# Eliminating Interference From Ignition

Many of the most severe cases of ignition noises in auto radio sets repaired by the writer have been completely eliminated by shielding the hot wire lead from the fuse holder to the set. The shield of the lead should be well grounded to the metal case of the set.

Always make sure that the aerial lead to the set is also well shielded with braid shielding properly grounded so that there will be no chance of pick-up of impulses from the ignition system of the car.—Clarence R. Marchbank, Galena, Mo.

### Removing Cone From Speaker Frame

One of the best solvents for removing speaker cones which are cemented to the frame is acetone. A small bottle of this liquid should be kept in all radio service shops.

### **Cleaning Tube Sockets**

An easy way to clean tube sockets which have become clogged with dirt and wax from overheated tubular type capacitors is to apply a hot soldering iron against the side of each prong, and at the same time pass a pipe cleaner through the prong. The pipe cleaner may be bent and doubled in half to clean the larger socket prong holes while the smaller ones can of course be cleaned without doubling the pipe cleaner.—



# Airline Model 62-307 and 62-407

In the few sets of this model which have come into our shop for repair it was found that the capacitor C-2, as indicated in the service diagram of this set, would be defective. Consequently, in tracing trouble in this type of set, be sure to check the .1 mfd 200 volt capacitor connected to the screen-grid of the 6L7 and 6K7 tubes. Even if this capacitor may seem O.K. it will be well to replace the unit with a 600 volt tubular type capacitor of the same capacity. — James Limbeck, Glendale, Calif.

### Line Voltage Set-Up

Here is a circuit for an autotransformer arrangement to step up line voltage for use in servicing intermittent sets.



Connect the filament windings of an old power transformer in series with the primary winding as shown in the accompanying sketch. A voltmeter test will determine which way each filament winding is connected in order to add its voltage to that of the line voltage. The single pole double throw switch is employed for changing the voltage from the high to the low and vice versa.—Edvin Johnson, St. Louis, Mo.

### Wet Electrolytic Capacitor Replacement

Since wet electrolytic capacitors are seemingly so difficult to obtain during these times of aluminum conservation for defense purposes, the writer has made replacements of all wet types electrolytic capacitors (except those of the voltage regulator type) with tubular type dry electrolytics in the manner as follows:

The electrolyte and complete anode assembly are first removed from the can which is cleaned well. A short brass machine screw and nut is then inserted through a hole in the can to which is soldered the negative lead of a dry electrolytic tubular type capacitor of the same capacity and voltage rating of the wet unit. The positive lead of the capacitor is brought through the insulated rub-

ber bushing for the positive terminal connection. The top cover is then replaced on the can and the completed unit is ready for remounting to replace the original wet unit.—

### Screen-Grid Tube Repair

In these times when every means must be employed to conserve on materials for national emergency, repairs on radio tube should be made by service men wherever possible, A common fault with screen-grid type tubes is that the caps become loosened. In such cases the writer has repaired all tubes and thus given them a new lease of life.



To repair a loosened screen-grid cap remove the cap carefully with a hot soldering iron. Clean the cap and all parts around the small tip of wire at the top of the tube. If the tip has been broken solder a short length of fine wire to the broken end.

Mix a small quantity of litharge (yellow oxide of lead obtainable at your local druggist) with enough glycerine to form a stiff paste and pack the grid cap with this compound. Press the cap into place and allow to set for twenty-four hours. After the cap has set firmly carefully resolder the fine wire lead which of course should protrude through the small hole at the top of the cap. Care should be taken not to apply an extremely hot soldering iron to the top of the cap too long a time as to open the contact of the soldered wire lead within the cap. — H. J. ### **CAPACITOR REPLACEMENT\***

DESPITE the best efforts of the manufacturers, it is unavoidable under the pressure of the present emergency that some delay be encountered in supplying even standard types of replacement capacitors. The greatly expanded production facilities that have been provided by some of the manufacturers have scarcely been able to keep pace with growing government and high priority demands and normal business has necessarily suffered somewhat as a result.

Fortunately, from the standpoint of the Service Man, capacitors to meet his requirements are obtainable, even though not always as promptly as he would like. To avoid the hardship of delays it is suggested that he plan his requirements reasonably well in advance, order in adequate quantities and maintain a careful check on his inventories in order that replenishment orders can be placed far enough in advance to insure maintenance of stocks on hand. While this article concerns itself with capacitors, many of the suggestions presented apply to other replacement parts as well.

A definite contribution that every Service Man can make toward minimizing difficulties during the present emergency is the strict avoidance of waste. We know that there are pressing shortages in certain basic materials. such as aluminum, which is so extensively employed in the manufacture of capacitors. Waste which results when a still usable capacitor is discarded because its leakage is slightly high, where a multiple unit is thrown out because one of its sections is broken down, etc., may involve a relatively large volume of aluminum and other materials. It is conceivable that a time may come when there will be limited quantities of these materials allocated to capacitor manufacturers for other than government products. At such time service jobs which use or discard capacitors unnecessarily will, in effect, be cutting down the supply by just that much.

It goes without saying that this sort of thrift not only helps the national market situation but the individual Service Man as well. A capacitor which demonstrates a leakage value which makes it unsatisfactory for coupling or blocking service may still be entirely satisfactory as a replacement for a defective by pass unit and will thus save the cost of a new capacitor in this latter job. Or where a single section of a multiple capacitor is shot, the addition of a separate, single capacitor in place of the defective section not only makes for economy of parts cost but avoids the headache of searching the market for an equivalent multiple replacement unit.

To follow this suggestion for conservation requires some form of instrument capable of not only measuring capacity values, but analyzing capacitor characteristics. If such an instrument rendered no other service its use in a thrift campaign might perhaps not be fully justified. It is widely recognized, however, that it can serve many other purposes. To such an extent is this true that capacitor bridges and analyzers have become substantially essential equipment in every well equipped shop and laboratory, especially during the past year or two.




Fig. 1.—A capacitor analyzer will provide information as to the exact value and condition of a capacitor.

Such an instrument is shown in Fig. 1. It provides direct reading measurements of capacity values from 10 mmfd to 240 mfd for all types of capacitors. Power factor measurements from 0 to 50% are also read directly. Leakage values are indicated by the 6E5 tube.

This information can prove exceptionally helpful in these times.

Shorts and opens of both constant and intermittent types are directly indicated and the instrument may be used for measuring values other than those of capacitor units. Thus insulation resistance of various materials can be measured to 1,500 megohms or higher, capacity between wires of a cable or between transformer windings can be accurately measured, etc. In addition the instrument can be used as a sensitive bridge-balance or output indicator.

Let's go back to the subject of capacitors. An instrument such as this one will provide definite information on the quality of a capacitor under test and thus supply information which will determine whether this capacitor is normal or, if subnormal, whether it is suitable for any use in a radio circuit.

When the Service Man could replenish his capacitor stocks from day to day, or week to week, he didn't have to worry too much about either the variety or quantities he carried on hand. The larger stocks required under present conditions involve careful consideration of these factors, however. Augmented stocks call for increased investment and therefore for careful planning if this investment is to be held to a minimum and the job of stock-keeping made as easy as possible.

One way of keeping the investment down is by avoidance of "exact duplicate" multiple replacement units. These are relatively expensive, and, as suggested above, are seldom required because it is usually only a single section that breaks down and a standard capacitor of suitable value will serve as the repair for this. Another means is to standardize on as few types and sizes as possible. This may not decrease the potential investment greatly, but it does simplify the inventory and reordering jobs.

In the case of electrolytic filter capacitors, for instance, it is often practical to standardize on a single general type. A round cardboard unit with universal means for mounting either

vertically on the chassis, or hozizontally under the chassis, will serve as a replacement for can, box and tubular types and is at the same time the least expensive of these types. There are indeed few filter replacement jobs that this type cannot satisfy.

The variety of capacity values and voltage ratings carried can also be minimized by recognition of certain facts. One of these is that filter capacity requirements are not critical as to value, providing only that the replacement capacity be not much lower than the original. Thus where the receiver manufacturer's specifications call for values between 4 and 8 mfds an 8 mfd unit will serve. For values between 8 and 16 mfds a 16 mfd unit will prove satisfactory, etc. Eights and sixteens will also serve where capacities of up to 12 and 24 mfds, respectively, are required. These are points which perhaps call for some explana-

In filter applications the receiver manufacturer usually employs the lowest practical values of capacity for the sake of economy. It is for this reason that replacement values should never be more than 20% lower than those originally specified. On the other hand a replacement can usually err as much as 100% on the plus side, usually with improved filtering as the result.

Electrolytic capacitors are made with tolerance of 20% to 30%. Actually an 8 mfd replacement unit may show capacity anywhere from minus 20% (6.4 mfd) to plus 30% (10.4 mfd). Because the lowest of these values is only about 60% above 4 mfd, a "low" 8-mfd unit would make a satisfactory replacement where either 4 or 6 mfd units are called for. At the same time a "high" 8-mfd replacement might easily fall within the minus-20% range Thus a stock of a 12-mfd original. of replacement capacitors rated at 8 mfd will likely provide suitable replacements for every value from 4 to 12 mfds. To take advantage of this will, of course, require some means of measuring the actual capacity of the replacement units - classifying them either by their actual capacities or into groups of "high," "low," and "normal." This is one of the valuable services rendered by an instrument such as the analyzer mentioned above.

The variety of voltage ratings in which filter capacitors are to be carried comes down to a matter of arithmetic. Many Service Men feel that it is simpler to carry filter electrolytics in only two values rather than in all four of the common values, 150, 250, 350, and 450 volts. A replacement 8-mfd unit rated at 450-volts costs perhaps 3c more than one rated at 350 volts. Where voltage values called for are 350 volts the larger unit provides an extra factor of safety and the elimination of a 350-volt stock reduces bookkeeping time and expense.

When it comes to mica and paper capacitors these same ideas can be applied although it must be borne in mind that some of the circuit applications in which these types are employed may be more critical than those for filter electrolytics. But the general line of reasoning presented above for electrolytics will apply to these other types as well, even though in perhaps more limited degree.

It is believed that more thought in the planning and maintenance of replacement stocks will help the Service Man over some of the humps unavoidably presented by the current market situation.

### SERVICING CONVERTERS\*

## How to find troubles peculiar to combination Oscillator-Mixer Circuits

SERVICEMEN encounter many receivers today that employ a single tube combining both oscillator and mixer stages in one glass envelope.

Although these produce the same result as separate oscillator and mixer tubes, coupling or injection of the oscillator energy takes place within tube itself and meter readings may be misleading due to the common cathode circuit.

### **Typical Circuits**




Fig. 1—Parallel feed oscillator using a 6K8 bexode-triode.




Fig. 2—Popular tickler feedback circuit with 6A7 pentagrid converter.

Examples are shown in Figs. 1 and 2, where the oscillator grid leak does not return to ground but to the cathode at point B. Since point A is

positive with respect to ground due to the voltage drop across R1, the fact that the voltage measured at point A is zero or slightly positive does not necessarily indicate that the

oscillator is inoperative. It may simply mean that the negative voltage at point A is not sufficiently great to counterbalance the positive voltage at point B.

The proper check in such circuits is to measure both the cathode voltage and the voltage to point A. If the cathode voltage is plus 3 volts and the voltage from point A to ground is plus 1 volt, the actual voltage across the oscillator grid leak is minus 2 volts and the stage is oscillating.

In Fig. 1, a parallel system is used to feed the oscillator plate. The resistor R3, used for the purpose, serves also to flatten the oscillator output and thereby makes for greater uniformity

of operation. If this resistor changes considerably in value, uneven output or "dead" spots at certain portions of the band may result.




Fig. 3—Hartley oscillator with 6SA7 pentagrid converter.

In Fig. 3, note that a Hartley circuit is employed. This is emphasized since it seems that many are under the impression that the circuits employed for the 6A7 are equally suitable for the 6SA7. Such is not the case. The tubes are different in that G2 is the anode grid for the 6SA7. The Hartley circuit is particularly suitable for the 6SA7; but not for the 6A7. This is pointed out in order that you may not be tempted to substitute an oscillator coil designed for a 6SA7 in a 6A7 circuit, or vice versa.

#### **Dead Oscillators**

No matter what type of circuit is employed, if the oscillator is dead, the set is usually completely inoperative. In some cases, where there is a strong local near the low frequency end of

the dial, it will ride through the i-f and the signal will be heard "all over the dial." This is a common occurence with ac-dc sets of limited selectivity. When no signal is heard, and the fault is localized to the oscillator, it is frequently advisable to restore operation temporarily by substituting another signal for the dead oscillator. This is done by connecting the output of a test oscillator to the mixer, either coupling loosely to the signal grid or feeding directly to the oscillator anode grid.

The receiver is then tuned to a strong local and the test oscillator is set to produce a strong, unmodulated signal equal in frequency to that of the station to which the receiver is tuned, plus the intermediate frequency. Thus, if the set is tuned to 600 kc and the i-f is 455 kc, the test oscillator should be adjusted to 1055 kc. If there is nothing else wrong with the set, the station should be heard. This stunt is particularly useful when it is necessary to give estimates.

#### **Curing Drift**

Oscillator drift is a common trouble with older receivers and is usually caused either by changes in the capacity shunting the tuned circuit, or as a result of the effect of temperature changes upon components of the oscillator circuit. For this reason, if it becomes necessary to change the position of the oscillator in any receiver, particular care should be taken to keep the coil and other components well away from any hot objects, such as the rectifier tube, bleeder resistors, etc. Where fixed condensers are employed in the oscillator circuit, the use of temperature compensated types will improve stability. Never leave a trimmer adjusting screw loose. If it must be turned nearly all the way out to tune, it is best to check the dressing of the leads and shift them so as to minimize the shunt capacity. Often this will permit adding more capacity in the trimmer.

Variation in oscillator voltage may cause frequency instability. This variation in voltage often occurs as a result of poor power supply regulation. When the avc is acting on a strong local signal, the plate current of all tubes under avc control is greatly reduced; consequently the B-supply voltage increases. This increases the voltage applied to the oscillator, resulting in a frequency change. With modern

converter tubes, such as the 6K8 and, to a lesser extent, the 6SA7, the trouble is not so serious, but with some of the older sets the effect may be bad, particularly at the high frequency end of the tuning range. Voltage may be stabilized by employing a regulator tube, and this is the practice in some high grade receivers.

When frequency instability suddenly becomes evident in a receiver which previously performed satisfactorily, the trouble may be due to a decrease in the plate current drawn by one or both power output tubes. Since such receivers often employ no bleeders, the power tube load takes over this function. When the load is reduced, due to a decrease in plate current, ave action causes greater than normal voltage variations, thus affecting the oscillator frequency.

#### Replacing Coils

It is frequently possible to substitute an oscillator coil designed for one receiver in that of another, provided the oscillator or converter tube, the intermediate frequency, the tuning range, and the gang condenser capacity are identical. Care should be taken to maintain the same lead length and positioning of parts as was originally employed.
