THE PICTURE BELOW SHOWS THE PERSONNEL OF DEPARTMENT 36, where a variety of duties are performed under the able direction of foreman, Bob Bonness. Most of this department recently moved from 2nd & Maine to 2nd & Hampshire, but the Woodworking section, consisting of Barney Frese and Ray Hudnut, remained in the same quarters where they handle all wood cabinet building for the company. This consists largely of CB-4 and CB-6 turntable cabinets. Among other things, they also repair office equipment and build special files, cabinets, etc., for office and plant use.



The Cable section is strictly feminine. These girls are responsible for the assembly of almost all cables used by our company. Wire cutting and numbering for fast, convenient use by other assembly areas is also a duty of this section. Ruth Edens is shown on the right in a cable harnessing process. She, as well as all the ladies in this department, work from drawings developed by engineering sections of our company.



The Phasor section is one of the most specialized units in our company. This section builds phasing and antenna tuning equipment, plus other allied equipment, to the specification of the broadcaster. Phasing equipment determines the pattern, or area, in which the radio station may broadcast, and must be built to the customer's particular need to comply with FCC regulations. Consequently, no two phasors are alike. This section is responsible for the lay out of each phasor and the men work directly with the design engineers in the final assembly of their products.

The Repair section repairs and salvages all types of Gates equipment. They repair products the customer sends to us to be repaired and returned, or to be placed in our stock, repair any damage or errors made on the line, check and repair any damage or errors which may be made on the line, check and repair equipment which has been in a trade show, and repair products received on a "trade in."

The people in Department 36 perform a great variety of duties. They "tie together" many functions of our company, and work with our customers. They are another fine example of how all areas are a vital part of our over-all company operation!
