



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


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
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GUY LOMBARDO

M·J·B Demi-Tasse Revue Presents

A DOUBLE barrel discharge of the highest type of talent ever teamed together in a Western radio presentation is making its bid for a place in the radio sun on the popular coffee company broadcast on Monday nights at 7:30 o'clock over the entire Western network of the National Broadcasting Company.

Guy Lombardo and his internationally famed Royal Canadians, one of the better known dance music organizations of the North American continent, have been signed for a series of broadcasts by the sponsors of this weekly musical "hot spot" in the ether domain.

Tizzie Lish, in the Western radio world the outstanding in his particular field, who has also been signed on a contract by the program sponsor, is extraordinary as a laugh-getter. In real life this ludicrous character which has amused listeners to an afternoon NBC broadcast for the past year, is William Comstock, a real "he-man" with a rare sense of humor and a gift at character impersonations.

Guy Lombardo's Royal Canadians, now

playing a special engagement at the Coconut Grove in Los Angeles, are classed by most critics and the public alike as the ultra in dance tunesters. Without a doubt Lombardo has become the most popular of the young orchestra leaders to gain prominence in the last year. From the Columbia Broadcasting System alone he collects \$150,000 a year for his two coast to coast programs.

On top of this there are cafe, stage, movie and more radio engagements.

With his signing with the coffee company sponsor, it marks the first time that his popular musical organization has ever been sponsored out of the West. This young Canadian leader, just 28, is a native of London, Ontario. In his band are his three brothers, Carmen, Leibert and Victor, and all except Guy have been playing together for the past decade.

Lombardo attributes his phenomenal success in the musical and radio world to the fact that he plays only in a slow, simple, sweet manner. No fast, horn-rasping, eardrum breakers will ever spread over the ether from his band.

The work of Tizzie Lish before the microphone measures up to the standards set by the Eastern comedians of the radio field. Her first two performances on the Demi-Tasse Revue proved her the most popular comedian to be heard on the Revue in the past four years.

With such a stellar line-up, the Demi-Tasse Revue, which is broadcast over the entire Western network of the NBC on Monday nights from 7:30 to 8 o'clock, is now comparable to the big eastern variety broadcasts.

In the fall of 1929 when Guy Lombardo deserted Chicago for New York, he was just another baton hustler, another fellow for the song pluggers to listen to. The big town where he had now arrived bent a cold and unresponsive ear to his pokey melodies. And from the right of him, the left of him, in front of him and from in back of him came the generous advice of amateur band critics to speed up his tempo. "Discard that slow type of music," they all but yelled in his ears. But Guy merely replied: "That's the only kind we know how to play, if New

York doesn't like us, then we can go back to Chicago." Of course Lombardo was only biding for time. He knew that he had an individual slant and with Cleveland and Chicago successes as a precedent, he remained confident during those lean months of autumn in 1929.

This, of course, was just about the only emotion that he could entertain. For try as he would, Lombardo never could produce the rich orchestrations of Lopez, the wold clamor of Ellington or the driving fervor of Rolfe. Such musical slants were Greek to him. If these were the only tunes the town likes it was just too bad for good old Guy. The only adjectives he knew were "slow, sweet, simple."

Lombardo and his boys have been playing on these adjectives for over ten years. They've been creating this same kind of music ever since they were kids in London, Ont. All of them—there are now four Lombardo brothers, Guy, Carmen, Leibert and Victor—were whiling their days away in London Collegiate Institute. Why not take the next paragraph to introduce the orches-

tra members, with their nicknames and current ages? O. K., here goes:

Fred ("The Enemy") Kreitzer, 27, piano; Francis (Muff) Henry, 26, banjo; George (Sheik) Gowans, 25, drummer; Victor (The Kid) Lombardo, 20, saxophone; Carmen (Bull) Lombardo, 27, saxophone; Leibert (Gabriel) Lombardo, 25, trumpet; James (Bim) Dillon, 27, trombone; Ben (Apples) Davies, 27, tuba; Fred (Derf) Hifman, 23, saxophone, and Larry (King) Owens, 28, saxophone.

Guy has always been known as "Reckless." His brother, Victor, the kid, being so callow, was not, of course, with the original outfit. He didn't join his brothers until they attained New York popularity.

Parting from school at a somewhat elementary scholastic stage, the orchestra began its first tour—traveling Pantages and Keith vaudeville circuits—and eventually arrived, pale-faced kids and somewhat bewildered, in the Claremont in Cleveland. Even then they were not certain that they wanted to become musicians. Maybe they had better return to their home town, London, Ont., and go in for a more substantial craft. Well, they held a council, and with Guy as chairman, determined that if ever they were to have an opportunity, this was it.

For four years they remained in Cleveland—at the Claremont, Lake Road Inn, the Yacht Club and the Music Box. In 1927 they moved to Chicago to the Granada Cafe, where Paul Whiteman now finds room for himself. This supper club is eight miles from the Loop District and never had been unusually popular. There were exactly four couples on the floor when Lombardo opened.

After several singularly unsuccessful weeks Lombardo begged the management to release him. He wasn't clicking and he knew it only too well. But the management refused. Lombardo, remembering his radio popularity in Cleveland, pleaded for a broadcasting tie-up. It was arranged. WBBM somewhat skeptically agreed to broadcast his music, despite Lombardo's then obscure name. But there was an immediate response to his soothing, sweet melodies.

Then sponsors began to reach for him. The Florsheim Shoe Company sponsored his band locally in Chicago. Later he played nationally for the Wrigley chewing gum people. He stayed in Chicago for four years—four successful, money-making, popularity-building years.

The Music Corporation of America then took him under its wing and placed him in the Roosevelt Hotel in New York City. And Manhattan went wild over him. He's been broadcasting over a coast to coast CBS network for the past year or so for the

Robert Burns cigar folks and is heard on other CBS programs. But the signing of Lombardo by the M. J. B. Coffee company makes radio history. It is the first Western sponsor of radio broadcasts to get under contract such a luminous star for a series of broadcasts originating on the Pacific Coast for the listeners in the Western states.

And now just a snap-shot of Guy. He's dark, olive-skinned, a boyish appearing fellow with heavy eyebrows and a way of smiling that calls to mind a sun-lamp. As he conducts he holds the violin in one hand and gently sways the bow left and right and right and left, never spoiling the smooth flow by lifting or lowering it.

Just a bit now about that excruciatingly funny Tizzie Lish. For a year she was one of the outstanding features with Al Pearce and his Gang on the NBC Pacific Coast network. She is known by her former followers as the culinary and health expert of the Gang, making light, of course, in her own ridiculous style, of everything and everybody.

Her ludicrous comments on her private affairs, her extraordinary and absurd ideas on physical culture, housekeeping etiquette, cooking and other important problems, her insane recipes, delivered in her dry, unmusical voice have made her a unique sensation of the air.

Tizzie Lish has a style of presentation that is unique in radio entertainment in the West. She developed it a little more than a year ago and met with almost instant success after going on the air. As we pointed out at the beginning of this article, Tizzie Lish in real life is William Comstock, a real "he man" with unusual impersonating ability and possessor of rare wit. He always appears on his radio programs garbed in feminine attire—just to get into character. And his all but chic style of garments and accessories always bring up a roar of laughter from the studio audience.

Just as Gus Edwards and Texas Guinan have developed many stars for the theatrical world, the M. J. B. Demi-Tasse Revue has been the stepping stone on the road to fame for many radio personalities. George Olsen and his equally famous wife, Ethel Shutta, started their climb to fame and fortune on the M. J. B. broadcasts; then came Phil Harris, Bing Crosby, Donald Novis, John P. Medbury, Gus Arnheim and others.

In the signing of Guy Lombardo and his Royal Canadians and Tizzie Lish, the M. J. B. Coffee company is maintaining its radio policy to bring only the very best personalities in their respective endeavors to the living rooms of the Western radio audience.

SILHOUETTES

JOE PENNER, who earned his first money catching frogs in the swamps of his native Hungary, had many another job before he settled down to his life vocation of selling ducks in the theaters, the movies, and via radio.

He was born Joseph Pinta, November 11, 1904, in Nadgybeck Kereck, Hungary, where his grandfather was rector of the Reformed Church. It was nine years later that he reached the United States, and when he joined his parents in Detroit he had to start school in kindergarten, because he didn't know the language.

He made some pocket money selling papers out in Detroit, and he had a high soprano voice that qualified him for the choir of St. Mary's Church. It wasn't much of a step from that to occasional appearances at amateur nights in the Detroit theatres, but you could hardly say that the Penner career was launched, for still other jobs were to intervene.

Joe left high school to go on the road, selling magazine subscriptions. He developed the usual tale of needing money to go to college, and offered it with appropriate gestures. His salesmanship, thus early displayed, delighted his employers and they put him in charge of a gang of subscription solicitors. Somewhere in along here, also, came a temporary billet as filing clerk in the Ford factory.

But Joe, who liked to clown for his schoolmates, had always nursed an ambition to be a regular comedian. He was a step along the road when he got a job as property man with Rex, the mind reader, in a traveling variety company. There was also one of those tabloid revues on the bill, and the revue boasted a comedian. Joe learned the comedian's part and had a chance to take it over when the comic got temperamental.

This, incidentally, was the only instance of imitation in Joe Penner's career. He always wanted to be original and never developed the gift of mimicry that most comedians display. He even avoided seeing other comics perform, fearful that his own style would be affected.

The funny man whose part Joe took used a German dialect and Joe, naturally, did the same. "Dutch" was extremely popular then (ten years ago), especially in the lower

variety circuits, the carnivals, and the burlesque shows in which Joe for a time was to lead a precarious trouping existence.

But he wasn't satisfied with the Dutch dialect—it smacked of imitation to him and made him one of the great horde of non-descript comics. He thought his lisp, his laugh, and his other tricks got him the laughs, so he tried, on one engagement, leaving out the dialect, and he has never gone back to it.

His talents began to get substantial recognition around 1926-1927. It was about then that he developed the "Wanna buy a duck?" line. He had been telling a joke with a "straight" man in the course of which he would interrupt with irrelevant queries such as "Wanna buy a horse?" or "Wanna buy an ash-can?" and one night he happened to say, "Wanna buy a duck?" which got a better laugh than any of the other variations.

In 1927 came his first chance in a first-rate musical production, when he was engaged for the road tour of the Greenwich Village Follies. Thereafter he joined the Publix circuit and appeared at all the leading Paramount theatres. He was one of the biggest attractions of the circuit. Mingled with his movie-house engagements were brief experiences with shows that never clicked in New York—Tattle Tales Revue, Vanderbilt Revue, and East Wind. Later he did a series of fifteen two-reelers for Warner Brothers.

Some idea of Joe's itinerant life as a trouper can be gained from the fact that in the last ten years he has never been more than six weeks at a time in one city. His wife, Anna Mae Vogt, who was one of the original Russel Markert girls, and whom he met in the Greenwich Village Follies company, has accompanied him on his travels and their home has been wherever their hats were hung.

Joe had done the usual local broadcasts arranged by the theatres he played in, but up to the spring of 1933 he had never been on a network program. Then Rudy Vallee had him on several Fleischmann broadcasts and his signing for a long-term contract on his present program, the Bakers Broadcast, followed.

Having given up all other engagements, temporarily at least, to concentrate on radio, Joe is set to break his former record of six weeks in one spot.

Stanford University is going on the air January 8. The Palo Alto institution of learning will present a quarter hour each Monday night from 7:45 to 8 o'clock of educational theme. The initial speaker in the series will be Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, president of the university. He will be followed by prominent professors of the school, who will discuss various phases of current happenings.

The NBC has made a swell gesture for the good will of its millions of listeners throughout the length and breadth of the land by presenting those Boston Symphony Orchestra concerts. They are broadcast every Saturday from 5:30 to 7 p. m. and the series continues until March 31. Dr. Serge Koussevitzky is the conductor. The Boston Symphony is the oldest symphony organization in the United States.

Among the recent program shifts on the NBC line-up is the transplanting of the Big Ten program to Friday nights, 9:15 to 9:45 o'clock. The affair, which features Meredith Willson's orchestra, Tommy Harris and the Clef Dwellers, formerly was heard on Thursdays.

A. W. O. L. is Uncle Louie's Pet Shop—a KFRC event which won us over and now for some unknown reason has been yanked

off the ether just when we got all wrapped up in it. How come, Mr. Sponsor? Bill Wright was doing a great job as Uncle Louie and the whole broadcast, which was on Sunday nights at 5:30 o'clock, was a commendable one.

Little Joan Yarborough, four-year-old daughter of Barbara Jo Allen and Barton Yarborough, is probably one of the youngest tots to play in a regular NBC network production. She made her debut before the mike in a recent episode of "Death Valley Days." At the conclusion of the broadcast she was presented with a huge bouquet of roses, and was that young lady thrilled!

Nell Callahan, who punched the black and white ivories in radio studios in San Francisco way back when, is back on the air via KTAB after a long absence. She is heard Monday nights, 8 to 8:15 o'clock.

Educational and historical alike is "The Makers of History" program on KYA on Sunday afternoon, 3:45 to 4 o'clock. It is paid for by the Alliance of Retail Trade Associations.

• • • The Rhythmettes, Al Pearce girls' trio, who were the voices for the Three Little Pigs, recently attended a luncheon at the Walt Disney Studios when Walt Disney was awarded a medal for the best children's picture of the year. Rufus Von Kleinschmidt, President of U. S. C. awarded the medal, which was given by a children's magazine, for the cartoon picture, Three Little Pigs. An hour after the award, Disney learned he was the father of a ten-pound boy.

• • • When Mabel Albertson, featured with Phil Baker, the Armour Jester, first started in radio, she sang the theme song of a Pola Negri picture over an eastern station in advance of the actual showing of the picture. The mail from the radio audience was so heavy that the station was forced to repeat the show.

• • • Poley McClintock, the frog-voiced drummer, is the funny man of Fred Waring's Pennsylvanians. In real life, his voice is really pleasant and he's quite serious about life. Poley and Fred grew up together; they were next door neighbors in Tyrone, Pa. Once, both were in love with the same girl and they became bitter rivals. Then they went away to college. Several years later, she married another chap in the band. They shook hands and have been friends ever since. Poley's foghorn voice was largely responsible for the popularity of "Where Do You Worka John?" He is one fellow who made good by being bad.

• • • Morey Amsterdam, Al Pearce comic, was all set to give Mabel Todd, his fiancée, a fur coat for Christmas, but Mabel's frugal nature stopped

him. Why not use that money for our honeymoon in January? said Mabel.

• • • KNX's "Sheriff" Underwood, who recently returned from a 70-day trip through the southwest, tells of a meeting with an old-time sheriff—Sheriff Graham of Mojave County, Arizona, when the peace officer presented Underwood with a solid silver star over 60 years old. The silver was obtained from adjacent mines. "Sheriff Graham and I were discussing the old West and he told me some interesting stories. The badge he gave me he had worn for thirty years and was found on the body of his predecessor who mysteriously died in the mountains, on a still-hunt for bandits. The puzzling death was never solved, and a .44 and this badge were the only means of identification," Underwood said.

The "household word" names of radio are getting thinner.

Next in significance is the passing of many "name" bands from programs with which they have been associated. George Olsen will lose his gelatine sponsor. Guy

Lombardo leaves the Burns and Allen show. B. A. Rolfe, a maestro with a personality and a controversial type of rhythm, still reigns and Whiteman is still in the big league.

Rudy Vallee—whether you like him or not—still reigns supreme. His handlers have made a great showman out of him. Jack Pearl is getting a new sponsor. Ed Wynn's rating has slipped but he is still cackling on Tuesday nights. Cantor gets a raise in pay at the same time his material becomes increasingly weaker. Sponsors dicker with George Beatty, the latest overnight sensation and a cigarette sponsor talks turkey with Eddie and Ralph, the Sisters of the Skillet. Julius Tannen, with a bad start, hangs on. So much for the comedians.

• • • Frank Black's prophecy of a year ago—when he launched his string symphony programs—that better music would come to the front before 1934, has come true. Lucky Strike is sponsoring the Metropolitan opera. Chesterfield gives you the Philadelphia orchestra under the great Stokie. Castoria gives you more of the fine fiddling of Albert Spalding, America's foremost violinist, and John McCormack, his voice a bit blurry at times, carries on.

That famous hand lotion prepares a costly array of movie and opera names such as Katherine Hepburn, Lily Pons, Wheeler and Woolsey and the Ipana Troubadours continue to give you guest stars of note.

• • • Benny Fields, of vaudeville and motion picture fame was guest master of ceremonies for the New Year's Day Shell Show, broadcast over the Don Lee-Columbia western network

Monday evening from 8 to 9 o'clock. He replaced Benny Rubin who, after five months, completed his contract with the weekly variety hour.

Radio fans will remember the recent appearance of Benny Fields and Blossom Seeley on this program as guest artists. Fields is a trouper from 'way back, having been a vaudeville headliner for more than 15 years. Teaming with Blossom Seeley, he has played in every part of the country. Recently he acquired new acclaim in the motion picture field. He is best known as a singer and sometimes is described as "the original crooner." In addition, he plays many instruments, particularly the guitar, on which he is outstanding.

In designating Fields as guest master of ceremonies it was indicated that he has not been definitely signed beyond the first program. Benny Rubin enjoyed the longest run of any of the several masters of

ceremonies who have appeared on the hour.

• • • Earl Hatch, Al Pearce accompanist, was playing the drums in his home town orchestra when he was 10. At 12 he left home with a band and was with it for three years. By that time he was playing the piano. His only music school was the University of Hard Thumps.

• • • Rudy Vallee's choice of the ideal variety program, from the 1933 list of guests he had with him, is Mae West as the outstanding personality; George Gershwin in his "Concerto in F" for music; Tom Howard and Joe Penner for comedy, and Judith Anderson in "Elizabeth the Queen" for drama. Of the people new to radio who joined him at the microphone during the year, he selects as the most promising Gertrude Niesen, Barbara Blair, Joe Penner and Alice Faye. (Miss

Faye, by the way, has been signed to a four-year contract by Fox films). The most important 1933 achievement in radio, in his view, is the proof of the possibilities of good radio drama presented by legitimate talent.

• • • A letter came to the Chicago NBC studios the other day addressed as follows: Angel, NBC Broadcasting, Chicago. It went directly to Harriette Widmer, who plays Angel in the Widow and Angel sketch.

• • • Nino Martini, famous Columbia tenor and Metropolitan Opera star, never has to worry about reducing to keep that slim figure of his. He doesn't get a chance to eat more than two meals a day and these are often hours apart. He recently established a fasting record when he went for eleven hours without food before a concert in Madison Square Garden.



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
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
