# ETHER GLEANINGS

By J. CLARENCE MYERS

WHILE lending your ear to some ether production have you ever thought: "Gosh, that's a putrid program. I'd write to that station and tell 'em about it, but they don't pay any attention to audience letters."

Or, vice versa. Maybe you'd like to compliment a program or make a suggestion, but with the thought in mind that all letters sent to a radio station are absolutely ignored, you shelve the idea right then and there.

You're WRONG!

Radio stations today *do* read your letters, they tabulate them, analyze them and when it is deemed advisable and is at all possible abide by the desires of the majority.

The big networks, for instance, maintain what they call "fan mail" departments where competent staffs are employed analyzing the mail that comes in from the listening audience. And believe it or not this is one of the most important departments in the broadcasting organizations.

This department is the first to learn how a new program is registering with the audience, what its weak spots are, its strong spots and gets a thousand and one suggestions for improving the program. Often these suggestions prove valuable and are employed in bettering a microphone production. Of course thousands of suggestions are received that are positively useless.

But, at least, this department gets the trend of how the program is registering with the listener—who, after all, is the potential consumer of the products advertised over the air. And if a great many dislike a certain program, something must be done—or should be done—to make that program acceptable to the majority, or else all that advertiser's efforts and money are spent in vain. You can't make people listen to a poor or mediocre program, no matter how much money you spend on it.

Just as an example of the power of fan mail, let's take the Goldberg's program. You probably already are aware of the fact that it has returned to the air out here in the West, after an absence of several weeks.

Pepsodent, sponsors of "The Goldbergs," a very popular nightly script act, yanked the program off the Western chain some weeks back.

The squawk that arose from the listeners as the result of that act was like a thunder roar. As we told in these pages a few weeks back no less than 10,000 telephone calls, not counting the thousands of letters received,

swamped the NBC network stations the first week the Goldbergs were off the air.

The number of complaints broke all records in this portion of the country. The NBC kept a close tabulation of them and shipped 'em on to New York and the Pepsodent people.

And as the result the act is back, being broadcast nightly from 8 to 8:15 o'clock over KPO. Heretofore it had been over the coast chain, but since KPO jumped up its power to 50,000 watts, they figured that dialers on the Pacific slope can get the program without difficulty. KOA Denver, is the next nearest station releasing it.

This is only one instance in which fan mail had a direct bearing on a radio program. There are many others.

Of course, we don't propose you write to a station if you haven't anything constructive to say. But if you have some constructive criticism to make regarding a broadcast, by all means sit down and write it and send it to the station. We assure you it will be welcomed.

Harrison Holliday tells us that the Feminine Fancies program, which is captained by Bill Wright, is seeking a new name. Probably by the time you read this it will have it. The inducement to the listening audience is a grand electric mixer, to be awarded to the one submitting the name that is finally chosen for the program.

After but a limited trial on KFRC, the Remar Company folded up its weekly "Remar Jubilee" which was a pot pourrie, not unlike the Blue Monday Jamboree.

From authoritative sources we learn that the owners of the Seals Stadium in San Francisco have decreed that there shall be no broadcasts of baseball games played in that park this season. KYA and KTAB each were endeavoring to get the rights to the park.

The Tarzana Hill Billies, who cavorted before the KTAB mikes for more than a year have moved to the Don Lee station in San Francisco—KFRC, and are appearing Tuesdays and Fridays from 8:15 to 8:30 p. m., with Arnold Maguire taking care of the m.c. work.

\* \* \*

Ruth Etting, the girl with that personality plus radio voice, was scheduled to arrive in

Los Angeles May 7, for a long rest in the Southern California territory. She has been singing over the CBS net for several years.

\* \* \*

Quite a swanky affair was that KROW dedication of its new studios in Oakland the other week. Hundreds were there and as many more tried to get it.

\* \* \*

The charm spells cast by Barbara Dale over the NBC ether highways in her health and happiness matinees, have ceased. The Charm Chats program was erased from the network program sheet, April 30.

Maybe you'd be interested to know that Ed Wynn started his second year as Texaco's Fire Chief recently and is guaranteed a weekly salary of \$5,000 from the oil company.

Following an eight month's tour of Europe, George Nyklicek, former KPO organist, is back in town.



# SILHOUETTES



**N**OBODY loves a fat man? Add that to the list of proverbs, axioms, slogans and aphorisms which have been disproven, for there's Bennie Walker as evidence to the contrary.

Two hundred and forty pounds of Bennie make up one of the best-loved personalities on the air. The big, good-natured chap who edits NBC's *Woman's Magazine of the Air* and appears as half a dozen other personalities over the microphone, counts his fan mail by the sackfuls.

"I knew exactly how you must look before I ever saw a picture of you, Bennie Walker," one woman listener wrote him not long ago. "If you had been thin, I think I should have been dreadfully disappointed."

Whereupon Bennie went right out and ate a piece of coconut cream pie, including the crust, and said, "That for you!" to his diet.

He's one of the most versatile members of the radio profession, in spite of—or perhaps it's because of—that weight of his. As Bennie Walker he edits the *Magazine of the Air*; as Bennie Fishel he is the piping-voiced little boy heard on many comedy programs, and under his own family name of Benjamin Walker McLaughlin he sings ballads and lyrics in an engaging tenor voice, and plays Ezra Higgins in "Memory Lane."

The NBC star was just thirteen when he discovered his flair for showmanship. It was

back in Slatington, Pennsylvania, where his father was the head of a prosperous baking business. The elder McLaughlin himself delighted in amateur theatricals, and was not unsympathetic toward his son's ambition when he learned it lay in the theatre. He informed the young aspirant for Thespian honors that he could

have a musical education and everything else he would require in his career—provided he learned the baking business first. Young Bennie grasped the wisdom of the suggestion, and while he was studying music he learned also how to bake bread, pies and biscuit which still are the envy and despair of feminine guests in the McLaughlin home.

"I have one advantage over most actors," Bennie declared. "I'm always pretty sure of being able to eat, for I can bake my own when necessary!"

The McLaughlins moved to Des Moines, Iowa, and there Bennie engaged in various occupations while still hoping to reach the footlights. Then the World War came along, and Bennie enlisted in the Fourth Field Artillery. When the military powers learned that Bennie could cook, they appointed him the company chef. Refused active service, Bennie was glad to do what he could, and he presided over 205 husky appetites for so long, he says, that to this day he still can't count coffee in anything but gallons.

The war was over, Bennie decided he was through with department stores and anything else except singing. He came west and almost immediately was part of the California Male Quartet, noted vocal group which sang at the Mission Play in San Gabriel every year. Bennie also played characters in prologues at Sid Grauman's Million Dollar Theatre. He was a member of the Rounders, another well known quartet, and singing in the Music Box Revue when the group was signed up by NBC. Myron Niesely, also an NBC star now, was the other tenor in the quartet. Bennie's personality as well as his singing voice carried so perfectly over the microphone that when the *Woman's Magazine of the Air* was organized he was the natural choice for its editorship, and his magazine slogan, "Keep that old smile smiling" has made radio history for one of the most popular programs on the Coast.

# MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Young composers of California are taking a keen interest in the work of Lost and Found, the Sunshine Twins of KLX, who are, each Saturday, broadcasting musical discoveries of theirs—unpublished songs by California composers.

This piano duo, now in its fifth year on the Classified Program of KLX, has met with marked success so far, uncovering a surprising amount of better than average music. They request that all manuscripts submitted be copyrighted in advance to protect the interest of the composer.

Lost and Found personally rearrange all submitted manuscripts and present them as piano duets each Saturday morning between 11 and 11:30 over KLX. Western representatives of national publishing houses audit these programs, constantly on the alert for new hits.

The Sunshine Twins profess that their purpose in life is to make people happy, and they feel that they are fulfilling this purpose, not alone for the composers, but for their friends as well.

• • • More than 100 radio pick-up points already have been installed by the National Broadcasting Company in the World's Fair Grounds in Chicago, where the Century of Progress Exposition will open on June 1. Plans to give radio listeners the most complete coverage ever attempted for such an extended series of events are now being formulated. Actual broadcasts from the exposition following the opening are still tentative, depending upon the scheduling of events at the fair.

• • • Hazel Warner, popular contralto of the Don Lee Sys-

tem, who maybe, has sung "Springtime in the Rockies" more times than many other radio singers combined, recently won a popularity contest in Southern California, as the most popular woman singer in that part of the state. The presentation of the diploma in the KHJ studios in Los Angeles was something of an event. Now "Steadfast Hazel" is receiving congratulations by air. William H. Wright extended them from KFRC during a recent Feminine Fancies Hour.

• • • KMTR announces that Leslie Adams, one of the West's best known radio figures has been appointed Production Manager of that station. Adams has long been a favorite on the air, both in Los Angeles and in San Diego, where he was until recently manager of KFSD. His many fans and friends are welcoming him back to local ether lanes.

• • • Nearly every sports celebrity who visits San Francisco is lured to the microphone by Ernie Smith to take part in KTAB's Sport Page of the Air.

Some recent Smith interviews have been those with Jim Londos, wrestling champion; Young Corbett, welterweight champion of the world; Tom Sharkey, an old-time fighter; Mickey Walker, heavyweight contender, and Ellsworth Vines, foremost American tennis player.

• • • The most startling experience Carlton E. Morse, NBC playwright, ever had, occurred shortly after midnight several years ago. Mr. Morse, then employed on a morning paper, was on his way home when on a dark, lonely street, he stumbled over

a body. It was that of Sergeant Michael J. Brady, San Francisco police officer who had been shot by gangsters. Morse got him to a hospital just before he died, and then went back to his office and wrote the story.

Now he has written it again but in dramatic form, this time—for the story of Sergeant Brady will be heard in the May 12 episode of "Killed in Action," series of true dramas taken from the San Francisco police records, with Police Chief William J. Quinn as narrator, and heard over NBC station KPO Friday nights.

• • • Tom King, who tells interesting detective stories over KROW every Wednesday evening, usually relates some of his own experiences while dealing with criminals. In his professional capacity as a detective, King has assisted in a number of important California criminal solutions.

• • • Mary Wood, NBC soprano, still has the first long skirt she ever owned. It came from an exclusive New York shop Mary selected in which to buy her very first grown-up dress.

• • • Helen Pickens of the Pickens Sister Harmony Trio studied fashion designing in Paris and New York before she ever thought of making singing her career. Helen designs and makes all her gowns and street clothes.

A tip to the feminine dialers who listen to the harmony singer: Helen insists on well-tailored clothes rather than fussy ones . . . and likes beautiful materials and good lines rather than frivolous effects.

• • • Chuck Russell and Roger Neill of the College Inn Trio heard over KTAB on Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights, were at one time members of the Harmonizers, old KPO favorites.

Russell sings and Neill is the guitarist on the College Inn broadcast. The third member is Al Mason, who is also a guitarist. Art Fadden is heard during the program in piano solos.

• • • Although Howard Claney, NBC announcer, is noted for the dignity that he lends to many radio programs he particularly enjoys a hilarious role. For example, Claney revels in the chance of crashing through the solemnity of Jack Benny's learned discussions each Friday night. Although "it is all in the continuity," Claney takes particular delight in confusing Benny with his commercial announcements.

• • • The oddest autograph request ever received by John and Ned, harmony duo, came the other day in the form of a large section of a crazy quilt, whose owner asked to have the radio stars sign one of the squares of silk. They sent it back to her with not only their own signatures, but that of

Little Mary inked in, together with a sketch of a guitar and a bar of music.

• • • According to Harold (Scrappy) Lambert, lead tenor of the Songsmiths' Quartet, a man may be a big shot among small-timers and still remain a small-timer among big shots.

• • • Verna Felton, NBC dramatic star, was a well-known stock actress before she turned to radio, playing in various companies up and down the Pacific Coast. One of her Portland, Oregon, admirers has sent an envelope-full of programs dating back to Verna's early stock company experience, with the plea, "Please don't think I am delving into your past but I have kept every program on which your name is written from the time I first saw you, and you are still my favorite actress."

• • • KROW has set aside Monday evenings, beginning at 8 o'clock, for studio auditions. Billy Sherwood, production manager at KROW, will hear all prospective radio entertainers at this time.

• • • KGO listeners who follow Lee S. Roberts' Memory Box program, will hear the famous pianist-composer improvising now and then. One of the most enjoyable features about radio work, Roberts believes, is the opportunity it offers for spontaneity on the part of its artists, and many times when he sits down to play a microphone program, he discards the composition he has selected in advance, for an improvisation which may never be put down on paper.

• • • That new trio heard over KNX is managed by Eddie Bush, formerly of the famous Biltmore Trio and is composed of Eddie Bush, Buster Dees and Earl Randall. This new aggregation is very, very good and is drawing much in the way of favorable comment.

• • • George Givot the "Greek Ambassador of Goodwill" on the Old Gold programs, speaks with a perfect Greek accent. But he was born in Omaha, raised in Chicago, and has never been in Greece.

• • • Professor Pierre Douillet, concert pianist heard on occasional KTAB programs, studied music in Moscow. He has appeared in concerts in a great number of American and European cities.

• • • Kate Smith collects hundreds of unusual perfumes in all sorts of containers, but never uses any herself.

David Ross, who has the deepest and most resonant announcing voice, is the shortest in stature of all radio announcers.

Joe Haymes, who leads the band at the Village Nut Club, is the most serious of the stick-wavers.

Bing Crosby, Kate Smith and Morton Downey are three of the outstanding vocalists in radio today, yet they never took a singing lesson in their lives.

Fred Waring sings and conducts his vocalists in college glee club specialties over the radio, but he was refused membership in the glee club at Penn State.

• • • Edward Ludes, NBC sound effects engineer, declares that the two "most unreliable" sounds he is called upon to produce is a squeak and a door crash. The radio sound man, he explains, never can be sure how either of these effects is going to sound through the microphone, no matter how many times he tests his apparatus for producing them. A difference in a fraction of a degree in the squeak may make it so shrill as to sound like a whistle, or so raucous as to be another noise altogether. The door the hero crashes to rescue the heroine may be tried out a dozen times in advance, but a

slight variation in power may make it sound like an explosion or just a gentle "poosh."

• • • Another change in staff at KMTR is the signing of Dean Metcalf as publicity director and announcer. He has been on the air and in print on the Coast for six years, and but recently returned to Los Angeles after four years as program director of a San Francisco radio station.

• • • William O'Neal is the tallest CBS singer, and Jeanie Lang is the shortest, and both sing together in duets on the Pontiac broadcasts.

• • • The jig-saw puzzle rage of today reminds Happy Jack Turner, NBC solo and piano artist, of the time he played in a night club with two other fellows as the orchestra. Each Saturday night

a gentleman arrived and put a \$20 bill on his table. Every time Jack's orchestra played a number he liked he would tear off a piece of the bill and throw it into the saxophone. At the end of the evening the three spent several hours picking out the pieces and pasting them together. It was a bad week if the fellow did not come on Saturday because this \$20 amounted to more than the combined salary of the three.

• • • Gypsy, NBC interviewer whose Closeups of the radio stars are heard over NBC station KPO Sunday nights, wanted to be a missionary when she was a little girl.

• • • Singin' Sam still blushes when he recalls his first theatrical experience at the age of seventeen. Against the stern disapproval of his

father, who wanted him to go into business, young Sam organized a home-town quartet and left with high hopes on a barn-storming tour. The tour folded after several weeks, leaving the boys stranded in the Kentucky mountains, and Sam shamefacedly wired his father for help.

Two days later, when the boys' belts were tightened to the last notch, Sam's father rolled up in a hired gig and confronted his unhappy son. There was no storm of denunciation, no "I told you so"—just this biting query:

"All right, Mr. Barrymore, where's your bag?"

• • • H. G. Ashbaucher, Chicago NBC sound technician, has found a new sound effect for the old-time horse drawn carriage. He rolls a roller skate over finely ground gravel.






