



# ETHER GLEANINGS

**C**ECIL and SALLY, the popular radio youngsters, have been signed by the Fanchon and Marco circuit for a tour of their theaters with an option for a year's contract which will take them throughout the nation.

Johnny Patrick and Helen Troy, the principals and their company left San Francisco for Northern California the latter part of last week. From there they jump to the Pacific Northwest, later playing the Northwest states. Johnnie Sirmyer, business manager for the famous radio team, was responsible for the negotiations with the theatrical company.

Although Cecil and Sally programs are not being released in the San Francisco bay district at present, electrical transcriptions of their act are being heard daily over more than forty stations in the country, Canada, Honolulu, New Zealand, and South Africa. It will be necessary for them to make airplane trips back to San Francisco every few weeks to record more transcriptions at the MacGregor and Sollie laboratories.

That "Mickey Mouse Club" broadcast, sent out from KFRC every Saturday morning at 9:15 o'clock under sponsorship of O'Connor, Moffatt and Company, San Francisco department store, has been attracting more than 400 youngsters to the studios each week.

"Winning the West" is the monicker of one of the latest dramas to hit the ether hereabouts. It comes over the NBC wire-up every Tuesday night at 9:30 o'clock and relates in play form the exploits of the courageous men and women who braved the dangers of pioneering in the vast western section of the United States.

The Occidental Life Insurance Company of California is the sponsor and has signed a year's contract with NBC.

Wilbur Hall, NBC playwright and an authority on early day history of the West, is the author of the new series.

The principal characters in the series are being played by Charles MacAlister, Helen Musselman and Frank Provo.

Chesterfield cigarettes are coming back on the air over CBS, this time with a six nights a week quarter hour program—6 to 6:15 o'clock. The ciggy people have engaged the Philadelphia Symphony orchestra for the occasion. It will mark the first time that a full symphony orchestra has been

hired for a fifteen minute program. However, it is the plan of the producers of the program to run the concerts in series form, linking one broadcast to another, keeping a running continuity from day to day. The broadcasts are scheduled to start some time this month, the date not having been set at this writing.

The CBS is catapulting that old Gold program across the sea to station KGMB in Honolulu now. Moran and Mack, the "Two Black Crows" and Waring's Pennsylvanians are featured on the bill.

\* \* \*

Floyd Gibbons' program on the NBC for the Johns-Manville Company, has been shifted to 9:30 o'clock Monday nights. It formerly was 9 p. m.

\* \* \*

Bill Wright, KFRC production manager, tells us of the engagement of Helen Nagin, distinguished concert pianist, by the station. She was soloist with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra in the Hollywood Bowl concerts and likewise appeared in concerts in the east. She is being heard Sundays from 2:45 to to 3 p. m. on KFRC.

Another beauty talk, backed by incidental music is hitting the ether domain from KGO and KFI on an NBC program these days. The speaker is Betty Marlowe, who does it in behalf of the J. W. Marrow Company, shampoo manufacturers. She is billed Tuesdays and Thursdays from 1:45 to 2 p.m.

Harrison Holliday tells us he had one "swell trip" during his recent flight to Los Angeles and return on the U. S. Navy's big gas bag, the Macon. He and Paul Rickenbacher, KHJ production manager and Al Cormack, KFRC engineer, made the trip and broadcast twice from the big air cruiser as a feature of Navy day. Both broadcasts went over the coast to coast NBC chain.

Aileen Fealy and Phyllida Ashley, who comprise that popular NBC piano team, are back on the air, after a three weeks' vacation. Miss Ashley visited the Century of Progress in Chicago during her rest period.

\* \* \*

An answer to an Oakland reader who queries us about the whereabouts of Jack Delaney and his band, formerly on KTLX: The popular maestro is vacationing after appearing over the Oakland station for four

consecutive years. He stepped down from the ether stage September 30. After a vacation he plans to organize a new band and will probably return to the air.

Eddie Fitzgerald, impresario of Feminine Fancies hit on the Don Lee chain has recently been named manager of the Orpheum Theater in San Francisco. He is continuing, however, with his matinee radio broadcasts from KFRC.

\* \* \*

With a lot of new ideas tucked in his hat, Tom Gerun and his boys came back to the Bal Tabarin Cafe in San Francisco with a bang the other night. They're back on the air over KGO. Gerun and his musicians have been away from the Pacific Coast for more than six months, most of which time they were playing at the Chicago Century of Progress.

Kay Kyser, who ground out the rhythmic melodies during Gerun's absence at the popular San Francisco night club, is now playing at the Casa del Mar in Los Angeles and beginning November 4, his music will be heard over KFWB nightly.

\* \* \*

George F. McClelland, who resigned recently as vice-president in charge of sales of the NBC, was largely instrumental in the building of the Pacific Coast network of the NBC. He came to San Francisco more than six years ago to establish the chain on this coast. We interviewed him at the time. His prediction then that we would soon be daily hearing programs from all parts of the nation, was exciting news in those days. McClelland is to enter the radio broadcasting business in an independent capacity.

Safeway failed to renew their radio contract with Eddie Peabody, the banjo wiz, which ran out October 30.

\* \* \*

Boys, here's just what you've been looking and listening for—some real honest to goodness railroad thrillers; Commencing Sunday, November 5, the NBC will wing out a program called: "True Railroad Adventures" at 1 p. m. KGO is the San Francisco outlet. They will be dramatizations of authentic stories of train wrecks, holdups and feats of courage on the great American railroads. The Lionel Corporation is the sponsor.

Due to some program switching, Seth Parker is being heard on station KPO of the NBC chain. But it's only a temporary arrangement.

Bruce Cameron, tenor, who sang on some of the first San Francisco stations way back when, is about town again following a stay in Europe where he had been studying.

\* \* \*

Cheerio has a new program on the NBC wire-up. It's radioed over the chain from 3:45 to 4 p. m. on Tuesdays and is called: "Cheerio's Musical Mosaics." The contributing talent includes: Jan Pierce, tenor; a chorus of eight voices and an orchestra.

\* \* \*

Michael Raffetto, "Paul" of "One Man's Family," is back at the NBC studios after a week's vacation.

\* \* \*

Ted White, ex-NBC star, is studying voice in San Francisco.

\* \* \*

That anvil used in the Cross-Cuts from the Log o' the Day on the NBC, is worth much more than its weight in iron alone. It is the same anvil used by John Studebaker to make wheelbarrows for gold miners in the days of '49. Studebaker came to Placerville with the rest, but soon realized that the surest gold mine for him was to make wheelbarrows for the other miners. It was for that purpose that the old anvil was used, until Studebaker sold out to join his brothers in the east in the manufacture of wagons.

"One man's Family," from the prolific pen of Carlton E. Morse, considered the best of radio dramas now on the air, besides its release in the West, is "fed" to thirty-nine eastern NBC stations every Saturday night.

\* \* \*

If producer Caryl Coleman of the NBC finds it necessary to reproduce the effect of a crying baby on the air, he won't have any trouble now. For he's the daddy of a brand new baby boy, born to Mrs. Coleman, October 23. Among the programs produced by Coleman on the NBC set-up is the M. J. B. Demi-Tasse Revue.

Emil Polak is due back on the air November 5, after enjoying a great vacation.

The Iverson String Quartet, of which Albert Iverson, violinist, is the conductor, is being featured now on the Evening Vespers program on KQW, daily except Sunday from 5 to 5:30 o'clock. The musical group likewise is heard every weekday on the same station from 8 to 9 a. m.

\* \* \*

Nadine Amos, secretary to Lloyd E. Yoder, NBC press relations exec, was signally honored when chosen to act as secretary for Guglielmo Marconi during the inventor's stay in San Francisco recently.





# MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Rubinoff and Eddie Cantor are discussing plans for a stage musical of which the NBC comedian would be star and producer, and Rubinoff musical director. Success of Cantor's road show last year is responsible for the present discussion.

• • • Floyd Gibbons, who for four years has reported over the radio general news, wars, and the World's Fair, and now NRA activities for Johns-Manville, was a pioneer in the rapid-fire style of talking over the air. Others have speeded up, but he is still at or near the top in speed, with a regular average of 230 words a minute.

• • • Just before the anniversary broadcast of Captain Henry's Show Boat, every principal player was presented with a handsome traveling clock set in a leather case, gifts from the sponsor in recognition of a year's service. The name of the recipient is on each clock.

• • • "Together we stand, divided we fall" has been the motto of the Glen Gray's fourteen excellent musicians who, for the past four years, have preferred to remain on the road rather than diminish their number to accept offers from prominent hotels, bidding for a smaller band. Aside from teamwork equivalent to that of a gridiron squad, the success of the outfit may be traced to its outstanding members—Glen Gray, president; Mel Jensen, director; Gene Gifford, arranger; and Kenny Sergeant and Pee Wee Hunt, vocalists. Casa Loma has a flair all its own, exemplified by an unorthodox abuse of "St. Louis Blues" and by the tenderness of "For You," when Kenny Sergeant's voice

goes right up to the stars in a moonstruck timbre.

• • • Within a very few minutes after the whistles blow, ending the football games of the nation each Saturday the afternoon Gano-Downs Football Reporter takes the air over KOA, Denver, giving the scores of the important games. Walter Campbell, a veteran sports announcer, handles the assignment, and in addition to the scores gives other information as is of interest to the average football fan.

This feature is broadcast at 6:55 p. m., Mountain Time, each Saturday over KOA only.

• • • Lovers of good rhythm will be interested in knowing that Carol Lofner and his fifteen-piece orchestra are now being featured over KOA, Denver, in six half-hour programs each week, direct from the Hotel Cosmopolitan. Assisting Mr. Lofner are Florine Dickson of Los Angeles, winner of the popularity contest on the campus of the University of Southern California in the Spring of 1933, and Larry Cotton.

• • • Cliff Hall, who is straight man for Jack Pearl on those Saturday night Magic Carpet programs, has nothing to do from one Saturday night to another, so he has volunteered his services six days a week to the NRA. Hall is making addresses to business men's clubs and various meetings in and around New York City.

• • • Kel Keech, NBC announcer, wanted to tear out telephone receivers and wreck pay stations when he telephoned his wife at home and the operator told him there was no such number.

"But I—I—it's my own number," bellowed Keech.

"One moment please. I'll check again. (Pause.) Sorry, Sir, there is no such number listed."

Keech merely gurgled by this time, while the helpful hello girl asked for and got his name and address. Then she gave him his correct number. Kel's memory had done a throwback and he had been trying to get a number he had about five years ago.

• • • Grace Frankel and Gertrude Lyne joined the NBC staff about a year ago, shortly after they formed their now well known two-piano team under the name, "A Pair of Pianos." For several years Miss Frankel was a pianist in West Coast motion-picture houses, while Miss Lyne was an organist on the Paramount Theatre circuit. Miss Frankel later gave up theatre work to join the staff of a music publishing firm. Miss Lyne makes all arrangements used by the team on the air.

• • • H. V. Kaltenborn, CBS news commentator, had to brush up on his foreign languages during his recent trip to Europe. He broadcast in French and German, in addition to his native tongue. He used French speaking from the League of Nations station in Geneva, German at the Austrian government station in Vienna and English over the Danish Broadcasting System in Copenhagen.

• • • One of the few Americans ever to attain the honor, Arthur F. Kales, general manager of KFI-KECA, has been elected to the Royal Photographic Society of London. Kales has achieved international note for his development of technical processes

and for his studies of portraiture. He is the only amateur photographer who has carte blanche from all studios to "shoot" their stars.

• • • Jimmie Grier's orchestra, heard nightly over both KFWB and KTM, have started to do a series of late dance tunes on transcriptions at the Freeman Lang sound studios in Hollywood.

Gogo Delys and others of Grier's vocalists will be heard, too. They will be released to eastern broadcasters. Radio Transcription Company of America produces the series at the Freeman Lang studios.

• • • When radio artists and employees have vacations they find it hard to get away from business. James Melton, popular NBC tenor, overcomes that handicap by sailing away to nowhere on his fifty-foot cruiser, *Melody*, which has everything from a refrigerator to a shower, with hot and cold running water, but no radio.

On a recent trip, however, when Jimmy was host to twenty-one NBC page boys from a day's respite from radio and broadcasting in general, it was brought home to them when they met Yoichi Hiraoka, NBC Japanese xylophonist, and Serge de Somov, NBC engineer, who were fishing quietly and contentedly until they were nearly swamped by rollers from the cruiser.

• • • Don McNeill, Chicago NBC's tallest mickeman, announces the Singing Strings program which is followed in the same studio by the Morin Sisters' broadcast. Bill Kephart, the shortest announcer, announces the latter program. Artists have a lot of fun in the twenty seconds between programs watching Bill as he dashes into the studio and struggles to lower the microphones to fit his height.

• • • Though Nat Brusiloff, famous radio orchestra leader,

possesses one of the most valuable violins in America, no company can be found to insure it owing to his habit of using it as a baton when he is not playing.

For years, Nat Brusiloff has tried to break himself of the habit, even to the extent of having a man stand by to take his violin away from him each time he stops playing. "One day the habit is going to cost me twenty thousand dollars," sighed Nat Brusiloff, for that is the estimated value of his priceless Stradivarius.

• • • Three years ago Ethel Merman was an unknown stenographer in Astoria, New York. In three years, she has become one of the stage's outstanding singing stars, and has been starred in "Take a Chance," "Girl Crazy" and George White's "Scandals." When she appears at the New York Paramount Theater, she invariably sets attendance records.

• • • George Burns and Gracie Allen, that goofy pair, are again heeding the call of the silver screen. They left New York for Hollywood, where they will make three full-length Paramount pictures within the space of five months. At the same time, Guy Lombardo and his Royal Canadians, their co-broadcasters, will be swinging through the midwest in a personal appearance tour. All will continue to be heard each Wednesday evening over the Columbia network, with specially installed lines between the two points of origin providing for quick switching from George and Gracie to Guy and his boys. The first picture George and Gracie will make is titled "Six of a Kind," in which they will be featured with Mary Boland, Charles Ruggles, W. C. Fields, and Alison Skipworth. The second, which will feature the dumb-crackers alone, is as yet untitled. In the

third, they will join their fellow CBS artist, Bing Crosby, in a "Cruise to Nowhere."

• • • Captain Hugh Barrett Dobbs, master of the Del Monte Ship of Joy, gets response from all over the continent on his broadcasts. A recent wire from Baltimore, Maryland, said: "Thanks for your fine programs and congratulations to Armand Girard, the basso, and Meredith Willson for his Chiffon Jazz." It was signed by F. X. Millholland, assistant to the vice-president of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad.

• • • There was quite a "piece" of traveling accomplished by the "Myrt and Marge" cast before its members were herded back to the kilocycles from their vacation rambles. Donna Damerel ("Marge") spent a busy summer in California making movie, stage and radio appearances. Myrtle Vail ("Myrt"), Director Bobby Brown and Mrs. Brown traveled for two months in South America, gaining first-hand impressions for future script material. Eleanor Rella ("Billy") and Reginald Knorr ("Sanfield")—in private life Mr. and Mrs. Knorr—summered at their isolated cabin in the north woods of Wisconsin. Ray Hedge ("Clarence") stayed two months in California and trekked leisurely back through Canada.

# SILHOUETTES



**P**HILISTINE.

Odd word, isn't it?

You've heard a man talking over the radio under that name for some time now, presenting interesting, humorous and instructive chats in a philosophical and facetious manner.

But, have you ever taken the trouble to go to the dictionary and look up that word—Philistine?

Neither have we. But we did go one better. We looked up this radio masquerader who tosses the English language about the ether with such dexterity. We cornered him one day in his lair and the following is the result of our findings:

In private life he is Dr. Seth Maker, dentist by profession, broadcaster, editor, painter, dog fancier by avocation. Just so that we might get off to a good start, our first question fired at the radio personality was:

"Doc, what is the meaning of the word Philistine?"

His answer:

"Well, Mr. Webster (the dictionary man) says he is a person who is lacking in liberal culture and refinement. One not appreciating the nobler aspirations and sentiments of humanity. One who is indifferent to the higher intellectual interests preferring the material and commonplace.

"But," the dentist added, "I tell my audience that it means a common individual not weighed down by an excess of intellect, who on occasion is prone to err, both in matters of opinion and fact. It is assumed, therefore, that if mistakes are made or if the opinions advanced do not meet with your approval you will make due allowance for the source and exercise the virtues of patience and tolerance."

So much for that. Now let's tell you something about this man who has created a new type of radio entertainment and succeeded at it—tremendously and prosperously—for his sponsor, Doctor Painless Parker.

But before we get started let it be known to those of you who are not already familiar with the Philistine, he

is heard on the NBC network every Monday night at 8:15 o'clock.

The Philistine (Doctor Maker) is a descendant of the Maker family which came to Rhode Island from Scotland in 1670. Captain Robert Gray, the early day explorer, who in 1796 discovered the Columbia River and named it that and after whom Gray's Harbor was named, is a distant uncle of Doctor Maker. His ancestors on the other side were Spanish pirates who were shipwrecked on the Maine coast.

Probably the first mentioned ancestry has something to do with Doctor Maker's un-

usual versatility. He is constantly exploring new fields to conquer. A Seattle newspaper once said that Doctor Maker was the most versatile man in Washington. Mediocrity doesn't enter into it in his case. He excels in every endeavor he undertakes.

As an example was his success as a speed writer on the typewriter. While in his youth Doctor Maker decided to master the typewriter. He accomplished his purpose. The American Writing Machine Company sent him on a tour throughout the United States and then to England, giving speed writing demonstrations on their machines.

In the span of years since then, Doctor Maker has been newspaper editor, magazine editor, author of novels and dramas, song writer, sign painter, pianist, landscape and portrait artist, lecturer and dentist. He shot at everything and hit a bull's eye every time.

Our subject was born in Wisconsin a certain number of summers ago, is married, has a son who is a lecturer, and a daughter who recently graduated from a Los Angeles high school.

After his return from Europe and his speed writing demonstrations, Doctor Maker decided to study medicine in New York. Shortly afterwards, though, he switched over to dentistry to honor the memory of his father, who was a dentist.

The god of luck that has been his constant companion brought him into an acquaintanceship with Dr. Painless Parker, the noted painless extractor, about thirteen years ago. He became publicity man for Doctor Parker and gave street demonstrations of extracting teeth without pain in nearly every city on the coast.

A year later Doctor Maker went on the radio for the first time under the auspices of Painless Parker over KFON in Long Beach. Since then he has come face to face with the microphone in thirty or more Pacific Coast stations.

The original Painless Parker radio program consisted of a general talk on dentistry by Doctor Maker. That didn't click very well, so Doctor Maker decided to incorporate in his program the answering of dental questions over the air. Interest in the program increased immediately. Then evolved the thought to answer general questions put to him by his tuner-inners. The popularity of the program increased several hundred per cent. And today that is the structure of the program—answering questions about everything and anything.

We've heard him scores of times and have never known this Philistine to be stumped on a question put to him by a listener. Many of his replies are in a facetious manner, yes, but that is the tasty sauce to his presentation. He's the book of knowledge of the air.

Several years ago this human encyclopedia, Jack and master of all trades, inaugurated a radio university over the late Northwest chain, consisting of KEX, KJR and KGA. The response to the affair was so overwhelming that the time and additional expense involved forced him to abandon it.

Up in the beautiful Puget Sound Doctor Maker owns a 96-acre piece of property, which he is just itching to inhabit. He wants to go there and do all the things he has always wanted to do—hunt-


In closing will add that the WEEKLY in its very informative and handy size has helped me to learn to know and enjoy my radio more—also to inform myself of the many entertainers.






