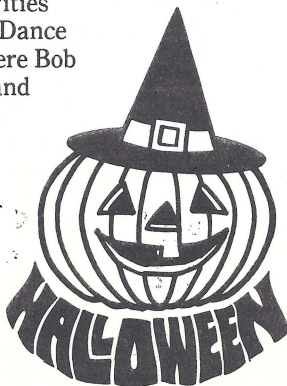
SPOOKS GET DOWN
