NEVER UNDER-ESTIMATE THE POWER OF A WOMANIS

It has been said, the power of a determined member of the "weaker sex" can move mountains -- and men! Gates Radio Company has reason to believe this statement, for women play a vital role in the company operation. A recent employee count lists 142 females as full-time employees. Of this number, approximately 70 are working in different areas of our plant -- capably handling a variety of duties.


Assembly 22 is a good example of the important role played by our girls. There are 35 females in this department, as compared to 5 lowly "hen-pecked" males! Bob Strode is foreman of Assembly 22, which handles sub-assembly and final assembly of many Gates products. Three of these products are the Gatesway Console, Spot Tape, and Cartritape.

The Gatesway Console, installed in the studio, controls microphones and turntables. A control unit, such as the Gatesway, is essential for all radio station installations.

The Spot Tape, a comparatively new product, provides the radio broadcaster with a simplified method of handling commercials -- or spot announcements. Announcements are pre-recorded on tape, and the desired announcement is selected by moving the indicator arm to the correct number on the dial. After each announcement, the tape rewinds back to the starting point, so the operator may quickly select the next announcement.

An even newer product -- the Cartritape -- also provides an easy-to-operate system for spot announcements. Instead of a rewinding tape, a small cartridge containing a continuous tape, is placed in the Cartritape, which plays the pre-recorded announcement. A different cartridge is used for each announcement, and the radio station can keep a file of recorded cartridges to be played over and over again.

Previous to automatic spot announcement devices, it was necessary for the operator or engineer to wind and rewind tapes by hand, and listen to them, to make sure they had the right place on the tape. With Spot Tape, and Cartritape, they may dial, or use a labeled cartridge to automatically play the correct announcement.

You'll notice these have come to the department partly assembled -- Metal Fabrication and Cable have already put their touches in the product -- and Assembly 22 will complete the job.

Women are particularly suited to electronic assembly. Electronic parts and components are becoming more and more minute. The smaller hands of women, and a nervous system more adaptable to this type of close, tedious work, make them quite efficient. Our girls are versatile -- they can work on various phases of the sub-assembly operation, and can also step into final assembly as needed.

The above three products are just a small example of the importance of the feminine touch in our over-all operation. The girls in Assembly 22 -- as well as in all other departments of the company -- vividly emphasize daily why we at Gates "NEVER UNDER-ESTIMATE THE POWER OF A WOMAN!"
