

THE AM FREEZE

The FCC has a new Chairman and, for the first time in its recent history, an experienced broadcaster is serving as a Commissioner. The appointment of Mr. Robert Wells, veteran Kansas broadcaster and Mr. Dean Burch as Chairman has strengthened the FCC and has been well accepted throughout the industry.

Perhaps this change in the complexion of the Commission will result in less FCC emphasis on the economics of broadcasting and place more attention on major areas of policy and on ways to provide more and better free broadcast service to our growing nation.

Last September the FCC proposed a rule change (Docket No. 18651) which would, except in rare cases, discontinue the granting of applications for new AM stations and severely limit the opportunity for AM stations to increase power or to otherwise improve their facilities.

The FCC proposal would also lump AM-FM together as a single aural service and would reject applications for daytime or nighttime facilities if any other AM or FM service is being provided to 25% of the proposed service area, or to 25% of the area's population.

Many broadcasters, consulting engineers, and industry associations have filed their objections to the Commission's proposed rule changes. The NAB took a strong stand and said that the proposed rules, as they related to major changes in AM facilities were "ill founded and will not assist in conserving spectrum space, but rather will result in a diminishment of the AM licensee's ability to operate in the public interest by serving listeners in his area".

NAB's comments also stated: "It is inconceivable to think that existing AM stations will be unable to continue broadcasting in the areas they are licensed to serve without eventually having a need to undertake major changes—No station would be able to request even a minimal power increase, nor would it be able to effect any improvements in service which involve 'major change'."

Your company also filed comments which pointed out that the growth of AM stations in the U. S. and has been accomplished within the framework of the free enterprise system, and that the result is a broadcast system which by any measure is without parallel anywhere in the world.

We stated that neither the number or the power of AM stations should be restricted by governmental action as a substitute for sound engineering criteria.

Our comments suggested that the FCC should encourage the continued development of a strong AM service side by side with a strong FM service—that the two aural services (AM and FM) are complementary and not the same.

It is hoped that an intelligent analysis of the many comments filed will result in the withdrawal of the FCC's proposed AM Rules change. As the FCC made these proposals last July, the addition of two new FCC Commissioners since then may indeed provide a fresh look at the healthy radio broadcasting industry, and result in a lifting of the eighteen month freeze on AM applications.
