

# ETHER GLEANINGS

THE birth of a new comedy team which will make a strong bid for the coveted Amos 'n' Andy audience, is scheduled to come about April 30 on a nationwide scale over the NBC wireup.

Fully confident that they can "hold over" the listening legion to the world's most popular radio actors, the Gillette Razor company has bought the fifteen minutes on the NBC chain, coast-to-coast and border-to-border, just following Amos 'n' Andy. And on their program will go a radio pair of laugh-makers, who already are well established in the East. They are known as Gene and Glenn. The names, of course, are new to Coast dialers. The Gillette program will follow the same schedule as the Pepsodent broadcast, daily except Saturday and Sunday.

The novelty of the idea will probably keep the Amos 'n' Andy audience tuned in if the Gillette program is strong enough to hold them, they will gain one of the largest radio audiences in the country today.

One by one the nation's big manufacturers are recognizing the value of radio as an advertising medium.

Gillette "felt-out" radio with a series of electrically transcribed five-minute dramas which are spotted on stations in various parts of the country. Evidently the results were satisfactory, for they are getting ready now to spend a few hundred thousand dollars a year in exploiting their products' via the ether route. We'll be watching with keen interest this new experiment.

Max Dolin, one time musical director of the Pacific Coast chain of the NBC and one of the country's better violinists, is now staff artist at NBC's Radio City, New York, and is featured as a soloist in a chain program on the Atlantic Coast and other programs.

H. C. Connette is grinding out continuities for KYA programs by the yard. "Connie," as he is familiarly known to the radio fraternity, gained radio fame with his "Memory Lane" program on NBC. He retired about a year ago. But you can't keep an old fire-horse away from a blaze and when he heard about Hearst taking over KYA, he ups and makes an appearance. Now he's on staff turning out "Mr and Mrs. Reader," "Vignettes of Life," "Children's Hour," and a number of others.

The Bank of America program "Leaders of Tomorrow" is giving work to a large number of radio actors, musicians, readers

The act, which is written by William Robson, motion picture author, in collaboration with Mrs. Lucy Cuddy, is released over the Pacific Coast chain of the Don Lee-CBS net work Tuesdays and Wednesdays. The principals in the skit are Tom Kelly, male lead; Dorothy Scott, feminine lead; Lou Tobin, the heavy; Nestor Paivi, Beatrice Benadaret and Ronald Graham. About fifteen others with minor parts also participate, in addition to Claude Sweeten's orchestra and Dick Aurandt, organist.

One of my readers in Saratoga has requested that I give the "low-down" on one of her favorites — Lena May Leland, of KQW. Here goes:

Miss Leland first came to KQW six years ago to act as piano accompanist on the "Friendly Hour" which was then conducted by Wynn Louthain. Shortly afterward Wynn left and joined KFRC. So Miss Leland became the mistress of ceremonies on the popular matinee period, which is still broadcast daily except Sunday from 1:30 to 2:30 p. m. Now in addition to this program Miss Leland conducts the "Children's Hour" on that station at 4:30 p. m., daily, and acts as accompanist for most of the artists appearing on the evening programs.

Before her affiliation with radio, Miss Leland played piano with an orchestra at the old Vendome Hotel, which was a California landmark in the Garden City.

Some of our foremost dance band leaders of today played in Hickman's band in the old days.

The program, "Pages from the Book of Life," originates at station KOMO, Seattle, every Sunday from 3:45 to 4 p. m., and is sponsored by the New World Life Insurance Company.

Co-starred with Miss Olander is Alton Phillips, reader, who is presenting dramatic bits of human interest stories, philosophy and humorous anecdotes. Assisting musically is a trio composed of: Aubrey Knoff, pianist; Ted Anderson, violinist, and Don Strain, 'cellist.

Phillips is a former University of Washington crew member and during his college days was considered one of Washington's greatest oarsmen.

Tim and Irene, erstwhile comedy stars of many NBC Pacific Coast broadcasts are heading for big-time radio. # SILHOUETTES



**R**ICHARD CROOKS, the distinguished American tenor who made his debut with the Metropolitan Opera Company during the season 1932-33, was born in Trenton, New Jersey, of American parents. Though there had never been a musician before in the history of the Crooks family, little Richard was already singing in a church choir at the age of nine. Sydney H. Bourne, the choirmaster, gave him instruction for four years, at the end of which the boy went to New York to sing at All Angels' Church, where memories of his boyish soprano voice are still cherished today.

At the age of twelve he shared honors with Schumann-Heink at a big music festival in Ocean Grove, New Jersey. He sang before an audience of fourteen thousand and was not at all self-conscious until Schumann-Heink kissed him.

Lying about his age when the war came, young Crooks enlisted in the 626th Aero Squadron. He proved an excellent aviator, learning the tricks of the air from Clarence Chamberlin, the famous flier. But because of his wife's dislike of it he rarely flies a plane any more.

Returning to New York, Crooks obtained employment with one of the big insurance companies and simultaneously, the coveted position of tenor soloist at the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church. He now felt that he had an income sufficient to marry on, and so he did. The bride was the girl who sat beside him from the fifth grade in grammar school through high school days. Today they have two children, Patricia and Richard, Jr., but neither of them shall be musicians, says the father.

In 1923 Crooks sang for Walter Damrosch, who was so delighted that he engaged the young artist to sing the third act of "Siegfried" with the New York Symphony both in New York and on tour with the orchestra. This launched him well on his first professional season; the second season the engagements doubled and the summer of 1925 saw Crooks invading Europe, singing with great success in London, Berlin, Munich and Vienna. Returning to Europe in the summer of 1927, he made his formal operatic debut at the Hamburg Opera in Puccini's "Tosca," following this with appearances at other outstanding operatic centers.

The Metropolitan Opera audience acclaimed him in his brilliant debut as Des

Grioux in Massenet's "Manon," and during the season 1933-34 he sang, besides the standard repertory, the leading role opposite Lily Pons in the revival of Donizetti's "Linda di Chamounix."

Mr. Crooks is heard on the Voice of Firestone program Monday nights at 8:30 every second week, alternating with Lawrence Tibbett.

**O**VER every broadcast by Jay Whidden's music and through every program runs the liquid music of Carl Fisher's perfect piano playing. Like the singing of Lee Norton and Lawrence King, it is an integral part of this sweet, strong, well-balanced program that Jay Whidden is introducing into San Francisco.

Because of great modesty, little is known of Carl Fisher. He sits there at his piano, always playing—even during the intermission. Because he is extremely dark, the dancers do inquire from one another about him and learn that he is a full-blooded Cherokee Indian before they notice that in those strong ever-active hands, rests much of the charm and a great deal of the rhythm of Jay Whidden's music.

Carl Fisher, besides being the most native of Americans, carries with him two musical degrees and a B.A. from the University of Arizona. But, he liked music more than he did medicine and Hollywood found him soon after his graduation trying his hand at anything having to do with the six or seven instruments he plays as well as the piano. The violin, as a matter of fact, was his first love and before he had even started to train himself medically he had toured the Southwest with his violin in concert.

The Hollywood Conservatory welcomed him and for some reason or other he gave up violin for piano. He has played in orchestras since he was thirteen—he has broadcast as a soloist just as long—and was on the arranging staffs of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer and Fox.

He composed all the scores for the Hollywood Premier—"The Cheater and The Spy," just before coming to San Francisco with Jay Whidden who looks upon him as he does his right arm. On the other hand, Fisher's loyalty to his maestro and the orchestra he works with is a very splendid thing to find, and accounts in no small way for the high grade—even music that is coming to mean Jay Whidden to San Francisco dance lovers.

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# MICROPHONE GOSSIP

• • • Cyrus Trobbe, KYA's genial musical director has one of the most complete musical libraris in the West. Approximately 25,000 orchestrations of classical, semi-classical and popular selections have found place upon his shelves. This cherished music has been insured by Cy for ten thousand dollars, so it gives the reader some idea of the tremendous quality of his library. Trobbe has a complete orchestration for a small group of instrumentalists or a fifty-piece orchestra, and believe it or not, like the mail man who had a day off and took a long hike, Cy's pet hobby is collecting music from all over the globe.

• • • With night-testing of its giant new 500,000-watt transmitter now virtually complete, the Crosley Radio Corporation has just been granted authority by the Federal Radio Commission to embark on a series of daytime tests. At the conclusion of these final tests application will be made with the commission for permission to operate this Gargantuan transmitter, with its most powerful radio broadcast signal ever generated, on WLW's regular day and night schedule.

• • • Yogi Yorgesson, Al Pearce comic, learned his Swede dialect at the source—working with Scandanavians in the lumber yards of the Northwest when he was just a kid. Yogi, whose real name is Harry Stewart, worked at a dozen different jobs before he landed on radio. He was a bellhop at 15, a picarooner in a lumber mill, worked as a rough carpenter, was a short order cook and dish-washer, learned to play the banjo at 18 and then went into vaudeville and stock companies.

• • • Jerry Cady, erstwhile newspaper reporter who came to KFI-KECA some two years ago to see "if he could write radio drama," leaves immediately for New York to start an important series of scripts for the Fletcher-Ellis agency.

Jerry's chief productions during his stay at KFI-KECA were the "Gilmore Circus," "Richelieu," "Makers of History" and "Tapestries of Life." Other serial productions from his pen include "Rangoon" and "King of the Toy Mountain."

Cady is the second major exportation to Eastern radio from KFI-KECA during the winter. Don Wilson, former chief announcer, being the first. Wilson is now an ace announcer with NBC.

Cardinal Richelieu, outstanding dramatic success, written and produced by Jerry Cady over KFI, will continue as before in spite of Cady's departure for the East, it was announced by Glenn Dolberg, program director for the Anthony station.

Arrangements have been completed to have Cady write the program as before, mailing it from New York for local production.

• • • Aileen Fealey, who is heard with Phyllida Ashley in NBC's "Piano Pictures" program, one of the few piano duos on the air, has never played anything but standard music and has four grand pianos in her home.

• • • Several radio listeners to a recent program presented by Linda Lee and her Louisianans over KHJ and the Don Lee network were astounded to hear the phrase, "Your announcer is Joe Twerp." Only when they had called the station to verify the announcement would they believe that it was actually the garble-tongued comedian of KHJ. They learned then that Joe really can speak without stuttering.

• • • There's no professional jealousy in the Phil Baker household. Not a bit of it, although Mrs. Baker is the former Peggy Cartwright of the British stage and the movies. Mrs. Baker says she is much too busy making a home for Phil and their young daughter, Margot Eleanore, to think of returning to her career.

• • • Jim Fettis' Orchestra, popular Philadelphia ballroom unit, have started a series of Saturday afternoon dance programs on the Columbia network. Fettis organized his orchestra in the spring of 1933, and since has been a familiar maestro in Philadelphia clubs and on the air over WIP, associated with Columbia's Philadelphia outlet, WCAU. The group includes ten pieces and is distinguished for its slow tempo and unusual arrangements which impart a rare richness of melody. Bob Holm, George Young and Ed Manley, under Fettis' direction, are responsible for the distinctive style of arrangements. The programs originate in the La Casa Ballroom.

• • • Fred Allen's Sal Hepatica Revue and the Ipana Troubadors have merged. A big show, lasting one hour, which is the result of the merger, puts Allen at the head of the largest radio production in which he has

ever been starred. The show is entitled "Hour of Smiles" and is broadcast over NBC Wednesday night from 9 to 10. Allen will continue as head of his own company of comic mimes, surrounded by one of the most elaborate musical embellishments ever put on the air. The musical list will include Theodore Webb, the "Ipana Troubador," a mixed chorus of 8, a male glee club of 12 and the Songsmiths, a quartet of men's voices. Music will be by Lennie Haytons' orchestra. It is the first time that two shows have joined to advertise jointly two products previously publicized by each.

• • • KNX's 25,000 watts of power starts reaching out early in the morning to far-off places—it never seems to have that "morning after" tired feeling although it works late every night, too. Here is a letter from Edith MacDonald of Dawson, Yukon Territory, to prove it. Part of it reads:

"I am a constant listener to the KNX Varieties, Paris Inn broadcast and every morning at 5:45 a. m. we listen to Bill Sharples and the Breakfast Club. Reception is simply great and at all times as clear as a bell. Although I say 'more power to KNX,' literally you don't need more power to reach the Yukon Territory." She also adds, "This winter has been very refreshing with its 45-66 degrees below zero weather." Signed: Edith MacDonald.

• • • Jack Pearl, always generous, is giving many laughs to his straight man, Cliff Hall, these Wednesday evenings on the Royal Gelatin Revue. Jack has freely credited his writing associate, Billy K. Wells, who has been with him since the inception of the Baron Munchausen.

• • • Monte Carter, talent manager in Hollywood for ten years, and promoter of many present-day radio celebs, has been appointed program manager for the Los Angeles Breakfast Club which is heard at 8 a.m. Wednesday over both KFAC, Los Angeles, and KFVD, Culver City.

• • • Charlie Lung, KHJ's man of a hundred voices, was recently the surprised recipient of a beautiful etching of San Juan Capistrano mission, done by Ostrander, and presented Charlie by Harry James in appreciation of Charlie's appearance at the Ocean Park benefit program March 10, sponsored by the P. T. A.

• • • Drury Lane, heard on "Noontide Melodies," KNX 12:45-1:00 o'clock Monday to Thursday inclusive, seeks to please all of his listening audience's wishes—so he has designated certain days for certain types of

songs. Monday and Tuesday, request numbers; Wednesday, old favorites; Thursday, light opera and musical comedy numbers.

• • • Emery Deutsch, a veteran artist associated with the Columbia network since its beginning, recently returned to the studios after a six months vacation. His programs will be of popular trend and will feature the violin virtuosity of Deutsch with a special orchestral background. Although he is proficient in the melodies and folk songs of his native Budapest, Deutsch also presents current songs with gypsy interpolations.

• • • Mel Frey, new continuity writer at KYA, is an ardent follower of "hunches." Mel tells us the story of how she happened to leave her home city of Portland, Oregon, and come to San Francisco. It appears that she was busily engaged in writing a travel series for a Portland radio station and while researching for proper material, found some interesting pictures of San Francisco. Mel got the "hunch" and shortly after the series was completed decided to take a short vacation and journey to the City by the Golden Gate. Several days later, while sightseeing San Francisco, Mel casually strolled into a large Market Street building. She says "Something seemed to draw me inside and when I reached the lower corridor I was amazed to see a large sign which read "Radio Station KYA." Promptly following her second "hunch," the lady found herself a staff member of this station—and a definite resident of San Francisco.

• • • Rosaline Greene, dramatic actress on Captain Henry's Show Boat, has a lot of "firsts" to her credit.

She was the first leading lady of the first dramatic troupe on the air, the first actress to procure a Broadway engagement through radio work, the first woman to be awarded a prize for a perfect voice, the first actress whose face was transmitted by radio vision and the first woman to act as "mistress of ceremonies" on an air program.

• • • Proof of their abilities in assisting Joe Penner's duck-vending efforts is obvious in the announcement of a thirty-nine-week renewal for Ozzie Nelson and Harriet Hilliard on the Bakers' Broadcast.

The present Sunday evening program, starring Joe Penner, over the nation-wide NBC hookup will be obtained, with the exception of a thirteen-week lapse during July, August and September, through June 1935.

Ozzie Nelson, first signed commercially by his present sponsors October 8, 1933, has in the short span of five months become recognized as one of the leading entertainers

among radio's dance kings. Ozzie's vocal efforts along with those of his attractive-featured soloist, Harriet Hilliard, have done much in making the Bakers' Broadcast one of the crack air shows of the year.

• • • Carlton E. Morse, author of *One Man's Family*, is busy with blue prints and house plans these days. He and his pretty blonde wife own two acres of land near Sky-londa, and they hope to build a home there this summer, among their very own red-woods.

• • • Just about three years ago Rudy Vallee discovered a new radio star while he was in Florida on a tour. He introduced her to the nation-wide NBC networks in one of his broadcasts and persuaded her to try a radio career in New York. She took his advice and shortly after she came north she met Eddie Cantor who predicted that she would go as high in her chosen profession "as anyone would go." Now she seems to be in a fair way of carrying out the predictions of both Vallee and Cantor, for the young lady is Frances Langford, one of the busiest artists on NBC.

In the three years since Miss Langford made her debut as Rudy Vallee's guest, she has come into her own as a radio star and has played a leading role in the musical comedy, "Here Goes the Bride."

• • • Cecil Wright, "Crazy Cowboy" on KYA is a genuine mountaineer and he is one of the few hill-billy singers who has lived up to the name. Cecil says that he was raised in the Oklahoma and Arkansas mountains, where the land was so steep you "had to put a harness on a chicken so it could stand up and scratch." In his "early" days Cecil just had a "hankerin'" for music, so he managed to buy a guitar and began at once to entertain the folks around those parts. Arriving in San Francisco in 1926 he started on his radio career and soon became known on the Pacific Coast as quite a popular entertainer.

• • • Lee Norton was born in Mexico City in 1912—one of thirteen children—father a missionary in Mexico. Started singing with a trio in El Paso, Texas—came to Los Angeles in 1932 with trio. ## We Are Thinking About It

MY suggestion for improving the service you give and making it more easy to use is as follows:

The system is in use in Great Britain and consists of a daily "time" program rather than station. The point is that the average listener looks at his watch and then at the programs to try and find something he likes. The program as it is now is O.K. for those who don't care what they get. One hears everywhere the same complaint that radio is not worth bothering about. All chopped up into 15-minute periods of indifferent stuff. By the time you've looked through two pages of programs you may have missed a lot of good items—even if you find it. From an advertisement standpoint good stuff will pay more and more. I and many others immediately switch off on hearing these very bad items, and a crooner kills any advertiser I hear instantly. Now the crooner has a right to live, of course, and no doubt there may be some who like it, but it is probably true that the people who prefer good stuff if they can get it are those whom advertisers would prefer to get in touch with. You would probably be able to charge more for putting ad-

vertisers programs in the proposed time program, if this is how you get paid for your service. It is obvious you can't pay for your excellent publication on \$1.50 subscriptions.
