8,000,000 Radios Need Replacing

MOST of life's pleasures entail a reciprocal duty or responsibility. Radio is no exception. It is beyond human capacity to figure the hours of happiness radio has brought to mankind or its inspirational, soul-sustaining value during periods of distress and discouragement such as that through which we have just passed. Radio has been practically the only form of tax-free and "admission-free" entertainment available to *all* the people, with the additional advantages of continuous performance, wide variety, and individual home control. And yet, during recent years, there has been manifest a growing tendency on the part of the audience to consider this blessing from the skies an inviolable hereditary right, the exercise and enjoyment of which permits frequent and voluble criticism without any accompanying responsibility or show of appreciation. It is regrettable that audience attitude and conscience should have atrophied to such an extent.

True, the air *is* the "property" of the people. But, in the fundamental sense, that was equally true a hundred years ago. Today there is "music in the air" only to the extent it is put there. That costs money. And 99 per cent of that expense is borne by sponsors and broadcasting companies without any direct contribution whatever by the public. During recent years these organizations have voluntarily spent millions of dollars to make broadcasting constant, secure the best talent available, and perfect transmitting equipment and technique so that the realism and naturalness of programs would be faithfully preserved. Has that money been

spent in vain? Shall further progress in radio broadcasting cease? Sponsors are now objecting to the continuance and expansion of such costs as unnecessary and unjustifiable, on the ground that too few homes have modern receivers capable of passing on these additional benefits to the audience. On this point the facts are as follows:

The government census of 1930 indicated that there were approximately twelve million radio-equipped homes in the United States at the time that census was taken. It is estimated that of the nine million sets subsequently only 46 per cent or approximately four million, have been replacements. In other words, of the total number of radio homes in the nation today, estimated at seventeen million, eight million or almost one-half are *over three years old*.

Is your set one of these eight million which sponsors and stations consider obsolete for fine reception? In delaying your purchase of an up-to-date set you are not merely defeating your own enjoyment, but discouraging further radio progress. Have you been to a radio store recently? Ask some reliable dealer to demonstrate the *new* sets. Prices are so low that buying now is real economy, and terms may be arranged to suit your convenience.

Progress in broadcasting will cease the instant sponsors become convinced it is nullified by inadequate home receiving equipment. It is the duty of every radio listener to combat that impression. Buy that new radio *now*. And see the makes advertised in BROADCAST WEEKLY *first*.

ETHER GLEANINGS

“ARE you going to accept beer advertising on your stations?” we asked the head men at the two big chain headquarters here.

“Are we? Well, just lead 'em to us. Have you any 3.2 per cent sponsors up your sleeve? Of course we'll accept advertising from the breweries, with certain restrictions. Their programs must conform to our policies with the constant thought in mind that they are going into the home where little tots as well as adults will hear them.”

That was the jist of the answers from our interview with Don E. Gilman, NBC boss here and Harrison Holliway who holds down the like position for the Don Lee station, KFRC, in San Francisco.

Both stated that they had no brewery signatures on the dotted line as yet, but that several suds manufacturers were listening to auditions and were contemplating radio very seriously.

And so within a short time we predict that the Pretzel Benders' Quartet, aided and abetted by the brewmaster's German band, will be warbling and tooting all the long forgotten, moss covered beer songs, not to over look the kingpin of 'em all—“Sweet Adeline.”

“Thou shalt not pour forth suds programs over these transmitting towers or thy name shall be mud.” That ultimatum was handed down to the manager of a bay district station, who had already signed some “sudsy wudsy” sponsors. He had to break the contract. You see the station happens to be owned by a church and they put the damper on when it came to accepting any advertising from a brewer of inebriating liquids.

Three other stations are battling for the account.

Claude Sweeten has been named musical director of KFRC. He assumed his duties Monday.

He directed the orchestra at the Golden Gate Theatre, RKO house in San Francisco, for ten years and previous to that was concert master of the Salt Lake Symphony orchestra. Sweeten succeeds Walter Kelsey.

KTAB, which moved to Oakland not more than six weeks ago, has moved back to San Francisco—that is, the main portion of it. The station took over an entire floor in the Kohler-Chase Building at 115 O'Farrell St., in the downtown section and has quite a nice set-up. There are two studios, the main one and an auxiliary, executive offices and pro-

gram department and headquarters for a sales force. The large studio is equipped with a Welte Philharmonic organ.

Rob Roberts, after an absence of a year, has returned as the station's general manager. He resigned from that job last year to enter his own radio advertising business, which he still maintains.

Roberts was largely responsible for building up KTAB to the leading of the medium class stations in the bay area at that time. He has many new plans for the growth of the station and is busy formulating them.

KTAB will retain its Oakland studios and will maintain sales staff for that territory.

The appointment of Edward V. Murphy as publicity director was also announced by Roberts.

The NBC has yanked the Road Show off that Monday night spot and in its place goes the Talent Parade. The hour is 9:30 to 10:30 o'clock. No reason for the change was given. But it will be recalled that Jennison Parker, who was writing the script for the affair, was signed by KFRC as an exclusive only recently.

Walter Bunker, Jr., and his charming wife depart for a trip to Europe the first of this month. KFRC's chief mickeman expects to be gone about five months. (Gee, radio announcers must make a lot of money.) To fill the vacancy while he is gone the station hired Mel Venter, who has done mike speling over KFBK, Sacramento, and KGA, Spokane.

Dialers in the Pacific Northwest will be gypped out of listening to the Goldbergs, unless their sets can pick up KPO. Since the melting of the Gold Network (NBC-KPO chain) that script act will be heard from the San Francisco station only in this section of the country.

The Westinghouse programs—the Octavus Roy Cohen Murder Mysteries, which were heard on the KPO chain have been moved to the KGO network, so they won't be lost to any followers on the coast. The schedule of broadcasts is changed a bit though. They are heard now from 8:15 to 8:30 p. m., on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays.

Art Fadden, the well-known radio piano puncher, who is holding forth on George Taylor's Revue over KTAB daily, is coming up to the studio on crutches. His explanation is that he twisted his ankle while playing handball.

Max Graf, one time movie man, now head of the Titan recording laboratories here, is working on a number of new ideas for the Associated Oil Company for their radio presentation. The present Spotlight Revue is put into shape at the Titan studios.

After an absence of three months Lillian Cooper, cosmetician is back on KYA telling the ladies in the air audience how to make themselves beautiful. She speaks Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 11 a. m.

KJBS, ever on its toes when it comes to transmission of current events, scooped all other San Francisco stations on the arrival of the frigate Constitution (Old Ironsides) in San Francisco bay the other day. With radio reporters aboard, two power yachts, equipped with special radio transmitting apparatus, cruised out to the Golden Gate to meet the historical craft as she headed due east through the Gate. The reporters on the scouting boats took turns about describing the impressive scene as the Constitution crept into the harbor.

Ralph Brunton, manager of KJBS, supervised the installation of the equipment on the two boats which were loaned for the occasion by Dr. S. Nicholas Jacobs, Sutter Hospital head and C. L. McWhorter, manager of the Philco radio company here.

The palatial Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Britain was literally brought into the homes of the dial spinning audience on March 25, when KTAB staged a special broadcast from the dining salon of the ship. Ernie Smith painted a grand word picture of the whole affair, and acted as master of ceremonies for the program that emanated from the ship. The celebrated English radio star, Frederick English, basso, was a feature of the program. He has given concerts in most of the 74 ports that have been visited by the Empress of Britain on this cruise. We also heard music by the ship's orchestra and talks by Staff Captain Hall and Wireless Officer Cleary. Jerry Jermaine was guest artist and sang several numbers, accompanied at the piano by Glenhall Taylor.

Phil Rich, chuckle-getter on the Orpheum circuit for years, is now being heard on KFRC programs. He has appeared on several Jamboree broadcasts already in the rôle of "Pappy Sloat."

Scouting round and about the Pacific Northwest section, John Haughan, Jr., our special operative No. 9999, learned the following: That Casey Jones has quit. The KJR personality packed up and left for Hollywood

April 1, where he will join his family. He was well known on the Mardi Gras program where, among vocalizing parts and skits, he portrayed the part of Oogy Awful, the little man with the mighty mind. He had been with KJR for about two and a half years.

After a lay-off of several months KOL's Mid-Week Jubilee has returned to the air. This time with Wen Niles as master of ceremonies. It is now a Thursday p. m. affair.

KOMO announces its plan of broadcasting two Easter holiday programs. The first is the broadcasting of the three-hour ceremonies, 12 p. m., to 3 p. m., from the St. James Cathedral on Good Friday, and the other is of the Easter Sunrise Services to be held at Washelli Cemetery Easter morning. Horace Lintz will announce the broadcast.



SILHOUETTES

SPEAKING of “breaks”—It was a “break,” and a most unexpected one, that brought Gertrude Niesen before the public. With her it was out of the front parlor and into the spotlight overnight. It all happened because she admired Lyda Roberti so much she went home from a performance of “You Said It” and imitated her all over the house. Her family didn’t seem to mind, so she imitated La Roberti at parties. Friends said, “Swell, y’oughta be on the stage.” Gertrude thought maybe that was a good idea, picked a theatrical booking agency at random from the phone book, and went looking for a job. When they asked what she had done in the way of performing, she drew on her imagination. They told her they’d call her when they needed her.

Gertrude went home to Brooklyn, thinking it had all been quite a lot of fun. The booking agency, she figured, would forget about her overnight. But it didn’t. It called her up pretty soon and said, “Come on over right away for an audition.”

That same night Gertrude was signed at a yard a week (\$100 to those who insist on English) for a vaudeville engagement with Joe Taylor. Two weeks later her name was in lights over the doorway of the “300 Club.” Then she went to the Paramount Grill; after that, five weeks in Chicago; back to the Paramount with J. C. Flippen; and finally into vaudeville with Lou Holtz in the same spot formerly occupied by her ideal, Lyda Roberti.

Gertrude admits she was frightened when she first landed behind the footlights. It took her quite a while to overcome the jitters, but someone convinced her that audiences were just ordinary people—harmless. Now she’s no more afraid of an audience than of a veal cutlet.

For several months now Gertrude has been singing her torch tunes to a Columbia “mike” and doing nicely, too.

Getting rhythm into a number is easy for her. She likes rhythm. She can pick up dance steps quickly, and in personal appearances augments her singing with a few leaps and quivers. Swimming and tennis are her

sports, because they’re rhythmic, too. . . . she’s a bit temperamental, but says the stage and radio aren’t responsible . . . has had her ups and downs since childhood . . . favorite actors, Leslie Howard and Frederic March . . . likes to read . . . checks up on Bernard Shaw now and then . . . has three pets, two Boston bulls, called “Sookie” and “Pie Face,” and an angora cat named “Smokie” . . . she’s nineteen and single . . . can’t describe her ideal man . . . considers herself pretty lucky in getting the “breaks.”

JOHAN D. BARRY, KFWI’s noted commentator on world events, has been a conspicuous figure on the Pacific Coast for nearly twenty years. He is known as the author of short stories, novels, plays, and essays. In addition to his weekly radio program, Mr. Barry contributes his column, “Ways of the World,” each day for six days in the week to the San Francisco *News*. It is similar to his radio program in that it is carefully written and contains thoughtful subjects of human interest. His subjects cover the fields of psychology, sociology, ethics, and international government affairs.

He is also an authority in literary and dramatic criticism and many times includes these subjects in his talks. His long experience has given him a large acquaintance with celebrated men, and his studies of their personalities and their work are intimate and searching.

John D. Barry was educated at Harvard, numbering among his teachers: William James, the great psychologist; George Palmer, the philosopher; and Adams Hill, professor of English composition and author of many books on rhetoric.

Mr. Barry’s first practical experience as a writer he had on papers in Boston and New York. For a number of years he was on the editorial staff of the *Forum Magazine*, with Walter Hines Page, later Ambassador to Great Britain, as his chief; of *Collier’s Weekly*, where he became known for his dramatic reviews; and of the *Cosmopolitan Magazine*, then owned and edited by John Brisben Walker. During this time he began to speak in public. One of the best known editors on the Pacific Coast says that Barry is without an equal in the lecture field of California today. The popularity of his lecturing led Barry to become associated with radio work.

And do her sisters burn up and tell her things until she gets co-serious again! Patti and her sisters, Jane and Helen, are the Georgia harmony trio that is heard over the NBC networks.

• • • How long does it take to write an average-length radio script?

"Two days in bed," answers Edith Meiser, whose radio adaptations of the Conan Doyle stories for NBC have set a high standard in broadcast drama. "I mean it," says Miss Meiser. "I do write most of my productions before I get up. 'There's something of a formula, a ritual and a rite about my writing. I don't seem to be able to get at it unless I start right off after breakfast in bed.'" Washington, of course) I start to write. That's at about 11

o'clock, and I keep at it without interruption until almost six in the evening." In this fashion, Miss Meiser writes a half-hour program in two days' time and spends, she says, a total of fourteen hours upon it.

• • • John Mills, formidable basso of the Mills Brothers, who imitates that resounding tuba, announced some of his own numbers on a Cleveland broadcast recently and had to be supported before the microphone by his three brothers.

"Nevali no more announcing," gulped John after his ordeal, "I'm going to stick to singing my tuba part."

• • • Joe Wright, whose orchestra has been heard over KYA until a recent fire destroyed the cafe from which they played, is mourning the loss of a Stradivarius violin destroyed by the fire. He says that during the entire time that the valuable instrument was in his possession, this was the only occasion upon which he left it anywhere overnight. He is now being heard with his orchestra over KFWI from the New Lido Cafe.

• • • That imposing "Parade of Presidents" which was heard on a recent Saturday night during the Associated Spotlight program and which apparently reincarnated the ghosts of five American leaders, was presented by Harold Peary, Harold Dana, Bennie Walker, and Caryl Coleman. Both the grave voice of Washington and the lifelike reproduction of Franklin Roosevelt emanated from the vocal cords of the irrepresible Peary. Harold Dana was the human-sounding Lincoln, complete even to the Illinois twang. Bennie Walker was Thomas Jefferson, and

Caryl Coleman, producer of Spotlight, reproduced the quick, enthusiastic Wilson voice.

• • • Constance Yates, formerly director of the Canterbury Hotel Trio, is appearing on Tuesdays and Fridays over KROW in a fifteen-minute classic piano recital.

She has also appeared in NBC Western Artists Series concerts, and for one year was a member of Dobbsie's KPO Happy Time entertainers.

• • • For the first time in his life, Ned, of the John and Ned Harmony duo, muffed a joke on the ether in a recent Talent Parade program. The slip has gone down into NBC history along with the time Minetta Ellen, who plays the mother in "One Man's Family," said graciously into the microphone—"Then I'll meet you at the Pin Tweaks Tunnel, Hazel"—then, less smoothly—"I mean—the Peak Twins—no—the Tin Weeks—oh, dear—I'll MEET you!"

• • • Most every sister team of stage and radio dress alike in every detail—but not those Boswell sisters, Connie, Martha and Vet shop as a trio, but they meticulously avoid buying any two garments alike. The girls believe that different styles of dress permits them to retain a degree of individuality.

• • • Gifts from fans to radio stars now range from smelling salts to snakes. Don Lang, Columbia's spinner of animal yarns, recently opened a fascinating package in the studios—and out crawled a ten-foot boa constrictor. He hurried it off to his private zoo. After mentioning the breaking of a perfume bottle in a recent script, Myrtle


