

DX fans are often puzzled by the time difference throughout the world, and have difficulty in computing the time at distant points with respect to the local time. Particularly is this true in the short-wave field, where foreign DX reception is not only possible, but a regular occurrence. For instance, when the Pacific network gives us the London rebroadcasts, no doubt many listeners are puzzled to know the hour in London corresponding to Pacific time. The accompanying World Time Chart answers all questions concerning world time.

The local time, under the "Pacific" heading, corresponds to the time indicated on the same

horizontal line in any other part of the world. It is seen that 2 a. m. here is 10 a. m. in London, 9:30 p. m. in New Zealand, 8 p. m. in Sydney, 7 p. m. in Japan, etc. If you should hear Manila on short waves at 6 a. m., you will know that it is 10 p. m. there. In order to determine whether it is the same day, or the preceding or following day, follow this rule: Crossing from dark to light area at midnight, indicates the following day. Crossing from light to dark area indicates preceding day. As an example, 4 a. m. here is 9 p. m. in Tokio of the preceding day.

That question has popped to the fore innumerable times in the past few years. And as we watch the production trend turn that way from time to time, it seems only logical that some day perhaps it will.

One of the principal reasons that the Shell Oil moved its Monday night show to the southland was the fact that there was so much talent available. Naturally Hollywood, Los Angeles' next door neighbor, has attracted entertainers of every type to that section of the country and unknown quantities are always available for the microphone.

The other reason for moving the Shell production to the lower regions of California was to make it possible for residents in that section to see it. And to carry out the idea perfectly, Shell is producing its Monday night radio festivities at the Radio Playhouse in Los Angeles, admitting the public free.

Georgie Stoll is maestro of the new orchestra. Rush Hughes remains the m. c., commuting between San Francisco and the south each week.

Likewise on that commuting list will go Yabbut and Cheerily and Edwin Imhaus. Bennie Fields and Edith Evans are southern Californians anyway, so they are right at home.

"Songs of Araby" is the name tagged onto a new series of musical comedies which are being wafted out on the NBC network 9:30 to 10 o'clock Tuesday nights. This, too, is originating in Los Angeles.

Armand Girard, the NBC songsmith, is going places. He is soloist on a transcontinental program now which takes off from the San Francisco studios Thursday at 2 p. m., Emil Polak's orchestra furnishing the musical background. Girard is also heard on the Del Monte program.

out land by the NBC facilities. The time to dial it in the West will be from 2:15 to 2:30 p. m. The broadcast will originate at Hsin-king.

While on that subject let's remind you that on March 4 Hawaii will pay tribute to the first anniversary of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's inauguration by sending a special program to the mainland.

The gala broadcast, to originate at the studios of KGU in the Islands, will be heard from coast to coast over the NBC facilities, beginning at 3:15 o'clock, Pacific Coast time.

I hate to spill the beans like this, girls, but handsome Mel Venter, KFRC mikester, has lost his heart (my investigators report) to a certain young song star in Ted Fio-Rito's orchestra—Dot Hill. She's a member of the Fio-Rito Debutantes, harmony trio. In spring a young man's fancy—you know.

Tim and Irene are reported to be considering a lucrative offer to go on the air in the East. Meantime they are making a tremendous hit with their Night Club Revue, winged over the NBC hereabouts from the Bal Tabarin Cafe from Tuesday to Friday nights inclusive from 7:45 to 8:15 o'clock. Principals in the revue are Tim and Irene, Kay Kyser's Bal Tabarin orchestra, Dot Kay, Will Aubrey. The Night Club idea was originally scheduled for only a few broadcasts from the floor of the classy cabaret, but by popular demand it is staying.

Like Southern folk music? Then give a listen to the program winged out over NBC and KPO from 1:45 to 2:15 p. m. Wednesdays. John Powell, the pianist, is featured.



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MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Eddie Albright, one of the real veterans of Los Angeles radio circles, celebrated the 2800th broadcast of his own program, "The Ten o'Clock Family," Thursday, February 15, 1934, over KNX.

For almost nine years this program has been conducted by Albright daily except Sunday, 10:00-10:30 a. m., and his homely philosophy and messages of good cheer have won him thousands of friends, as his fan mail testifies.

• • • When Helen Gordon Barker, art director of the De Young Museum, stepped before the KYA microphone on Wednesday, February 14, she not only observed St. Valentine's Day, but her "eighth Ash Wednesday on the air," as she puts it.

Miss Barker, who does a weekly art period, 2:15 to 2:30 p. m. on KYA, has been broadcasting her art talks for eight years, beginning them on KPO and moving to KYA nearly two years ago.

• • • KFI this week received the following telegram, which the station passes on to its listeners, without comment:

"As radio interference investigator for the radio trades engineering association it has been my duty to know what program has been most liked and most desired throughout the week. I wish to convey to you the information that your program "Cardinal Richelieu" has been expressed as the most desired including all eastern network broadcasts in Southern California including Los Angeles county and Orange county." (Signed) S. P. Dalton.

• • • Charles Bulotti, Jr., producer and announcer at KHJ, has always been a gentleman who prided himself upon his ability to take it. But Charlie admitted recently that he had had just about all the violence he could stand. Charlie was dozing away in his easy chair about 10 o'clock Tuesday night, when the telephone rang and he was advised that he would have to put KHJ on the air at 7 o'clock Wednesday morning. Clarence Hamilton, who usually performs the duty, had been rushed to the hospital for an emergency operation for acute appendicitis. Bulotti went to bed, but awakened at 2 o'clock in the morning with a hemorrhage from a bad tooth which had been broken off in the tragic excitement at the KHJ studios Monday morning. Bulotti dressed himself and went down to the emergency hospital,

where he found the attendants snowed under treating fractures, cuts, bruises, and all the ills that flesh is heir to. So Charlie sat down and waited, holding his throbbing jaw and rapidly getting woozy. About 4 o'clock the attendants got around to Charlie and fixed his tooth. He went home and to bed, crawling gratefully under the covers at 5 o'clock. An hour later, at six, he had to get up again and go down to the studios—it being too late to notify anyone to take his place—and put the local Don Lee station on the air. About 10 o'clock he went home for the day to rest up and recover from some of the stress and strain to which he has been subjected the last three days. Studio officials talked to Hamilton by telephone Wednesday morning, following his operation, and learned that he had rallied in fine shape, was feeling as well as could be expected and would be out of the hospital in about two weeks.

• • • Leah Ray, Phil Harris's lovely partner in song on the Let's Listen to Harris programs, is doing a series of Fox shorts with Bob Hope, involving comedy and music. She had previous movie experience with Maurice Chevalier in "A Bedtime Story."

• • • Joe Penner is in such demand by movie houses and vaudeville theatres that the managers are willing to let him have their most profitable day—Sunday—off for his radio program. He does stage work only every other week, lest it cut into the time he feels necessary for preparation for broadcasting.

• • • Eddie Cantor, on his annual winter vacation in Florida, will broadcast through Station WIOD of Miami. The usual WEAF-NBC network will carry the program, with Rubinoff's music originating in New York as at present.

James Wallington will be with Eddie on the programs from Florida. The broadcasting will probably be done in a hotel ballroom in or near Miami.

• • • Meredith Willson, Tommy Harris and the Coquettes (Annette Hastings, Marjorie Primley, Imelda Montagne) almost went to Sing Sing last week.

It appears that Warden Lewis E. Lawes has been listening admiringly to the transcontinental broadcast by Willson and his orchestra, which is heard in New York every Tuesday. But imagine Willson's surprise

when he opened a letter postmarked Ossining, New York, and found inside a cordial invitation from the Warden. Lawes wanted Willson and his orchestra and the singers who appear on his Tuesday program to come to the prison and participate in a concert to be given there within a few days.

So the NBC orchestral supervisor had to sit down and write a letter to Warden Lawes, explaining that he didn't come to his party and probably wouldn't be attending any similar affairs, because he broadcasts from San Francisco, not New York.

• • • Senator Fishface, that enthusiastic orator and tireless syllable twister, has such a following in the Northwest that he has been signed as the stellar attraction at two automobile shows there next month. He will be missing from NBC programs March 3 and March 10, while he is in the North.

• • • Thomas Kelly, veteran actor of the legitimate stage, has become a member of the group presenting radio dramas over KFRC and the Columbia-Don Lee network as the "Little Theater of the Air," and will take a leading rôle in future episodes of "The Adventures of John Ridd," thrilling serial based upon the famous novel of R. D. Blackmore, "Lorna Doone."

Mr. Kelly, a native of New York City, has been on the stage for eighteen years. He has played in London, New York, and the country over with Charles Hawtrey, John Drew, Ethel Barrymore, with whom he played for three years, and others. He was "The Caliph" in Harrison Gray Fiske's "Kismet," and played the juvenile leads in Tarkington's "Seventeen" and "Clarence." His play, "The Son of Isis," was produced by Stuart Walker. He has sold poems, articles, and a half-dozen scenarios, and has had previous radio experience, both as actor and director. Mr. Kelly spent a year in France with the First Army. His hobbies are horseback riding and children, and he finds exaltation in symphonic music and beauty in language.

• • • Stuart Churchill not only is the stellar high tenor with Waring's Pennsylvanians, but is a stooge for the entire band. For example, when Poley McClintock deserts his stand at the traps to clown before the microphone, Stuart fills in most capably. In addition, he is a virtuoso on the xylophone. Stuart also is adept on the violin, banjo and saxophone. Whenever one of the regular instrumentalists takes ill, Fred feels perfectly at ease because young Churchill can pinch-blow or pinch-strum as the case may be. He was working his way through the University of Michigan as a waiter when he

met the Waring gang. He asked for and got a job.

• • • NBC folk will be much in evidence at the pier when the Dollar liner President Coolidge sails from San Francisco Feb. 23.

Betty Marino, violinist who has been a member of the National Broadcasting Company staff since the inception of the Western Division, will be aboard the Coolidge, on a 'round-the-world cruise. The pretty, dark-eyed musician is a general favorite at NBC, and a host of microphone stars will be at the Coolidge to bid her bon voyage.

Miss Marino probably will be absent six months on the tour. She will stop in Honolulu, Kobe, Hongkong, Manila and Singapore, spending a month in the latter city, with friends there. Then she will visit Penang, and Ceylon, and go from there to India.

She will sail from Bombay to the African coast and through the Red Sea to Egypt, where she will stop at Cairo for more sight-seeing, paying her respects to the Sphinx and other famous spots, then go through the Suez Canal and the Mediterranean to Italy. She will pause at Naples, Genoa and other Italian cities, and if time permits she may study music in Italy for a while. From Italy she will go to England, stopping in London before sailing from Southampton in the early summer. She will stay in New York for a time before returning to California by way of the Panama Canal.

In Italy Miss Marino probably will make the acquaintance of relatives whom she has never seen before. Her family is a noted musical one; her father and mother are Neapolitans whom music brought to this country before she was born, and music is her heritage. Her father played harp in various symphony orchestras until a few years ago, and his brother, Pietro Marino, plays first violin with the Metropolitan Grand Opera Company. Her mother's brother, Nicoli Pinnella, is a well known flutist.

Miss Marino entered radio at Station KGO in the early days of broadcasting in the west. She conducted a woman's orchestra previously.

NBC listeners know her as a soloist and as a member of the Woman's Magazine of the Air orchestra.

• • • Betty Marino, NBC violinist, heard on the Woman's Magazine of the Air, has a relative in Italy who is married to a member of the Borgina family, a descendant of Lucrezia.

• • • Jennison Parker, who plays the effervescent "Yahbut" in the Yahbut and Cheerily comedy travelogues on the Shell Show, also writes the scripts. Bill Wright, who plays Reginald Cheerily, the English globe trotter and lecturer, is production manager for KFRC and is one of the most versatile radio performers in the country, playing a wide variety of character rôles.

• • • Jeanie Lang, the diminutive songstress, returned to radio bringing with her the Three Rascals for the new "Powderbox Revue" starring Jack Whiting and Jack Denny's orchestra. For the past few months Jean has been busily engaged on the vaudeville boards. In the same troupe with her were the Three Rascals, a west coast novelty and vocal trio including Bob Keiph, Fred Frutsch and Robert Harthun. Their stage combination was so successful that her sponsor decided to include them in the cast of "Powderbox Revue." A native of St. Louis, Jeanie first came into prominence when Paul Whiteman gave her a rôle in "The King of Jazz." Following this she appeared in "Ballyhoo" on the Broadway stage and later returned to California for radio work. A rush wire from Jack Denny brought her to New York in the summer of 1932 and under his auspices she became a network favorite. Last year she was on the Stoopnagle and Budd program over CBS.

• • • Hazel Warner, San Francisco contralto who is regarded affectionately by an army of fans, has joined the Al Pearce Gang and with "The Old Spinning Wheel" and similar songs, sung in her characteristic manner, is adding a touch of graciousness to the program heard daily over an NBC-KGO network, and transcontinentally on Saturdays.

• • • The Central Presbyterian Church of Waco, Texas, wrote to NBC, Chicago, asking for an autographed picture of Bill Hay to sell at auction on the occasion of its sixty-fifth anniversary "because of his prominence in world affairs." Bill sent the picture and wrote saying that he hoped they would be able to sell it for at least twenty-five cents.

• • • A distinguished list of actors compose the cast of "Catherine the Great," the absorbing drama of eighteen century Russia, heard over the Don Lee Columbia Broadcasting System Saturday nights. The Empress Catherine is played by Mora Martin, who has a number of successfully played radio rôles to her credit. The soldier, Gregory Orloff, is played by True Boardman. Lucille La Pointe takes the part of the old servant, Naranka. Ted Osborne, who plays Potemkin, spent many years on the New York stage and directed plays in the New England states. The part of Catherine's maid of honor, Mme. La Ponierre, is played by Paula Winslow. Other members of the cast are Malcolm Meacham as the Grand Duke Paul Petrovitch, Martha Wentworth as the Grand Duchess Maria Feodrovna, and Carlton Kadell as Sascha Lanskoï.

• • • Richard Holman, who authors, produces and appears in the synthetic cub reporter sketch "Milly and Billy" on KYA, has been added to that station's continuity staff.

• • • Few of our radio luminaries were born with gold spoons in their mouths. Many had to work their way through preparatory schools and college, and their ways and means were devious. For instance:—Bing Crosby worked in the post office, and during the crop season spent many a hard day in the orchards. No razzberries, either—Louis Dean milked three cows a day while attending primary school. He's seen better days;—Lulu McConnell gave entertainments and also taught the youngsters of her home town the heel-and-toe. Breaking in on the jig time—Freddie Rich played piano in a nickelodeon for \$6 a week when he was only eleven. Patrons paid to see the pictures—Don Ross showed his versatility as a chauffeur, ditch-digger, roofer and tire builder.—Mildred Rose, a self-taught pianist, played in her home town movie theatre to pay for her first singing lessons.—Willard Robison was the proud possessor of a newspaper route.—Babs Ryan, one of the "Three Smoothies" on the Waring program, earned her pin money teaching piano and playing for dances.—George Jessel has been self-supporting since he was ten.—Kate Smith, while studying nursing, sang at private social functions. She had lots of patience before she got her chance.—Christy Walsh had a busy time of it after classes at St. Vincent's and the University of Southern California, cutting lawns and selling men's furnishings.—Gypsy Nina played at a nickelodeon for \$7 weekly in Liberty, Mo., while attending William Jewell College.

SILHOUETTES

LAURENCE TIBBETT, the sensational young baritone of the Metropolitan Opera Company, was born in Bakersfield, California, November 19, 1896. It was the family wish that he should grow up strong and husky to succeed his father as sheriff of Kern County. But that desire died when William Tibbett was killed in a fight with a trapped gun-man.

Lawrence was six years old when the widowed mother moved to Los Angeles. He had a special talent for dramatics and it is reported that at school productions in which he took part he was able to move his youthful audience to tears and audible sobs. Whenever the opportunity offered itself, he studied music. Vacations were often passed on ranches with his grandfather where young Lawrence learned valuable lessons from the entertainments staged by the cowboys.

The remainder of Tibbett's youth was divided between drama and music. He joined Tyrone Power's Shakespearean repertory company and played important rôles. Then he swung over to a light opera company, playing up and down the Pacific Coast.

The end of the war saw Tibbett serving as a seaman in the U. S. Navy, where his singing was less appreciated. In fact, he was once or twice called upon to defend with his fists his right to "self-expression." Returning to civilian life, he continued to divide his time between the speaking and the singing drama, but following two operatic successes in 1923 at the Hollywood Bowl, he finally decided in favor of music.

Staking everything and even borrowing money on his life insurance, he headed for New York and grand opera. His arrival caused no more commotion than most newcomers, but after six months of the most intensive study he got a contract with the Metropolitan.

He began with small rôles and still caused no commotion. Then, near the end of his second season, came the historic performance of Verdi's "Falstaff" when a staid Metropolitan audience went wild and stopped the show for a solid quarter of an hour while they clapped and cheered the young American. Tibbett was made.

Now one triumph followed another. Principal rôles were accorded the young artist. He helped create Deems Taylor's "Peter Ibbetson." Gruenberg's new opera, "Em-

peror Jones," which had its premiere in the season 1932-33, was practically one long solo for Tibbett. Critics and public acclaimed this portrayal as his greatest achievement thus far.

HARRIET HILLIARD, who sings with Ozzie Nelson's orchestra on the Bakers Broadcast, the radio occasion for Joe Penner's salesmanship, is called "Snyder" by the boys in the orchestra, because that happens to be her name. She was christened Peggy Lou Snyder back in Des Moines, Iowa.

Of a theatrical family, her father a stage director and her mother an actress, Harriet had her first part at the age of six weeks, when she was brought on in a cradle. Ever since then she has been pertty constantly busy, in child parts at first, later singing and dancing. She found time, however, to attend St. Agnes Academy in Kansas City, where she was captain of the basketball team and a member of the swimming team. Ramona was a classmate there.

Harriet also studied ballet dancing under Chester Hale. At fifteen she was in vaudeville and in the ensuing years appeared at various times with Bert Lahr, Ken Murray and others. She made a total of six swings around the Orpheum circuit, from Canada to Florida, New York to California.

Less than three years ago Harriet was a sort of mistress of ceremonies with N. T. G. at the Hollywood Restaurant in New York, where Ozzie Nelson admired her talent and asked her to join his crew at the Glen Island Casino, where he was playing with an NBC wire. She has been with him since then.

Harriet is 5 feet 4¾ inches tall; weighs 114 pounds; has a light complexion, very blond hair. She is extravagant about shoes and now has thirty pairs. Her favorite dish is chili con carne and she dislikes the color green and people who point out obvious mistakes that she knows all about already. She admires Mildred Bailey's singing and her heroine is Sarah Bernhardt. If she ever had the time and money she would take a trip around the world, then buy an old Connecticut farmhouse and fix it up. She is something of an amateur interior decorator and can cook and sew but gets no chance to exercise these arts. In fact, she hasn't had a vacation in four years.

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

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
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
