During the past several months, many Gates people have been busy taking many different kinds of adult education courses.

Seven men have completed the first 20 lessons of the Capitol Radio Engineering Institute group training course. They are Virgil Alderton, Bob Koetters, Roger Newell, Kyle Snowhill, Chuck Taylor, Will Lindsay and George VanDeBoe. Dean Fugate, who had already started this training before he joined us, has also completed it.

Several of these men have already enrolled for the next section of this material.

Nine engineers have just enrolled in an engineering refresher course being sponsored by the University of Illinois extension service. This will run for 11 weeks.

There are also many other people taking different kinds of courses and good reports are being received on their progress.

Are You Interested?

At times other have inquired about the Educational Assistance Program and how it works. The following material may answer some of your questions.

To Qualify

- Applicants must have at least 6 months of continuous service with the company.
- The course must be completed while the person is in full-time employment with the company.
- 3. Applicants will be handled on a "first-come, first-served" basis with the company reserving the right to limit the number participating according to the budget for the current year. The company reserves the right to terminate this policy on new applications at any time.

Financial Assistance

 Upon satisfactory completion of the course, the company will refund 50% of the tuition cost up to a maximum of \$50. Satisfactory completion means presentation of evidence from the school in the form of a statement, certificate, or di-

Gates Employees Credit Union Meeting Has Large Attendance




