
INDONESIA RADIO CONTRACT

This large contract, signed on July 22, 1975, is made up of 36 individual radio station systems located in 34 different communities. The equipment consists of (3) medium wave 50 kW transmitters, (1) short wave 50 kW transmitter, (1) 10 kW FM transmitter, quantity of (21) medium wave 10 kW AM transmitters and (11) 10 kW short wave or tropical band transmitters in addition to transmitting towers, diesel generators and support equipment.

A Harris BFE-50G3 50 W FM transmitter will serve as a studio to transmitter link (STL) at each site. All sites will operate on diesel generator power, as there is inadequate commercial power available at this time.

The first equipment shipped left Quincy 9-26-75, just 71 days after the signing of the contract, a real tribute to our manufacturing capability. Major shipments are planned the 15th of each month continuing through March 15, 1976. All equipment is planned to be shipped over a six month period, starting with the first shipment on September 26.

In addition to the supply of equipment, Harris Broadcast Division also has the overall responsibility for the installation of all this equipment at each of the various sites and the demonstration of the proper operation of the equipment for customer acceptance and commissioning.

DEPENDABILITY PAYS OFF FOR HARRIS

"How well we serve our customers today determines how successful we will be in the future" is a truism of which there is no better proof than our recent order from the Government of Indonesia.

Twenty-five years ago, Gates shipped to the then-young independent Republik of Indonesia its first Gates transmitter. Over the years, Indonesia purchased in small quantity orders a total of some sixty

transmitters, studio equipment, spares and service. All products sold to Indonesia work and continue to work daily — a tribute to Gates products and the technical ability of Radio Republik Indonesia. Also, it is important to recall the visits by Indonesian engineers to our factory where they liked what they saw and the people they met.

Today, Indonesia is a strong, rapidly developing nation with a population of some 140 million spread throughout a chain of islands over a distance of about 3 thousand miles. Broadcast communications are, therefore, an important consideration in the Government of Indonesia's development plans for its people.

On July 22, The Government of Indonesia and Harris Corporation, Broadcast Products Division signed a contract in excess of 20 million dollars — the largest radio

equipment order of its kind ever placed with any manufacturer. Why did the Government of Indonesia select Harris over the numerous other major international broadcast equipment manufacturers, each of which did their utmost to secure this order? There were three major reasons.

First—Product Evaluation. Radio Republik Indonesia in conjunction with representatives of an international consulting firm, thoroughly investigated and evaluated every manufacturer's equipment and proposal. All transmitters were graded on each of twenty-five features with the total points earned by each transmitter becoming the basis for the technical evaluation and recommendation. Harris radio transmitters, based on this comprehensive evaluation, were proven to be the finest product available in the world today.

Second—Company Capability. Only Harris was capable of supplying the quantity of systems required within the time allocated by the Government of Indonesia Development Program.

Third—Long-Time Relationship. The good product and service experiences developed over the past twenty-five years, between Gates and the Government of Indonesia, had developed a relationship that allowed us to sustain our position throughout the long and difficult negotiation and in the final analysis, was the predominant factor in our receiving an excellent contract.

INDONESIA RADIO CONTRACT FOR 36 RADIO BROADCAST SYSTEMS (Cont.) . . .

Commissioning of sites will begin in January of 1976 and continue through August of 1976. We have contracted an Indonesian company, Intermetronics, headquartered in Jakarta, for the inland transportation, installation and commissioning part of this contract.

Program Organization

While the contract was in the final stages of negotiations prior to signing, Howard Young was designated as Program Manager. A task force was formed for developing preliminary plans required to support this extremely tight time schedule. Much necessary work was done during the vacation shutdown period by the Purchasing Department to satisfy early delivery requirements.

A program organization was established after the vacation shutdown consisting of Larry Schlepphorst and Dale VandenBoom, Assistant Program Managers; Ken Carder, Program Planner; Wilma White, Diana Benjamin and Al Schafer, Expediters. Also a dedicated stock area was established in building No. 7 on Ellington Road with Bill Muse as Working Stock Supervisor and Jack Stanton as Stock Clerk. Hardin Stratman is devoting full time to this program under the direction of Ray Schafer, Engineering Systems Manager. Mike Preis is Manufacturing representative; Hal Thomas, Purchasing's representative; and Dean Niederhauser will be supporting the program from a financial standpoint. Others sup-

porting the program are: Gene Jaeger, Contracts Administration; Jim Barry, Sales; George Spellman, Credit; and Dick Goodson, Quality Control. Every functional department is heavily involved in this program.

In addition to our normal Drafting and Engineering support, we have contract hired personnel from the Electronic Systems Division, (ESD) Harris Corporation to assist in preparation of installation drawings under the direction of Hardin Stratman. They are Bill Lappin, Rick Dohlstrom, Fred Reese, Steve Gibson, and Mike Dick.

Overseas

Due to the large amount of activity at each of the 36 sites involving the overseas control of the program and the supervision of the installation subcontractor, it was necessary to establish an overseas program office in Jakarta. This program office is being managed by Ed Rabine, whose title is Resident Program Manager. Ed brings to us a well rounded background in this type of work. His previous assignment covered a number of years in Ethiopia. As this program progresses and more and more equipment is received, additional personnel will be placed in the program office and in the field to monitor the installation and commissioning progress.

This program was successfully launched through overall division cooperation. With this continued enthusiasm and support, it will certainly rank as one of the most successful in the Division's history.

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

In the last issue of Intercom I mentioned that it looked like fiscal 1974/75 was going to be a recordbreaking year at the Broadcast Products Division. Now all of the figures are in, and it was indeed one of our best years ever—in new orders, in shipments and in profitability. Congratulations to all of you on an excellent job.



We are now through the first quarter of fiscal 1975/76, and the news is still good. We are on or above plan in sales, in shipments and in all significant financial areas. And this is not counting the \$20,000,000 Indonesian order, which was signed in July!

Quarterly Review

Dr. Joseph Boyd, President of Harris Corporation, and Mr. William Stolze, Vice President-Group Executive of the Harris Communications Group attended our last Quarterly Review on September 8, and provided us with pertinent information on corporate plans and goals for this fiscal year, and beyond. Both of our visitors were very impressed with division results last year, and complimented all of us on a fine overall performance.

As you know, a regular part of each Quarterly Review is a discussion of progress and problem items. For the past quarter, major progress items were listed in the following order of importance. First, new orders, shipments and financial results continue to be on or above plan, and represent a very healthy growth. Second, the Indonesian contract was signed. This is probably the largest single order ever placed with a manufacturer for radio broadcast equipment. Third, our new MW-1 transmitter is selling at a rate well above our most optimistic expectations, while customer demands for our MW-5 and MW-50 remain very strong. And fourth, our

new System 90 program automation controller is beginning to take off in sales.

I feel another important progress item is our rise in employment. Since this time last year, employment is up 11%, and we expect further moderate increases through this calendar year in all areas of operation.

In addition to these progress items, there was considerable discussion of the excellent prospects offered by all of our export markets—as evidenced by Indonesia and Iran. To take full advantage of these opportunities, we are continuing to strengthen our international sales organization.

The one major problem item listed concerned our total division administrative function—which we need to strengthen to support our growing order rates and our production line capabilities. To accomplish this, we have recently instituted several new programs, which will be continued for at least a year.

Summary

In looking over last quarter's results, I would say that we are off to an excellent start toward another record year. And a large part of the credit goes to the team spirit we have developed. I am really impressed with the way almost all departments have responded to meet our rapidly growing order and shipment rates.

Because of this great performance we have significantly increased production on important items such as System 90 and MW transmitters, so that we should soon be able to respond more quickly to customers' demands. Also, we are on schedule with our Iranian and Indonesian shipments.

And because of this great performance, last quarter was the sixth straight quarter in which financial results have been above plan. As this has been accomplished under extremely unfavorable national and world economic conditions, I think it is a real tribute to our total effort. Again, congratulations, and keep up the good work.

the company as an assembler and was transferred to the Production Control Department where she worked for approximately 18 months. She is survived by her husband, one son, her parents and four brothers.






