These compelling penny postcards root out volume repair work, and every job can mean \$10 or more added to your daily intake. Follow the simple instructions below for profitable results from your postcard mailings.

Mailing List. Compiling a good list is vitally important. Check these sources for names and addresses: telephone directory, lists from non-competing stores, milk companies, or newspaper delivery routes. Most cities have "mailing list companies" that provide this information at nominal cost. The best way would be to hire an intelligent school boy to cull the list in a house-to-house canvass of mail boxes. Every six months check your list for changes Watch for misaddressed cards and "moved" notices.

Addressing. You can easily address these cards a few at a time in your spare moments. If you wish non-deliverable cards to be returned, write or rubber stamp your return address in the upper left corner of the card's addressing side. For a large list of 1,000 or more, it pays to use a mailing list company (mentioned in paragraph above) or to hire girls on a piecework basis through an employment agency.

Timing. Post your mailings to reach prospects on any day but Monday



since it is usually a heavy mail day. Stagger each individual mailing over a few days to spread out sales results.

Spacing. Mail the different style postcards about three weeks apart. The cumulative effect will eventually draw all potential customers to your shop.



Repetition. Hammer away with these cards on the same mailing list for maximum business returns. When you've used all card styles, allow an interval of no more than five weeks and start the series again. Be sure to omit, of course, all those names that have responded previously.

Follow-Up. Many sales are lost because of delayed follow-up. When a customer answers the card, call on him quickly or arrange an early appointment. Your promptness becomes an important part of your service reputation in the community.

Servicing Intermittents*

Locating Defective Tubes. Poor Socket Contacts. Fading Capacitors. Other Trouble-Causing Components.


Of all the sets that reach the radio serviceman's workbench, the biggest headache producers are the "intermittents." So much time may be spent in locating the source of trouble, that net profit disappears. Rather than check an intermittently operating receiver at once, it may prove wiser to wait for the defect to recur, going on to repair other sets in the meantime.

If the radio cuts off completely, the tubes should be carefully inspected. Do all the filaments light? If they don't, one of them may be opening after it heats up. A good way to check for a condition of this sort is to "cook" each tube separately in

the tube-tester. A glance at the tester's fuse lamp every so often will indicate whether the tube filaments are still lit.

Checks should be made for intermittent shorts within a tube. This may be done by tapping the sides of each tube gently with a light mallet, or wooden base of a screw-driver, while the tubes are in the receiver. When the defective tube is tapped, it will often cut off.

In checking for other troublespots, tube prongs, grid-caps, and socket contacts should be among the first suspects. In cases where socket contacts have loosened, the vibrations of the speaker may prevent the tube



Some common causes of intermittents in the r-f section. Converter tubes like the 12SA7 often become inoperative after playing awhile. C1 may open, resulting in reduced volume and possibly noisy reception. An errant piece of solder may short the plates of C7 to the i-f shield can.



pins from making permanent firm connections with the socket. If the plate or screen contacts are loose, the arcing at those points may deposit a coating of carbon on the tube pins that will increase the chances of an intermittent. This carbon deposit may be removed with sandpaper or emery cloth. Loose socket contacts may be pinched together with long-nose pliers for a quick, easy repair.

gang tuner, as well as on the trimmers in other parts of the set, may be examined for breaks and dust.

When the receiver has a bandswitch, check to see if any of the contacts are loose or dirty. Dirt and corrosion may be removed with a brush that has been dipped into carbon tet. Tightening loose contacts, however, is not always simple.



Loose connections at A. or oxidized contacts within switch B. may cause intermittent operation as well as noise. A poor rectifier tube (D) may have an abrupt drop in cathode emission, and produce a sudden decrease in volume.

There are a few other areas in which intermittents frequently nest, which should not escape attention. One of these is the gang tuning capacitor, on which peeling of the plating may occur. An easy way to correct this condition is to disconnect the capacitor from the rest of the set, and then hook up the high voltage winding of a power transformer to the rotor and stator terminals. This will usually burn out the peelings. In some cases, however, it may be necessary to scrape them a bir to make sure they are thoroughly clean.

Poor Wiper Contacts

Dirty or corroded wiper contacts on tuning capacitors may also cause trouble. These rods may be cleaned with carbon tet and a rag. When tension is insufficient, they may be bent to make better centact with the tuning capacitor frame.

The insulating material between the plates of the trimmer capacitors on the

Removal of the entire assembly may be necessary to do an effective job.

Intermittents may be due to trouble in the loudspeaker. Voice coil connections frequently come off. Wires attached to speaker plugs often work loose, and produce trouble. Sometimes an off-center voice coil results in the scraping off of the enamel on some of the coil turns. These turns may short intermittently to ground through the pole-piece. To remedy this condition, apply coil dope to the bare wires, and center the assembly with shims.

Volume and tone controls may cause trouble when they become dirty or worn. Wiggling the shafts back and forth, and tapping them lightly with the back of a screwdriver, may bring on any intermittent defects. Replacement of dirty controls is better than cleaning them, in many cases, because repairs often lead to call-backs.

Fading Capacitors

On fading sets, capacitors are the most frequent offenders. Bypass and coupling capacitors in particular, should be carefully checked. Inspection may single out potential trouble-makers. In some cases the wax impregnation may have oozed out of one end of a capacitor; in other cases, the capacitor will be so old and blackened that replacement on general principles is advisable. Wiggling suspect units with fingers or long-nose pliers often helps in detecting defective ones.


Voltage divider sections may open intermittently. Carbon resistors which have "carbonized" are also sources of trouble to be looked for. Sometimes wire-wound resistors warp and short-circuit to the metal case on which they are mounted, causing the radio to stop playing. This is usually caused by the loosening of the fasteners which hold the resistor to the chassis. When this

occurs, heat causes the resistor to buckle.

Poorly-Connected Coil

The most common cause of intermittent operation of coils is a break in the winding, that alternately heals itself and re-opens, due to temperature changes or mechanical vibration. When disorders of this sort are present in a high voltage primary winding, voltage tests made during the time the defect is present, will usually locate the trouble. When the trouble lies in a secondary, and voltage tests are inadequate, pulling gently on the coil wire near the terminals will often detach a poorly-connected, intermittent causing wire.

Intermittent jobs need not be total losses. Servicing these sets only when the defect is present, and minimizing the time spent in forcing an "intermittent" to recur, may bring these difficult repairs out of the red.



Fading is often caused by defective volume control, or opens in C3 or C4. A bent i-f can may cause C1 to ground, resulting in inoperation. An open in C5 will produce shrill reception, and possibly a hiss. Voice coil openings will make reception inaudible, or nearly so.

TELEVISION RECEIVER ANTENNAS

PART II

(Continued from June issue)

Antenna Lengths

The length of the dipole used must of necessity be a compromise. That is, if it is expected to pick up three or more television channels with one antenna, some decision must be reached as to what frequency or wavelength to which the antenna will be tuned. Here, the Service Man will have to use his own judgment. As a specific example of procedure, let us take the New York area, where CBS operates on 54-60 mc, NBC on 66-72 mc, and DuMont on 76-82 mc. Three antennas might be installed with separate leadins and a switching arrangement at the receiver antenna posts, each antenna tuned and directed to its particular station. How-




Fig. 5. Where a twisted pair is used for a leadin, the antenna coil primary must be centertapped to ground. If a coaxial transmission line is used, the centertap is removed, and the outside shield of the cable is grounded.

ever, this might prove impractical, since seven stations are contemplated in the New York area, with possibly more in the distant future.

It is suggested then, that a preliminary survey be made in the particular location where the antenna is to be installed.

It is first necessary to compute the best antenna length for each station. For the New York stations, the lengths would be:

CBS (55.25 mc, video carrier) . . . dipole length, 50". NBC (67.25 mc, video carrier) . . .

dipole length, 41". DuMont (77.25 mc, video carrier)

. . . dipole length, 36".

The first step in the test requires that a temporary antenna, with adjustable sections, be installed. A chart is then made of the station signal strength, best direction, and best antenna length for each desired signal. Some arbitrary figure may be used for a comparison of the signals, such as the ave voltage in the audio portion of the receiver. The minimum requirement of the video portion of the receiver may be determined by rotating the antenna, noting too the avc voltage at which the picture starts to fade. The signal strength of the three signals can then be compared to determine their relative levels. Once the signal characteristics are determined, the antenna length and direction may then be arranged to favor the weakest signal. vet bring in the others.

Transmission Lines

The next important installation factor is the size and type of transmission line, or leadin. An antenna has a specific impedance at the point at which the leadin is connected. For example, a half-wave antenna's terminal impedance is 70 ohms, a full-wave antenna has a terminal impedance of 150 ohms, etc.

The primary of an antenna coil in a receiver is designed to work out of a given impedance, as established in its design. At broadcast frequencies, the input impedance of the antenna coil

has a fairly broad acceptance, in that it is either a high-impedance type as used in house receivers, or a low-impedance type, as used in auto receivers. However, at the high frequencies, the matching of the antenna to the primary of the antenna coil must follow closer tolerances and practices. Thus, the transmission line becomes a matching device which must match the antenna to the antenna coil. This function becomes a simple one, in that the antenna itself must match the antenna coil in impedance, and the line then becomes a device for connecting the two. All three elements must therefore be of the same impedance.

A mismatch in impedance causes two conditions to arise. First, the signal delivered to the receiver is reduced. Second, mismatch will result in the creation of ghosts in the receiver, due to reflections being set up in the line itself. The impedance match is not critical, but impedance values should

be kept within 5%.

The input system of the receiver may be either of the balanced, or unbalanced type, or a combination of both: Figure 5. In the balanced type, a twisted pair of wires of the correct impedance is connected to the two outside ends of a grounded center-tapped primary of the antenna coil. The unbalanced system is used where a coaxial transmission line is used between the antenna and the antenna coil. In the latter case, the grounded center tap is removed, and one end of the antenna coil is grounded. Either system may he used, depending on the installation conditions.

Twisted pairs are used where the leadin lengths are less than 75'. At lengths in excess of 75', the attenuation of the signal in the leadin may cause too great a loss of signal strength, necessitating the use of coaxial cable, which is a more efficient conductor.

The great majority of installations will undoubtedly use a twisted pair. since the cost of the coaxial leadin is quite high. In choosing a twisted pair.



FILTER CAPACITOR REPAIR

Openings in the common negative of a dual or three-section filter capacitor generally lead to the discarding of the defective unit. Capacitors with this type of defect, however, may often be repaired to function at lower capacitance and higher voltage rating. A repair of this type is not ordinarily recommended. In some cases, though, when specific filter capacitors are hard to get, the repair will produce a unit that will function satisfactorily until a new one is obtained.

Verifying Defect

Consider the defective unit shown in the sketch below at A. The open in the common negative section at



X produces hum, distortion, and decreased volume. You can verify the hypothesis that the open is at X, and not anywhere else, by bridging the defective unit with a new equivalent capacitor. No improvements symptoms will result, as the feedback in ac from C to D, or from C to E, is not corrected by this bridge.

Suppose we ground lead F to chassis—if it isn't already grounded—and disconnect positive lead E, either cutting it off near its root, or grounding it. By using D as a negative terminal, and C as a positive one, we now have two capacitors in series. The equivalent circuit is shown at B.

The capacitance is reduced to half of the original value (if the capacitors are equal), but the voltage rating is doubled. The remade unit should function fairly well at its new ratings, provided, of course, that it has no other defects. — Radio & Television Retailing.

some investigation will be necessary in order to insure a minimum of loss of signal strength. The insulation used in the twisted pair exerts a great influence on the signal loss. Ordinary twisted wire, such as is used in electrical wiring, even if it is the right impedance, is not recommended, since it absorbs moisture easily, and the insulation is not suitable to high-frequency work. Impregnated types should be used, and their characteristics at high frequencies studied, before a decision is made.
