





ETHER GLEANINGS

HAVE you ever sat back in your favorite chair listening, sometimes with awe or envy, sometimes with repugnance, to the boys of the announcing fraternity as they let go a flow of words?

Haven't you said to yourself: "Gee, I wish I had the command of the English language that bird has," or "Shucks, he's punk, bet I could wrap circles around him when it comes to announcing over the radio." Well, we have.

And so it came to pass that one day recently we found ourselves in the office of Jennings Pierce, one of the peers of announcers in the West and chief mikeman for the Pacific division of the NBC. We got to talking about announcers—how they came to get that way, their qualifications, their requirements, how they made or broke a program, and so on. We hinted to our friend Jennings that perhaps we, too, possessed that voice they'd love to hear. Who could tell but what our vocal department could produce that certain something that bowled over the radio audience and brought forth mash notes?

"How would you like to take the announcer's audition?" Jennings asked us.

"Is it anything like a fraternity initiation? we shot back.

"Nope, it's perfectly harmless," was the assuring reply.

And so it was a bargain.

A couple of days later we showed up at the studio with a few selected passages and little narratives to read. We were met by a very pretty and congenial young lady—Miss Katherine Morgan, who said that she was in charge of the audition. Well, sir, before we could say "boo" she handed us a fistful of papers which she said we were to read at the audition. After we had spent hours on our own little pieces out of that book!

We did get a chance though, before going into the studio, to glance over the papers—one a continuity for a symphony orchestra program with more Russian, French, and Italian composers' names, foreign phrases and unfamiliar musical terms than we knew existed. The other must have been written by one who has a pet aversion for announcers. If your tongue didn't get tied up in pretzel-like knots when you read it, you were a pronouncing Houdini. Here is one of the passages that was in it:

"The seething sea ceaseth and thus the seething sea sufficeth us."

If you can say that the first time without getting your tongue entangled with your tonsils, you're eligible to the other severer tests.

Listening in on these auditions are Pierce and the heads of all the other departments at the NBC. They get in a huddle later and decide on who they want.

When it was all over we trudged into Jennings's office. He told us we had the makings of a good announcer and then outlined all the things we should do to accomplish that end. "If you ever think seriously about going in for announcing, come and see me," he said. We replied with thanks, adding that we guessed we'd stick to punching the typewriter for awhile yet.

New faces and voices continue to make their appearance at KFRC. Ted Roy, who tenored his way to second place in the National Atwater Kent auditions in 1927, is now being heard from that station. "Sunny" Russ, a young girl with lots of personality in her voice is there, too. Adele Burian, once a KYA favorite, has joined the team known as "The Noodlebugs," the others being Murray and Harris. She took the spot left vacant by Nora Schiller.

SILHOUETTES

EVERYBODY knows Yahbut for his hilariously funny appearances on the Blue Monday Jamboree and Remar Jubilee with Reginald Cheerily in the "Cheerily Round the World We Go" travelogues. And those who have seen him playing the part, agree that there is no need for any make-up. He looks just as he sounds—short, rotund and quite impenetrably—shall we say, Dumb?

But few know him as Jennison Parker, member of the KFRC staff and one of the most versatile of radio artists and continuity writers, author of musical comedies, stage actor and what have you.

Jennison Parker hasn't time to be interviewed. You wouldn't either if you were writing script for Hodge Podge Lodge which goes on KFRC three times a week for a half hour per time, most of the skits for the Jamboree and Remar Jubilee, and rehearsing for "Yahbut" and other rôles.

So instead of getting interviewed, he consented to fill out a questionnaire in his spare moments if any. Here it is:

Born? 1902, November 6. For no particular reason, in the lovely little city of Madison Lake, Minnesota.

Married? Quite.

Education? Portland Academy, Portland, Oregon; Wien Military Academy, Vienna, Austria, various Portland high schools. Then sentenced to three years at Culver Military Academy, Culver, Indiana, Oregon State College and University of Washington.

Experience? One year of newspaper work. Two years with an advertising agency in Seattle, one year with same in Chicago, three years in same field in San Francisco, where came into contact with KFRC via the Jamboree, sponsored by an agency client. Started the "Deep Dramatic Stock Company" and "Elmer Blurt," and wrote skits for "Axel Axelson," "Adhesive Pontoon," "Senator Frothingmouth" and others. Wrote "Riding Hood," "Bungle Land" and "Arabian Nights," musical comedies featured on the Jamboree. Also wrote thirty-five original one-hour musical comedies for the NBC Road Show, a job which I recently relinquished to go with KFRC exclusively, where

I'm writing "Yahbut and Cheerily," heard on the Jamboree and Jubilee, various Jamboree acts and skits, and "Hodge Podge Lodge." Playing "Yahbut" character because it comes naturally, and modestly made myself the National President of Hodge Podge Lodge. Play various other parts when occasion arises.

Hobbies? Golf (terrible). Eating (very, very good). Reducing (not so good). And watching the waves.

Remarks: Have played stock, vaudeville, and managed amusement circuit at various intervals.

MURIEL WILSON, the dark-haired radio sweetheart of Lanny Ross on Captain Henry's Show Boat . . . the Mary Lou of the Show Boat romance, and one of the best sopranos under the NBC tent . . . born in New York City June 29, 1908, of English-Irish parentage . . . entered radio via opera and the concert hall, because she felt it presented a larger field for her talents . . . sang in the National Light Opera Company for five years, and the National Grand Opera Company for three years . . . has appeared on eight commercial programs in her brief career . . . business men write her considerable fan mail . . . funniest experience she has had in a studio was when she sang eighteen numbers at an audition, all she had with her . . . most dramatic experience was the time she changed her voice to fill in for a contralto who lost her music . . . her only broadcasting eccentricity is carrying a handkerchief to the microphone . . . inherits a keen interest in politics from her mother, who is a Republican leader in the Fifth Assembly District in New York City . . . is still a Republican, despite what you have to say . . . hobbies are opera, swimming, tramping, horseback riding, and reading . . . greatest ambition is to cross the ocean once without being seasick . . . idea of most useless pastime is gossiping, idea of nothing to do is playing cards . . . favorite dish is hot huckleberry pie, favorite drink chocolate soda . . . her pet aversions are sewing, rising early, poor English and housework.

Next evening, aboard a wheelchair in the CBS studios, Kate bumped into Jack Dempsey, who playfully wheeled her to the microphone and remained to quip, as one heavy-weight champ to another, "Success has gone to her feet."

Kate can't wear shoes for a month, the big Cinderella!

• • • Another personality, shining brightly in the musical firmament of Southern California radio, has been added to the KMTR staff, that of Mildred Loughlin, contralto. With a background of several seasons concertizing and radio in the musical centers in the East, Miss Loughlin has rapidly climbed the radio ladder of fame in California by sheer ability. Hers is

a gifted voice equally at home in grand opera roles, and ballads of the moment.

• • • Death suddenly stilled the nimble fingers of Salvatore Massaro Sunday evening, March 26, and silenced the singing strings of his guitar. His passing removed an amazing figure from the kingdom of rhythm. The studios knew him as Eddie Lang who strummed for the stars—Bing Crosby, Ruth Etting, the Boswells and others. He was preparing to accompany Bing Crosby for a return engagement in Hollywood when, on his day off, the finger of fate sought him out. He succumbed to a throat hemorrhage. He is survived by his widow, Katherine Rasch, a former Follies girl.

• • • Lee Sims, piano wizard, is one of NBC's busiest artists—he's on nine programs a week now . . . and sometimes more . . . a progressive chap if there ever was one . . . has never taken a job that paid less than his previous one . . . got \$75 a week from the late Charley Erbstein back in those good old WTAS days . . . it was the biggest pay Lee had earned . . . but he took it reluctantly with the promise of a speedy raise . . . has played accompaniments for all manner of singers . . . from blues artists to opera stars . . . likes best to play for the lovely Ilomay Bailey . . . no wonder . . . Ilomay is Mrs. Lee Sims, you know . . . a famous tenor once told Lee his playing was terrible . . . Lee socked him on the beeper . . . and quit being an accompanist . . . until Ilomay came into his life.

• • • The instrumental imitations of the Mills Brothers will be available to the entire

Columbia network from April 18 on. On that day the "four boys and a guitar" will inaugurate a new series of semi-weekly programs which will be heard Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6 to 6:15 p. m.

Radio audiences were given a surprise in October, 1931, when they heard the initial network program by the Mills Brothers. Almost overnight they created a sensation. Although they have been on the air continuously since that time, their amazing harmonies and effects have been transmitted only to commercial networks limited to the east and part of the mid-west. While broadcasting, the young negroes from Piqua, Ohio, have busied themselves with vaudeville, motion picture work and recording.

• • • The Amos 'n' Andy episodes are frequently written the day they are broadcast. The boys usually finish writing an episode around three o'clock. When they are in New York and Bill Hay is in Chicago they send Bill a telegram with the synopsis for the night's broadcast.

• • • Rita Lane, NBC soprano, looks back on her "most embarrassing moment" as the one when she was riding over the housetops of Milan with a gallant young Italian aviator. The plane was equipped with dual control and the pilot urged the pretty American singer to help guide it. The next thing Rita knew she had swooped over the Cathedral and knocked the great bronze hat off the head of the statue of St. Christopher that topped it. She left Milan in haste that night.

• • • "Shorty" Maxwell, who chauffeurs for the Boswell Sisters, took the car to

Indianapolis to drive the girls to Louisville when it looked like they might have difficulty cashing checks for railroad fare. And when he drove back to New York, he had nine passengers in a seven-passenger car. "They were stranded," said "Shorty," "so what could I do? One guy did buy ten gallons of gas, but the others were broke."

• • • Radio stars never know what the day will bring forth. Ann Chase, featured as the nurse in NBC's Doctor Dick program, arrived at the studio the other morning only to discover that, through a misunderstanding, little Anita Calfot, who was to play the child in the drama that morning, had not been notified, and could not be reached by telephone. So Ann doubled in the part of the five-year-old in the play—being careful not to catch the eye of any of the other members of the cast, who were ecstatic with mirth during her scenes.

• • • Connie Moffatt is town talk! She made her radio debut April 3, over KFRC at 7:15, in a fashion skit that had all the fashion "plugs" so sugar-coated that even the men folks in the family listened and pronounced it swell!

Connie is just as flip as you would expect her to be . . . yet she is enough in-the-know about fashions to be entirely convincing. We predict that she will be a splendid good wool builder for her sponsor, O'Connor, Moffatt & Co., and congratulate this firm on the thoroughly modern idea they are putting over-the-air. After all—it is something new to address a fashion program to men as well as to women . . . and to hold the attention of both.

Connie . . . who is assisted by an orchestra (direction of Claude Sweeten) and by a young man whose patter isn't hard to take at all . . . will continue at the same hour every Monday night hereafter.


