## HEALTH HINTS FOR OVERSEAS TRAVELERS

Not long ago when you planned a trip abroad, you just packed your suitcase and left. Now, Harris Health Services will help you plan a

safe and healthy trip. Many services, first-aid items and booklets are now available to you. So if you are planning a trip, call or drop in for a visit with the industrial nurse. She will line you up for the shots you need, inform you of the information that is now available on the countries you plan to visit and advise you of the first-aid supplies that you will need to take with you. A drug kit, and water purifier will be sent with you when needed. To secure these items fill out a request form that is available from the nursing office. A few hours after this signed off form is received by the nurse, you will be instructed to pick up your "care package" from the P & S Clinic Pharmacy, 1101 Maine Street. If a water purifier is needed for the area you plan to visit, it will be sent to you through the inter-office mail. Be sure to return the purifier to the nursing office on your return so that it can be fitted with refills for use by others.

Our reference library is just being established in the foyer of the Personnel Department. It can be a valuable source of information as to the customs, climate or other interesting facts about the countries you plan to visit. At the present time, only one copy of this information is available but feel free to ask for copies of any of the information that you find interesting or in-

ormative.

One of the most important features of preparing for a trip abroad, is obtaining the necessary immunization. If you are planning a trip, notify the nurse a month in advance of the time you are leaving. This will give everyone time to set up your trip. However, if the advance notice is impossible, notify the nurse at

the earliest possible time. At that time she will confer with you as to the shots that are required and see that your immunization booklet is brought up to date. After you have had the required shots and your yellow immunization booklet is brought up to date, it must be validated by the Quincy Health Department.

A new feature added this month is the Yellow Fever Immunization Center established in Quincy at the Health Department. This center came about after the law was changed in September and eliminates many of the hurried trips out of town that were required before for you to receive these shots. Appointments must be made for you by the nurse on the 1st or 3rd Monday of the month to obtain this Yellow Fever immunization. If an emergency comes up and all the advance notification and preparation cannot be made, provisions are set up to see that you will receive all required shots and information before you leave the Quincy area. However, this emergency plan should be followed only when your trip is of an extreme hurried nature.

If you should find yourself needing assistance while traveling abroad either from illness or injury, please telex the nurse at once. If any medical expense is incurred, save the itemized bills

for reimbursement.

In summary let's say:

1. Notify the nurse a month in advance of your trip, or as soon as you know you are going.

Update your immunization booklet and have it validated by the Health Department.

3. Obtain all information possible on the countries you are visiting.

4. Be sure you receive your Yellow Fever shots when they are

required.

Harris also provides a special plan for those personnel involved in "War Risk" countries. However, to be covered by this plan, you must notify Nila Woodruff of your travel plans. Nila will see that all forms required for this special coverage are completed.

Provisions have been made to help insure a safer trip abroad for you. Please do all you can to help these provisions work. Contact the industrial nurse on any other questions you may

have.

# GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

For the past three years I have been reporting on our division Quarterly Reviews in this column, to give each of you an insight into the major progress and major problem areas at Broadcast Products, as seen by management.

In my first column, in 1974, I explained the purpose of the Quarterly Reviews, and how they operate—but as many of you have joined Harris since then, I would like to take a little space to explain these meetings again.

In brief, the Review is a half-day meeting between department heads and other key members of the management group, at which we go into quarterly results, as matched against division objectives, and the objectives of each department. At these sessions we delve into the strengths and weaknesses of our division, pinpoint the areas in which we need to improve, and discuss means to make these improvements.

At the end of the day we wrap up each meeting with our "Progress and Problems" session, at which we come up with a list of major progress items and a list of major problem areas. Then everyone at the Review votes on the order of major problem areas. Then everyone at the Review votes on the order of importance in each category. This gives us a consensus as to where we have been doing well—and not so well—and helps direct our efforts in the proper direction.

#### FIRST QUARTER RESULTS

At the last Review, in October, we covered the results from the first quarter of fiscal 1977/78. And, I'm sorry to say, this is the first time in fourteen quarters that we did not meet our sales, shipments and financial goals. This was due primarily to a weakness in international orders, which I believe will see a definite turnaround in the coming months. However, as international sales have grown from 16% of our total in 1974, to almost 50% in fiscal 1976/77, a slow quarter in this area has a pronounced effect on our overall results.

We voted "digestion of growth" as our second major problem area. Broadcast Products has grown so rapidly over the past few years that we are experiencing a few problems in getting our many people acclimated to their jobs. This is not an unusual problem for a fast-growing company, and I feel that it will improve with time, as our new people gain more on-the-job experience.

Our third most important problem was production costs, which are currently running higher than expected. However, we are taking steps to reduce these costs—and, in fact, one of our major corrective actions was voted the number one progress item.

#### VALUE ANALYSIS PROGRAM

During the last quarter we began a Value Analysis program, which is being handled by our manufacturing department. This program, when fully implemented, will include a comprehensive study of the design and manufacture of a broad range of Harris products, to see where and how manufacturing costs can be reduced without reducing quality. Eventually this could mean a big payoff for us, as cost reductions allow higher investments in new products, new markets and new facilities, and therefore promote continued long-range growth.

Our second progress item was the introduction of our new "MW Transportable" system, which packages an entire AM radio station—up to 20 kilowatts—in a single transportable building, ready for delivery anywhere in the world. Options include a living-quarters building and a generator building—both transportable, and delivered ready for use. Several countries have already shown considerable interest, and I believe pre-packaged AM, FM and TV stations are going to be a very large item for us in the future.

The third progress item was our development of a Compatible Phase Multiplex (CPM) system for broadcasting AM stereo. This system, along with several others, is now under consideration by the Federal Communications Commission, and we expect a ruling within a year to eighteen months. The Harris system, developed by Cliff Leitch, has definite advantages over the others under review, and we feel that when FCC approval for AM stereo is granted, CPM will be the approved broadcast method. This would open up an estimated \$100 million market for us over the next ten years in exciters, in transmitters, and even in studio equipment, as AM stations convert to stereo.

#### **FUTURE PROSPECTS**

Even though we did get off to a slow start in the first quarter, we can still make fiscal 1977/78 another good year. The opportunities are there. We have the people, the products and the know-how. And we still have the "team spirit" that has played such a major role in bringing us so far so fast. With all of this working in our favor, we should be able to take full advantage of the enormous potentials in our marketplace, and continue our steady growth for many, many years.

In closing, I want to thank each of you for your fine efforts during 1977—and wish you and your families a very merry Christmas and the best for the coming new year.

#### ENGINEERING MODEL SHELTERS



You no doubt have noticed the modular units that have been placed in front of the loading dock of the Manufacturing building. When fully equipped, one or more of these units can provide a complete, self contained transmitting station anywhere in the world for either radio or TV transmitting. Additional units are available for living quarters for the personnel operating such transmitting stations.

The smaller of the two units, 18 feet in length, houses two (2) MW-1's with a program input rack plus two (2) heating/air conditioning units. The larger modular, 28 foot size, is being equipped with two (2) BC 10H's plus a program input rack and

four (4) heating/air conditioning units.

These units weighing between 8,000 and 18,000 pounds can be air shipped directly to the transmitting site anywhere in the world. After arrival on site, the complete station will be ready for "on the air transmitting" within a two or three week time span, with all equipment pertaining to any one site contained within the shelter itself.

Another Harris Engineering advancement.

#### WOMEN AS WINNERS!!!

In September of 1975, Indonesian government officials approved a \$20 million contract for Harris radio broadcast equipment. It is considered to be the largest single order of its kind ever placed with any broadcast manufacturer. Included in the order were transmitters, antennas, towers, power generators and related equipment for thirty-six separate sites throughout the country.
