## The Perfect Radio Program

THE PERFECT radio program, assumedly the kind of a program that pleases everybody, has not yet been devised, nor is it likely to ever be discovered. Half of the people want what the other half violently oppose, and nine out of ten persons seem to be undecided as to exactly what they do want. Yet the critic, like static, is always heard.

One listener writes "There is too much classical junk on the air. We want popular music, good late songs, and no high-brow convolutions." Another correspondent prays not to be led into temptation but delivered from jazz. When a station puts on dance music it blankets the parson's sermon. A good talk on moral uplift brings forth an avalanche of profanity from fans who want to hear the latest blues.

Letters from listeners seem to be as poor a guide to the perfect program as a cross-roads sign on a revolving barber pole. A good politician can get an overwhelming vote in favor of anything, anywhere, except in Congress where it really counts. A radio poll usually brings out more ayes than noes.

One comprehensive survey showed that more people were in favor of talks on science and travel than in musical comedy and minstrels. A tremendous telegraphic vote for grand opera is counteracted by an equally large demand for more plays. Orchestras were preferred to single instruments, the cornet especially. But these results might be reversed in some other section of the country.

The trouble comes from radio's universality of appeal coupled with the difference in taste of those appealed to. All of us want to live, but we do not want the same food, the same drink, the same girl, the same boy, nor the same radio program.

Most people seem to object to advertising over the air. Yet if some advertiser did not pay the bill we would have little but music pupils as performers. Each of us may object to some particular station. Yet, if that station to which we object and those stations to which others object should cease operation, there would be no stations left!

So what is poor Robin to do? In trying to please everybody he pleases nobody and in trying to please somebody he displeases somebody else. It's the old third reader story of the man, the boy, and the donkey. To paraphrase Barnum (or was it Lincoln?), you may please part of the people all of the time, and all of the people part of the time, but you can't please all of the people all of the time.

The answer is diversified programs. But in this very diversity there is danger of similarity to the program of some other local station. Why, then, in the name of common sense and common satisfaction, don't the program managers compare notes so that there won't be three different plays or three different jazz orchestras playing at the same time? And as for the perfect radio program, "there ain't no such animal."

# M. J. B. Signs Peter B. Kyne

A RADIO "scoop" that will be the major topic of conversation wherever broadcast doings are discussed has been achieved by the M. J. B. Company in the signing of Peter B. Kyne, world famed author, for its Monday night Demi-Tasse Revues.

The successful novelist makes his bow to the Pacific Coast radio listening legion on the M. J. B. Demi-Tasse Revue Monday night, February 20, from 7:30 to 8 o'clock. Twice during that half hour of variety he will appear, telling some of his spell-binding adventures of the sea and spilling some of the humorous anecdotes for which he is noted.

Thereafter Kyne will be the featured star on the Demi-Tasse Revue every Monday night over the NBC-KGO network in the Western States.

In addition to being one of America's foremost writers, Kyne has a wide reputation as a story teller. As soon as he begins speaking his auditors are literally cast into a spell, so convincingly, so entertainingly can he weave yarns, fiction as well as non-fiction.

Peter B. Kyne is one of the two internationally famous penmen to consent to appear on a commercial radio broadcast, the other being Irvin S. Cobb.

Kyne is as colorful as he is adept with the art of handling words. He is a "true-blue" San Franciscan—was born here, raised here, worked here and today still calls it his home. He lives on Russian Hill and does all his work in his very exclusive pent-house studio atop the Pacific National Bank Building in Montgomery Street, as he puts it, "high above the hatred of men."

Naturally there is a warm spot in his heart for San Francisco, as the millions who have read his novels and short stories know. For San Francisco figures as the locale in most of his famous yarns.

Among his biggest sellers which attained world-wide recognition were the "Cappy Ricks" books; "The Go Getter,"

"Kindred of the Dust" and "Pride of Palomar."

Hard work and success followed as the night the day with Kyne. For in his comparatively short career he has written and sold twenty-five novels, fifteen hundred short stories and three scenarios for the motion picture industry. You will recall, also, that he was one of the chief factors in the building up of the *Saturday Evening Post*.

At present his stories are appearing in such nationally known magazines as the *Red Book*, the *Cosmopolitan* and others. His latest serial story, "Comrades of the Storm," is scheduled to start in the *Red Book* next month.

Peter B. Kyne might be called one of the best publicity agents San Francisco ever had. For haven't his yarns, which have always included something about this City of the Golden Gate, been read in all corners of the earth?

This renowned weaver of yarns was born at Nineteenth and Eureka streets in San Francisco. As a boy he used to herd his father's cows over Twin Peaks, which was close by. There were no winding highways then, no sight-seeing mecca for the interested visitor, nothing but "darn good" pasture country. It was here, too, that Kyne used to romp with his playmates, fly his kites and hike.

From his earliest years he was of a studious nature and was extremely fond of reading. He was choosey in his literature, though. No Diamond Dick novels or harem-scarem adventure stories for him. He went for the high-class literature, Balzac, Shakespeare, and so on.

Kyne has felt the pangs of two wars. He fought in the Spanish-American conflagration in the Philippines when he was but a boy of sixteen years. During the world squabble he served as a captain in the United States Infantry.

The Western radio audience is in for a rare treat with the appearances of this

# SILHOUETTES

WORN, frayed and tattered through overuse, the caption line attached to 637 photographs of radio beauties—"If television were only here"—was laid to rest in 1932.

Strictly on behalf of the feminine members of the ether audience, who probably didn't give a hang for television as they surveyed those pictures of their more fortunate and shapely sisters of the broadcasting business, that bromide is revived—just once—and attached to a masculine star, Vinton Haworth, male lead in "Myrt and Marge." He plays the heroic role of Jack Arnold.

For Haworth can walk on any man's stage and inspire a wave of assorted feminine "ahhs" that sound like the start of a tropical hurricane. Lace edges are chewed from handkerchiefs, hats are twisted into formless masses, and envious male companions are kicked in shins. As they say in the profession, he "panics the femmes."

He's just under six feet, this Haworth chap, slender, with black wavy hair, a jaunty little moustache a la Jack Holt, and blue eyes.

Born in Washington, D. C., on June 4, 1905, young Mr. Haworth struggled along to the age of six without a display of the artistic temperament. Then he put on an exhibition that cost him a broken arm.

Young Mr. Haworth was more than a little annoyed when a larger lad was selected to play the part of the prince in a school production of "Cinderella," while he was consigned to the comparatively lowly rôle of a courtier. As the budding young Thespian tripped by the prince in a minuet he paused in his dance long enough to whisper:

"Are you lousy!"

The prince replied with a vigorous push. Haworth landed in the orchestra pit and the arm snapped.

Today he insists that even while the arm was mending he was determining to become an actor, a real one. He'd show that prince up. Through the grades and through high

school, dramatics absorbed him. He tried out for every school production and won a good part in all of them.

An elder sister had gone to New York to go on the stage, so Haworth's mother and father made no serious objection when he announced his intention of heading for Broadway. The sister had abandoned her career in favor of a husband, and they were sure young "Vin" would have a home in good surroundings until he got the "crazy idea" out of his head.

But young "Vin" fooled them. He landed a job—at \$40 a week—in a dramatic company making the chautauquas. That was in 1923. From 1924 to 1926 he was busy in an act on the vaudeville circuits. From 1927 to 1928 he tried the business world, but the grease paint yen was still with him. The following year he landed in Chicago, and into the radio world.

Television was coming to the fore at that time, and for a year he directed and acted in productions. Then, suspecting that like prosperity this television business might be a bit slow in coming from around the corner, Haworth went into the more practical aspect of the broadcasting business, announcing and acting dramatic rôles in commercial broadcasts.

He was "Don" in "Don and Betty" and leading man in many sustaining CBS programs out of Chicago, so when "Myrt and Marge" came on the air more than a year ago seeking a hero, he was a quite logical selection. From the start the girls went for that voice. As a single member of a large dramatic cast he receives as many as 300 fan letters a week.

He's married, and knowing that actors are not apt to be the best business men in the world, he consults his wife on all matters pertaining to finances, and abides by her decision. That's her part of the contract. She, on the other hand, never criticises his broadcasts. That's his business.

And they say it works to perfection.

LEONARD HAYTON, the youthful conductor of the Chesterfield Orchestra, has directed more bands than his life numbers in years. Less than two decades ago, six-year-old Hayton used to pitch pennies to a ring-tail money on Manhattan sidewalks and marvel at the musical machinations of the hurdy-gurdy. He dreamed of the day when he might rouse the neighborhood with similar fanfare.

Today, at the age of 24, young Hayton directs the gay music heard with Bing Crosby, Ruth Etting and other stars in the Columbia Broadcasting studios high above the haunts of his childhood hurdy-gurdy. Hayton's rhythmic music not only echoes through his old neighborhood, but rides the wires and ether waves from coast-to-coast.

Hayton is a prodigy of popular music. Before he was out of his 'teens, he began a career which carried him upward as pianist, arranger and conductor with Paul Whiteman and Bing Crosby on Broadway, on stage tours and in Hollywood. Brilliant moments, such as conducting overtures by Whiteman's band in joint concert with the old Roxy Symphony, developed his ambition some day to command an orchestra of his own. His big chance came this year when he assembled a group of novel instrumentalists and won the engagement to support the Chesterfield stars.

Hayton was born in New York City on February 13, 1908, the son of a Manhattan restaurateur. He developed a penchant for the piano when six years old, showing unusual interest in the early classics off the rolls of the family player piano. Neither of his parents was a tutored musician, but both were avid followers of the concert hall. Leonard was taken to every musical event and, before he emerged from knee pants, became thoroughly schooled in the symphonies. Works which particularly delighted the family were obtained for the piano, and the pedaling and expression were produced by the youngster until his own hands could stretch the octaves.

The parents forbade "jazz," and it was not until the youth reached the daring age of sixteen that he knew the subtle appeal of syncopation. Then he "bootlegged" modern recordings into the household and soon was tantalizing the keys with rhythmic tunes for

schoolboy friends. This forbidden forte became his fortune when family reverses set in.

Leonard left high school to become pianist with the Broadway Hotel Orchestra of Cass Hagen, a boyhood friend. While playing at the Park Central, Hayton was heard by Whiteman and immediately engaged by the exponent of jazz symphonies. During his two and a half years in the Whiteman fold, Hayton alternately served as featured pianist, arranger and assisting conductor on the stage, and in radio, recording and movie studios. This took him up and down Broadway, to Carnegie Hall, and before the Hollywood cameras for the filming of "The King of Jazz."

With Whiteman at the same time was a young singer named Crosby, one of the original Rhythm Boys. Hayton and Crosby struck up a professional and personal friendship which remained intact when Bing leaped to radio fame. Hayton joined the Crosby radio ensemble as one of the piano duo of Hayton and Arthur Schutt, and as Crosby's arranger. He accompanied Bing to the Coast for the filming of "The Big Broadcast." Enroute, they played eight weeks of theatre engagements, Hayton organizing and directing a new band in each city. When Chesterfield contracted for their triumphant return to the air, Hayton not only emerged in his own right as arranger and conductor for the popular baritone, but was appointed musical director for the entire series.

Hayton's distinctive arrangements immediately became apparent, embellished by the talents of such stellar instrumentalists as Tommy and Jimmy Dorsey, trombonist and saxophonist respectively; Manny Klein, trumpeter; Eddie Lang, guitarist, and Phil Wall, pianist.

Known as "Lennie" to his friends . . . is slender, of medium height, has dark hair and trim mustache . . . likes a real game of ping-pong . . . hasn't missed an important football battle . . . isn't superstitious and believes everything happens for the best . . . believes popular arrangements should faithfully represent the original melodies . . . hopes some day to write a serious symphony . . . lives in a bachelor apartment . . . divides his spare time between sports, symphonic concerts and the movies, especially the news reels.

# ETHER GLEANINGS

IT will be just a matter of a few weeks now when KPO, yet coast aircaster, will have its voice "lifted" to exactly ten times its present power, making it one of the most potent in the West. Next month it is scheduled to become a fifty kilowatter, or 50,000 watts to you. And in case your Aunt Het asks you, that's a lotta juice.

Great headway is being made on the new KPO set-up in the mudflats near Belmont, on the San Francisco peninsula. Two massive steel towers reach 300 feet skyward and there's a reinforced concrete building, which will house the new equipment and be the center of operation, that is, the mechanical end of it, when the station swings on the air with its added power.

At this writing the engineers are busy installing the RCA transmitting equipment, which naturally is the very latest word in such things.

The NBC, which operates KPO, expects that the big dedication party for the new transmitter will be held on or about March 15. Testing will start approximately a week and a half or two weeks previous.

There's going to be a grand broadcast party, too, when KPO gets its new voice. New York, Chicago, San Francisco and other important broadcasting centers will contribute to the auspicious occasion. We'll keep you posted as the new plans take shape.

\* \* \*

Wednesday night, February 8, was a propitious occasion on the western airlines. It brought to our loudspeakers two nationally famous personalities on two new ether presentations. John P. Medbury, ex-M. J. B. Demi-Tasse Revue m.c. cut word capers on the Old Gold affair over the Columbia chain and Eddie Peabody, the banjo-mauler and musician unusual, made his bow as a radio artist on the Safeway program on the NBC chain. Medbury was in the New York studios of the CBS, while Peabody performed in the San Francisco NBC program factory. Each will be heard every week.

Preceding the Peabody debut, a dinner was tendered the radio editors of the bay region newspapers and broadcast journals by the Safeway organization.

\* \* \*

The mile-a-minute air blabberer—Edna Wallace Hopper steps back into the broadcasting picture once again, in fact, she has stepped. You can dial her over KFRC on Mondays, Wednesday, and Fridays from 1 to 1:05 p. m.

Lucky Strike has shrunk its radio broadcasts to two a week. The final Saturday night "magic carpet" rode the ether waves on February 11. They are retaining their Tuesday and Thursday night presentations, however.

St. Mary's College has "gone radio" seriously. It recently started a program tagged "Classroom of the Air" over KYA in San Francisco which is heard every Monday from 7 to 7:30 o'clock. Educational programs, with literary events being stressed, will occupy the period.

\* \* \*

KFRC maintains it has its best "find" in many moons in Consuela Gonzales, the little Mexican girl with the bird-like voice who you hear on the Jamboree, Feminine Fancies and other Don Lee programs. Ellis Levy, impressario for the station, discovered her at an entertainment and arranged for auditions. She clicked before the mike and now they have her monicker on a nice contract.

\* \* \*

Since Johnny Patrick, microphonically known as Cecil of "Cecil and Sally," has been off the air, his thoughts have turned to radio's first cousin, the show business. Oh yes, he's been doing quite a bit of scribbling of plays and such and soon will produce one of his works in Oakland. Meanwhile, his managers are endeavoring to get another radio sponsor interested in the popular air performers.

\* \* \*

Frank Watanabe, whose auto license reads Eddie Holden, who stepped up the ladder of radio popularity in San Francisco some years ago, is now being heard regularly over KTAB, Oakland. Watanabe is now associated with KNX in Hollywood, but KTAB rebroadcasts several programs from the southern station and this comedian's act is one of them. You can hear him most any weekday night about 7 o'clock.

Jerry Jermaine, late of KTAB, is now doing a household type program over KQW, San Jose, speaking daily at 11 a. m. from that station's San Francisco studios in the Robert Dollar Building.

\* \* \*

Just so that the newspaper boys might get an idea of what they were going to offer the public over the air, the Pennzoil people presented a special preview at the NBC February 5. After the air show, the gang was fed at the St. Francis Yacht Club.

Jennison Parker, author of the latest Don Lee chain giggle-getter, Hodge Podge Lodge and a handful of other successful laugh makers, was on the stage a few years ago, playing the handsome juvenile. Since then he went into the advertising business and now to authoring for the radio. He plays the rôle of Mr. Parks, national president of Hodge Podge Lodge in the thrice weekly funfest.

KYA is now pushing out on the ether about twelve programs a week furnished it by the NBC.

Among the artists recently added to the KYA staff were Bill Simmons, the Lone Star Ranger," whose ranger and Hillbillie tunes are being heard Tuesdays and Thursdays at 7:30 p. m., and Jack Castle, baritone, former Stanford student, who sings on Saturday nights. The latter says Friday, the 13th is his lucky date, for that's the time he was given his radio audition.

Gill and Demling, who are doing that joint m.c.-ing on the Union Oil Merrymakers over the Don Lee system, worked on the NBC at Chicago not so long ago. In fact, they used to be heard here under that banner, often.

\* \* \*

One of KFRC's newest accounts is the General Foods Cooking School of the Air, which is being heard on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 11:15 to 11:30 a. m. The programs are electrically transcribed.

\* \* \*

Those Tarzana Hill Billies, who cavort before the KTAB microphones nightly, have built up an enviable following of radio listeners judging by the test recently made by the sponsor. A group photograph of the troupe was offered the audience for a nominal sum and at this writing about 1,444 requests had been received already.

\* \* \*

Many critics are declaring the NBC skit, "Vic and Sade" produced in Chicago and released nationally, to be one of the most natural acts of its kind on the air. KGO broadcasts it here on the coast every Monday night from 7:15 to 7:30 o'clock. We recommend it.

\* \* \*

The Boards of Education of four San Francisco bay cities and the NBC are collaborating in the recently inaugurated Bay City School Broadcast, an educational program, which is winged out by KYA every Tuesday from 9:15 to 9:45 a. m. The program dovetails with the Standard School Broadcasts which follow. School children of the bay area listen in on the air lessons.

Brief Broadcasts . . . Do you know that no less than nine oil companies are using the NBC networks and are heard on this coast? They are: Richfield, Standard, Associated, Hancock, Pennzoil, Gilmore, General Petroleum, Signal Oil and Texaco. . . . The NBC gang are planning a contract bridge tournament. . . . Four canary birds are being heard regularly on the Feminine Fancies hour over the Don Lee network. . . . # MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • The microphone through which Amelia Earhart greeted the American radio audience from London, after her successful trans-Atlantic solo flight last May, has been presented to the Smithsonian Institute by the Columbia Broadcasting System, and will be placed on display in the Institute Museum in Washington as soon as arrangements for its transportation are completed. The microphone was given to Columbia by the British Broadcasting Corporation after the Earhart broadcast.

Miss Earhart's greeting to America was sent to this country by short wave on May 21, last, and was broadcast over the CBS network. The microphone Miss Earhart used was dismantled from its pedestal, fixed in marble and shipped to Columbia headquarters where it has been kept until the present time.

• • • Ad Beideman and Ray Howell, KTAB's smart technicians, have done a sweet job on the new Oakland studio. The latest in Western Electric equipment has been installed, and the said equipment has been so placed that it furnishes an ease in the handling of programs which is comparable to no other studio. An additional studio will be added so that following programs will not conflict with those preceding. Much praise should go to these two boys for the way they have handled the job, and the decided improvement in the tone-quality of the programs.

• • • Eugene Mancini was born in San Francisco in 1905. Gene has the distinction of being the originator of the first exclusive Italian program broadcast on the Pacific Coast through which he has created

a tremendous audience among the Italian population. Mancini's Italian Hour is heard every Saturday night through KQW at 8:45 p. m. His musical career started about five years ago, during which time he has appeared in numerous stage productions and oratorios also gaining a reputation as master of ceremonies for various musical events around the bay cities.

• • • John P. Medbury, the West Coast humorist and writer, has affixed his "X" to a contract with the Columbia Broadcasting System that calls for his appearance as master-without-ceremonies for the Columbia Revue broadcasts twice weekly. He is also being heard on the Old Gold program.

• • • Monroe Upton, (Lord Bilgewater in the Associated Spotlight and Simpy and Gladys), is the descendant of many generations of sea-going folk. Monroe was the radio operator on a ship for several years before he became a microphone star, and he still spends hours prowling along the San Francisco water front.

• • • There is a decided resemblance in the voices of Jack Benny and Goodmar Ace, CBS comics. In fact, many listeners think they are one and the same, a possibility which is precluded by the fact that Jack works from New York and Ace faces the microphone in Chicago. The pair have been friends for years and first met when Ace, as dramatic critic of a Kansas City newspaper, reviewed a Benny stage performance.

• • • Facial calisthenics is the newest thing in radio. Faithfully for fifteen minutes

every morning, Jack Pearl, alias the modern Baron Munchausen on the NBC Lucky Strike Hour, twists his face into a series of comic expressions, performing these gyrations before a mirror to the rhythmic "1-2-3-4" of the physical culturists. This practice, he explains, is a hangover from the early days of the cinema when facial expressions were of paramount importance to the success of the actor.

• • • Gertrude Niesen, exotic young torch singer and the latest addition to Columbia's vocal staff, is a picturesque bundle of contradictions. Fond of flaming songs, and a delightful mimic of Broadway celebrities, she is old fashioned enough to insist upon living with her mother and father in a distant part of Brooklyn. Miss Niesen plays golf and swims well—and she dislikes all automobiles that won't register over ninety miles an hour.

• • • Arnold Johnson, CBS orchestra leader, has developed the saxophone and the string sections of his band into a vocal octette. The singing instrumentalists now are used occasionally to balance the vocalizing of the Hummingbirds, girls' trio, heard as a harmony background for Whispering Jack Smith.

• • • Vaughn de Leath is an amateur chemist and recently applied for a patent on a skin lotion.

• • • Freeman Gosden (Amos) feels the need of a lot of activity. To satisfy his desire for exercise while at the office, he now has a jumping rope like the professionals use in training. When the jumping rope was delivered, his

partner (Andy) remarked: "Now get me some jacks and a ball and everything will be perfect."

• • • The first aeroplane ride by Josef Koestner, Chicago NBC orchestra director, proved a real thrill. The plane dived from 3,500 feet to 75 feet when it ran out of oil.

• • • Leibert Lombardo of Guy Lombardo's Royal Canadians, was recently asked if he had had his small yacht taken up for the winter. "It's been taken up, all right," he replied. "That last storm took it up and left it in a parking lot a hundred feet from the water's edge."

• • • On the wall of the largest workroom in the Blindcraft building, San Francisco, hangs an enigmatic-looking affair somewhat like a wide poster covered with rows of perforations. It is the list of programs offered by the National Broadcasting Co.—in Braille. So many of Blindcraft's members find companionship in their radios when they go home at night that the schedule is kept there for their convenience. The last thing most of them do in the evening as they leave the workshop is to go over to the schedule and read, through their fingers, the time and the station of each program they want to hear when they reach their homes.

• • • Hap and Jack, rapid fire song writers, are now singing and playing over KJBS daily, from 3:45 to 4. Both are well known vaudeville and radio performers. Fred (Hap) Van was a nephew of the celebrated late Van of the Vaudeville team of Van and Schenck and a maternal nephew of the late Sam Bernard, famous musical comedy star.

• • • Dance programs by Buddy Lewis and his orchestra are being broadcast over KROW every Tuesday and

Thursday and Saturday afternoons. The orchestra is one of the most popular dance bands in the East Bay. With Dot Lewis as vocal soloist, the orchestra consists of Lew Deering, trumpeter; Lloyd Cantrell, saxophonist; Sandy Berger, drummer; Buddy Lewis, pianist; and Monte La Fleche, guitarist.

• • • Johnny Marvin, the lonesome singer of the air, had to give up his Great Dane kennels because he's on the air six days a week and could not give them the personal attention he wanted to give them, but he's started a new collection of dogs. But this one is porcelain, and they all stand with ears and tails pointed atop his radio at home waiting patiently for their master's voice. On his speedboat at his summer home in the Thousand Islands Marvin also has a dog on the prow, the dog that used to sit before the phonograph in the days when millions of people bought Johnny's records.

• • • Bob Stevens, young NBC tenor, was born in Nevada, Missouri, the city which started Marion Talley on her operatic career. Bob never met Marion but remembers contributing a quarter to the collection which was taken up in his school when he was in the fifth grade, to assist Marion's career.

• • • The New Voice of KTAB, otherwise known as Newell McMahan, who dishes out the news at 7:15 each morning, rambles at a rate of 330 words a minute in his snappy broadcast.

• • • Among the women who have become successful in radio writing with the NBC are: Lula Vollmer, author of "Moonshine and Honeysuckle"—Edith Meiser, author of the G. Washington Sherlock Holmes dramas; Gertrude Berg, author and leading lady of "The Goldbergs"; Ruth Cornwall, author of the Death

Valley Days stories and Katherine Seymour, assistant continuity chief of the NBC in New York and author of many successful programs.

• • • Nathan Abas, NBC conductor who directs the orchestra in the National Concert program and other offerings, was born in Amsterdam, Holland, where his father was a noted diamond-cutter.

• • • The KTAB Hillbillies will have three members to replace Jad and Elton, who have returned to their homes. The new members are Aaron, Joe and Caleb. Aaron stutters on a par with Roscoe Ates, the film comedian.

• • • A new hillbilly outfit has made its appearance on KROW. They are the Arkansas Hillbillies with Al Cook as chief hillbilly.

• • • When any one of the three Boswell Sisters have a birthday, the other two girls do not buy her a present. Instead they let the sister having the birthday decide what she'd like to do and then all of them do it. Connie had a birthday recently. She wanted to go to Washington for the week-end. So Vet and Martha went with her—and bought their own round-trip tickets. Connie, it seems, wanted to go to Washington to go up in the Washington monument.

• • • Rudy Vallee has an inseparable companion in a Boston terrier, "Boy," a recent gift from a friend of Rudy's father in Lewiston, Me. The pup appears with him at radio rehearsals and travels along when the Yankees go on an out-of-town engagement.

• • • Arnold Johnson, whose orchestra is heard with Whispering Jack Smith, is the creator of the idea of the Hummingbirds. He uses the girls' trio to replace certain instruments in his band. The singers are given regular instrumental score sheets.

• • • Hall Johnson, leader of the Hall Johnson singers on "Captain Henry's Show Boat" over NBC, got his first break in New York when he played in the orchestra of "Runnin' Wild." A male quartet singing negro spirituals in the show brought down the house every night. Johnson saw the possibilities, and immediately formed his own chorus. His most recent success was in training the singers in "The Green Pastures," Pulitzer prize play.

• • • Nelson Case, NBC announcer, wanted to be a motorman when he was growing up. . . . Walter Beban, NBC orchestral director, wanted to be an athletic champion. . . . Betty Marino, NBC violinist, longed to be a harpist, but her family wouldn't let her. . . . Irving Kennedy, NBC tenor, directed his hopes, ambitions and education toward the law . . . and then, after he passed the bar examinations, decided to sing instead of argue. . . . Michael Raffetto of the NBC National Players, always wanted to be an actor, but studied law and practiced in the Federal courts for awhile . . . then wrote a series of radio dramas, was asked to act in them, and thus returned to his earliest ambition. . . . Barton Yarborough, also an NBC actor, was born in Texas, and hoped to be a real "bad man" but fate made him a law-abiding citizen. . . . Gail Taylor, NBC soprano, longed to be a trained nurse when she was a little girl. . . . and Helen Musselman, NBC actress, almost became a school teacher.

• • • Andrea Marsh, young vocalist heard with Ted Weems' Orchestra on the Jack Benny program, is the latest victim of a microphone prank. While a guest at dinner the other night, Andrea heard the radio announce "We will now bring you the music of Ted Weems and his orchestra." She rushed to a tele-

phone and frantically called the CBS studios, her father and Weems, before she realized her host was responsible for the announcement, made through a microphone linked with the home receiving set.

• • • Lucille Long's first professional job as a singer came about when she decided that she was not cut out to be a book salesman. The NBC singer went to Canada to sell books but after three days went to the Canadian Pacific Railway and secured a position as singer and hostess on one of the excursion steamers plying from Montreal up the St Lawrence River.

• • • Those Boswell Sisters, famed as a vocal trio, are pretty good in the field of instrumental music, too. In fact, they started their entertainment careers playing as piano-banjo-saxophone trio, and all three are expert pianists.

• • • Radio has its heroines — for instance, Bernice Berwin, NBC actress, was cast on a Doctor Dick program recently, and arrived at the studio to discover that as the "love interest" in the dramatic sketch, she had to sing the aria from the opera "Romeo and Juliet" — accompanying herself on the piano. She had never attempted to sing, much less to play, the "Romeo and Juliet" score before, but with less than an hour's rehearsal, she did it, and came through with flying colors.

• • • They do these things at NBC microphones: Hugo Mariana sits on a tilted chair as he directs his orchestra. . . . Mabel Jackson looks at the ceiling. . . . Kelvin Keech stands on tiptoe. . . . Aileen Clark turns her back to her audience. . . . Jules Bledsoe stands five feet away from the "mike." . . . Leigh Lovel, the Doctor Watson of the Sherlock Holmes programs, peeks cooly at Richard Gordon (Sherlock Holmes) over the

top of his script. . . . Robert Simmons watches the clock. . . . Ray Perkins dwaddles at the piano keys between sallies.

• • • Andre Baruch worked as a studio pianist for a long time before he ever thought of announcing, his present occupation. Just the other day Andre substituted for a sick pianist in Fred Berrens' CBS orchestra.

• • • Mary Wood, NBC soprano, was just thirteen years old when she first began singing in public, in the choir of a large Denver church.

• • • There may have been a "battle of the baritones," but the "war of the bassos" is quite remote—at least so far as Whispering Jack Smith and Singing Sam, possessors of two of the deepest voices in radio, are concerned. Jack and Sam are fast friends, consult each other on building programs and are often seen together outside of the CBS studios. They first met several years ago when Jack played new tunes at a publishing house for Sam, who was headlining in vaudeville as Harry Frankel.

• • • Patti Pickens, of the NBC Pickens Sisters, collects odd breeds of goldfish, much to the consternation of Helen and Jane. The sisters complain it is impossible to go shopping with Patti because she has to investigate every pet shop, and if she finds a new fish, insists upon taking it home immediately.

• • • One of the most interesting letters Dick Teela, NBC tenor at the Chicago studios, ever received was from his nursemaid whom he hadn't seen or heard from since he was six years old. She wrote him after hearing his first radio program.

• • • Budd Hulick, of Stoopnagle and Budd, was a radio announcer for two years.

DX fans are often puzzled by the time difference throughout the world, and have difficulty in computing the time at distant points with respect to the local time. Particularly is this true in the short-wave field, where foreign DX reception is not only possible, but a regular occurrence. For instance, when the Pacific network gives us the London rebroadcasts, no doubt many listeners are puzzled to know the hour in London corresponding to Pacific time. The accompanying World Time Chart answers all questions concerning world time.

The local time, under the "Pacific" heading, corresponds to the time indicated on the same

horizontal line in any other part of the world. It is seen that 2 a. m. here is 10 a. m. in London, 9:30 p. m. in New Zealand, 8 p. m. in Sydney, 7 p. m. in Japan, etc. If you should hear Manila on short waves at 6 a. m., you will know that it is 10 p. m. there. In order to determine whether it is the same day, or the preceding or following day, follow this rule: Crossing from dark to light area at midnight, indicates the following day. Crossing from light to dark area indicates preceding day. As an example, 4 a. m. here is 9 p. m. in Tokio of the preceding day.

## Oakland Distributor Inaugurates Campaign to Stabilize Business

Pledging themselves to a policy of selling only to radio dealers, service men or others engaged in the trade who are legitimately entitled to purchase at wholesale prices, the E. C. Wenger Co., wholesale radio distributors, 1020 Oak Street, Oakland, have sent an announcement to all radio dealers and service men in their territory stating that for the best interest of the trade in general they have inaugurated a new policy and hereafter will discontinue the practice of selling radio merchandise to amateur radio operators at wholesale prices, and that only those actually entitled to purchase at wholesale will be served by their company.

Authorized dealers and service men in the territory served by the Wenger Company have been supplied with a registered identification card and no merchandise will be sold to any person calling at their place of business unless personally known to the firm or presenting the identification card, it was announced.

## Business Conditions Show Improvement, Says Philco Head

C. L. McWhorter, Pacific Coast manager for the Philco Radio & Television Corporation, returned last week from an extended business trip that took him to most of the important cities in central and southern California as far south as San Diego and reports that general business conditions are showing an appreciable improvement over last fall.

"Conditions are rapidly be-

coming more stabilized and there is a growing feeling of confidence in business. ### Public to See "House of Magic" Show as Guests of G-E Radio Dealers

A novel and spectacular entertainment, demonstrating the marvels of electrical science, will be staged as part of General Electric's famous "House of Magic" show at the Scottish Rite Auditorium, San Francisco, Tuesday evening, February 21. The public is invited to attend. Tickets of admission may be obtained from any General Electric radio dealer.

A similar show given last year was such a success that it was decided to repeat it again this year. Only the one performance will be given in San Francisco and those who desire to attend are advised to get their tickets early as many were disappointed last year.

"Sweetness and Light," but a different kind than that championed by John Ruskin in his famous essay, will be dispensed by E. S. Darlington, General Electric vacuum tube engineer, when he demonstrates the "musical waves" with the aid of the cathode ray oscillograph.

The principle of the device is not altogether new, but will be the first time that such musical waves have been demonstrated to a large audience. Usually it has been necessary to observe the experiment through a hood under laboratory conditions. The use of the cathode ray oscillograph tube makes it possible to see the electric "picture" of any sound, whether it be singing, whistling, playing or speaking. The sounds changed into electrical impulses cause a constant change in a flickering stream of light at the end of the tube, painting a picture in light waves of the sound. When the "Stars and Stripes Forever" is played, the variations in frequency caused by playing the different instru-

ments creates a veritable fireworks along the beam. On the other hand, whistling, being almost a pure tone with standing waves, presents an almost constant design.

Many other interesting and educational experiments will be demonstrated with special apparatus brought here direct from General Electric laboratories.

### Radio Exports to China Increase

The Department of Commerce reports there is a growing demand from China for American made radio sets and point out that for the three months prior to October more than \$150,000 worth of sets were exported to China from this country.

There are seven broadcasting stations in China, the largest of which are owned and operated by British and American capital. More than half of the programs are given in English, the rest are in French and Chinese.

At a recent radio exhibition held in Shanghai, eight of the ten exhibits were of American manufacture and attracted considerable attention. There are more than 7,000 registered owners of radio receiving sets in Shanghai.


