H. C. Singleton has been appointed, effective January 1, as engineer for KGW, Portland, Oregon.

• • • Nikola Zan, baritone, is a new artist on KGW, Portland, Oregon, featured with Margaret Notz, pianist, in a series of Sunday broadcasts for a sponsor.

• • • Now they've gone and named a breed of dog after Jack Pearl, the Magic Carpet

gagger on Thursday nights. The new breed is called the Munchausen after the radio character of the liar baron Pearl exemplifies over the air. A Philadelphia breeder has bred a longer and lower dachshund that covers so much ground that few people would believe it without seeing the elongated canine so he thought "Munchausen" was an ideal name. Mr. Pearl has already placed an order for a pup which he will not call "Sharlie" because a dog that long will undoubtedly be there.

• • • Radio's latest menace is ticket speculators who stand outside the Times Square studio in New York and peddle seats. Hardest hit is the Magic Carpet program on Thursday nights, which features Jack Pearl and for which requests for the free seats are mailed in 12 weeks in advance. The speculators have been swamping the program sponsors with requests for tickets and when they get them, sell the tickets. The sponsors are planning to number tickets so they can be checked up.

• • • Monroe Upton, NBC star, writes letters upon unique stationery adorned with a line drawing of a radio transmitter and a silhouette of his famous ether character, Lord Bilgewater.

• • • Marian Peck, soprano voice in the Bluettes, NBC singing trio, is becoming more and more in demand as a model by photographers. The attractive blonde Blulette photographs like "a combination of Jean Harlow and Thelma Todd" according to one enthusiastic camera-man.

• • • Al Jolson appeared on the stage of the NBC Times Square Studio for his broadcast wearing a pair of horn-rimmed spectacles, his first. "I need them," he explained, "because the figures on contracts are getting so small these days."

• • • Carlton E. Morse, author of "One Man's Family," and Mrs. Morse, gave a New Year's Eve party for a group of NBC folk. Biggest hit of the evening was the appearance of "The Morsel," miniature newspaper published for the occasion, and containing enlightening "personals" on the guests. Bernice Berwin, NBC actress, found herself described in the want-ad column as "Chiropodist — let Bernice Berwin put wings on your scows."

• • • Francia White, whose lovely lyric soprano is a frequent contribution to KNX programs, admits she was born in a non-descript Texas town name of Greenville, and does not mind adding that the blessed event in the White household occurred October 30, 1909. She has been singing in radio since she was 13, but she wants most to do costume engagements on the concert stage. Francia professes to be very "domestic," her secret passion is Kate Smith, and she is very fond of orchids, although gardenias will do.

• • • KROW reports the return to the air of the Tropical Beach Combers, a quartet of singers and instrumentalists who specialize in Hawaiian melodies, and "Doc" Shahan and his Oklahoma Cowboys.

• • • There can be no doubt as to the authoritativeness of Ernest Hutcheson's interpretation of Edward MacDowell's Concerto in D minor during his recent CBS broadcast devoted to commemoration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of MacDowell's death. Hutcheson was playing from music which had been specially annotated by the widow of the great composer. As a young man, Hutcheson was a casual acquaintance of MacDowell, and after the latter's death became a great friend and admirer of Mrs. MacDowell. She repeatedly

showed her confidence in Hutcheson by requesting him to give special recitals of her husband's compositions.

• • • Ever since the report got around KFI-KECA that Clay Osborne and Jerry Cady won a bowling match from Glenn Dolberg and Les Kelly, this innocent purveyor of that somewhat ambiguous information has been heckled by the last mentioned pair of execs. Now we have it on fairly reliable authority (subject to challenge at a moment's notice) that Messrs. Osborne and Cady DID win one match but have been taking a consistent beating on other occasions.

• • • Every Monday afternoon, from 2:15 to 2:30, KJBS broadcasts a brief instruction on the playing of contract bridge by Willie Mae Carson, an exponent of the Culbertson system.

• • • Happy Jack Turner, heard in piano broadcasts from the Chicago NBC studios, once played for two and one-half hours in a marathon broadcast. He did not repeat a number, playing them all from memory, wore out two announcers and was still going strong when the broadcast ended.

• • • The KFI continuity department (mostly masculine) received a coterie of pipes for Christmas, the result being that members thereof are forever bumming cigarettes from the neighboring department of press relations.

• • • Two special engineers are always on duty in the studio control room when "The March of Time" is on the air. One sees that the countless dramatic lines, sound effects and orchestral "curtains" are correctly cued and balanced, while the other checks equipment and maintains contact with the master-control room.



# SILHOUETTES

TEN years of the stage, during which he has played leads opposite many of America's best known stars, were Cameron Prud'homme's experience before he came to NBC.

The darkly handsome young actor who plays Danny, the elusive artist in the serial "One Man's Family," and the hero of many of the dramas microphoned from San Francisco, has been associated with notable productions and noted names since he started his career. May Robson, Taylor Holmes, Robert McWade, John Bartels, Leo Carrillo, Marjorie Rambeau, Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., Bebe Daniels and other stars of the stage or screen are among those whom he has supported in major roles.

Born in San Francisco, Prud'homme comes of an old California family. He is the son of John Prud'homme, head of a famous old San Francisco publishing house which dates back to the days of the gold rush, but from childhood, the theater, not the printing business, interested the NBC star. His father, sympathetic with his son's ambition, gave him every opportunity to develop along his natural bent, and his education was such as to make a solid foundation for a remarkable talent. A member of the Bohemian Club, he has played leads in the annual Grove Play of this famous organization, and has been associated

with such groups as the Reginald Travers Players. He and William Rainey, NBC Production Manager in New York, appeared in "The Jest" when the Travers Players presented it in San Francisco at the Community Playhouse, and unforgettable to many

who saw it was the joint performance of the two as the soldier and the poet—Prud'homme played the former.

He made his debut before the microphone about a year ago, in a Bible Story program, and has been heard regularly since then in various rôles. He is one of the principals in the new series of dramas, "Barbary Coast Nights," written by Carlton E. Morse, with Police Chief William J. Quinn of San Francisco as narrator.

Prud'homme is an expert

golfer, and excels in archery. Photography is his hobby, and he has produced some unusual camera effects, using his small daughter as a model.

BEFORE gags brought John P. Medbury into the big money, they brought him grief and invariably caused him to lose his job.

In his youth, as a salesman in a San Francisco haberdashery store, the master of ceremonies of NBC's Demi-Tasse Revue, found that gags—inscribed on the wrapping paper—were not always conducive to further sales of socks and B.V.D.'s

Between customers, John used to jot down some of the humorous, sharp turns of his own thoughts and then, in the excitement of making a sale, he would send the purchase home enlivened with wisecracks written on the wrapping—usually before they had been edited and cleaned up a bit.

Irate customers complained to the humorless German proprietor, who wisely observed, "Vell, hif you must be a vise-cracker, why don't you do it vere you get paid for it? You're fired."

John took the old Dutchman's advice, got a job on the San Francisco *Call-Bulletin* and soon found himself in his element and on the road to fame as one of the world's greatest gagsters.

DX fans are often puzzled by the time difference throughout the world, and have difficulty in computing the time at distant points with respect to the local time. Particularly is this true in the short-wave field, where foreign DX reception is not only possible, but a regular occurrence. For instance, when the Pacific network gives us the London rebroadcasts, no doubt many listeners are puzzled to know the hour in London corresponding to Pacific time. The accompanying World Time Chart answers all questions concerning world time.

The local time, under the "Pacific" heading, corresponds to the time indicated on the same

horizontal line in any other part of the world. It is seen that 2 a. m. here is 10 a. m. in London, 9:30 p. m. in New Zealand, 8 p. m. in Sydney, 7 p. m. in Japan, etc. If you should hear Manila on short waves at 6 a. m., you will know that it is 10 p. m. there. In order to determine whether it is the same day, or the preceding or following day, follow this rule: Crossing from dark to light area at midnight, indicates the following day. Crossing from light to dark area indicates preceding day. As an example, 4 a. m. here is 9 p. m. in Tokio of the preceding day.



## New Tube Checker Announced



### Electric Palate Developed

An "electric palate," or Electrynx, that tastes and indicates on a meter the ripeness of apples, oranges, lemons and other fruits and vegetables by measuring their acidity has been developed by R. C. Hitchcock, electronic engineer of Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company.

The small portable device also registers the acid content of tea and coffee. The Electrynx was primarily designed for the measuring of the minute currents that flow in photoelectric tube circuits or "electric eyes" that are used in sound-motion picture projectors or other light and sound sensitive devices. With this new instrument it is possible to check the current continuously.

This latest electrical measuring device is so sensitive that it records the action of one-millionth of an ampere or about one-tenth the "wing power" of an ordinary house fly and is 100 per cent more sensitive than any of its type now on the market. Previous recording meters of this sensitivity were expensive and not readily portable.

### Oil Company Orders New Moving Coil Mikes

The Standard Oil Company has just placed an order with the C. C. Langevin Company

for the installation of Western Electric moving coil microphones, associated amplifiers and mixing panels, to be used on their public address trucks for advertising purposes.
