Below is a summary showing the number of days worked by the people in various areas with no lost-time accidents. A lost-time accident is one whereby the injured person is unable to work at least one full day following the day of the accident.

During 1960, 3 Gates employees suffered lost-time accidents, and there were 62 other injuries which required the attention of the company physician. All of these accidents meant a lot of pain and suffering for the people involved!

All Gates employees are protected under the Workmen's Compensation Act. If an employee is injured while on the job, complete medical care is available at no cost to the individual. But -- just ONE injury is ONE too many! The individual must bear the pain -- the company must bear the expense of having someone away from work, in addition to the expense of medical care. Everyone loses when there is an accident!



Here is another incident in the life of "Reckless Russ." We can be happy "Reckless" is not really a Gates employee, and his careless acts are the imagination of his creator, Russ Miller, of Stock.

"Reckless Russ" carries vitally important messages for everyone. This sketch shows how a small puddle of grease left on the floor can be the start of an accident. These drawings illustrate how most accidents are caused by carelessness! One unsafe act can result in days and weeks of pain and discomfort -- and even in permanent disability!

DICK SPRUILL, TRANSMITTER SALES CHAMP FOR 1960: Larry Cervone, Vice-President of Sales, recently announced that Dick Spruill is our 1960 Transmitter Sales Champ. The winner of this coveted title is determined by figuring which of our Sales Engineers sold the highest percentage of AM and FM transmitters from available grants and replacements in each territory. The highest percentage of possible sales is what counts -- not the largest number. Dick sold 14 out of 21 opportunities in his territory -- or 67% -- or slightly more than 2 our of every 3 chances for a sale. Good work, Dick!

JOHN ANDRE IN SECOND PLACE -- BILL MOATS IN THIRD: John Andre batted 62% in his territory, by selling 10 out of a possible 16 transmitter sales during the year.

Bill Moats, the 1959 Champion, continued his good performance and ended up in third

place with a 54% average.

Final tabulations are not available as yet -- but it appears our company is close to a 50% figure for transmitter sales on a coast-to-coast basis. Our men are accomplishing this against competitors who are doing their best to obtain these sales. But, we are getting about half of the AM and FM transmitters sold in the United States, and our competitors are splitting the other half among their individual companies.
